Modern culture bounbards women with the message "thin is beautiful." but the quest for this subjective beauty often can lead to the development of eating disorders, a UK psychologist says.

"We think the reason why women are very concerned about their weight is culture," said Dr. Laurie Humphries, a child and adolescent byschologist in UK's Eating Disorder Service.

"Culture gives one very strong message to women that body shape and appearance have a lot to do with self-esteem and acceptance within a society."

Anorexics have a low body weight, fear fat and have a distorted body image. Humphries said. Bulimics have average or slightly above-average body weight, but go on eating binges, secretly consum-

Alice Lloyd opens residence hall near UK

Alice Lloyd College dedicated a residence facility Friday that will provide free housing to about 24 of ne school's students who are pursuing graduate studies at UK.

The \$1 million H.N. and Frances C. Berger Residence Hall, also called Caney Cottage, is located at 444

Rose Lane.

In the summer, the facility also will be used to house Alice Lloyd faculty members, who often finish advanced degrees at UK.


"We are tickled to death with where we are right now," UK coach Tom Simpson said.



Technically, the academic orbudsman is charged with "consideration of student grievances in connection with academic affairs." In reality, however, the office does a great deal more.

Any cases in which students academic rights have been violated can brought to the academic orbudsman handled in the academic orbud

Sometimes, however, your best efforts fail and the academic ombudsman may be able to mediate or

find a new solution.

What are my academic rights as a student?

All students should be familiar with their academic rights, which are spelled out in the "Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook."

Some of those rights are adequate written information about courses in syllabi, freedom to express contrary opinion, fair and just academic evaluation and freedom from sexual harassment or discrimination.

A number of campus offices are

available to protest violation of stu-dent rights in non-academic areas. These include student affairs, mi-nority affairs, financial aid, Student Billing Service and international student affairs. It helps to be famil-iar with these campus resources.



The presidential candidates are only "addressing the symptoms," Bridge said, but at least they are showing an interest in reform.

Bush launched his 1988 election campaign with promises of educa-

Clinton has disputed this argument, saying public schools would

Education sociology professor Alan DeYoung said all three of the

candidates' proposals amount to lit-tle more than election-year rhetoric.

"They're on the right track to get-ting elected," De Young said.
"They're saying what people want to hear. But it's sort of a win-lose situation when you talk about more education funding."

He said the candidates trying to make people think that learning will improve America's workforce and increase economic development.

"People should not confuse training and education," he said.

DeYoung said the public does not have the appreciation for job train-ing that it has for academics. There-fore, politicians do not focus on acquiring job skills.

"When you talk about job train-ing, nobody's for it. But when you talk about higher education, every-body's for it," DeYoung said. "Eve-ryone thinks that good jobs are jobs where you don't want to get your hands dirty."

DeYoung said, in higher educa-tion, the humanities would be hurt by education reform because aid would be concentrated in areas re-lated to economic development and technology.

The overriding issue concerning ducation reforms is cost, DeYoung education reforms is cost, DeYoung said. "They're all going to be very

YPSILANTI, Mich. — When President Bush takes a look at the electoral map these days, he knows exactly how Bill Clinton feels.

With a little more than two weeks until Election Day, Clinton has an overwhelming lead in state-by-state polls, particularly in major states, and could win in a landslide if the election were held today.

The Democrat's electoral edge is a virtual mirror image of the huge advantage. Bush enjoyed at this point of the campaign four years ago — and Bush went on to win 40 states and 426 of a possible 538 Electoral College votes.

Analysts in both parties caution that things could change in the final 15 days, with a final debate tonight, but acknowledge Clinton is poised for definitive victory.

The Arkansas governor himself was annoyed on Saturday when asked about the possibility of a landsilded victory,
"It's way premature," Clinton said. "This election is a long way

People who suffer from eating disorders have several options on campus for getting help. The Counseling and Testing Center, the Mental Health Service and UK Hospital's Eating Disorder Service all offer therapy and counseling for eating disorders.

The Counseling and Testing Center provides individual therapy and group sessions for eating disorders, although group sessions currently are not available because of scheduling constraints.

When the group sessions are available, they deal with body image, self-estern and controlling impulses to binge.

Individual therapy also is available at the Mental Health Clinic.

At the Eating Disorders Service, people can receive individual, group and couples therapy, thumphries said. Patienta sow work with a registered dietician.

Humphries said patients are not limited to just one kind of therapy. If they want to participate in both group and individual therapy, for example, the service can accommodate them.

Eating disorders can be complex to treat. Humphries said, because they often are caused by underlying problems like substance dependency, depression or a post-fraumatic stress disorder. Humphries said that the Eating Disorder Services not only treast the cating disorder, it also treats any potential causes.

According to the American College Fleath Association, warning signs of an eating disorder include a person's prococupation with eating, food, weight and body image.

People with these symptom often count their calories closely, weigh themselves often, have restricted diets, are uncomfortable cating small meals and seem anxious when eating around others. "Women often feel they should be a body weight that is lower than a healthy body weight." Humphries said.

She said 85 percent of students with eating disorders had the

problem before they came to col-lege, while only about 15 percent develop the disorder after coming to school.

People who seek help for eat-ing disorders generally only do so when they feel it is completely of control, Humphries said.

But early treatment is impor-tant to help stop diseases that, if unchecked, can lead to death.

unchecked, can lead to death.

Anorexia nervosa has the highest death rate of all mental health
disorders. Humphries said.

Other medical problems also
can result. These include the loss
of teeth enamel and low calcium
in the bones, which causes frequent breaks.

in the bones, which causes frequent breaks.
Infertility also is possible.
Humphries said that 8 percent of women in infertility clinics have eating disorders. The majority of people who seek treatment for their disorders show some degree of improvement, Humphries said. From 25 to 33 percent improve somewhat and 25 to 33 percent show no improvement at all.

Waite discounted quotes attributed to former Archibishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie in a new book about the Lebanon hostages. Runcie was quoted as saying that Waite had misled him and that his love of publicity and lack of knowledge of the U.S. dealings had compronised his status as a negotiator.

Waite said that during his captivity he came to understand why peo-ple resort to taking hostages.

Waite holds a post at Cambridge University and spends his time working on a book of his experiences and enjoying the things he had taken for grained before his capture. "I'm much more thankful for the small things, such as to feet the wind on my face, to see the countryside." he said. "And recognizing that family relationships and true friendship, if you have them, it is extremely fortunate. I really appreciate that more than anything else."
