


MEMORIAL COLISEUM

"HOME OF THE KENTUCKY LADY KATS" (capacity — 8,700)

Memorial Coliseum is the home of one of the richest basketball traditions in the entire world. It is also the home of Coach Sharon Fanning's Kentucky Lady Kats, a team determined to bring glory and excitement to a facility that has known a wealth of both.

For 24 years, the historic coliseum housed the renowned Kentucky Wildcats, who won two national championships and 24 Southeastern Conference titles there under the direction of legendary coaches Adolph Rupp and Joe B. Hall. But the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat

Old Dominion, with 6-foot-8 All-American center Anne Donovan looming as no foe had before. A record crowd of 10,622 fired-up fans packed the Coliseum that Saturday evening, and roared hysterically as the sixth-ranked Lady Kats came from 10 points down in the second half for an 80-66 upset win. After the victory the Lady Kats, who were led by their own All-American Valerie Still, climbed to fourth in the national poll. In their three remaining home games, they averaged 7,600 fans. And they easily led the nation in attendance that year.

Just as their male counterparts did before them, the Lady Kats have made Memorial Coliseum the home of a high-class, winning program. They have never had a bad season at home. and once boasted a 31-game

win streak in the Coliseum.

In 1984, University President H.L. Donovan began plans for the Coliseum, when he recommended a building that would "properly take care of our athletics, our health services, our physical education and our recreation." The building was also nicknamed "the house that Rupp built," since "the Baron's" standout teams had long since outgrown 2,800-seat Alumni Coliseum.

Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$3,995,000. The huge building was dedicated to serve as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict. The Coliseum covers an entire city block and has as much space as a seven-story office building.

Situated along Euclid Avenue, Memorial Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games and Athletic Department offices, but also serves as the site of other sporting events, lectures and concerts.




Memorial Coliseum has been the exclusive basketball home for the Lady Kats since 1976.

Since then, Memorial Coliseum has undergone renovations to include a state-of-the-art weight room, basketball and administrative offices, a team meeting room and modern dressing and lockerrooms.

The Lady Kats have added a Southeastern Conference title and a National Women's Invitational Tournament Championship to their list of accomplishments, and have proudly carved a 199-68 home court record into the history of the now 8,700-seat coliseum.

The undisputed highlight of the Lady Kats' Memorial Coliseum era came on a cold winter night in 1983. The date was February 5 and the opponent was No. 5

Guard Kristi Cushenberry moved to sixth in all-time Lady Kats scoring with a total of 1,358 points.

Leadership, determination and athletic ability helped the Kentucky Lady Kats succeed in 1991-92, despite a difficult schedule.

Senior co-captains Stacy McIntyre, Kristi Cushenberry and Rebekah Reasor helped guide the team through a schedule that featured 11 nationally-ranked teams.

Kentucky took its blows early, losing to lowa in its season opener and to Houston in the championship game of the Lady Kats Invitational. Nevertheless, the Kats managed to pull their forces together and record one of the biggest wins in program's history with a 67-66 upset victory over intrastate rival and NCAA Champion runner-up Western Kentucky in Bowling Green. UK also earned its first conference victory early in the season against newcomer South Carolina (75-63) in Columbia, S.C.

In addition to the victory over Western Kentucky, the Kats reigned supreme in the Commonwealth with wins against Louisville and Morehead State. UK also enjoyed several other season highlights. The team beat Auburn for the first time in six years and beat LSU for the first time in 10 years. By midseason, UK was off to one of its best starts in the conference with four wins and only one loss. The Kats also reached the semifinals of the SEC Tournament for the first time since winning the title in 1982. UK beat Arkansas and nationally-ranked Alabama in the tournament before losing to eventual champion Tennessee.

