Caring 'Em Wild

NOW it came to pass that on a certain Friday afternoon, April 29, in the year 1938 A. D., all the Greeks, armed with their spikes and sweat rained, did convene upon a certain Stoll contesting arena for the proffessed purpose of settling and making known among all men which among them was the intramural track and field champion for 1938. And the high tribunal before which the case came for settlement was composed of various and sundry members of the intramural department student brigade.

And lo! Twice had the sand-glass been inverted before the jousts were ended, yet the true possessor of the championship cup remained in doubt. For on the one side were the mighty disciples of Delta Tau Delta, who spoke with the judges: "Verily we say unto thee, our lords, this cup doth rightfully belong among our manly decorations." But their words were objects of impatience for on the other side were the believers of Alpha Tau Omega, the tribe which by the cup of the previous year had gone, who spoke in voices of thunder: "Nay, most high, these honors be thine! This glittering cup doth rightfully belong among our manly decorations." And the two tribes of Greeks were soon vexed, each at the stupidity of the other, for the one side, which passed among the nobles were many and bitter, yet neither heeded to the words of the other. Then from a distant portion of the cinderly path arose the dread cry: "The time is ripe! Ineligible!" And once more the controversy flared anew, with claims of ineligibility arising from all points. During this episode of time the judges lay as motionless as the dead, knowing not what to do for there were whispers of threats against the contestants and to some them to death.

Then the darkness descended and the debate halted, but in many a fraternity house on that eventful night, the question was a topic of grave discussion by the wise men and elders of the lodges. Great too, was the anguish of Delta Tau Delta for days after, for on legends indeed is the wrath of an aroused Greek, which fell on the poignants of the tribunal like hail from the sky. And even unto this day, which is the twin spike words of truth is eternal discussion.

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Just ten years ago the intramural department was established locally, although since 1918 many of the Northern and Mid-western schools had embraced the idea. In taking up the intramural plan, Kentucky became one of the first to start institutions of the South to adopt the movement. E. W. Mitchell of the University of Louisville was the father of the move.

Today it would be difficult to find a similar department at any school that offers a better balanced or more diversified program of intramural athletics than the local set-up with touch football, tennis, volleyball, horseback riding, swimming, basketball, free throw, ping pong, handball, badminton, golf, track and field, softball, basketball and fencing.

Friday afternoon, the one question that has haunted the department since its genesis again reared its ugly head, causing a great breach. That head-ache problem—just who is to be considered ineligible for competition, should varsity team members be excluded—left the track and field meet as far from being a closed book as it was before the affair started. Both Delta Tau Delta and Alpha Tau Omega lay possessive hands on the championship trophy. In some quarters, the Delta won the trophy by as many as 10-points while at other breeding grounds, the ATOs walked away with the meet.

The seriousness with which every fraternity on the campus views intramural competition, for the sake of friendly relations, and to avoid another such blow. A well stocked trophy cabinet offers too much muscle appeal to be lightly looked upon and intramurals offer the best seasonal market for bragging rights. If the department is to carry on its splendid work of the past, a more definite series of eligibility rules should be drafted, and for a big event such as the track finals, better organization among the staff should be shown. It's a hard job for a junior or senior intramural manager to extract cooperation from a group of silver-wreathed hungry frat men, unless the plan of action has been worked down to the point that there can be no slip ups. True, there will always be the usual disputes, but none that will not be forgotten over night.

Some Records
To prove the point concerning the serious view taken toward intramurals, the following are a few track records for the annual meet, many of which would be good check-ins in any competition.
The 100-yard dash record was established in 1929 by Heiler with a time of 10.4 but the record was tied by Fred Fischer Friday. Heiler holds the best 220-yard trip with 22.4, made in 1932. In 1932 the 440-yard dash was led by Wallcut. A half-mile jaunt of 2:04 by Egan in 1935 set the low for that event. The high jump mark of 5 feet, 9 inches has been held by Crosby since 1932. Parritz holds the record vaulting in 1932 when he cleared 10 feet, 6 inches. A leap of 21 feet, 1½ inches in 1932 equaled the broad jump record for Yates.
