Coach Terry Hall &

Indiana State (1966)

Terry Hall's continuing record of achievement has been well documented at the University of Kentucky. It took her less than five years to become the winningest coach in Kentucky women's basketball history. And should she post 20 victories with this year's squad, she would simply be keeping pace with her outstanding six-year season average.

In each of her first three seasons, Hall led her Kentucky teams to at least 23 wins. Overall, Hall's UK squads have won an impressive 68 percent of their games. Four of those teams advanced to the national playoffs. One captured the Southeastern Conference championship. All but one have been in the Top 20.

Hall's success is not unique to Kentucky, however. In 12 years of collegiate coaching, her teams have known only winning seasons. Her career record is 214-115, with a 121-55 mark at Kentucky. She previously coached for one season at Eastern Kentucky and had a five-year stint at Louisville.

Hall began to establish Kentucky as a national contender in her first season as Lady Kats coach. That year the team won the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and Hall was named KWIC Coach of the Year. The Lady Kats advanced to the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament and completed the 1980-81 season with a 25-6 record. In 1981-82, women's basketball joined the NCAA and Hall's Lady Kats won the Southeastern Conference title and advanced to the Mid west Regional final before falling to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor.

The 1982-83 team rose to new heights as the Lady Kats were ranked fourth nationally and set a new women's basketball attendance record-10,622 vs. Old Dominion in UK's Memorial

Coliseum. The team was upset by Indiana in the first round of the playoffs, but finished with a 23-5 record.

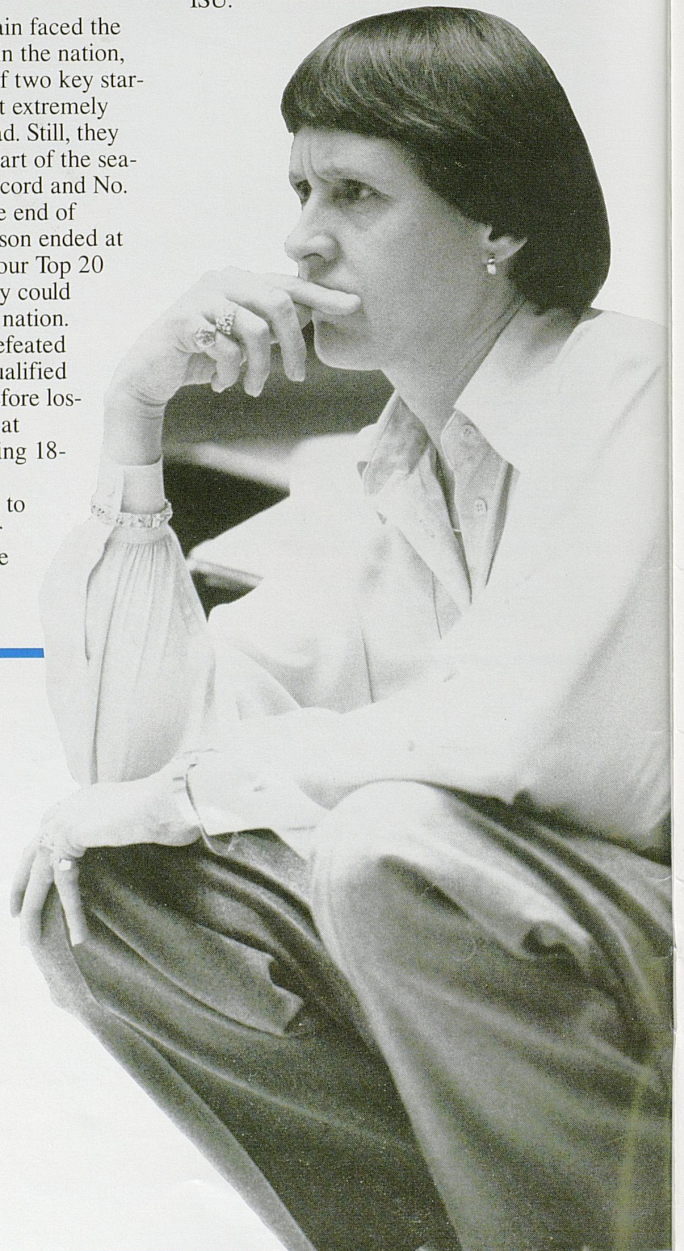
In 1983-84, Hall had a very young and inexperienced team that was challenged with the fourth-toughest schedule in the nation. The Lady Kats earned respect from their opponents despite their up-and-down season and finished 15-13.

