Roselle, students discuss Chandler statement

Concerns of racism expressed in closed-door meeting with president

UK President David Roselle said yesterday he does not think former Gov. A.B. "Happy" Chandler should stay on the UK Board of Trustees if he made the recent racial slur that has been attributed to him.

Chandler, however, has denied making the statement.

"(Students) asked me if I thought Happy Chandler should be on the board, and I said I did not think he should be on the board unless he represents all the students and the faculty of the University of Kentucky," Roselle said.

"I understand (the students') abhorrence at being represented by someone who was unable, through their comments, to represent all such people."

Roselle held a closed meeting with students yesterday afternoon in the Old Board Room of the Administration Building after receiving many calls from students concerning Chandler's comment, said UK spokesperson Bernie Vonderheide.

Some students questioned after the meeting said the president had said Chandler should be removed from the board if he does not represent the University.

"We came here wanting (Roselle) to say, 'Well, as the UK president I feel that

"Happy" Chandler should be taken off the board because it gives us a bad image as a holistic scale," said sophomore James Blackmon.

"My point is I know (Roselle's) making the statement, but I don't know if he's going to follow through on that statement — I mean he's got his triple digits, he's got his security here at the University, and yet "Happy" Chandler has a lot of pull. But (Roselle is) here for us, not "Happy" Chandler, so he should support us."

A rally will be held to protest Chandler's membership on the Board of Trustees tonight at 6 p.m. at the Civic Center entrances. The event is open to the public and is sponsored by Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council member Mike Wilson.

"I wholeheartedly support the efforts of the people involved with this endeavor," Wilson said.

Chandler's comment was made prior to a book signing of the two-time governor and former senator's autobiography, *Heroes, Plain Folks and Skunks: The Life and Times of Albert "Happy" Chandler*, at Joseph Beth Booksellers on Sunday.

The comment seemed to repeat a racial slur Chandler made at a BOT committee meeting last year, which stirred controversy across campus and the state.

But Chandler has denied making the

most recent comments, which appeared in Monday's issue of the Kernel, Roselle said after talking with Chandler.

"Whatever the truth of this matter, I believe that Board members, administrators and faculty members must respect all of the constituents of the University of Kentucky," Roselle said in a statement released later in the day. "Those who do not,

by reason of their actions or comments, should therefore not serve."

Roselle said he discussed the responsibility of membership of the BOT last April with Chandler, after which Chandler apologized for the comment.

"Today Governor Chandler has again agreed with this basic obligation of membership on the Board of Trustees," Roselle

UK groups call for Chandler's exit from BOT

Several student groups and SGA senators organized yesterday to propose a resolution to the Student Government Association, asking for the removal of A.B. "Happy" Chandler from the UK Board of Trustees.

The resolution was drafted after Chandler made a racial epithet in an interview with a Kernel reporter. The quote, which appeared in a story about Chandler's new autobiography, appeared Monday.

Several student organizations, calling themselves Students Against Racism Together (START), announced at a press conference yesterday that the former governor's comments "have no place in modern society on the campus of an institution dedicated to higher education."

START, backed by SGA senators Paige Foster, Joseph Elias, and Mehvan Jاهد, has demanded Chandler's immediate resignation or his removal by Gov. Wallace Wilkinson. If Wilkinson fails to remove Chandler by March 8, 1989, then the matter will be taken to the United States Congress.

James tosses hat into the SGA ring

First black candidate to run for president

Promising to be dedicated, recognize campus diversity and unify the student body, Kennedy, James and Pat Hart announced their candidacy for Student Government Association's executive branch, last night.

James, an agriculture senior and currently serving his first term as an SGA senator at large, is the first black candidate to run for student government president.

James and Hart announced their bid before a crowd of about 75 students.

The James-Hart ticket will not make race an issue during the campaign said press secretary, Bill Bonilla.

"Race has no part in this race. It is not an issue in any way," said Bonilla. "His color has nothing to do with it. We're here because we honestly think he is the most qualified candidate for the job."

Hart, an education major, is currently the College of Education senator and pro tem of the Senate, said he plans to represent the student body to the best of his ability as vice president.

