## MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT :-

This appeal is prosecuted from and to reverse the judgment of the Floyd circuit court, in a case late pending therein styled as above.

The plaintiff and defendant were married to each other. The defendant, James Honaker, had been previously married, had one child and was a merchant in a small way. Soon aftertheir marriage, James Honaker's creditors began to urge payment of their bills, and finally, Keel & Company made an assignment for the benefit of their creditors. assignee, after disposing of a good many of the goods in the store, sold the remnants in a lump to Nanny J.
