MINUTES OF THE SENATE MAY 12, 1924

The University Senate met in the Little Theatre Monday, May 12, Mr. Boyd presiding.

The minutes of March 10 were read and approved.

The Senate voted that candidates to receive their degrees in absentia must have the approval of the Deam of the College.

Senate approved the Registrar's request that in evaluating the standing of candidates for degrees, their extension and correspondence work be included.

Senate failed to approve the recommendation of the Rules Committee that all cases of cheating in University work be referred to the Student Council.

The following recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

I Combination Courses in Law and Medicine

"A student may combine his courses in Arts and Sciences and Law, or Medicine under the following conditions:

1. He must gain at least 97 credits in Arts and Sciences subjects with a standing of 1 or more.
2. He must have met the specified requirements of the College of Arts and Sciences excepting the 20 credits in the major subjects.
3. He must have been registered in the College of Arts and Sciences for at least one full year immediately preceding the completion of his Arts and Sciences requirements, and must have gained at least 30 credits in Arts and Sciences subjects in this college.
4. The fourth year, the year of professional work, must be done in the College of Law of the University of Kentucky, this subject to the approval of the Arts and Sciences faculty, or in a "class A" medical school.
5. He must in his law or medicine work secure sufficient semester credits to bring his total in the Arts and the professional work up to

127 credits, and must secure a standing of at least 1, or its equivalent, in the professional work. Professional courses duplicating Arts and Sciences courses or duplicating courses elected in other colleges of the University by the student while registered in the College of Arts and Sciences, will not be counted in the total."

II That, beginning with September, 1924, credit in the first semester of a beginning modern foreign language be conditional on the gaining of credit in the second semester's work. That is, a passing grade in the first semester's work in beginning modern foreign language will not entitle the student to credit until he has gained a passing grade in the second semester's work.

IV - It was further recommended that in the senior year of the Industrial Chemistry course, Elective English, 2 crs. per semester, be substituted for English 101a and 101b. It is understood that this English will be elective with the approval of the Head of the Department of Chemistry.

The following recommendations of the College of Agriculture were approved:

I "Drop Mathematics 13, Agricultural Mathematics, as a required course, substituting 3 credits of elective work.

Drop Bacteriology 102, General Bacteriology, 4 crs., substituting for it Agronomy 22, Agricultural Bacteriology, 4 crs.

Add Educational Psychology 116, 3 credits, in the first semester of the sophomore year, as a required subject.

Drop Animal Industry 12a, 12b from the freshman year, placing A. I. 1, Market Classes and Grades of Live Stock, 3 crs.; in the first semester, and A.I. 17, Breeds of Live Stock, in the second semester freshman year.

Non-Credit Courses in Home Economics

The following courses are offered to mature students who desire to obtain a maximum of practical information along certain specialized lines, but who by reason of time or qualifications may not enter the University as regular students. A small matriculation fee is charged for each course.

Elementary Dietetics. Two hours a week.

Men's Students Council

The following amendments to the Constitution of the Men's Student Council were approved:

ART II In line 2 change "twelve" to "fourteen."
In line 13 after words "Student Council" change to read: "All candidates for membership on the Council shall have a scholastic standing of one or better at the time of the election and not be on probation for any cause. If after election a member is placed on probation, he is automatically disqualified to serve and the Council shall provide for the election of a successor in accordance with Sec. 8, Art. 5 of the constitution.

ART III-In first line change "Twelve" to "fourteen"
page 2, the last sentence commencing with the word "Inasmuch" change to read: "Inasmuch as the efficiency of the organization depends upon its relative permanency, one member shall be elected

each year by the Council from its membership to serve thru the succeeding year.

ART IV In first line change "four" to "five".

ART V Insert just after Sec. 3 the following: No student shall be permitted to announce his candidacy for President or Vice President of the Council before he shall have obtained from the office of the Registrar of the University a certified statement that he has full junior standing at the time the certificate is issued. This statement must be filed with the President of the Student Council.

ART. V Insert between Sec. 6 and Sec. 7 In the event the "hold-over" member does not return to the University or declines to take up his duties, the vacancy shall be filled by the Council by election of a member of the Council of the preceding year.

ART V Insert after Sec. 7: The Council shall select from its membership at its first regular meeting at the beginning of each school year, one of its members to represent it at the meetings of the University Senate, and one member to represent it at the meetings of the Discipline Committee.

Rules
General Rules Page 9, line 2, omit "except those specified" and insert in their place, "except with special permission."

Dances page 10. Omit 1, 2, 3, and 4 and insert:

- (1) Dances scheduled shall comply with the following:
- (2) Afternoon dances shall begin at three o'clock and close at five-thirty.
- (3) Afternoon dances: Freshman Dance, Sophomore Dance, Cadet Hops, Club Dances.
- (4) The Senior Ball, Junior Prom, Military Ball and Pan-Hellenic shall close not later than one o'clock and may be held on Friday evenings. All other dances shall close not later than eleven-forty-five o'clock.
- (5) No dances shall be scheduled before Thanksgiving nor within examination periods.

Note: These amendments shall go into effect on their adoption, and shall be properly arranged and numbered by the Council."

The request of students in the College of Education to organize an honorary educational fraternity was approved.

Senate approved the organization of a local literary fraternity to be known as Omega Epsilon Literary Fraternity.

Rules
The following recommendation of the Rules Committee concerning the College of Law was approved:

- 1. "To be eligible to graduate a student must be registered in the College of Law during his last year of work and must gain during that year at least 26 credits in law, with a standing of 1. Resident study of law in member schools of the Association of American

Law Schools during a period of at least ninety weeks, and the successful completion of at least 1080 hours of class room instruction in law, are required of all candidates for the degree.

Senate also approved the following recommendations of the Rules Committee:

1. "Before submitting the list of candidates for degrees to the Senate, the Registrar shall obtain the approval of the names from the faculty of the college in which the degrees are to be obtained."

2. That in the future excuses for absence from class on account of sickness, other than those certified to by doctors or dentists or handled entirely by the resident physician or resident nurse, to be issued by the deans of the colleges.

The object of this recommendation is to relieve the resident physician of much of the labor that can be handled as well by the dean's offices."

MINUTES OF THE SENATE MAY 29, 1924

The University Senate met in the Little Theatre Thursday, May 29.

Consideration of the following report from the Rules Committee was postponed until the beginning of the first semester of next year:

"All cases of cheating shall be reported to the head of the department in which the cheating occurs, who shall immediately investigate all circumstances and determine the guilt or innocence of the student charged. If the student is adjudged guilty, he shall be dropped from the class in which the cheating occurs with a grade of E. This fact is to be reported in writing by the head of the department to the student's dean and to the Registrar who shall certify on the student's record: "Dropped with grade of E, because of cheating."

It shall be the duty of the registrar to acquaint the parent or guardian of the student (or the student, if he is of age) with the fact of the record. The decision of the head of the department shall be final.

It shall be the duty of the Dean of the College, when such report is made to him, to admonish the student and inform him that if he is dropped for cheating as a second offense, he will be reported to the Discipline Committee and be liable to suspension or expulsion from the University.

If a student is dropped from class for cheating as a second offense, the registrar shall report the case to the Discipline Committee."