The 1984-85 squad again faced the fourth-toughest schedule in the nation, and with the graduation of two key starters, expectations were not extremely high for Hall's young squad. Still, they came roaring out at the start of the season and owned an 11-3 record and No. 12 national ranking by the end of December. Before the season ended at 16-12, they had stunned four Top 20 opponents and proven they could play with any team in the nation.

Last year's team also defeated four Top 20 teams, and qualified for the NCAA playoffs before losing a 73-70 heartbreaker at Drake to end an outstanding 18-11 season.

Hall still has strong ties to her native Salem, Ind. Her parents, Henry and Lucille Hall, and her sister Judy

Hall still live in Salem. Hall's other sister, Mardee McNay, lives in nearby Columbus, Ind. A graduate of Indiana State in 1966, Hall studied Health and P.E. while starring in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Women Award in 1965 and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

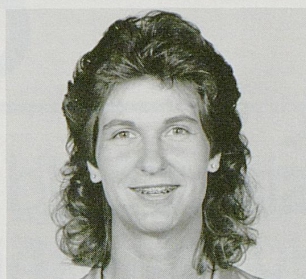

Cindy's experience as a great player at all levels of competition made her an exciting addition to the Lady Kats staff. A two-time Olympian, Cindy joined the University of Kentucky for her first coaching job in August, 1985.

A native of Clarksburg, Ohio, Cindy began an outstanding playing career at Frankfort-Adena High School, where she earned All-America honors and was named the Outstanding Athlete in Ohio. She went on to similar glory at the University of Tennessee, where she

earned Kodak All-America honors before graduating in 1983.

In the meantime, she was also establishing herself as a great international competitor. She was selected to the 1979 World University squad, the 1980 Olympic team, the 1983 Pan American team and the 1984 Olympic squad. She also played professional basketball for one year in Italy and for two years in Japan.

This has been a very eventful year so far for Cindy. This summer she was inducted into the High School Hall of Fame and was married to Mark Hauserman.

Donna Murphy

Assistant Coach
Morehead State (1980)



Donna Murphy joined the Lady Kats program in June, 1985, giving Coach Hall's staff an experienced coach and recruiter, as well as an accomplished player who is highly-regarded throughout the state. A former assistant coach at Memphis State and Florida, Donna achieved legendary status in Kentucky as a player at Newport Public High and at Morehead State University.

A native of Newport, Donna had a brilliant high school career and was honored as the state's first "Miss Basketball" in 1976. She went on to star at Morehead, where she earned All-America honors while virtually rewriting the record books of both MSU and the Ohio Valley Conference. Following her graduation in 1980, she was the first forward drafted in the now-defunct Women's Basketball League, and played for one year with the St. Louis Streaks.

Donna continued her education at the University of Cincinnati, where she served as a graduate assistant coach in basketball and track. After one year at UC, she returned to Morehead, where she was an assistant in basketball while completing her degree in higher education. She then served as an assistant for two years at Memphis State, before accepting a position at the University of Florida for the 1984-85 season.

Pat Etcheberry
Strength Coach
Kentucky (1968)



A former Olympian, Pat was named full-time strength coach in 1984 after serving on a part-time basis as both strength coach since 1973 and track coach since 1982.

A native of Chile, which he represented (javelin) in the 1964 Olympics, he is a former South American Games record-holder in the javelin and was a participant in the 1967 and 1971 Pan American Games. He captured the Southeastern Conference title while performing for Kentucky in 1966. He holds a Masters Degree from Georgetown College.

Ohio State (1979)

Sue joined the UK training staff in 1982 after serving for one year as Co-Ordinator of Sports Medicine for the Department of Intramural/Recreational Services at East Carolina University. Sue graduated from Ohio State University, where she earned a degree in Physical Education in 1979 after serving for four years as a student trainer. She was a graduate assistant at Purdue University, where she earned her Masters Degree in Physical Fitness and Exercise Physiology in 1981.

A native of Smithville, Ohio, Sue is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association.

"We lost our leading scorer and rebounder in Leslie," Hall said of the three-time all-conference player, "and we lost a very fine and underrated player in Karen. Everyone must play together and depend upon each other to be successful this year."

Leading the way will be the electrifying Harding, a 5-foot whiz kid who ranks second in all-time assists and fourth in all-time steals for the Lady Kats. Last season she averaged 9.5 points, 6.2 assists and 1.9 steals while shooting 49.8 from the field and 82.2 from the foul line.

