LEXINGTON, Ky. — UK has established a theater scholarship in honor

of the student who was beaten to death by the railroad killer.

Suspected serial killer Angel Maturino Resendiz is charged with killing
Christopher Maier, a third-year student from North Canton, Ohio, Maier
was killed Aug. 27, 1997 while walking back to campus from a party. A
woman walking with him was raped by Maier's killer.

Nearly \$7,000 already has been raised for the endownent among
Maier's friends and university theater department patrons and associates.

the endowment can support will be awarded each year to UK theater students who have "a passion for theater, generosity of spirit, a caring attitude
towards all, as well as a zes for life."

Victim of Murray State fire files suit against official

PADUCAH, Ky. — A student severely injured in a dormitory fire at Murray State University last year has filed a federal lawsuit seeking to recover medical costs and other compensation.

Michael Priddy of Paducah filed the suit Monday in U.S. District Court against Joseph Green, director of public safety at Murray State.

The suit, which seeks unspecified damages, claims Green was negligent by not taking steps to protect students after a fire Sept. 13 caused minor damage on the fourth floor of Hester Hall, where Priddy lived. Another fire broke out Sept. 18 that injured Priddy and killed another student.

Judge rules former dancer not discriminated against

PADUCAH. Ky. — A former exotic dancer was not discriminated against because of her gender or former occupation when she wasn't hired as a city firefighter, a judge ruled. Bonnie Ackerson sued the city Oct. I and her case was to go to trial July 27. However, U.S. District Court Judge Thomas Russell dismissed the case on Wednesday. Police officers and firefighters are required to be of "good moral character." CAPE CANAVERAL. Fig. — With perfect weather forecast, NASA prepared space shuttle Columbia yesterday for a second launch attempt with Elleen Collins, the first woman to command a U.S. space flight. Liftoff was scheduled for 1228 a.m. this morning. Columbia holds the world's biggest and most powerful X-ray telescope, the \$1.5 billion Chandra Observatory. Collins and her crew will release it from the shuttle seven hours into the flight.

Tuesday's launch attempt ended abruptly at the seven-second mark of the countdown after a dangerous buildup of hydrogen gas was detected in the shuttle engine compartment.

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
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