The success of McIntyre was a key factor for the team throughout the season. She led the squad in scoring for the second consecutive season, averaging 16.1 points in her senior year. She was named to the Dial Classic All-Tournament team, the St. John's Cahill Invitational All-Tournament team, the SEC All-Tournament team and was named MVP of the Lady Kats Invitational. She hit a career-high 25 points twice and broke Lady Kats Invitational records for most free throws attempted and made, netting 14-14 against Houston. She made a place for herself in the Lady Kats record book, having moved to seventh place in all-time scoring (1,215) and fifth

in all-time steals (189). She was the only Lady Kat to start in every game. Off the court, she had success in the classroom and was named to the Academic All-SEC list, along with teammates Cushenberry, Reasor and sophomore Jennifer Gray.

Cushenberry was also an instrumental figure in UK's success. She was second in scoring with an average of 10.7 points per game. She ended her career sixth in all-time Lady Kat scoring with 1,358 points. She played in every game and was a key in UK's three-point attack, netting 37 percent of her attempts. Cushenberry and Mia Daniel helped UK to a spot in the top 20 in the NCAA in three-point goals made per game. Daniel made 37.3 percent of her attempts and was key in helping UK tie the SEC record for most three-point goals made in the tournament with a total of nine.

In May, the Lady Kats went overseas to tour Finland and Estonia. The trip brought the successful 1991-92 season to a close as the Kats posted a 5-0 winning record against their opponents.

UK beat Tapiolan Urheiluhall 76-56, the Finnish Junior National team 73-49, Estonia 71-66, the Meelis Estonian team, 82-80 and Espoo, in Finland, 77-53.

SEASON OUTLOOK

A national ranking, a high finish in the Southeastern Conference and an NCAA Tournament berth are just three of the goals the 1992-93 Lady Kats basketball team is set to accomplish.

Coach Sharon Fanning, in her sixth season as head coach, introduces another challenging schedule as her squad returns nine letterwinners and welcomes three freshmen to the program.

Kentucky survived one of its toughest schedules last season. Eleven teams were either nationally ranked or received votes. UK earned a 16-14 record, finished with a 5-6 sixth-place finish in the SEC and managed to make its first appearance in the SEC Tournament semifinals since 1982. Kentucky also posted victories against in-state schools, beating Louisville, Morehead State and NCAA National runner-up Western Kentucky.

Many of the same teams the Kats faced last season appear on the schedule this year. Sophomore guard Stacey Reed played against each of last year's opponents and started in all but four games. Reed returns averaging 8.9 points and 2.9 rebounds. She led the squad in assists (3.0) and steals (2.3) and scored a career-high 19 points against Holy Cross. She also played basketball over the summer with the USA Junior Select team.

Junior center Jennifer Gray hopes to retain her position in the starting linuep. Gray played in every game and started in all but five, averaging 4.6 points and 3.2 rebounds. She had a career-high 12 points in UK's victory over Mississippi State and grabbed a career-high 13 rebounds in UK's win over LSU.

The Kats figure to put pressure on opponents with the likes of senior forward Mia Daniel and senior center Jocelyn Mills. Both were set back due to injuries last season, but both return strong this year.

Daniel returns averages of 8.7 points and 3.5 rebounds. Often credited with giving UK an added spark, Daniel is considered one of the team's best three-point shooters. She hit four three-pointers against Vanderbilt and three against four other teams. She was ranked among SEC leaders for three-point field goal percentage (38.6) and goals made per game (1.7) and was instrumental in keeping UK ranked in the top 20 nationally among teams with the most three-point attempts per game.

Mills missed 11 games due to hernia surgery in January, but returned in February. She averaged 7.3 points and 5.8 rebounds through 19 games and scored a season-high 19 points and grabbed 11 rebounds against nationally-ranked Mississippi.

Increasing intensity, improving consistency and establishing a good work ethic are team ambitions this year. The mission will be crucial with the departure of forward Stacy McIntyre and guard Kristi Cushenberry, who averaged near 30 points collectively.

Two veterans looking to help fill the void will be junior guards Tedra Eberhart (7.3 ppg., 2.9 rpg) and Kayla Campbell (1.5 ppg, .8 rpg). At forward UK can go to senior Cathy Proctor (2.0 ppg, 1.6 rpg) or junior Christe Jordan (1.9 ppg, 1.5 rpg). Eberhart's versatility also leaves her open





to play forward this season, while Proctor may be called upon at center.

