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LET'S USE THOSE VOCALS!

Kentucky's new deal in football started last Saturday, but it was through no special cooperation of the student body.

For the past several years there has been a lack of the so-called school spirit in the University, but it was thought that this went "the way of all flesh" with the passing of the old athletic regime. This was not evidenced at the Maryville game, judging from the yelling done.

The cheer leaders, old and new, were at the game giving their aid in an effort to encourage the cheering section to show signs of life, but few were forthcoming. The band was there and its playing of "On, On U. of K." was the only factor which brought forth any noticeable response. However, we might suggest that it play louder. The music can't be heard throughout the stadium.

Friday night there was a pep meeting in the Alumni gymnasium and again the cheer leaders and band were there in an attempt to organize a cheering section, but the mass of the student body which was to make up that cheering section was missing. A handful of people, which could not have exceeded 300, a great many of whom were boys of high school age and younger, were there and did their duty. They are to be commended, but those who were not there, if we may revert to the vernacular, should be given a "Broox cheer."

There will be another pep meeting and game this week-end. There will be no excuse for the majority of the students not being there and no excuse for Stoll field not ringing with cheer Saturday. The game will be broadcast and a lusty cheering section would make a favorable impression on "listeners in."

CAN IT BE ?

It is the beginning of the end of the Hitler regime in Germany. Nazi persecution of the Jews echoed around the world and the persecution of the Roman Catholics for the last six months has caused considerable fervor. But the consecration of Reichsbishop Ludwig Mueller—the first step in the organization of the German National Church—will conclusively show that Hitler may be able to do anything else he pleases, but he cannot interfere with the religious life of the country and survive.

The persecution of the Jews may have been in agreement with most of Germany, and the injustices caused members of the Roman Catholic church may have been overlooked internally because the great mass of Germans are Protestant, but the effect has been developing. Consecration of Bishop Mueller will lose an anti-Hitler feeling in Germany which has been kept under cover for a long time.

In all churches of the opposition, Bishop Mueller and his followers have been "ex-communicated." The Germans will refuse to recognize their national leader and the world at large will show the same reaction as it did to the persecution of the Jews.

The consecration which had been planned for a year ago had been postponed time after time when foreign powers indicated they would fight the move for a national church under the regime in power. The absence of foreign dignitaries at the consecration ceremonies was an indication that the move would cause international as well as national ill-feeling.

Just as Great Britain, France and other powerful countries have been shown that their religious program is very apt to cause internal reverberations, so too, will Germany be shown.

The Hitler regime will soon be history.

INS—IMPORTANT NEW STEP

With last Friday's edition of the paper, The Kernel inaugurated in its pages the use of International News Service dispatches. By this means it is hoped that notes on current day events, which should go far in promoting general reading interest, will keep University students better informed, as well as enliven the publication.

This new service is of sixteen hour duration on Mondays and Thursdays, publishing days of the paper. Copy is sent from Louisville by bus to Lexington in the afternoon and at night, whence it is forwarded to the Kernel newspaper for editing. Although sufficient news matter for a metropolitan newspaper is included, only a small part can be used because of limited space.

INS long ago established an enviable record for colorful and accurate depiction of news and events throughout the world and it is the privilege of The Kernel now to bring these accounts to students of the University and other readers.

News from Switzerland, Japan, Mexico; from the world powers and the lesser nations; from states in all sections of this country—all live, bright reports, and all now available to Kernel subscribers.

Since the first idea, forerunner of our present Kernel, was printed approximately twenty years ago the paper has grown greatly in size and prestige. For years it has been the dream of Prof. Enoch Grehan, head of the Department of Journalism, that some day there might be a student-owned student-operated daily newspaper on the campus.
