

The Kentucky Equal Rights Association won a notable success in its Legislatite work in the passage of the law for Co-guardianship of Father and Mother of Minor Children. The bill was drawn by Judge A.R.Burnam, state senator from Madison County; and was ably sup orted by him in the Senate; and by Representative Wm.Klair in the House. It passed both Houses by a good majority, and when it became law by the signature of Gov. ugustus ". Willson a blot upon the civilization of Kentucky was wi wiped out; for the old law had all the worst features of the old Common Law on the subject, which have caused some conspicous tragedies in other states before similar laws were repealed.

The Ky.E.R.A. was an ally with the Federation of Woman's Clubs in its effort to secure School Suffrage for all women who can read and write. The federation is working for this franchise as part of its endeavor or to improve the school conditions of the state. It secured the endorsement of the leading educators of the state and of practically all the women's and educational associations; but the liquor interests are opposed to even this small fragment of women suffrage, and defeated the bill.

Our paid-up membership has nearly doubled during the year. This is partly attributable to the month's excellent work done in the state by the National organizer, Miss Perle Penfield; and to the great increase of the Louisville Association, following the state convention held there. The interest of the young college is articularly gratifuing. Miss Margeret Veissinger of that city is now our Press Superintendent; and under her management our cause is obtaining a hearing in the Louisville papers hitherto difficult to reach. The newspaper press throughout the statefis, as a general thing, very liberal in its attitude to our movement.

Dear Dr. Gay,

I received your letter of the 29th inst. this morning; and I am complying at once with your request for advice on the various points asked, though I feel that after all your own women must decide them.

In the first place I doubt very much if Mrs. Boyer could get any more money from the National by going to Washington, and therefore I think it would be better not to spend the money to go. It is hard for Mrs. Boyer to realize how poor the National is; for at the time of the Oregon campaign the National had in reserve flout fifteen thousand dollars from legacies, twhich it had held in reserve for campaigns. All these were spent in that campaign, besides what could be raised for it in particular, Then there was no other campaign on hand. Now the National has no reserve fund. It had promised to help South Dakota before it knew that Oklahoma would have a campaign; and it also has helped some in the Washington campaign, which was ahead of yours. Besides this, the work in states where there are no campaigns is very active, so that the friends who used to give for National purposes are giring their money to their own states. The fact is, the National has not the money to give , and is now straining its resources to denate Mrs. Boyer's Setwigeand expenses. Of course, I know it will cause you disappointment and perhaps discouragement to know these facts but I am speaking plainly, as I think I ought to. It might be that at some time some one or more persons might give for your campaign; but I do not know to whom to apply, and wiless Mrs. Boyer does, I do not see what she could gain by giong to Washington. As for my coming to Oklahoma to see the

conditions, that would be a useless expense, as I am just as thoroughly convinced of the amportance of pushing the campaign in Oklahoma as I can be and I shall do every thing I can to get help for you when I go to washington. But I am a very poor money-raiser, and you can count only on my goodwill. Many of the members of the Official Board take a very pessimistic view of your changes for success, either ar a special or general election. It is a fact of history that no constitutional amendment has carried inany state, where the requirement was that the vote should be a majority of the votes cast at the election; and by study of your Constitution, this appears as the requirement in your state at any election. For it is a matter of experience that the voters cannot be got to vote on the amendment as numerously as they do on other questions; and even if you got the majority on your measure it would not be a majority cast in the election. Of course, you see the hopeful side; but the National had fought several cumpaigns where every sign was promising, and then failed; and so there is no way of convincing them that this time the result will set a new precedent. I do not tell you these things to discourage you in your hopes of success; for I think your chance is well worth straining every nerve for; but I tell you so that you may understand that it is not for want of will that the Bational is not giving more help, but that simply it has not the money, and has not the hopefulness which-might-ence-rage its friends to make a great and special effort for your state.

Now as to Hiss Kearney. I know of ne reason whatever the National would have to Miss Kearney's helping in your campaign. I believe the I association is on thoroughly good terms with her. I am not sure that the L.C.T.U. is. Somewhere or some time I believe she is thought to have been lacking in discretion in the stirring up artagonism. But I do not know about that I do not think you could have any hope of the National helping you to pay Miss Tearney, for she has never been on our list of regular speakers, and it is not a favorable time, as I have explained, to begin to enlar

the list. She is far better known as a W.C.T.W. and temperance speaker than as a suffrage speaker; and she is intensely southern in her sentiace ments and utterances. Some of her best friends think she is sometimes too impulsive in her speeches.

I think you had better have Mrs. Boyer and your officers write good, strong letters to be read at the Convention, stating the whole circumstances about your campaign, saying exactly what is your election law on the point I have mentioned, and stating all the encouraging eights which give you hope. It seems your own officers are in doubt what your constitution requires, as in one of her letters Mrs. Biggers writes that she understands that only a majority of the votes cast on the measure, and not the majority cast at the election, are required to win. If you still hold this opinion please state your authority for it, for We have the Oklahoma Constitution, and our reading of it gives us the other impression. I hope before the Washington convention that your case will have been passed upon by the Courts, so that the legal standing of your petition will be known.

Whatever happens, you may be sure offeny warm interest, and that I will do what I can for your campaign.