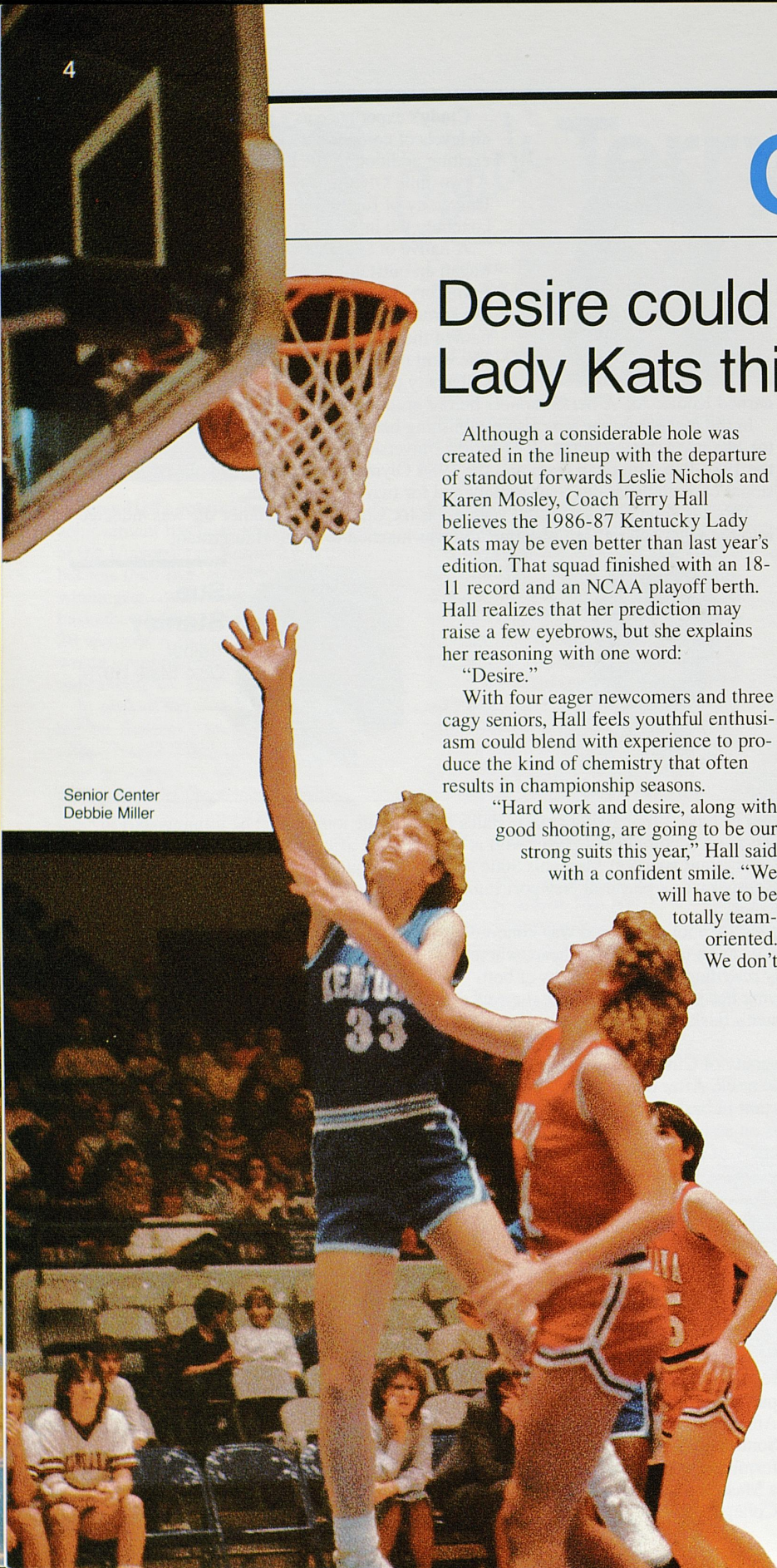
"We're counting on Sandy to inspire her teammates and lead them into correct execution at all times," Hall said.

Many of Harding's assists this season will be to the 6-1 Miller, a workhorse center who averaged 12.4 points and ranked second in the league in field goal percentage at 60.3 and seventh in free throw percentage at 77.8.

"I feel Debbie will be a force in the conference this season," Hall said. "We'll count on her board strength as much as her scoring." Miller averaged 5.8 rebounds.

