Mild Flu Epidemic **Expected By Spring**

University of Kentucky students and staff members are being advised to obtain influenza vaccine in the immediate future as safeguards against an epidemic of mild flu and expected to reach the state by spring.

Dr. Richardson K. Noback, assistant dean of the College of Medicine and newly-named director of the University Health Service, said vaccinations have been recommended by the State of Department of Health. He added the vaccine can be obtained either at the Health Service or from personal physicians.

"The Health Service has been trying to determine the supply of vaccine available for Lexington."

Dr. Noback said. "At the present it appears likely that enough vaccine will be available to meet the needs in Lexington, although this cannot be known definitely until the demand the supple to the supplement of the U.S. Public Health Service rejected:



The Hole In The Dike

A gaping hole in the nation's highly touted research dike showed itself in the Research Conference held by the University last week-a hole which the waters of human events, particularly international affairs, are widening by a slow but inexorable erosion.

The Research Conference itself was not devoted entirely to scientific research. It was, in fact, rather a comprehensive program and included the physical and biological sciences, agriculture, engineering, and the humanities and social sciences. Yet the preponderance of national effort, finances and concern has been more and more toward technology as the frenzy to "beat the Russians" takes hold of more institutions and individuals.

Scientific study is broad and important, but an even broader and perhaps more important field, which holds the key to man's survival in the future, is being shockingly neglected. As we prepare to rocket ourselves to the moon, we seem to be forgetting that we still have to live on this planet with other idealogies, other races, other religions, like it or not.

We have heard our statesmen spout such blather as "peaceful co-exist-ence" and then solemnly nodded our heads in assent without stopping to realize that we really have no other vanced our technology to the point where a pushbutton will launch a flurry of rockets toward Russia the instant a flight of Soviet planes (or even a MIG-shaped flock of geese) appears on our radar scopes, but we have devoted pathetically little research to determine why Russianswhy men-behave as they do and how we can reconcile our differences short of mutual annihilation.

The answer to future security lies not in higher-flying missiles or more lethal cobalt bombs. It lies, rather, in reaching a fundamental understanding of human behavior and relationships, and in creating a race of men governable through a "peaceful coexistence" wrought not by necessity or fear, but by understanding.

This is not an original idea, or even a radical one; eminent men have been calling all along for more emphasis on man's social problems through sociology, psychology and other studies of human behavior. Ours is merely a reiteration of the idea that one of these days, unless we and other nations learn to live at peace, someone is going to push that missile-controlling panic button.

The resulting blast will be the biggest one any of us ever attended.

Art Gives New Life To Ancient Town

In Switzerland and Germany In Switzerland and Germany more than 40 years ago, the Bucharest-born painter and architect was a leader of Dadaism, one of the most avantguard movements in modern art.

Today, the 63-year-old Yanku js among the top-ranking painters of Israel. And in addition he is the country's most colorful community.

country's most colorful community leader: mayor of the Ain Hod arleader: mayor of the Ain Hod ar-tists' settlement, a cluster of Orien-tal houses perched on a hill south of the Mount Carmel range over-looking the Eastern Mediterranean. He settled it himself. Ain Hod is quite different from, let's say, Greenwich Village, Chelsea or perhaps Ascona with its Monte Verita. Its history prob-

Chelsea or perhaps Ascona with its Monte Verita. Its history probably began in the 13th century when the crusaders built, the mighty fortress and harbor lown of Atlit, half way between Caesarea and what is today Haifa Bay. In the same period, it seems, they built Ain Hod — more exposed to refreshing winds — as a sort of summer resort. The rame large pre-Gothic arches found in Atlit can be seen in some of the old houses of Ain Hod. Others stand in the open.

Ain Hod, which is Arabic for foundation of splendor," was inhabited by Arabs till the Palestine war of 1948. Then the inhabitants fied the country.

For some time the rather dispidated houses remained empty.

Later, new Jewish immigrants

Later, new Jewish immigrants tried to live there, but it did not work. There was not enough water—despite the romantic name — no electricity, no road to anywhere, and the soil wasn't very fertile.

The newcomers also left and with no one there the Israel security authorities were some-what worried. To have an empty village close to one of the main oads and rail links of the country didn't seem expedient. To cided to blast the place. Then Yanku stepped in. They de-

Working at that time for the Town and Country Planning Department of the Israel Ministry of partment of the Israel Ministry of Interior, he had been charged with a survey of possible sites to be kept as natural preserves. Ain Hod with all its romantic beauty was just what he was looking for.

"Okay," said the security peo-le, "you may keep the place if ou find enough madmen to live here. We give you two weeks."

But Ain Hodism was contagious But Ain Hodism was contagious and others followed the first three. The Ministry of Labor paid a group of workers to clean up the place. The Haifa Municipality "adopted" it and helped out by building a road and a water reservoir and installing a telephone. The artists themselves did much to make the village homey.

A fine album has just been issued with lithographs by Ain Hod artists. Some are among the best of the country — though it would not be correst to speak of a specific "Ain Hod School."



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

That's the question Kentucky fans are asking most often these days as the wire services and magazines began to scout the nation's collegiate standouts for

Cox's struggle for All-American honors has been complicated by the fact that he is a for-

been complicated by the fact that he is a norward. Only three other forwards are among the 20 All-Americans who have been produced here in the Bluegrass. They were Basil Haydon, who played in 1921, Carey Spicer, 1929-31 performer, and Wallace "Wah Wah" Jones, a member of the Fabulous Five" combination. Jones earned the honor in 1949. So actually, Rupp has had only one forward named to the

AA squads since his arrival in Lexington. This is due to the basic "guard-around" pattern which the "Baron of Basketball" has employed while Kentucky teams have raced to four national championships and 19 SEC titles. The Kentucky style offense stresses the guard play and the pivotman's role as verified by the fact that nine of the All-Americans have been outside men and eight others were centers.

In fact, the Wildcats had placed only one forward on the All-SEC team, before Cox made it has sophomore and junior years, since 1951, when Shelby Linville was named to the team. Most typical plays used by the 'Cats feature the guard passing to the forward, who fires to the center. The pivotman has the option of giving to the second guard breaking down the side or shooting the ball. Their other pet play is enacted when the guard passes the ball into the center and both split the post. The play has the same options as the above play.

But the coming of Cox changes this somewhat-a feat which even time could not change before the mountain sharpshooter emerged from Hazard. On Cox's arrival the 'Cats employed two plays which are designed to spring the lean, long-handed forward for a shot. Both use the double block, one setting Cox up behind the foul line and the other freeing him in the corner.

Does Cox himself think he will become Kentucky's 21st All-

"I don't know," said Cox yesterday. "Right now the thing we are worded about is winning the NCAA, or rather, just going to the NCAA. I think if we go to the tournament I'll have a much better chance. I guess every basketball player dreams about that all his life.


