

Dear Brother Hunter's Hill February. ^{the} 28. 1860

Your letter has just come to hand
which always affords me great pleasure to receive
them and it affords ^{me} pleasure to answer them also,
As I have but few minutes to write and no much news
to write you must excuse my short letter this time
I shall just write what you wanted to know,
well about the Deed for the 80 acres of land there
is eight legatees Durrett died without a will and of
course mother comes in for a child's portion which
makes the eight legatee, her interest will be allotted
with the perishable Property. I have deposited
one thousand Dollars more in Bank besides money
and Carolines, I can't say just now what all of
your interest will be But as soon as we can have
settlement I will let you know immediately, as soon
as you get this I want you to have the deeds signed
and send them to me, and then they will have no excuse
and will be obliged to come forward and settle with
me. I think by the first of April I shall have
money for you