"I won't be a leader to back away from your problems," Hart said. "We pledge to represent you (students) not only by our words but through our deeds."

Hart ran a Senate meeting last semester when Vice President Leah McCain was ill and received praise from many of his colleagues for the way he ran it.

SGA Senator at Large Paige Foster who also is running for vice president said he did a better job running meetings.

Humanities a must for well-balanced student

In his physics classes, UK professor Keith MacAdam lectures about difficult mathematical equations and scientific laws.

But he often complements these concepts with more humanistic ideas, like the background of the scientists who developed particular theories or the way air vibrations create the majestic sounds of a trumpet.

Combining the sciences with the humanities in such a way is essential to a truly significant and worthwhile education, MacAdam said.

Besides, he adds, it is something that needs to be done more on college campuses.

MacAdam's sentiment is expressed by many other UK professors and faculty, who see the role of the humanities — traditionally in such areas as history, philosophy and the arts — as becoming

increasingly important in a society that seems inundated with scientific and technological concepts and products.

"I think sciences and the humanities are inseparable," said MacAdam, who grew up with a strong background in music and literature. "I think they must be seen in that context. A student who goes through a program without being involved in the humanities is really missing a major part of their education."

While numerous reports and studies have shown that American students need to be better educated in the math and sciences, it is just as important to be knowledgeable in the humanities in order to be personally fulfilled and socially responsible, professors say.

"One of the most important parts of any education is to understand how limited human intelligence is," said Wendell Berry, an English professor and renowned Kentucky author. The

Rally to show support for embattled UK coach scheduled for tonight

Thanks to an anonymous donor, a rally to show support for UK basketball coach Eddie Sutton tonight will go as planned.

Someone rented the Patterson Ballroom in the Lexington Civic Center for the rally, according to Chuck Bradley, one of the organizers.

The Sutton supporters had hit a snag on Monday in an earlier attempt for the gathering, when Civic Center officials did not grant permission.

"They seemed to be nervous about it," said Bradley, a 49-year-old Midway grocer. "I believe that there might have been politics involved."

It has been speculated that Sutton will be forced to leave after this season because of the NCAA's investigation into the basketball program.

"We feel like the team and coach certainly needs our support and that's what we're attempting to do — show it," Bradley said.

"We want to show our support for our Wildcats and for Eddie Sutton. We (UK's team) take a lot of abuse and it's time we make a statement. We also need to give

the team a good send off (to the Southeastern Conference tournament)."

Bradley said that the purpose of the rally is to unite, not divide, UK officials.

"We don't intend to bring any divisions between officials of the university," Bradley said.

Bradley said it would be "great" if Sutton and Roselle would both be present at the rally, but that it was improbable.

Sutton, however, has said he will not appear at the 5 p.m. rally, scheduled to begin before the UK-Mississippi State University basketball game at Rupp Arena.

Roselle said he doesn't object to the rally.

"We recognize the right to rally in support of a cause," he said in a statement. "We encourage all participants to focus on the need to have the UK basketball program reflect integrity, honesty and compliance with NCAA rules."

"We are confident that the great majority of Kentuckians do not believe that UK needs to violate NCAA rules in order to be competitive in basketball."

Sutton said that he doesn't want a public struggle with the school's administration over his job.

UK officials won't ask for deposition from reporter

UK will not try to question a Courier-Journal reporter about a source that gave the Louisville newspaper information about UK's response to the NCAA, according to a letter sent to C-J attorney John Fleischer on Feb. 27.

The letter, sent from UK general counsel John C. Darsie, said UK will cancel its deposition of Richard Wilson, the reporter, because the newspaper won't allow Wilson to be questioned.

Without indicating where it got its information, the C-J reporter on Feb. 19 that UK's response implicated UK basketball coach Eddie Sutton in a possible cover-up.

The story quoted directly from Allegation No. 11 in the UK response.

UK scheduled a deposition for March 1, but cancelled it because the Courier won't release the name of the source, citing KRS 421.100 as its defense.

