My dear Mrs. Roebuck,

I am writing at once to say that I have just received from Mrs. S.M. Hubbard, ~~Hickman~~, Fulton County, the thousand dollars which I told you she had promised me. She does not send the letter of conditions of gift which she had me to write when we were at Monteagle; but I suppose that is an oversight, and I have asked her to mail one copy to you direct. For I wish you to put this most liberal donation in the minutes of this year. It is a long while to wait till the minutes of next year; and I think you can with perfect propriety put in a note that this money has been given. After waiting a few days for Mrs. Hubbard's letter, if you do not get it, you can simply state that the interest of the money will be used till a campaign is commenced to get the vote on a constitutional amendment, when the principal also will be used. If Mrs. Hubbard sends you the written conditions of the gift, then please publish it in full

Please send Mrs. Hubbard at once one hundred of the membership cards.

I am putting Mrs. Hubbard's money in the Lexington Banking and Trust Company, Savings Department, where it will draw 3% interest till it is otherwise invested.

My dear Mrs. Hubbard,

I have just received by the early morning mail your registered letter of the 12th inst., containing checks for One thousand dollars, for the Kentucky Equal Rights Association. I thank you most warmly for this very liberal contribution to the Association. It is very timely, in view of the campaign on which our convention of Oct. 24-25 decided we should now begin.

I expected a copy of the purpose of the gift which we drew out at Montecagle. Do you still wish this donation to be used as you then expressed your intention, - that is, to be invested till a campaign was actually before the voters, the interest only to be used till that time for the purposes of the State Association? If so, I expect you had better send a copy of that form of gift to be kept on file. If you send it at once, I can get it into the printed minutes of the last convention.

In the meanwhile I shall deposit the thousand dollars this morning in the Lexington Banking and Trust Co., in the Savings Department, where it will be drawing three per cent. interest until it is otherwise invested.

Yes, I am rejoicing with a great joy in the victory in four states. In view of these great victories, and others which I hope for in 1913 I do not believe it is too much to hope for that our Legislature will submit a constitutional amendment in 1914, which will then be voted on in the fall of 1916, and will give Kentucky women full political rights.

I am starting for Philadelphia on next Tuesday, to be away from home

first for the National Convention and then for a visit to my sister, Mrs. S.D.Crenshaw, 919 West Franklin Street, Richmond, Virginia. Mrs. Roebuck is now getting the minutes of the State convention ready for the printer. Therefore I think if you want that letter of the purpose of your gift put into this year's minutes you had better send her a copy of it on receiving this letter. In the meantime I shall write her that I have put the money in the bank, and that you will probably send her a letter about it.

I am glad to know that you feel that now you have liberty to help build up the E.R.A. organization in your part of the state. I am going to write to Mrs. Roebuck to send you a hundred of our membership cards. You will find it a great deal easier to get members on the enrollment plan than on our old plan of promising dues. I am enclosing a leaf from an old copy of the minutes which explains the system. It should be carefully explained to the signers that the treasurer will remind them at least once a year that funds are needed; but it does not invalidate a person's membership if the signer does not contribute anything. Many signers will give something, perhaps more than they would have paid in dues. Many others will not give anything, but we will have their moral influence. And that is much, in view of our constitutional amendment campaign.

Dear Mrs. Little;

As Mrs. Breckinridge is not going to the National Woman Suffrage convention in Philadelphia it has fallen to me to see that all the vacancies in our list of delegates are filled with the alternates. Some of your Louisville friends thought you might not go to the National convention. In that case, it would be proper for you to select a proxy from the other delegates or alternates for yourself as State Member of the National Executive Committee. Of course, the proxy ^{would} be only for the time of the convention. After that, you would still be the person to whom the National business should be submitted, as well as member of the State Board. In order that you may know from whom to select, in case you are not planning to go yourself, I am enclosing a list of the delegates and alternates. If I can do so before I leave for Philadelphia, which I shall do next Tuesday, I am going to notify alternates in order of the vacancies and try to have them filled, as I find a good many of the alternates are likely to be at the convention, and of course would like to be delegates, if possible. Therefore, will you please let me know if you are going? If not, will you select a proxy from the list I send, and notify me at once whom you have selected. If you select an alternate nothing further is needed except for you to write in on your certificate, which I suppose you have received from Mrs. Roebuck, the name of your proxy and see that she gets it promptly. If you should choose one who is already a delegate, it

might be asked if she is willing to resign her place as a delegate so that one of the alternates may become a delegate in her stead. If this is done, I should be notified at once, so that the alternate should be notified promptly. If you do not go yourself and do not care to select a proxy, will you kindly return your certificate to me, as the delegates in Washington will have the right to fill your place with a proxy, if one is not chosen beforehand. I hope you may find it possible to go yourself.