Karri Koach (3.2 ppg, 3.2 rpg) should see plenty of playing time at the post. Koach, a 6-4 sophomore, played in every game and started against nationally-ranked Connecticut. She played in every SEC game and was an exceptional shot blocker.

The freshman class provides depth and talent. Becky McKinley (5-11, Fr.), Christina Jansen (5-5, Fr.) and Julie Swarens (5-7, Fr.) join the team this season. McKinley is the first "Miss Kentucky Basketball" to sign under Coach Fanning's tenure. She led the state in scoring with an average of 30.2 points per game. Jansen averaged 12 points and six rebounds per game. She was honored as the state's Gatorade Player of the Year and USA Today Player of the Year. Both Jansen and McKinley were named to the Kentucky all-star team that faced the Indiana all-stars which featured Swarens. Swarens averaged 18.6 points and 5.6 rebounds per game in leading North Harrison High School to its second consecutive 22-2 season. All three freshmen were all-state and should see plenty of playing time.

Center Jocelyn Mills averaged 7.3 points and 5.8 rebounds, despite sitting out 11 games due to surgery. She returns as one of the strongest players and looks for a position in the starting lineup.

HEAD COACH

SHARON FANNING



Sharon Fanning enters her sixth season at Kentucky and her 17th season overall in collegiate coaching with a continued commitment to winning both on and off the court.

Fanning guided the 1991-92 Lady Kats through one of their toughest schedules which featured 11 teams that either received national votes or that were ranked. The Kats finished 16-14 overall and 5-6 in the Southeastern Conference. Fanning also guided Kentucky to its first appearance in the semifinals of the SEC Tournament since the team won the title in 1982.

Off the court, Fanning had to be pleased as four of her players were named to the Academic All-SEC list and six were chosen for the Athletics Director's honor roll for achieving a grade point average of 3.0 or higher.

The road to success was not always easy for the Chattanooga, Tenn., native as she watched her first two UK teams struggle. She took over the program in 1987, with the team near the bottom of the SEC and little talent in the cupboard. Her worst fears were realized as injuries and personal problems saw a roster of 15 shrink to nine en route to a 0-9 SEC record and a 14-15 overall mark. In 1988-89 the Kats improved their SEC record to 3-6 for an eighth-place showing in league play and an overall mark of 12-16.

Under Fanning's guidance the team continued to improve as the 1989-90 squad appeared in the Top 25 poll and posted a 23-8 record en route to winning its first National Women's Invitational Tournament title. The 1990-91 season featured a second consecutive 20-win season (20-9) and UK's first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 1985-86.

Fanning brought to UK not only an

exceptional record, but also a national reputation as an outstanding coach, recruiter and motivator. In 11 memorable seasons at her alma mater,

Tennessee-Chattanooga, Fanning's squads compiled a 189-129 mark, including five straight Southern Conference championships from 1982-86. In 1984, the Lady Mocs went 26-5 and were runners-up in the NWIT.

While her teams were reaping glory for UTC, Fanning was receiving personal honors as well. She was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year in 1984 and 1985 and was nominated for Kodak National Coach of the Year honors in 1984. In 1986 she coached the North squad in the U.S. Olympic Festival and in 1987 she was named to the staff of the USA Select team. She has also served on the staff of the USA Junior National team that competed in the World Championship Qualifying Tournament in South America.

Fanning completed her undergraduate degree at UTC in 1975 while competing in both basketball and volleyball. She received her master's degree in 1976 from the University of Tennessee, where she served as graduate assistant to Pat Head Summitt for one year before returning home to build a program at UTC.

A noted speaker who is very active in civic affairs, Fanning has served two terms on the Women's Basketball Coaches Association Board of Directors.

A 1977 graduate of Flagler College, McLaughlin earned a bachelor's degree in education and helped lead the NMSU Roadrunners to a 26-3 overall record and a 10-0 record in the High Country Athletic Conference in his first season. The Roadrunners finished first in the conference in 1987 and were ranked 19th in the final poll.

In 1982 McLaughlin served as assistant boys coach and head girls coach for Fife High School basketball team in Tacoma, Wash. After leading the girls team to a 22-3 record and the Seamont League Championships, McLaughlin received coach of the year honors.

Following his position at Fife High School, McLaughlin assumed the assistant coaching position with Temple University in 1982 and helped lead the Owls to the 1982-83 National Women's Invitational Tournament.

Before joining the program at NMSU, McLaughlin served as head women's basketball coach at Siena College for two seasons. While at Siena, he compiled a record of 34-24. During the 1986-87 season, his team finished its schedule with a 20-9 overall record and a first-place finish in in the MECA conference. He was named MECA Coach of the Year for the season.



ILENE HAUSER Assistant Coach (Idaho State, 1990)

Hauser begins her first season as a full-time assistant coach after serving two years as a graduate assistant to Coach Sharon Fanning and her staff. She replaces former assistant Myra Fishback.

She has also served as a fitness instructor for the Mid Valley Athletic Club in Reseda, Calif., and has instructed and coached at the Blue Star, Billie Moore and Lady Kats basketball camps.







CATS

The University of Kentucky continues to keep the term "student-athlete" in the proper prospective — student first, athlete second.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services or simply "CATS."

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms used for tutoring. CATS expanded during the past academic year and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

Currently, the UKAA budgets close to \$500,000 per year for the CATS Center.

"CATS is a tremendous advantage for all of our student athletes," says Lady Kats Coach Sharon Fanning. "We are very proud that Kentucky was the first in the nation to initiate an academic tutorial service of this magnitute."

"Our CATS staff monitors study hall, sets up tutors, requires a freshman orientation program to make sure our athletes get off to a good start and maintains flexible hours to accommodate any request for study time," said Fanning. "CATS also helps arrange summer job opportunities and works with the coaching staff on job placement upon graduation."

Former UK Football Coach Jerry Claiborne put the importance of the CATS Center in perspective when he said:

"There's no question, the CATS Center is a very important part of not only the UK football program, but the entire UK athletics program. Academic pursuits come first at Kentucky."

Indeed, academics do come first. The combination of the CATS Center and Claiborne, who retired after the 1989 football season and has since been replaced by Bill Curry, brought a national championship to UK in 1989. The UK football program was awarded the 1989 College Football Association's Academic Achievement Award for the nation's highest graduation rate for its 1983 freshman class. UK's achievement marked the first time since the inception of the award that a team other than Duke, Virginia or Notre Dame had won the award.


Bob Bradley, Assistant Athletics Director for Academics, supervises the CATS Center. Bradley is assisted by Barbara Deniston, Director of Student Development, and Mike Jenkins, Academic Counselor. The CATS Center also employs four graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and surrounding community.

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete over another without an academic center," Bradley says. "This is a medium which the student-athlete can get any question about his or her academic endeavors answered." Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics. "Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their student-athletes," Bradley said. "I have been blessed at Kentucky."

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to afford the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

HISTORY OF THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

Regarded by many as the most competitive women's collegiate basketball league, the Southeastern Conference continues to make headlines nationwide.

Since the inception of the NCAA, at least four SEC teams have been listed in the final Associated Press and USA Today national polls. To add to its list of accomplishments, SEC teams lead the way in NCAA Tournament appearances (61) and have recorded the best NCAA victory mark (96-58-.623) in the tournament. The SEC also leads the nation in Final Four (12) and Final Eight (25) berths.

The Southeastern Conference exclaimed another first during the 1990-91 academic year—the addition of Arkansas and South Carolina—which marked the first invitations extended since the league's inception in 1933.

The 12 universities of the Southeastern Conference began athletic competition with each other almost 100 years ago when most were members of the Southeastern Intercollegiate Athletics Association (SIAA). Seven institutions attended the SIAA organizational meeting of faculty representatives called by Dr. William L. Dudley of Vanderbilt in Altanta on Dec. 22, 1894.

The seven-member SIAA expanded to 19 institutions in 1895 and by 1920 there were 30 members. The larger schools reorganized as the Southern Conference at a meeting in Gainesville, Fla., Dec. 12-13, 1920. Professor S.V. Sanford of Georgia called the meeting and served as the first president. Despite an original limit of 16, the membership grew to 23 by 1928. At one time or another the SIAA and the SC included most of the Southern colleges from Virginia to Texas

The 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference at the annual SC meeting of Dec. 8-9, 1932, in Knoxville, Tenn. The 10 coast members remained in the Southern Conference. Dr. Frank L. McVey of Kentucky was elected president of the new conference whose charter members were: Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Louisiana State, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt. (Sewanee withdrew Dec. 13, 1940, while Georgia Tech and Tulane followed on June 1, 1964, and June 1, 1966, respectively). McVey held an informal meeting of the school presidents Feb. 16, 1933, in Birmingham, Ala., then the first full meeting in Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 27.

The new SEC discovered both stature and stability by designating voting power to the presidents of the member institutions. They determined the policies of the league and through the years it has been the principal source of strength in the evolution of the league, with particular reference to eligibility regulations and academic requirements. The office of the commissioner was formed in 1940 in Jackson, Miss., due to the great amount of detail work developing, especially in recruiting and eligibility. Former Mississippi Governor Martin S. Conner took office as commissioner Aug. 21, 1940, as an extension of the authority of the presidents.

The office was moved to Birmingham, Ala., with the appointment of Bernie H. Moore as the second full-time commissioner on Feb. 21, 1948.

The conference office has remained in Birmingham ever since. In that span from 1946 to 1991, the SEC has had four commissioners—A.M. (Tonto) Coleman, Dr. H. Boyd McWhorter, Dr. Harvey W. Schiller and Roy F. Kramer.

Current commissioner Roy F. Kramer came into office in 1990. Kramer has spent the last 12 years as athletics director at Vanderbilt and had served on numerous NCAA committees.

The first SEC champions were crowned in 1933 in four sports (baseball, basketball, football and outdoor track). The league's inaugural championship event a basketball tournament held Feb. 24-28, 1933, in Atlanta, Ga. Records show the first men's team title for cross-country was awarded in 1935, while golf and swimming were added in 1937. The league later began hosting championships in tennis (1953) and indoor track (1957).

In 1973-74 the SEC first awarded the Bernie Moore Trophy, symbolic of the league's premier men's athletic program. Points are awarded based on the member institutions' conference finish in all sports.

In the 1979-80 academic year SEC championships for women were recognized in basketball, tennis and volleyball. The following year golf, gymnastics, swimming and track and field were added. The administration of women's athletics officially came under the auspices of the conference office on Sept. 1, 1984. A women's all-sports champion has been awarded every year since 1983-84.

As the SEC continues its seventh decade of competition in 1992, the conference regulates nine sports for both its men's and women's programs as follows:

Men — baseball, basketball, football, golf, swimming, tennis and track (cross country, indoor and outdoor).

Women — basketball, golf, gymnastics, swimming, tennis, track (cross country, indoor and outdoor) and volleyball.





PRESIDENT AND BOARD

Charles T. Wethington, Jr. was named the University of Kentucky's 10th president on September 18, 1990 after serving as interim president for nine months. Prior to assuming the post, he served as Chancellor of the UK Community College system since 1982.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965, as an educational psychology instructor on the Lexington campus of the University and entered administration two years later when he was named director of Maysville Community College. In 1971 he moved to the system office in Lexington as assistant vice president, and became vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization of 1982, he was named chancellor of the UK system, one of the three major sectors of UK.

Under his leadership the Community College System has set enrollment records and added an entire new college at Owenshoro

Wethington earned his master's and doctorate degrees at UK after completing his undergraduate work at Eastern Kentucky University.

The Casey County native has been active on the national higher education scene, serving as legislation committee chairman of the National Council of State Directors of Community and Junior Colleges before moving to the chairmanship in 1985.

He has been vice chairman of the Executive Council of the Southern Association of College and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and was a member of the search committee for the executive director of the Commission.

He has held membership on the Joint Commission on Federal Relations of the Association of Community College Trustees and the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges, and has served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Wethington also is chairman of the Bluegrass State Skills Corporation board of directors, a member of the Board of Visitors of the Community College of the Air Force, a member of the Southern Region Education Board and a member of its Executive Committee. He has been in demand nationally in the accreditation process of community and junior colleges.

During 1957-61 he served as a cryptolinguist in the U.S. Air Force Security Service. He studied Russian at Syracuse University, 1958-59.

Wethington, born Jan. 2, 1936, in Merrimac, Ky., is married to the former Judy Woodrow, a Danville native. They have a son, Kennan, and a daughter, Lisa.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

When Charles Martin (C.M.) Newton became the University of Kentucky's seventh Director of Athletics on April 1, 1989, he hit the ground running.

Newton's first order of business was to bring respectability back to a basketball program hit hard by an NCAA investigation. He did so by hiring New York Knickerbockers head man Rick Pitino to coach the Wildcats. A few months later, Newton was faced with the task of hiring a football coach to replace the retiring Jerry Claiborne. Newton again rose to the occasion, luring Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year Bill Curry from the University of Alabama to lead the UK

Newton recently scored once again with the UK fans when it was announced that UK's football and basketball games will once again be carried on Louisville's clear-channel, 50,000-watt WHAS Radio, for the first time since 1986.

After little more than a year on the job, Newton has become one of the most popular public figures in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brought to Kentucky a sparkling reputation at a crucial time in the history of UK Athletics. In accepting the position at his alma mater, Newton summarized his goals and objectives by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to continue that great tradition, and at the same time, to totally do it within the NCAA and SEC rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

Newton capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his final Vanderbilt University team to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance during the 1988-89 season. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and also received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year award. Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at the Nashville school since 1982, compiling a 129-115 record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509-375 record overall, ranking among the top 10 active coaches in the game in terms of total victories. His Alabama teams won three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships. He finished his career ranked second in career victories in Southeastern Conference games to his mentor, Coach Adolph Rupp

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team, over 50

percent more than any other league school, and including his last graduating class, all 27 seniors received their diplomas.

Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman of that elite group for five of those years. He served as vice president of USA Basketball, the nation's governing body for international amateur basketball and was named president of the oranization in 1992.

Newton has literally circled the globe to promote the game of basketball. He served as team manager, a combination coaching and administrative position, on the 1984 U.S. Olympic team that won the gold medal. Indiana coach Bob Knight, who tabbed Newton for the Olympic staff, called him "the finest gentleman in our business." In 1983 and 1987, Newton took Vanderbilt squads to the Republic of China (Taiwan) to represent the United States in the R. William Jones Cup International Tournament, winning the gold medal in 1983 and the silver in 1987. He has also conducted coaching clinics in numerous countries.

Newton began his coaching career at Transylvania College (now Transylvania University) in Lexington. Recommended for the job by Coach Rupp, Newton guided Transy to a 169-137 record in his 12 years at the helm.


In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton answered a call from Paul "Bear" Bryant to take on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama basketball program. During his 12-year tenure, Newton orchestrated a complete turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a sparkling 211-123 record.

In addition to three SEC championships, Newton guided the Tide to two trips to the NCAA Tournament and four berths in the NIT.

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, when Vanderbilt athletics director Roy Kramer was searching for a coach of national stature to head the Commodores basketball program, Newton was the obvious man for the job.

Newton was born Feb. 2, 1930, in Rockwood, Tenn. He grew up in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., where he was eventually named a charter member of that city's Sports Hall of Fame, along with Chris Evert, Julius Boros and the late Brian Piccolo. Newton is married to the former Evelyn Davis of Ft. Lauderdale. The Newtons have three grown children — daughters Deborah and Mrs. Tracy Thompson and son Martin.

From its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learning. As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that awaits students at UK. At Kentucky, there is a tradition of value.

UK EDUCATES 37% OF THE COLLEGE STUDENTS IN KENTUCKY

With more than 69,000 students — 24,200 on the Lexington campus and 45,100 at the community colleges across the state — the University of Kentucky now educates 37% of all students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university.

UK HAD 26 NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARS IN FRESHMAN CLASS

There were 26 National Merit Scholars in the Fall 1990 freshman class on the Lexington Campus, an all-time record. They came from all sections of the Commonwealth including Lexington, Louisville, Pine Knot, Perryville, Murray, Beaver Dam and Hopkinsville. There were 77 high school valedictorians and 99 Governor's Scholars in the 1990 freshman class

UK TAKING INITIATIVE TO ATTRACT MINORITY STUDENTS AND FACULTY

Thanks to initiatives in minority affairs, there were 10 new minority faculty at the University as it opened in Fall 1990, including the first Afro-American dean (College of Education) at UK.

UK NOW GIVING \$1.7 MILLION IN MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships to UK students based on merit now total some \$1.7 million a year. The most prestigious is the Singletary Scholarships which provide students four years of college at no cost. In the 1990-91 academic year there were 24 Singletary Scholars — 22 in the freshman class and two transfers from the UK community colleges.

UK HAS REACHED THE TOP CATEGORY OF RESEARCH UNIVERSITIES

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has classified UK as a "Research University of the First Class," the only such institution in Kentucky and one of only 45 in the nation.

UK AMONG NATION'S TOP UNIVERSITIES IN COMPUTING

Thanks to a \$4.9 million gift from the IBM Corporation, UK continues its role as one of

the leading computing universities in the nation. The fit helped UK upgrade its IBM Supercomputer that is now being used at UK by both faculty and students. UK ranks in the top tier of public universities in the nation in computing capacity.

UK FACULTY WIN AWARDS AND HONORS IN MANY FIELDS

Some examples: GUY DAVENPORT, English, was a 1990 recipient of the prestigious MacArthur Fellowship. JOHN N. WALTER, Agricultural Engineering, is president of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. CARY CROMWELL, Animal Science is president of the American Society of Animal Science. JOHN R. VAN NAGELL, Obstetrics and Gynecology, was selected as one of the outstanding medical specialists in the country by Town and Country magazine. LINDA CHEN, Nutrition and Food Science, won the Borden Award for exceptional research in nutrition. RAMONA RUSH, Communications, was named the outstanding woman in the field by the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication's status of women committee.

UK FACULTY BRING \$70 MILLION IN GRANTS, CONTRACTS AND GIFTS

UK faculty brought in some \$70 million in grants, contracts and gifts from outside sources in the 1989-90 academic year. The record amount was 17% greater than the year before and marked a 70% increase in the past five years. As further indication of UK's faculty expertise, 98% of them have the highest degree attainable in their fields.

UK STUDENTS WIN MANY PRESTIGIOUS AWARDS AND HONORS

The debate team took second-place in the nation's largest invitational collegiate debate tournament in 1990. For three years in a row, the College of Law moot court team has been in the national finals of the intercollegiate moot court competition. A UK nursing student was one of 121 U.S. collegians chosen for the USA Today All-USA College Academic Team. UK's cheerleaders squad captured its fourth national championship in 1991 - most in the nation.UK was national champion in 1985, '87, '88 and '91. The UK yearbook won first place nationally in competitions sponsored by the Associated Collegiate Press and the National Scholastic Press Association. UK's student newspaper received the All-America honor rating five marks of distinction, placing it in the top third of the nation's best student newspapers. The UK Jazz Ensemble was voted most outstanding among 14 student combos or big bands invited to perform at the Notre Dame College Jazz Festival, the most prestigious event of its kind in the nation.

LEXINGTON

Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee-houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, thoroughbred and harness racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds, and streams, and the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park, all in easy distance of the UK campus, are just a few attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

A recent statewide poll indicated that the Lexington area is the most popular place to live, work and play in Kentucky, and it's an area most residents would not seriously consider leaving. Lexington, Kentucky — one beauty of a city.


If asked to describe Kentucky, the first word to come to mind would probably

be horses. And the description would be accurate, since the Bluegrass region of central Kentucky is internationally recognized as the Horse Capital of the World. 
