#### SYSTEM DOWN ON OCTOBER 20th and 21st

On October 20th, the LS/2000 was unavailable while we installed the latest version of Microcode on the MV10,000. Microcode is the Data General operating system. We were able to do that operation as planned before 9:00 in the morning.

On October 21st, the LS/2000 console showed a \*\*\*BREAK\*\*\* message and listed a strange 7 digit number on the next line. This occurred about the same time we were cleaning the console terminal.

We may have activated a sensitive key. The BREAK suspended everyone. Unfortunately, the usual methods of getting unsuspected did not work. We are waiting to hear from OCLC as to why we had trouble with the standard procedures. We were down for about forty minutes. We should not have been down more than fifteen minutes. Thanks to all who called in to let us know they were down.



#### NIU TROUBLES ON A WEEKEND

On Sunday, October 18th, several libraries experienced NIU troubles. The NIU's are Network Interface Units that are our communications links to the UK Network. During normal operations the green light on the front of the unit is lit. Sometimes after a terminal port has been "unfrozen", the terminal still will not work. The information bits that caused the terminal to "freeze" in the first place may be stuck in the NIU's buffer. Often resetting the NIU will release the information bits and free the terminal. (Do not reset the NIU without instructions to do so, given by a systems administrator.) During this process, the NIU reloads its basic configuration of ports. There is a special IBM AT computer in McVey Hall that must be turned on and set to accept this reload. Somehow the IBM AT got out of the file-server downloading mode on Sunday afternoon. When the NIU's were reset, they were not able to reload. The libraries were not able to communicate with the LS/2000 on any of their terminals until Monday when the cause of the problem was found.

We learned something about diagnosing NIU problems through this experience. If an NIU's STATUS light (red) is blinking slowly, the NIU is trying to reload. The file server IBM AT in McVey may not be in downloading mode. Call Tari (7-2643) during a weekday to report this problem. Leave a message if she is not available.

On a weekend or evening, if you have been instructed to reset your NIU and after 5 minutes your STATUS light is still blinking slowly, call the Computing Center (7-2900) and tell the staff that your NIU will not RELOAD and your red STATUS light is blinking slowly. Ask them to contact the Network Communications staff and have them check their file server. Please identify yourself, your library and leave your phone number.

If the red STATUS light is blinking rapidly, your NIU is malfunctioning. The trouble is in your NIU, not in the Network! This type of problem will take longer to resolve. Call Tari during Monday-Friday working hours. We will try and diagnose the problem and fix it as soon as possible. It may be necessary to substitute another NIU while yours is out for repairs. We try our best to find the cause and get you back up within a day.

Your help in troubleshooting the NIU's will be appreciated greatly.

#### ELECTRONIC MAIL UPDATE

Several new E-Mail groups have been established this Fall, with several more in the planning stages. In the next few Green Beans, information will appear on the usage of E-Mail in the LS/2000 and who is out there using it. A list of E-Mail groups will be provided as well as for what E-Mail should and should not be used. We will be offering E-Mail training in the next few weeks.

ANOTHER PLST AGAIN?  
HOW DO YOU AVOID THOSE  
GHOST FINES?

At UK our system waits 60 days after the due date to assume that a patron has lost the book. At the end of that period, it automatically assesses a PLST (Presumed Lost) charge. We thought that if we went in and paid the fine for the patron, the system would declare the book LOST or at least that the system would not continue to hold the patron responsible for the book. LS/2000, however, does not work the way we thought it would.

In order to prevent the system from reassessing a PLST charge for the patron, it is necessary to /SS (Set Status) for the item to PL (Patron Lost). The system will display the status LOST in the Availability Status area of the OPAC record. The Patron's record is marked as having lost the book and the PLST charge will be split into two parts: LOST (the replacement cost of the book and PLSTC (Presumed Lost Charge).

It is best to wait until you can see the LOST and PLSTC charges in the Patron Record before paying or modifying (waiving) these fines. If you try to pay or modify the PLST before it is split, you may see

a ghost fine that is equal to your Presumed Lost Charge. Local Systems User Support staff must clean this problem up for you. Meanwhile, your patron may be hassled every time he or she comes to the circulation desk. We still have this happen occasionally. It helps to put a message on the patron's record explaining the situation. We have to remember to waive the OVDR, since we do not charge overdue fines for lost books.

Another problem with the PLST charge occurs when a book is checked in or renewed after the PLST is declared by the system. The system is smart enough to know the book is back now. It takes the PLST charge and splits it, then it assesses the overdue charge. The cost of the book is cancelled by the system automatically, but the PLSTC is kept. We do not want to charge the patron for the Presumed Lost Charge, but until the fine notice goes out, we may not be aware that the PLSTC is still on the patron's record. Maybe this can be profiled differently, but we were not given that option.

While PLST is a great way to encourage patrons to return items, and I believe it gets the books back often, it does generate many problems for us. Some libraries have set their Days for Item to be Presumed Lost to a higher number than 60. It seems to be less of a problem for them. We still get ghost fines occasionally and we spend much time waiving fines that we had not intended to assess. (Submitted by Tari Keller.)