I am sure you will be pleased to hear a piece of good news, which came to me this morning. Mrs. S. M. Hubbard, of Hickman, Fulton Co., has just sent me one thousand dollars for the Ky. E. R. A. The money is to be put out to interest till a Constitutional Amendment is submitted to the voters in Kentucky, when it may be used for the campaign. In the meanwhile the interest is to be used for the purposes of the State Asso. As we hope to get the submission of the Amendment from the Legislature of 1914 this handsome donation is very timely. I deposited the money in the Lexington Banking and Trust Co., Savings Department, where it will be drawing interest of $\$3$ until the Board ^{of Directors} otherwise invests it.

If you can answer this letter to reach me on Monday in Lexington, I shall be glad to hear from you before I leave for Philadelphia. If you think it will not reach me by that time, please address me at Hotel Walton, Philadelphia.

I. Everybody's Equal Suffrage League would really be a State League as we have members from all over the state. Portland Equal Suffrage League would probably act as a local league.

b. Our objects are to raise funds and to promote the cause.

II. Also, the leagues have not been auxiliary to the present Oregon Suffrage Association.

The Oregon State Suffrage Organization joined a resolution on October not to pay its National dues therefore, it being disconnected with the National, we could not become any ally to it.

III. Am sending the certified list of over 700 members, for which \$40. dues have been paid.

IV. Dues were sent to the National on October 3rd for both leagues.

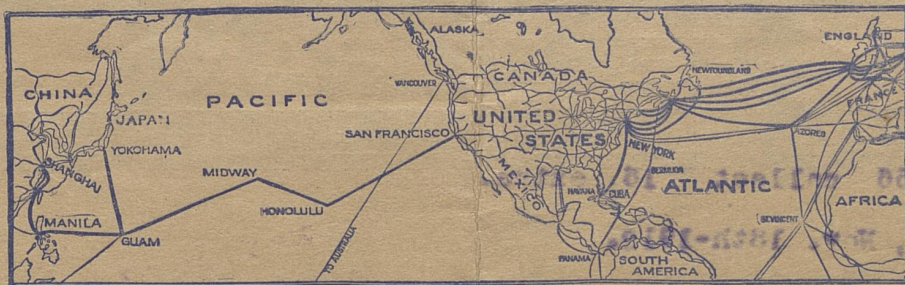

Instructions for Howard Bush.

[Nov 18, 1912]

Cut foxtail in Creek pasture as long as the seed stay on pretty well, or until all is cut. Then cut turkey foot hay in little woods. Get one man or two men to help stack, if you can get them for one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) a day.

Turn Mr. Wagers cattle in creek pasture as soon as Warfield brings his cattle, or about September 15th. Turn Warfield's cattle and those he buys for me into little woods. If Warfield wants his separate, turn them into the Buffalo pasture, in front of Mrs. Clay's house.

On the first of October, make two flocks of the sheep. Put all the young ones with the two young bucks, and part of the old ones. Put the rest of the old ones with the two old bucks. Put one flock in the Deatherage pasture, and the other in the race track pasture. Put all of the sheep in the Deatherage pasture when the frost makes you take them off the clover. You can then turn the three steers with the rest of Mr. Wagers' cattle.

Clean out the edges of all the ponds as soon as you have finished the hay.

Then go to fencing. Make a feed lot with high fencing wire when Mr. Shackelford gets it.

Close the gap from the pond into the creek pasture so the cattle in the little woods can go to that pond when the water gets low in the branch.

I want all the fodder cut.

Feed the hogs regularly twice a day, so you can see they are not roving.

You can take the five red shoats at seven cents a pound, paying me in corn at market price at gathering time.

Sell the torn ewes at one dollar for the two old ones, and one dollar a piece and a half for the young one. The wether at three cents a pound.

If you and Milton have any time left over, grub iron weeds. Let Milton cut all the broom sedge.
