She says:" The only directions I have to give are: Send the articles to one half the papers one week and to the other half the next. If the name of a paper is crossed out it means that it is discentinued or that the editor refuses to publish our matter. I used to have IOO papers, - 50 to supply with suffrage matter each week, but I have lost some papers. ./ The trouble, as I have always said in my reports, is to find out whether the articles sent are published. You will notice a cross mark at some of the names. This means that the editor is likely to publish what we send."

She had previously sent the list of newspapers, which I can copy, as her copy is pretty badly wern.

Miss Elizabeth Hauser writes that she answered a letter from you, saying that since Mrs. Obenchain's resignation the Press work had been under my direction. But in the letter which Mrs. McLaughlin queted to you, I said that I had found it impossible to take up the Press work; and in fact Headquarters has never sent me the articles which it supplies for the weekly Press work.

For some years past 'the Ky.H.R.A. has paid Mrs.Obenchain \$5.00 per month for Press work, made up of free-will offerings for that purpose taken up at the convention. But last convention Mrs.Obenchain wrote that she would not accept this salary, as she could not do much work. Therefore there is no fund in our treasury for this nominal salary this year, tho gh the

Executive Committee has authority to vote a sum for the necessary postage and stationery for the work. As I believe I have written, the National Head-quarters supplies daticles in any number desired once a week, I believe.

I wish very much that we could find one of our good suffragists who would be willing to do this work, for it is always valuable. My going to Arizona threw me out of all the plans I had made for the winter's work; and when I returned I was not able to rearrange them, so as to do what I had hoped to do. If you think you could undertake this press work for a time, I shall be very glad to write a circular letter to the Ex.Committee and have you appointed to fill the vacancy made by Mrs.Obenchain's resignation till next convention, when the Press Superintendent is elected.

Next Tuesday I am going to Owensboro to attend the convention of the Fed.

I found this morning the copies of a letter from Miss Blackwell to me in answer to the letter which I sent out during Miss Shaw's absence in regard to removal of headquarters from Warren. At the time it seemed to me that you all ought to see Miss Blackwell's letter, and I had these copies made and then failed to send them to so, so I enclose one herewith.

I wish also to make a report on one or two points on which I feel I owe it to the Business Committee:

BOOK OF RECITATIONS, - BOOK FOR DEBATERS: At the Buffalo Convention, about the close of the meeting, I was approached by a group of Pennsylvania delegates who urged me to consider the nomination as President of the Pennsylvania W. S. A. Mrs. Blankenburg had talked of me many times as her successor and had fully made up her mind that she would not hold the office any longer. After consultation with Miss Shaw I agreed to take this office, should I be elected. I confess at the time I did not know how much of my time and strength would have to go into this work, but it has absorbed a great deal of me this winter, and that is my excuse and apology and reason for not having taken any time for the collation of the Book of Recitations and the Book for Debaters. I have some material on hand and have looked it over once or twice, thinking I would get at it, but the time has never been mine to do it. I am, of course, more than ready to hand it over to any one who will undertake it and can give them such copy as I have on hand. I am very sorry to have delayed this publication because I think it is an important one, although perhaps not as important as most of user literature which has been is sued by the Literature Committee this year.

SUSAN B. ANTHONY FUND: As soon as I got some of the Pennsylvania work started, in the late fall, I sent out a letter to each of the state presidents in regard to the Susan B. Anthony work. I wrote a circular about which I consulted with Miss Shaw, and although she did not feel any great hope of results from it, she felt that I might be allowed to have some of the circulars printed and make an effort.

I stated to the various state presidents the fact that the bulk of the Fund of course remained to be raised, and suggested the use of coin cards in connection with the circular, a copy of which I herewith enclose. I received most discouraging replies and only in two or three cases was there any offer of co-operation along this line. On writing a second letter to these states asking how many of the coin cards they thought they could use I failed to receive any response.

B. C. #2. E June 11, 1909 -I do not think it necessary here to go into detail as to each state, but there have been no contributions at all as a result of these suggestions of work, although I did not let the matter drop, but followed up my first letter by later ones where I did not receive any reply. Some of the states feel that they have done all that they could; some feel that although they have done nothing as yetther can do nothing just now but must let the matter wait until some state work that is under way is through with. Nebraska alone expressed the opinion that each state ought to do something each year until the Fund was completed. I blame myself very much because I feel that it was through my inability to take the situation in hand, as I had every reason to believe I could, that what might be called the psychological moment for raising this Fund was allowed to pass. believe surely the time will come when Miss Anthony's name will be one to conjure with, but just now, although the work itself is going on in more places and with more activity than at any time heretofore, that very fact seems to make it impossible to raise money for this general National fund. I expect we will take up this National question and discuss it both en route to Seattle and at the Business Committee meetings which will follow the Convention, but I wish to make this much of a report here so that you would know that I have not this year neglected the work but have made a consistent effort to secure co-operation in it. In my own state of Pennsylvania, in taking the presidency, I have felt that I must devote every energy possible to finding out the friends of the movement in order later to make an appeal for the Fund. In this great state we have but 1150 members, and that is such a handful to whom to appeal that it seemed wise to put the present strength and time upon the effort to secure a larger membership. Looking forward to seeing the majority of the Business Committee at Chicago for the trip west, I remain, Cordially yours,

Just before I went to Owensboro to the Federation of Woman's Clubs I received a letter from Mrs. Roebuck, in which she mentioned that you had asked her if we were going to hold our next convention in Covington. I had thought all this time that the Covington invitation had been accepted by our convention; but on looking at the minutes I find that it was refferred to the Executive Committee. Therefore it is still open to us to change the place of meeting if our Board thinks it is advisable. Mrs. Shepard was at the convention of the Federation and Ers. Alice Thite of Louisville talked to both of us sayet ing that the suffragists desired to have the convention there this fall. Mrs. Shepard and I both thought it would be more useful to have the convention in Louisville than in Covington; so I told Mrs. White that I would at once write to you on my return home. The Louisville people are particularly desirous of having Miss Shaw; and I cannot yet say whether we can get Miss Shaw or not. Before we decide definitely, therefore, to hold the convention in Louisville rather in Covington I think that I had better hear from Miss Shaw what dates she can give us. I shall write at once, but I think it very doubtful if she can answer till after the Seattle Convention. I hope that it will be entirely agreeable to the Covington E. R. A. to have us accept the Louisville invitation. Certainly it has been a great relief to the Executiive Committee to have the Covington invitation and to have received it so early. But since

Louisville needs education on our question more than Covington I believe you will agree with Mrs. Shepard and me that it would be better policy to accept the Louisville invitation now with the hope that Covington will repeat its invitation for another year. Please let me hear from you what you think about it.

I got a pleasent letter from Ir. Louise Southgate in reference to taking the Press work. I think she would make an excellent person to take this work, and I wish she tould take it at least for the few months before the convention. I had to tell her that we had no money for paying the small salary we had previously paid because we took up no free will efferings at the dast convention, but that the Executive Committee could vote money for stationary and stamps. I should be very much pleased to have Ir. Southgate try the work and I wish you would urge her to do it.

The Federation passed the school suffrage motion again without a dissenting vote, and the convention showed great interest in the subject. The Legislative Committee is going to push the hill vigorously in the next legislature. I enclose a copy of the resolution which you may be able to use in your local papers.
