my Dear son I received your long look for welcome letter it gave me great satisfaction to think you remembered your duty to me once more would ^{have} written to you long ago but did not know where you was you told ~~me~~ intended going to new Orleans glad to hear you did not I did not write in some days after received your letter in consequence ~~my~~ being sick at the time had just received the sad intelligence the death of your uncle Minor Winn Thomas Winn of Mills Point has informed us by letter he states in his letter he moved from Hanover thirty 2 years since being the only relation he had near him he states in his letter the way he learnt our residence was by a letter Letty Durrell wrote to Minor after the Death of Harvey Durrell Mr Winn informs us he left house and Lot he supposed worth fifteen hundred Dollars other property ^{some} six hundred he says he is an old Man but will render any service in his power in the matter he says will attend to the personal estate but the other must be attended to by agent Jersy has written to him I dont know what I have not seen him since February he came to see me and staid a week hunted with the boys which they enjoyed very much George you wish to know about Caroline and Child she is well but has lost the Child soon after you left the boy Toals lived but short time after you left here I assure you my Dear Son there was no attention been towards the Child on my part nor its mother could not have done more had it been my own was truly sorry on your account she expects to increase very shortly again you wish to know my charge for keeping her you remembered promise to keep her for her services which I will do now will not have you pay me any thing for keeping her as long as you chuse for her to remain with me now if you fear any thing hereafter you should keep this letter in case of Death which will show I am willing to