Croley, at 5-10, can play either forward or guard, but seems destined for the small forward spot. She returns averages of 12.1 points and 5.4 rebounds, and gained valuable experience playing with the U.S. Select team in Canada this summer.

"We're hoping Bebe will pick up where she left off last season," Hall said. "She played great the last 10 games and she's continuing to improve and work hard."

Harding's running mate at guard will likely be Jodie Whitaker, a 5-7 "Miss Versatility" who showed great maturity while starting 20 games as a freshman. She averaged 10.7 points, 2.1 rebounds, 4.6 assists and shot 52.6 from the field and 84.6 from the line. "Jodie's an intense player with great work habits," Hall said.

Whitaker also gained additional experience this summer when she played for the South squad in the Olympic Sports Festival in Houston.

The other forward spot remains wide open, with junior Laurie Hudgens, sophomore Pam Shrum and freshmen Shannon Freeman and Lora Spencer all eyeing the position. Hudgens was a top substitute as a freshman but was slowed by an ankle injury last season. A return to her frosh form could notch the spot for her. Shrum was inconsistent as a freshman last season but showed flashes of great promise. Freeman and Spencer both are smart, aggressive freshmen who could surprise conference foes right away.

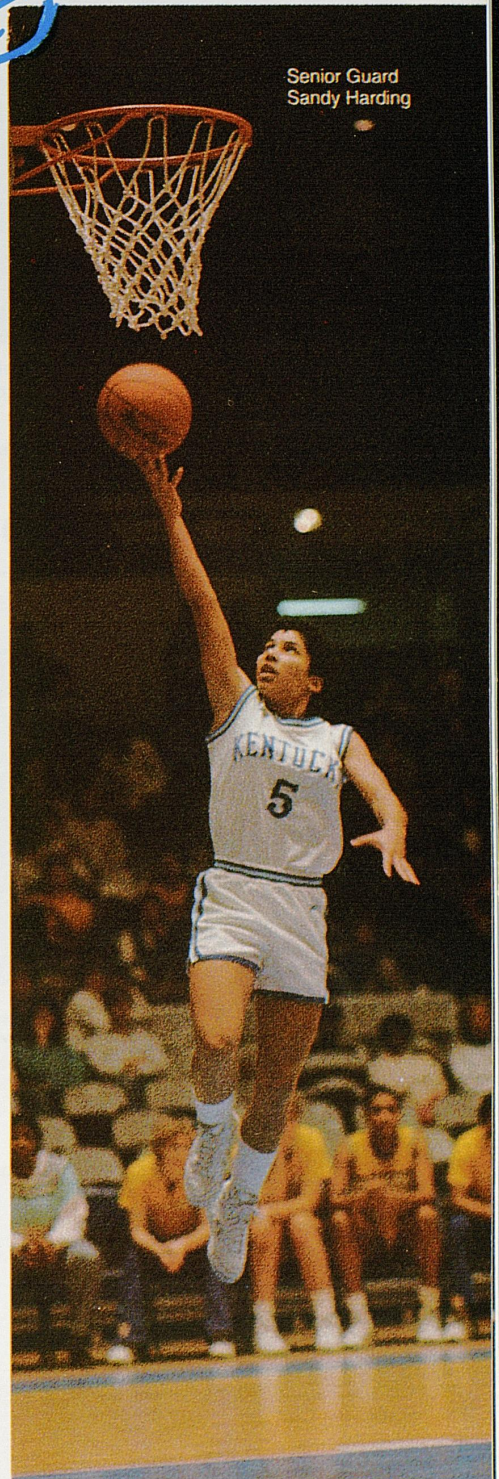
Dee Harrell is a 6-4 newcomer who will likely play center but could possibly see action at power forward. She and 6-6 senior Melanie Warren will add depth and height on the front line and could play an important role in Kentucky overcoming what Hall considers a big weakness—rebounding.

Michele Pennie is a 5-10 swing player who appears to be in good shape after two years of battling a recurring knee problem. She will play some at small forward, but will most likely be used more at guard, as will 5-8 junior Monique Tarantini, a sharp-shooting zone buster. Kris Miller, the 5-4 1986 "Miss Basketball" in Kentucky, will see quality time backing up Harding at the point guard spot.

Once again, the Lady Kats face a ferocious schedule that features nine games against teams ranked in the Top 20 last year. The progress of the four freshmen will be a key to Kentucky's success overall as well as in the top-rated Southeastern Conference. But, as Hall says:

"No one can count us out of the conference race or anything else because of our desire."

