

Students at Lexington Community College probably feel like second-class citizens.

The people at the college — which used to be Lexington Technical Institute — live, work and study in UK's shadow. Because they're part of a community college, they're part of the UK system.

But hecause the institution is a constant.

But because the institution is so close to UK's main campus, LCC is often treated as a college of UK, instead of its own institution. LCC has two representatives on UK's Student Government Association, for example.

That's fine. But the inclusionary attitude has hindered students at the college as much as it has helped them. We treat LCC as the college next door. Unfortunately, that can affect the attitudes of the college's students.

Because they are represented in UK's SGA, students at LCC have not taken steps to form their own student representation agency. Until now.

The institution now has a student advisory council. The body is dedicated to providing a voice for students.

Phil Taylor, one of the founders of the group, put it best: "We've never had an organized student voice. We want to get across to students a LCC that while they are LCC students, they are also UK students. All the rights the UK student has, the LCC student also has."

That is true, and too often it's been forgotten. The new advisory group would certainly be filling an important function if it could indeed bridge the gap between the institutions.



Post-merger decisions are usually made by university presidents and chancellors, and "there y committee — I think there should be," Millett said.

"If there is a trend, that trend is toward statewide governing boards. If the legislature should vote to merge these two institutions, I can't imagine that the other six would be left out for any length of time.



Foods tied to moods, research team finds

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Many fat people crave carbohydrates and gobble down between-meal snacks betwo properties of the properties of the control of the control
that improve their moods, some researchers believe.
The theory, based on a series of recent studies, suggests that overweight people may eat too much because
they re hungry.
The latest of the studies, published in the March issue
of International Journal of Eating Disorders, was conducted at Massachusetts Institute of Technology by Drs.
Carbohydrates can be either sugar or starch, and
those who crave them often snack on foods like candy
bars, potato chips and doughnuts. Mrs. Wurtman estimates that at least half of all obese people crave carbohydrates, and this is why they're fat.

"They clearly are eating the food because of a biologi-cal need to improve their feelings," she said. "It really comes out of a need to make more of this particular chemical" in the brain.

The body uses carbohydrates to increase the brain's production of serotonin, a message-carrying chemical known as a neurotransmitter.
This, in turn, somehow influences mood and makes them feel calmer and better able to concentrate, they