Since Fleischer and "Mr. Wilson intend to invoke all of the privileges avail-

able — to avoid answering my questions as to his source for the Courier-Journal news story. I have decided to cancel" the deposition, the letter said.

Terry McBrayer, Eddie Sutton's attorney, accused the University's administration of "leaking" the story to Wilson.

"To date my own inquiries indicate that Mr. McBrayer's charge is unfounded," the letter said.

"I had hoped to put the matter to rest with sworn testimony from Mr. Wilson. However, that is apparently not to be."

"I do find it curious that you are able to conclude that my effort to ask Mr. Wilson a few simple questions is an effort to impede or stop Wilson's First Amendment right to gather news and information" while at the same time contending that total revelation of the University's NCAA Response will have no effect on the University's investigative efforts or the rights of the individuals caught up in this thing," the letter went on.

Curtain call

UK seniors Mike Scott and Jeff Ginnan make their last appearance at home tonight

Rupp Arena will be full of emotion tonight, but not the kind of emotion most people are used to. Senior night is upon us once again. UK will pay tribute to another pair of seniors — Mike Scott and Jeff Ginnan — before tonight's UK-University of Mississippi game. NBC's Dick Enberg once called UK's tribute to its seniors "one of the most touching moments in the world of athletics." When "My Old Kentucky Home" is sung before the game, very few eyes will be dry.

Even the players have been known to get emotional during the ceremonies. "I don't think I will shed a few tears as of now, but tomorrow night may be different," Scott said. "I can't really say what will happen when I hit the floor."

"I'm sure that I will be a little misty-eyed come tomorrow night," Ginnan said. "Tomorrow night will probably be the highlight of my career."

Scott has been a member of the team for the past 2½ half seasons after transferring here from Wake Forest University. Scott, a 6-11 center, played only a half of a season for the Deacon Deacons before transferring to UK.

"I've always been a big blue fan, so for me to come back to the state and play has been very special to me," Scott said. "It's always been kind of a dream of mine since I was young."

Scott, a native of South Shore, Ky., has not seen the amount of playing time he counted on when making the move to UK, but he has taken everything right in stride.

"I've always tried to stay within my role here at UK," he said. "Last year, we had a No. 1 team with a lot of All-Americans on it, so it [lack of playing time] wasn't too disappointing."

Scott averaged only 4.9 minutes of action in the 15 games he appeared in last season. He contributed only 1.7 points and 1.7 rebounds to last year's 27-6 team.

"I will look back on last year's team as a great experience because we won the Southeastern Conference championship and did so well the entire season," Scott said. "Scott's role changed dramatically from last season to this. With the graduation of five seniors, Rex Chapman going to the NBA and Eric Manuel sitting out the year, he has been looked to as a leader of this team on and off the court."

"I think Mike Scott has given a great deal to this basketball team," UK coach Eddie Sutton said. "He hasn't gotten the great deal of playing time that everybody thought he would. He has been a real leader on and off the court."

After starting UK's first four games, Scott's amount of playing time diminished as he was relegated to playing behind LeRon Ellis at center. Scott is averaging 2.6 points and 2.4 rebounds in only 11.9 minutes a game.

But Scott will be the first one to tell you that despite the poor record and off-court problems this team has had, it still has been an enjoyable season.

"I've really enjoyed the experience," he said. "When I look back at this team, I will remember all the adversity we have overcome and the closeness this team had."

Scott foresaw this evening's ceremonies the day he transferred to UK, but Ginnan did not see this upon his horizon.

Ginnan transferred to UK after spending only one year at Transylvania University. Ginnan, a 6-8 forward from Beattyville, Ky., became a member of the team this season after a campuswide tryout in during the preseason.

"I really had no intention of making the team when I tried out," Ginnan said. "I just went out there for the fun of it and to say I did it."

Ginnan will now be able to say he started for UK in Rupp Arena as Sutton has decided to start Ginnan on senior night. Ginnan was in a state of shock when Sutton told him.

"When he told me, I said 'Are you sure?' and he said 'yes,'" the walk-on said. "It's beyond my wildest dream. I figured that I would not start because I was a walk-on and only here one season at that."