Dr. Otis A. Singletary

President,
University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis Singletary enters his final year as president of the University of Kentucky. At the April 1 Board of Trustees meeting, he announced his intention to retire from the presidency effective June 30, 1987. Singletary turns 65 in October.

Since becoming the eighth president of the University of Kentucky in August of 1969, Dr. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics.

Great strides toward academic excellence have been the trademark of Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation.

Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics also have gained nationwide attention, while the UK library system now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Dr. Singletary has served as president

of the Southern Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities, vice president of the American Council on Education and vice chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board.

He is a member of the Business and Higher Education Forum of the American Council on Education and a senior-at-large of the United Chapters of Phi Beta Kappa.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary also served as a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education and as chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association. He currently is a member of the NCAA Presidents Commission.

In the 17 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown to more than 21,000 students



on the Lexington campus and close to 24,000 students in UK's 14 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced when the UK Alumni Association presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of Kentucky.

Singletary and his wife, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.



Clifford O. Hagan

A former University of Kentucky basketball all-America, Cliff Hagan is no stranger to striving toward goals and achieving them. UK squads he played on won 86 of 91 games, including the 1951 NCAA Championship and the undefeated season of 1954. During his career with the Wildcats, he set dozens of Southeastern Conference records and

the NCAA season mark for rebounds with 528 during the 1951-52 campaign.

Having achieved such lofty goals as a collegian, it is no surprise that Hagan reaches beyond the rim as athletics director of his alma mater.

The new \$700,000-plus Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center is in operation. Groundbreaking is scheduled soon for the \$5.5 million Ervin J. Nutter Football Training Center. A new \$5 million-plus natatorium, to be named for former Wildcat Athletics Director Harry C. Lancaster, also is in the works.

Judging from his past accomplishments as an athlete and as an administrator, those goals will be achieved.

Recent completed projects include: a recruiting/entertaining lounge and two storage rooms in the Football Offices complex at Commonwealth Stadium, replacement of 120 yards of turf and the addition of 40 yards of turf on one of the main practice fields, and new dressing facilities for women at Shively Sports Center.

A completely revamped training room in Memorial Coliseum, a computerized program for the Ticket Office and installation of computers in the Sports Information Office also were among UK's achievements during a banner 1985. Kentucky scored a first by offering up-to-the-minute computerized statistics at the 1985 Final Four.

In addition to serving as host for that 1985 Men's Final Four, the University welcomed the Southeastern Conference Basketball Tournament and the Women's NCAA Basketball Championship last spring.

Championships were nothing new to Hagan. In addition to the recent championships and that which his UK team won in 1951, Hagan captured a world championship as a player with the St. Louis Hawks of the National Basketball Association.

The Owensboro native is married to the former Martha Milton, also of Owensboro. The couple has four children: Mrs. Barry (Lisa) Thaxton, Louisville; Mrs. Jim (Laurie) Hill, Lexington; Mrs. Ron (Amy) Burdette, Decatur, Ala.; and Kip, a recent graduate of Transylvania University.

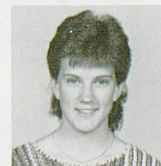

Memorial Coliseum is the proud home of one of the richest basketball traditions in the world. The historic old Coliseum was the host site for 24 Wildcat basketball teams that yielded two national champions and 16 Southeastern Conference champions.

Since the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976, the Coliseum has been the exclusive home of the Lady Kats. Throughout their 11 seasons in Memorial Coliseum, the Lady Kats have added an SEC title of their own and compiled a 140-42 record there.

The highlight of the Lady Kats' era in Memorial Coliseum came on Feb. 5, 1983. On that cold Saturday night, 10,622 enthusiastic fans filed into the 11,500-seat gymnasium to watch Kentucky upset fifth-ranked Old Dominion. That crowd constituted the largest crowd to have ever watched a women's college basketball game in America. Iowa broke the record last season with an amazing attendance of 22,000, but Kentuckians will long remember the excitement of that evening. The Lady

Kats were ranked fourth nationally after the Old Dominion victory, and in their three remaining home games that season they averaged 7,600 fans.

Just as their male counterparts did before them, the Lady Kats have made Memorial Coliseum the home of a winning high-class program. Among their many wins is included a 31-game home-court victory streak in 1981-82.

Plans for construction of the Coliseum began in 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University and recommended a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health services, our physical education and our recreation."

The Coliseum was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$3,995,000. The huge building was dedicated to serve as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict. The Coliseum covers an entire city block and has as much space as a seven-story office building.

