The controlled paradox Brown's study unearthed is the fact that the majority of Kentucky residents studied want to increase the amount of tourists who visit the state, but that same majority does not want to legalize gambling, a sure way of increasing tourism in the state.

"Essentially, tourism is anturul offshoot of casino gaming." Brown said.