Ginnan will look back on this season very fondly because playing for the Cats had always been his dream.

"This has been a year where I have seen about all I can," he said. "Who would have thought that I would have gone to Anchorage, Alaska, and Syracuse, N.Y.?"

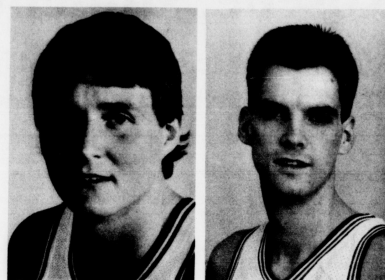
When asked what he will remember most about this year, he said "Coach Sutton. No doubt."

"The truly cares about all of his players," Ginnan said. "I can't say enough about the man and what he has done for me because he didn't have to."

"I figured that our relationship would be strictly on the court, but it has been totally different than I expected," he said. "I'm really proud of the fact that I've got to spend a year with Eddie Sutton on one of his teams."

Two filmmakers play off film classic and hope for a strike with 'Bowling'

When Tom Thurman and Tom Marksbury got together to make their newest film, they set out to combine their talents to create a complete work of art. But don't worry. They didn't forget to put in some good stuff, too. "It's got an ample dose of art, sex and violence," said Marksbury, a graduate student and doctoral candidate. "All tastefully done, of course."

Marksbury is describing "Bowling For Murder," the working title of the film for which he is writing the screenplay. Thurman, a veteran of several short films and documentaries, is the director, editor and producer of the film.

"Bowling For Murder," is, in Thurman's words, "an homage to, and travesty upon," "The Petrified Forest," the classic with Humphrey Bogart, Bette Davis and Leslie Howard.

"It's part comic thriller and part sentimental snuff," Thurman said, who currently works as a part-time UK English instructor. "We want to make you laugh and cry, remember and forget."

"Bowling For Murder" will mark the fifth time the two have worked together, and the most extensive work Marksbury has done in film.

Thurman has done many pieces, and his most recent work, a documentary on the ginseng farmers in the hills of Virginia entitled "Out-Sangin'," is tentatively scheduled to air on KETV in April.

The collaborators, both adept at the art of ironic wit, have high hopes for this film, as they are jumping up into the realm of the full-length feature film. And they

are confident the project will be successful.

"We want people to care about the characters and have fun with some curious forms," Marksbury said.

The film's plot, like that of the "Petrified Forest," is built around a boiling hostage situation, but instead of the traditional settings — such as a bank or a Boeing 727 — the action takes place in a bowling alley.

The entire film, besides its first minute or so, will be shot in the alley — among bowling balls, shoes, and pins.

"Shakespeare called it a unity of time and space," Marksbury said, alluding to the single filming location.

"We just call it cheap," Thurman said.

The filmmakers are using local acting talent, with members of Metropolitan Blues All-Stars, a local rhythm and blues band, and personnel from the UK English department.

"We're only using one professional actor," Thurman said. "Despite that, we'll use him anyway."

The three major roles will be

played by Frank Schaap (Humphrey Bogart's character), Leslie Beatty (Bette Davis) and Roger Register (Leslie Howard). University creative writing professor and novelist Ed McClanahan also will make a special appearance.

"Meryl Streep was going to be in it, until she found out she was to be shot in the head after 45 seconds," Thurman said. "We're now trying to get Buddy Hackett to replace her."

Thurman and Marksbury are aspiring higher than just making a quality film; they want to give their film a genuine low-budget texture, what Thurman calls the "look."

"We promise it will look like an actual low-budget film," Marksbury said.

Thurman and Marksbury are currently shooting "Bowling For Murder" and have hopes of completing the film sometime in April. Upon completion, the film will premiere on campus at Worsham Theatre.

The film is privately financed, and the makers are currently accepting donations.

Chandler should resign from BOT after racial remark

Last spring, A.B. "Happy" Chandler told the citizens of Kentucky he was truly sorry for a "regrettable" racial slur he uttered at an Investments Committee meeting of the UK Board of Trustees.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson, Chandler said, took him to the "woodshed" for speaking without thinking first. Those who were upset with Chandler's comment eventually accepted his apology and all was well again.

But with another racial comment Chandler made to a Kernel reporter during a telephone interview Saturday, the former governor once again demonstrated that he does not belong on UK's Board of Trustees.

Chandler has the right to think whatever he wants, but as one of the state's more visible citizens, what he says in public is often viewed by the rest of the nation as what Kentuckians think as a whole.

Chandler probably is not a racist. His many accomplishments during his career in public service included helping to integrate major-league baseball and Kentucky's school system.

But what makes Chandler's remark so offensive is that he does not understand that racial epithets are not acceptable in 1989 America.

As a voting member of UK's Board of Trustees, Chandler has a very important role in shaping the future of this institution and the state.

And because this University needs progressive and innovative leadership, attitudes such as Chandler's cannot be tolerated.

Gov. Wilkinson made a mistake when he reappointed Chandler in January 1988 as a voting member of the board.

Gov. Wilkinson made a mistake not asking Chandler to resign during last spring's controversy.

And if Chandler does not see the need to resign from the board over this incident, Wilkinson should remove him.

Chandler is quick to remind us of his unwavering loyalty toward the University, and we do not dispute that.

But the longer he remains on the board and in the media spotlight, the more Chandler distracts from UK President David Roselle's efforts to make UK a first-rate research institution. If Chandler wants to continue to help UK, as he says he does, the greatest service he can do right now is to resign from the Board of Trustees.

Socially Concerned Students confused over its priorities

In Monty Python's "The Life of Brian," the People's Judean Front — not to be confused with the Judean People's Front or the People's Front of Judea — spends a good deal of time arguing over whether it should fight for a man's right to want to have a baby.

Meanwhile, as their fellow man is being beaten and killed by the treacherous Romans, the group wastes its time discussing meaningless issues they can do little to alter.

At tonight's meeting of the Student Government Association's Senate, a resolution is on the agenda that is reminiscent of that scene.

Five UK student groups want SGA to accept a resolution calling for the United States to recognize a Palestinian state.

The leader of the coalition is the Socially Concerned Students.

To be sure, the situation in the Middle East should be one of the United States' top foreign policy priorities, but it is such a complex and intricate issue that it should be left to the likes of Sec. of State Baker and other Washington experts who are better equipped to deal with the issue.

Geoffrey Young, a member of Socially Concerned Students, said at a press conference Monday that it was the "grass roots" pressure that has kept the United States from invading Central America and he hopes that same pressure



can forge a peace agreement in the Middle East.

Aside from the fact that the United States' foreign policy is not to invade other countries unless Americans are in danger, Young and his comrades should realize that the only "grass roots" pressure that is going to affect the outcome in the Middle East are those directly involved with the issue.

from the groups at Monday's press conference came from Chris Bush, one of Socially Concerned Students more self-proclaimed socially conscious members.

"We believe that our student government should take stands on foreign policies because they are the voice of students, and while students are important, things that go on in the world affect all of us, and the student voice should be heard."

Bush was quoted as saying:

"And then after peace breaks out in the Middle East, SGA should consider tobacco subsidies, how to deal with the deficit and what the U.S. policy in the Pacific should be."

Socially Concerned Students, although it means well, often be-

at times, the group is afflicted with the dangerous tendency to romanticize the late 1960s and early 1970s when student protests, burning the American flag and tearing down anything that resembled the evil establishment was in vogue.

While Socially Concerned Students want to help students, many of their actions do more to hurt those they intend to help.

Last school year, Socially Concerned Students made an effort to raise the minimum wages of student employees of the University. The proposal was so poorly thought out, that it was laughed off the desks of UK's administration.

If Socially Concerned Students want some respect from the campus and administration, then it must learn the art of compromise and quiet diplomacy.

With all their emotion and excitement, they immediately back their adversary into a corner with no other option but to resist their demands.

Socially Concerned Students needs to understand that behind the scenes efforts, not sensationalism, and more serious proposals are the ways to accomplish anything at this University.