Situated along the Avenue of Champions, Memorial Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games and Athletic Department offices, but also serves as the site of other sporting events, as well as concerts and lectures.

Origin of ...

Blue and White Colors

Kentucky's famous Blue and White colors have adorned Wildcat teams since around the turn of the century.

Prior to a football game against Centre in 1891, State College students (UK was then called State College) held an ardent meeting for the purpose of choosing permanent college colors and a college yell. They decided on blue and light yellow, blue because it was typical of the bluegrass and light yellow because it represented the richness of the land. Also adopted at the meeting was the following yell, chosen because of its brevity:

"Rah! Rush! Ree! A! M! C!!!"

Neither the colors nor the yell stayed around very long. In a letter to Professor Gillis, R.C. Stoll, a member of the 1891-

95 State College teams, recalled:

"We had some other colors—I really don't recall what they were. But we had a meeting in the chapel in 1892, my recollection is, to discuss the colors of the university.

"After we decided on the now familiar blue and white, someone asked, 'What color blue will it be?'"

"I happened to have on a blue necktie and took it off and held it up. That was the blue which was adopted."

After the turn of the century, State teams would be referred to often as the "Blue and White," with those colors being officially adopted in 1910.

The official blue has ranged from a navy blue in the earlier days to the now-familiar "Kentucky Blue," or royal blue.

In 1972, Sue Feamster decided to coin a nickname that would be instantly recognizable as a University of Kentucky team, have dignity and refinement, and yet possess strength. Feamster was coach of the UK women's basketball team and the assistant director of campus recreation. She later became Assistant Athletics Director and currently is taking a one-year leave-of-absence. She decided to capitalize on the word "Cats", and yet accomplished the distinction the women needed by use of a K—Kats.

Opportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band—or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available—and there's someone to share it.

There are 25 national fraternities and 17 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.

In addition to supporting the various Wildcat and Lady Kat teams, men and women students take part as individuals or in groups in competitive sports and in intramural programs. The Seaton Center houses facilities in basketball, volleyball, badminton, squash, wrestling, and table tennis. An Olympic-size swimming pool, tennis courts, and several sports fields are available to students.

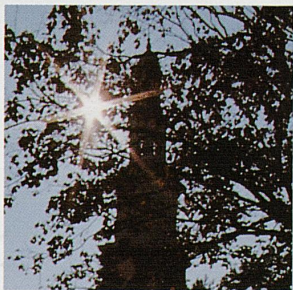
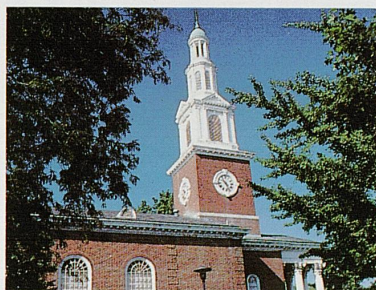
A similar variety of opportunities in drama, student government, athletics, service organizations, and recreation, is available.

Tailgating at football games, lining up for tickets to see nationally famous Wildcat teams in Rupp Arena or Lady Kat games in Memorial Coliseum, participating in the "Little Kentucky Derby," attending concerts at the downtown arena or in the 11,500-seat Coliseum on the UK campus, visiting the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park . . . all just a few of the many attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.



Campus Life



The University of Kentucky's 716-acre campus is located south of downtown Lexington, Ky., which has a population of approximately one-quarter million people. There are approximately 200 buildings and other structures,

walks, malls, gardens, playing fields, recreation space and parking areas on campus.

Academic Program

The University has 17 academic colleges: Arts and Sciences . . . Agriculture . . . Engineering . . . Business and Economics . . . Education . . . Home Economics . . . Library Science . . . Research

The University Library system contains approximately 1.7 million volumes

and ranks 13th in the nation in microform holdings.

Among the major areas of research at the University are energy, engineering, medical (especially cancer research on the aging) and agriculture (especially in tobacco and equine).

Faculty

UK's faculty numbers 1,430 on the Lexington campus. Including a graduate family of approximately 950.

Student Body

Enrollment on UK's Lexington campus is more than 21,000. The students come from every county in Kentucky and 48 other states and the District of Columbia and 78 foreign countries.

Approximately 5,400 students live in UK's resident halls with another 1,156 students in UK's 25 fraternities and 17 sororities.

Alumni

The University has approximately 70,000 alumni around the world with more than 22,500 of them paid members of UK's Alumni Association. There are 65 alumni clubs across the nation, with 34 of them in Kentucky and 31 outside the state from California to New York.

