My Ddar Miss Clay:-

I have the honor to report that on Wednesday, October 1, we had a hearing before Circuit Judge C. C. Marshall on my motion for a writ of mandamus against our County Clerk compelling him to me prepare separate ballots for the use of women voters in the next election, and on Friday the 3rd., we gained a complete victory in the decision. The Court sustained me in every point raised in the argument, holding that women possessing the statutory qualifications were entitled to vote for all school officers, and that the County Superintendent is a school district officer within the meaning of Chapter 47. of the Acts of 1912. The writ of mandamus was issued and, on the following day, was served on the County Clerk. The County Attorney. who is bitterly opposed to the suffrage cause, conceived that it w was his duty to defend the suit, and filed a demurrer to the petition, which was over-ruled by the court, and he will carry the case at once to the Court of Appeals on a motion to discharge the writ. However, I am confident that he will be overruled there as he was in the Court below. I am confirmed in this opinion by the statement of Judge Marshall in rendering his opinion in deciding our case. He said that personally, and as a matter of principle he was opposed to the idea of women

on any question, but that the Legislature had the right to enact the law and had made it so plain that he was compelled to issue the writ and to hold that as I have already stated. The question being presented for the first time in this district, there was a large number of lawyers present at the argument, and among them some of the most able men in the profession in Central Kentucky, and they all said that the Judge was correct in his ruling, and that the Court of Appeals would undoubtedly sustain his opinion. The decision was so convincing that I do not believe the case would be taken up further, but for the request of Judge Marshall that it be done so that it could be decided once for the whole state, and it is certain now to go to the higher Coutt.

I should be glad to hear from you as soon as possible with any suggestions you may have to make.

The 24th Convention of the Kentucky Equal Rights Association, meeting in Louisville, was called to order Friday, November 21st, at IO.30 A.M., with the president, Mrs.Desha Breckinridge, in the chair.

In the absence of Mrs.Emma M.Roetuck, Mrs.C.B.Semple was appointed Recording Secretary pro tem.

Miss Clay presented the report of the Executive Committeewhich upon motion was accepted by the convention. The reports of the second and third vice-presidents were presented verbally by these officers and accepted.

The report of the meeting of the Mississippi Valley Suffrage Conference in St.Louis in April 2-4 was made by Miss Clay. At this meeting \$10.00 had been pledged by the Kentucky representatives, Mrs.Breckinridge and Miss Clay, towards the expenses of the Conference. On motion of Mrs.Castleman this amount(ten dollars) was appropriated to meet this pledge.

The following committees were appointed by the president: Mrs. Halleck, chairman of Committee on Credentials; Mrs. Judah, Mrs. Hubbard and Mrs. Miller, the committee on Resolutions; and Mrs. Louis Becker a committee on Subscriptions to the Woman's Journal. Mrs. McLaughlin presented the report of the Plan of Work and Executive Committee meeting held at 9.30 A.M. as follows:

My dear Mrs. Modulloch,

The recent very marked increase of interest in the suffrage cause in Congress has set the States Rights suffragists to thinking as well as those who have no objection to an amendment which will give Federal authority over state elections. Miss Gordon, you will have observed by the time this reaches you has led in the formation of a Southern States Foren Suffrage Conference, and has had me appointed vice-president at large. I did not go to New Orleans, and I jeelined a mare active part, because it looks as if all my time will be taken up by our own state campaign. In view of this, I told Miss Cordon frankly I would not jeopardize the negro vote in Kentucky, where we have no feer of it through loss of white supremacy, but where the negroes are always jealous of any movement which may seem antagonistic to to their suffrage rights, as they always are about any movement of the Southern states exclusively. I have no letter yet from New Orleans, but the paper states that while the words States' Rights has been avoided the object is to secure suffrage by state action as opposed to a Federal Amendment, as is proposed by tye H.W.A! S.Asso, I wish to say at once I have not the slightest intention of in any way opposing any movement either the N.A.F.S.A., the Congressional Union, or any other body of suffragists may make to win suffrage. But I am decidedly a believer in States Rights, and I believe it would be a misfortune to have suffrage come by a Federal Amendment, though I would rather it should come that way than not at all.


My dear Miss Clay:
