# Hayes will fight board's decision

Deja vu: Experience clause at issue again

After being denied the chance to run for Student Government president by the SG Board of Elections, history junior Ben Hayes said he plans to file an appeal for injunctive relief with SG's Supreme Court.

"It took a thousand names to get us on the ballot, but only five to get us off," Hayes said.

With one member absent, the board voted 4-0 to disqualify Hayes' from the election on the grounds of the experience clause of the SG Constitution.

Hayes said precedents set by decisions of last year's board led him to believe he had met the qualifications for running

for SG president.

The experience clause states candidates for chief leadership positions must have served at least one year in Student Government. Last year's board interpreted this to mean that a student must have served one year in the same leadership position in any organization at UK in order to be eligible.

This year's board ruled Hayes' position as vice-president of Phi Kappa Psi this year did not count as being in Student Government. Nor did his experience the previous year as Student Government representative on the Student Appeals Board, because it is an appointed position, not an elected one.

His running mate Amy Thomas was automatically disqualified because she was on the ticket with Hayes.

"We feel that the claim against us just doesn't hold water," Hayes said.

Patrick Robinson, chairman of this year's board said the decisions of last year's board do not serve as precedents.

"Last year's interpretations are immaterial," he said. We're a whole new election board, and we're not going off others' decisions."

Nic Wilson, a political science senior, had problems similar to Hayes' last year. Wilson, who had transferred from Morehead State University, spent two years in Student Government there. But having no experience at UK, he initially

wasn't permitted to run even, after the election board's first decision.

Eventually, Wilson was allowed to run, but he said that having to fight to just get on the ballot made the election rough going for him and his running mate, Chris Schwartz.

"It took the wind out of our sails," he said.

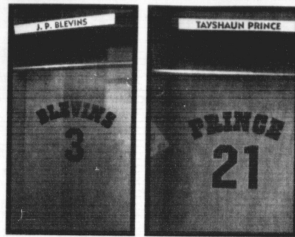
Having to file an appeal just to be able to run for SG president puts Hayes at a disadvantage, Wilson explained.

"Right now he should be worrying about the election. Instead he's having to worry about whether he's even in the race or not," he said.

Hayes said he and Thomas weren't going to wait for a ruling to start campaigning.

"We're gonna still campaign."

# SG election board fears controversy

Advice: Board denied early advice

A week before the Student Government Election Board of Supervision prohibited Ben Hayes from running for SG president, the board's chairman, Patrick Robinson, sought to avoid having to make such a controversial decision.

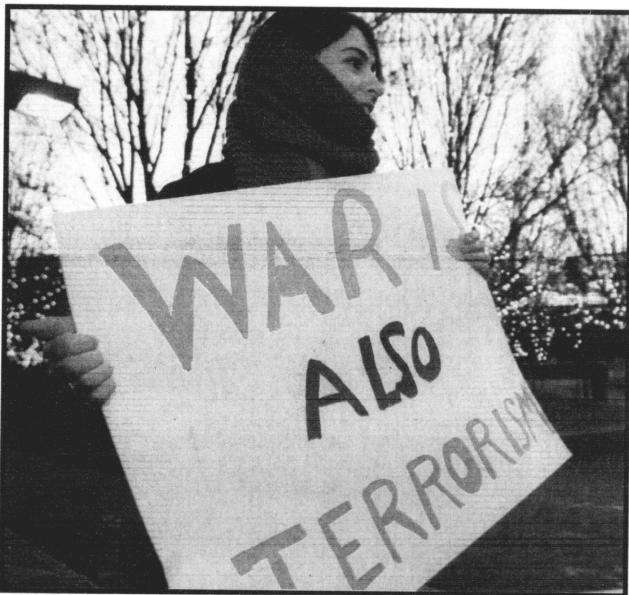
Robinson sent a letter to the SG Supreme Court asking for the court's opinion on nine specific questions about election rules and guidelines.

Robinson's letter read, "It is in the best interests of myself and the Election Board of Supervision that we have solid footing when enforcing the rules, so that the student body can have faith in the election system."

Unfortunately for Robinson and the Election Board, the SG Supreme Court denied the request for an advisory opinion.

The Supreme Court's response read, "The court feels that it is Mr. Robinson's job as Chairman of the Election

# Student's video wins on TV show

# Some UK offices moving downtown

In a move designed to expand enrollment and increase class and office space, several departments at UK and Lexington Community College will soon have a new home in downtown Lexington.

UK President Lee Todd signed a lease Thursday for two floors of the Kentucky Utilities Building on Vine and Quality Streets, three blocks from the main campus.

Todd said the move is an initial step toward his goal of bringing downtown and UK together.

"It seems like we're 46 miles apart," he said. "This gives us the chance to close that gap."

Todd said he envisions an environment where students can interact with professionals on a daily basis and have access to a greater variety of food and retail establishments.

"We want our students to have more choices of things they can do," he said.

Todd also said the building will offer more space to LCC faculty to address growing enrollment.

"They are really cramped," he said. LCC President Jim Kerley said an-

other goal of the expansion is to provide people who live in the north end of Lexington and downtown a more convenient place to take classes.

"What we're trying to do is offer new markets and get more opportunities for people to access higher education," he said.

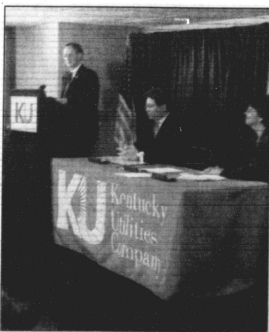
He said classes in the facility would be on a flexible schedule that meets the needs of people who work. Courses could be offered anywhere from 7 a.m. to midnight, he said.

LCC will relocate its Continuing Education and Workforce Development Coordinators to the eighth floor of the KU building and eventually offer classes for credit there as well.

About 60 faculty and staff from the UK's College of Social Work and the Interdisciplinary Human Development Institute will occupy the seventh floor.

Crystal Collins-Camargo, a clinical assistant professor in the UK College of Social Work, is among those moving. Her department is currently spread out in three different locations on campus, and the downtown facility will consolidate them, she said.

"We're very excited about it," she said.

### Student found dead in his bed

A UK biochemistry graduate student was found unresponsive by a roommate at his Conn Terrace residence Tuesday afternoon. After the arrival of Lexington emergency crews, Michael S. Sheehan, 26 was pronounced dead at 2:40 p.m. by the Lexington-Fayette County Coroner. The coroner's news release said that there was no foul play suspected. The cause of death is undetermined, pending toxicology and autopsy results from the coroner's office. Lexington police are also investigating the death.

## NATIONAL NEWS

### Court throws out NYPD convictions

NEW YORK — In a stunning turn in one of the nation's most shocking police brutality scandals, a federal appeals court Thursday threw out the convictions of three of the four white officers sent to prison for the torture of Haitian immigrant Amer Louima. A three-judge panel of the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled unanimously that Charles Schwarz's lawyer did not defend him adequately and that the jury was tainted by news reports when it convicted him of violating Louima's civil rights by holding him down during the 1997 assault in a police station bathroom. The court also said there was insufficient evidence to sustain the obstruction-of-justice convictions of Schwarz, 36, and officers Thomas Wiese, 38, and Thomas Bruder, 35. Wiese and Bruder had been accused of lying to cover up Schwarz's role. The ruling did not affect the guilty pleas of the main attacker, Justin Volpe, 37, who admitted he sodomized the handcuffed Louima with a broken broomstick in a fit of rage.

## INTERNATIONAL NEWS

### 58 Muslims killed in Hindu attacks

AHMADABAD, India — Angry Hindus set fire to homes in a Muslim neighborhood Thursday and then kept firefighters away for hours, dragging out one former lawmaker and burning him alive. At least 58 people died in revenge attacks triggered by a Muslim assault on a train. Police in western Gujarat state appeared outnumbered or unwilling to act to quell what appeared to be the worst rioting to hit the country in nearly a decade. The officers stood in bunches, watching as groups of Hindus, wielding iron rods and cans of gasoline or kerosene, roamed Ahmadabad attacking Muslims in their homes, shops and vehicles. The government promised to send the army to Ahmadabad, the region's main city, to end the rampage. But there were fears the violence would spread Friday, when Hindu nationalists called for a nationwide strike.

### Palestinian death toll surpasses 1,000

BALATA REFUGEE CAMP, West Bank — The Israeli military attacked two West Bank refugee camps with helicopter gunships, tanks and paratroopers Thursday in a high-stakes attempt to break strongholds of Palestinian militants. An Israeli soldier and 12 Palestinians were killed, pushing the Palestinian toll past 1,000 in 17 months of fighting. It was the first time Israeli troops have stormed refugee camps in the current Mideast conflict. The fierce, sustained gunbattles began before dawn and carried on past sundown in the camps, on the edge of Nabulus and the fringes of Jenin, Palestinian towns less than 20 miles apart. A thirteenth Palestinian was shot dead near the southern edge of Jerusalem.

Board of Supervision to make an initial interpretation of the rules. When and if a dispute arises, it is our job to make a final determination of the law. Until that time arises, we feel it is improper to make any conclusions."

Mitchell Page, Chief Justice of the SG Supreme Court, said not even the United States Supreme Court can issue advisory opinions. Advisory opinions threaten the balance of power but can be changed after a dispute arises, he said.

"We could never really know all of the implications if we answered his questions," Paige said.

Even if the Supreme Court was to answer the questions, none of the problems would be solved, said the Court's Response.

"Even if Robinson followed the advice of the court, his decisions could still be appealed to this court and our justices would then be asked to answer many of the same questions."

This was the first time any Election Board of Supervisors member has officially

asked for this type of advisory opinion from the Court that Page can remember.

"I believed it to be in the best interest of everyone to send out these questions to make the election run smoother," Robinson said. "I've been in SG for five years and these types of questions are brought up every year."

Concurring with the rest of the voting justices, Justice Jonathan Gay wrote separately in response to Robinson. He recommended Robinson clarify who would be eligible to run for office before the filing deadline had past. The filing deadline was 4 p.m. Wednesday.

His response read, "This will allow their supporters to adjust their positions before filing deadline has passed. If he does not, this court could be forced to use its equitable powers to deal with this issue in a way that is both untimely and difficult."

Robinson said he understands the reasons for the Court's decision. He plans to proceed with the election and answer questions to the best of his ability.

"I respect the decision and will abide by it," Robinson said. "We'll take problems as they come and try to work them out."

paign hard and make sure student voices are heard in this election," Hayes said.

Martin Bidegaray, an English sophomore, said he felt the concept of an experience clause was invalid in the first place.

"If Hayes is the only other person running, whether he's qualified should be up to the student body," he said.

Robinson said the fact that Tim would run unopposed was mentioned during the board's

deliberation, but the decision had to be based on the SG Constitution. He said the decision involved a lot of deliberation. Election board members feel they did the right thing, Robinson said.

Hayes said if his appeal is denied, he will try to get a referendum in which students will have to vote as to whether he should be allowed to run. He said he hopes it doesn't get to that point.

"It's a shame that stuff like this has to happen simply to run for Student Government president," Hayes said.

"This shows what has happened to Student Government."

# From Internet to print books, a new writer makes her debut

**Hypertext: Love, volleyball and bulimia all shown through Eisen's *Making Scenes***

*Making Scenes* is a book about love, religion, bulimia and volleyball.

"I write a letter to my advisor thanking him for all the honors-student research money he flunged for me during the past four years, and p.s. I withdrew all my applications to graduate school — I want to play professional beach volleyball," says the unnamed main character of the book.

She moves out of her house and starts to embark upon her volleyball dream.

"It's about that time after you graduate from college where nothing you ever learned means anything and you're trying to figure out what to do," said author Adrienne Eisen. "It's a lot about experiences I've had."

The character goes through

her uncertainties. Her life is a lot like the pro volleyball circuit, which changes quickly. In the volleyball world, the players are constantly trading off partners.

"Everyone is trying to make a living. So if you can trade up even one partner, it makes a huge difference in the pay," said Eisen.

In her private life as well as her professional life, the main character often switches partners. She explores lesbian relationships as well as relationships with married men.

The character finally gets involved with a man named Andy. The two move in together and continue to explore a relationship. Eisen thinks this relationship is the most important one in the character's life.

"Andy is so important because someone cares for her. She has someone to care about," she said.

Eisen deliberately chose not to name the main character.

"There is no name because she's so close to me," Eisen said. "I didn't want to give her someone else's name because I felt too close, but I didn't want to give her my name because I worried people would be unable to read the book as fiction."

The book itself is exciting for Eisen, because it is her first book in print. Her earlier writings, called hypertexts, were published on the Internet.

Her road to being a writer included writing for business magazines, something reflected in the short stock-market job of her character.

"I first write what I care about and then workshop to make it appealing to other people," she said.

It wasn't always easy. Eisen said she wrote in the format of a diary, and worked with various writing coaches to change that style.

"A person's diary is boring to everyone but him or herself," she said.

Although her book isn't

written in the format of the diary, the reader still gets the feel of the character's thoughts and is privy to things the character hasn't let on to anyone else. For example, the reader gets to know about the character's bulimia and stealing binges before she admits them even to Andy.

Also running through the book is a strong current of Judaism, which is Eisen's religion.

"It's really important to me to be known as a Jewish writer even though I'm very secular," she said.

She also gives some advice for budding writers.

"Write a lot. Don't feel bad about throwing anything away," she said.

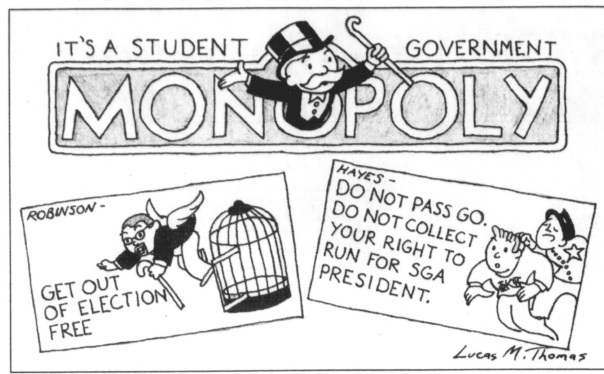

## Another step back: the saga continues

The decision by the Election Board of Supervisors to block Ben Hayes from running for Student Government president smells of something, and it sure isn't common sense. Nowhere in the SG Constitution does it state that a candidate for student body president has to have experience specifically in SG (then SGA, of course).

Yet, Hayes' bid for student body president was shot down just hours after the filing deadline, leaving incumbent Tim Robinson to run uncontested.

Since when are candidates for any public office restricted to a specific category of previously elected officials? Must a candidate for governor have served a term in the State House of Representatives? Does a future mayor have to first serve on the city council?

Why is this even a question? Patrick Robinson, chairman of the election board, managed to interpret an insignificant clause in the SG Constitution so narrowly that virtually every UK student would be rendered ineligible.

"We do not see where being vice president of Phi Kappa Psi, a greek organization, serves as being in Student Government," Robinson wrote in the letter to Hayes.

Nevermind that the Constitution does not refer specifically to SG in the experience clause. If the Greek leaders are disallowed, and leadership in any other organization not directly associated with SG does not count toward "experience," roughly one percent of the student body could run for SG president.

Simply put, Robinson's interpretation mandates incestuous tendencies within SG that would be unacceptable at any other level of government.

Now that's democracy. Not only that, but last year's election board interpreted the same clause in a diametrically opposite manner; they allowed experience on the Interfraternity Council to count toward the one-year requirement. Robinson has it within his right to ignore precedent, but doing so leaves only arbitrary musings, not serious deliberation.

For anyone to suggest the experience clause is anything but ambiguous would be absurd. For the chairman of the election board to then opt for the strictest interpretation, when doing so allows his former boss to run uncontested, is high comedy almost to the level of farce.

With a budget of more than \$200,000, a seat on the Board of Trustees and a microphone as the voice of the student body, the SG presidency should not be moved out of arm's reach from the majority of students. The standards by which candidates are judged should be determined by voters, not by a few people with a large stake in maintaining the status quo.

For a great number of students, the mention of SG brings to mind overactive students with too much time on their hands. This notion is only perpetuated when former deputy chiefs of staff turned election board chairmen interpret minute parts of the Constitution in a manner such as this.

The decision should be reversed immediately.

## There's no room for dirty politics at UK

Looks like Student Government President Tim Robinson is well on his way to becoming a respected career politician. I'm glad SG is helping someone.

Robinson is continuously proving he has what it takes to help further poison the loathsome political climate in our country. The SG Election Board of Supervisors' decision to disqualify Ben Hayes from running for president sets a new standard for injustice in student politics and serves as the latest black-eye on the face of a Robinson presidency that can be called "tainted" at best.

Even more dumbfounding is the fact Hayes also served as the SG representative on the student appeals board. Tim Robinson's buddy was quick to find a way around that quandary though.

In his explanation the board chairman wrote that Hayes' service with the appeals board was not considered SG service because he was appointed to the position by the university's president. That's some fancy politickin' falls.

"I've been here two and a half years and he hasn't been here at all," Robinson claimed. All right, since it's obviously "pat Tim on the back" week, let's have a look at some of his more honorable SG achievements.

After last year's successful presidential run, Robinson was found guilty of campaign violations. He and his vice-president were ordered to serve 25 hours of community service for underreporting the cost of an election Web site. It comes as no surprise that Robinson's preferred method of cabinet appointment turned out to be cronyism, as he so thoroughly demonstrated with the creation of his pastrty election board.

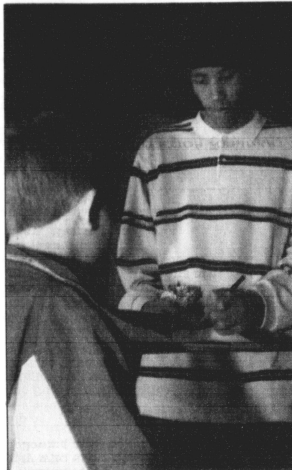

After defeating Texas A&M in the short sleeve temperatures of College Station, Texas, Monday, the UK baseball team returns to Lexington for its first homestand of the season.

But it's not an ordinary home game. Because the construction at Cliff Hagan Stadium is not finished, the Bat Cats will host the RedHawks of Miami (Ohio) at 3 p.m. today at Applebee's Park — the home of the Lexington Legends.

Although senior first baseman Robert Newton has never been to Applebee's Park, he's eager to test it with his bat. "Everyone said the ball carries well out there," he said. "I'll be eager to find out." One player who doesn't

want to find out is senior pitcher Jarrod Reynolds.

After pitching 3.2 innings in his first collegiate start against the Aggies, Reynolds said he hopes to keep the ball inside the stadium if he's called to the mound this weekend. Reynolds looks forward to playing at Applebees Park and has visited in the past.

"I think it's a beautiful ballpark," he said. Reynolds isn't as enthused about the weather. He said the recent snow and cold weather is hard to pitch in.

Couch Keith Madison said cold weather can create problems for pitchers. If the temperature drops below 40 degrees and the wind is swirling, it's rough, he said.

"If it's 38 to 40 degrees with a lot of sunshine, we'll play."

The win over the Aggies Monday was Madison's 700th at UK. Madison said his team's record (4-5) hasn't lessened his expectations. Two of the team's five losses were by one run.

"Our bullpen blew some leads," he said. "But I was very encouraged with our hitting. Our starting pitching was also very good."

After facing a slew of tough opponents in tournaments in Birmingham, Ala., and College Station, Madison said Miami presents another challenge.

"Miami of Ohio has a really strong tradition," he said.

The Bat Cats will continue to play home games at Applebee's Park until the construction at Cliff Hagan Stadium is finished on March 22 for a home series against the Mississippi State Bulldogs.

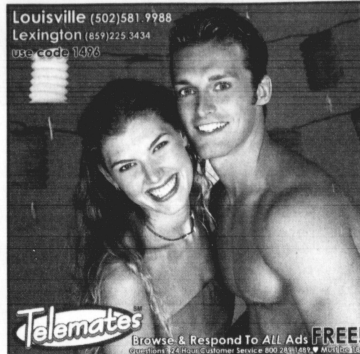