Community Colleges

The Lexington campus also is headquarters for UK's Community College System. UK has 13 of these two-year colleges across the state with a current enrollment of 20,700 students.

Medical Center

UK's Albert B. Chandler Medical College has a wide range of programs in education and research. The five colleges—Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Allied Health Professions—have more than 2,000 students pursuing bachelor, master's and doctoral degrees in health-related fields.

The Medical Center also has a 470-bed University Hospital as part of its teaching and service programs.

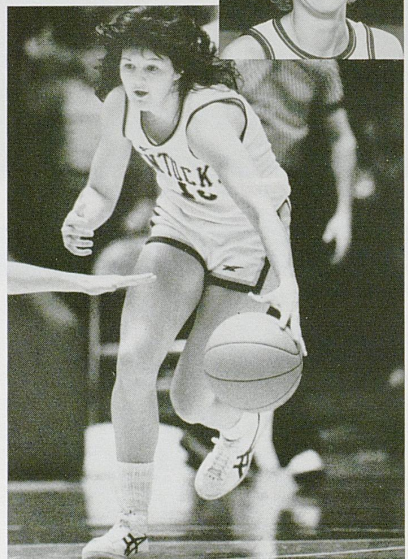

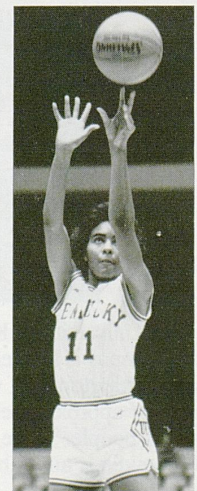

What is Cats?

CATS is specifically the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services. It is a multipurpose academic facility. We are proud to be the first university in the nation to open an academic center for student-athletes. We, like all other universities, tell parents and recruits that the student-athlete's education is of utmost importance. The difference is that at the University of Kentucky we have made a sincere effort to provide the best possible educational environment, one that is conducive to academic success.

Examine the list below:

1. ADVISING—It is not unusual for freshmen student-athletes to be confused about courses, campus, or any number of academic procedures. In addition to our study center, the CATS facility houses the office of the Assistant Athletics Director for Academic Affairs, a full-time assistant, a Reading Coordinator and four Academic Graduate Assistants (AGA's). These trained staff members are there for one purpose — to help the student-athlete mature academically.

2. STUDY SKILLS—CATS provides us with an area where we can conduct organized weekly study skills classes. Many schools give their student-athletes a crash course in study skills. This is not enough. We have a Freshman Orientation Handbook and Study Skills workbook that each freshman student-athlete receives. The student-athletes attend organized classes in CATS, where they learn to utilize proven classroom study skills and university resources.

The CATS facility not only provides us with our own large area for quiet study but it is also equipped with tutoring and small group rooms. Our center was specifically designed to meet the study needs to student-athletes.

The CATS Center is open all day and until 10:00 each night. This means that student-athletes at Kentucky are not restricted to attending required study hall in the evening. Our student-athletes can complete their study hall virtually any time of day. Research has shown that the best time to study is immediately after class. Our center provides the student athletes the opportunity to study at that time. This is definitely a CATS advantage.

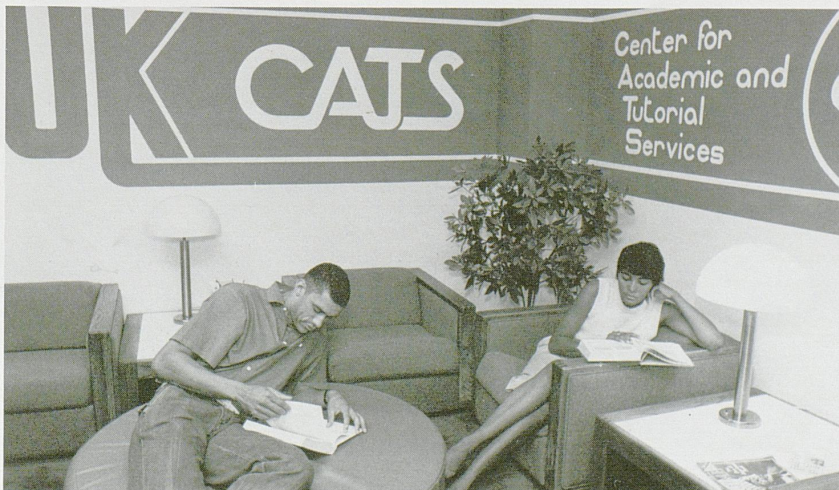
4. TUTORING—We have tutors available for any subject. Our tutors come from the University and the community. We utilize the services of professors, graduate students and graduates who are well-qualified. We screen our tutors and although we hire many more than we need, we develop a core list of those most effective with our students. This

core group works closely with us and thus we are able to monitor the progress of the student-athletes more closely. CATS provides the proper atmosphere for tutoring. Soundproof rooms are available where the student and the tutor can meet. They don't have to worry about being bothered or bothering others while discussing important concepts. Our system is most conducive to learning.



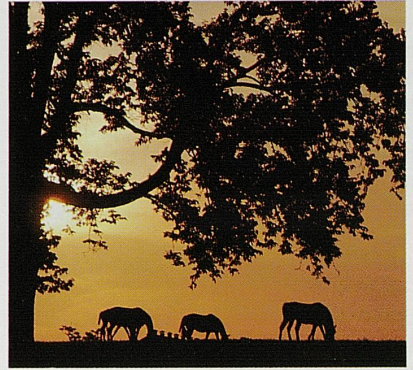

5. READING COMPONENT—The reading program at CATS is designed to meet the needs of all student-athletes. Upon entering the University each student-athlete is given a reading test that measures that individual's strengths and weaknesses. Based upon the results, a student-athlete may be encouraged to participate in the reading program, which provides both individual and small-group tutoring in a variety of areas such as reading improvement and advanced vocabulary development. It is the goal of the reading program to provide student-athletes with tools necessary to become more effective readers and studiers.

And on the south by mountains.

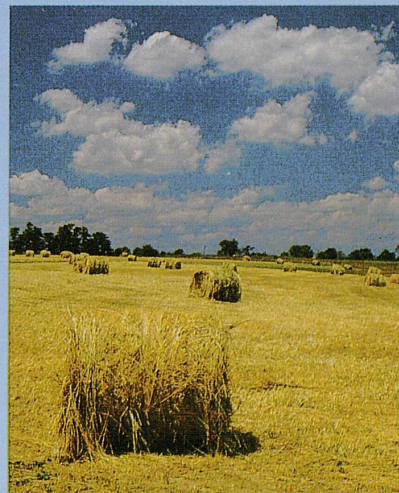
Only one boundary line is not a natural one,

Lady Kats' Basketball Schedule Released

Nine games against teams that were ranked in the Top 20 last season and a home schedule that Coach Terry Hall calls "our best ever" are the highlights of the 1986-87 Lady Kats basketball schedule released today by UK Athletics Director Cliff Hagan.

Exactly one-third of the Lady Kats' 27-game schedule is against Top 20 squads, and six of those games are at home.

"We are pleased to once again announce one of the toughest schedules in the nation," Hagan said. "For three years the Lady Kats have played one of the country's 10 toughest schedules, and this year's should rank among the best again."

New to the Lady Kat schedule is perennial powerhouse Louisiana Tech, which made three straight appearances in the Final Four beginning with a National Championship in 1982, and fell short of the Final Four last season but finished ranked fourth in the nation. The Lady Techsters will meet UK in Memorial Coliseum on January 3, highlighting a 14-game home schedule that also includes Ohio State (Dec. 12), Vanderbilt (Jan. 21), Old Dominion (Jan. 23), Auburn (Feb. 3) and Georgia (Feb. 27).

Ranked opponents UK will face on the road include Tennessee (Jan. 11), Louisiana State (Jan. 17) and Mississippi (Jan. 28). Kentucky also travels to St. John's Dec. 29-30 for a

Leading the way will be the electrifying Harding, a 5-foot whiz kid who ranks second in all-time assists and fourth in all-time steals for the Lady Kats. Last season she averaged 9.5 points, 6.2 assists and 1.9 steals while shooting 49.8 from the field and 82.2 from the foul line.

"We're counting on Sandy to inspire her teammates and lead them into correct execution at all times," Hall said.

Many of Harding's assists this season will be to the 6-1 Miller, a workhorse center who averaged 12.4 points and ranked second in the league in field goal percentage at 60.3 and seventh in free throw percentage at 77.8.

"I feel Debbie will be a force in the conference this season," Hall said. "We'll count on her board strength as much as her scoring." Miller averaged 5.8 rebounds.

Croley, at 5-10, can play either forward or guard, but seems destined for the small forward spot. She returns averages of 12.1 points and 5.4 rebounds, and gained valuable experience playing with the U.S. Select team in Canada this summer.