WRFL deserves apology from SGA

First, in an effort to be fair, I'll state my background and biases. I was in at the beginning of WRFL, or "the group in college radio" as it was known.

I recently read, with disgust, in the Kernel that SGA is considering a resolution to set up a student advisory board for the station. The author's reasoning, as well as I can determine, is that WRFL does not meet the listening needs of the UK student body. That is, "it could be more responsive to the musical desires of the students with an advisory board."

On the surface, an advisory board sounds like an excellent idea. Hopefully, I will persuade the reader that this is not the case.

In the Feb. 22 Kernel article, SGA Senator Saj Rizvi said, "WRFL is only liked by 5 percent of the students." Before Mr. Rizvi spouts such statistics, I would like to see a little proof.

Considering that an official survey would cost several thousand dollars, and the fact that Rizvi quoted no sources in the Kernel or at the SGA meeting, I would venture to say he has none — very irresponsible of an elected official.

I don't pretend to believe that a majority of UK students tune in to WRFL on a daily basis. However, this fact should not be the basis for a change in format. And quite simply, the call for an advisory board implies just that.

If WRFL became a WKQQ-sound-alike, it still could not defeat 98.1 FM in the ratings. Small, non-profit stations with limited broadcast range and amateur DJs cannot compete with stations of

WKQQ's size and budget. Therefore, if Saj thinks the board would increase WRFL's audience, he is mistaken.

Rizvi's argument for the board is based on the fact that WRFL is partially supported by students, with each student paying \$1 of his activity fee to WRFL's operating budget. This implies that all students should like what they pay for.

However, simply because WRFL is supported by students, doesn't mean students will like it. This argument, that students should enjoy, participate in or even approve of hi campus events they help pay for is illogical.

To prove it, I simply ask senators to look at the yearly turnout at the Little Kentucky Derby, the Worsham Theatre or any other event sponsored by the Student Activity Board, all using student activity fees.

I also ask them to consider the voter turnout in SGA elections or the number of students who get their \$100 worth of treatment at Student Health.

I guarantee you that Mr. Rizvi's mythical "5 percent" who enjoy WRFL would compare favorably with the numbers who attend these events and services they pay for.

The station's license from the FCC defines it as an alternative format, non-commercial station. To base the programming on Top 40 would not only be illogical, but it would also be against the spirit of WRFL's license.

However, this does not mean that WRFL bans Top 40. Not only are groups such as the Bangles, Madonna, Tracy Chapman, Roy Orbison and the Beatles played on a regular basis, there also exist a possibility for Top 40 block programming.

Go to the music director with a plan, and together we can make a Top 40 show you would like to DJ. If you pass the training, I think you'll be pleased with the reception you receive.

WRFL's primary programming is college rock. Today, this music is labeled alternative. Five years from now, it will be mainstream rock 'n' roll. An argument for a board (and a format change) may be that no one has ever heard of Scruffy the Cat, Sonic Youth, Jane's Addiction, Throwing Muses, Soul Asylum, or Roy Orbison.

These are nobodies, right? So were REM, U2, Echo and the Bunnymen, Run-DMC, the Georgia Satellites, and INXS a few years ago, when the only stations they could get airplay on were alternative stations exactly like WRFL.

So go ahead, put a clamp on college radio at UK, you'll only cause the stagnation of rock radio.

Earlier, I mentioned several SAB and SGA activities with student turnouts (to be polite) that were modest, at best. If I were to complain to Saj Rizvi, or any other

SGA or SAB official, and tell them that their events do not represent student wishes, I wonder what they would say?

If I told them I wanted to create a board to oversee their administration of student funds, would the approval? I would probably get an answer something like this: Boards like that already exist, and the best way to influence decisions is to get involved.

This would be an excellent answer, one which I would take to heart. I hope they (and the entire student body) will respond in kind. A media board already exists to oversee the station, so a second would be superfluous. More importantly, the best way to influence WRFL's programming is to become a DJ.

Only 40 of the more than 1,300 college stations in the United States are chosen to report to Gavin. Earlier this year, WRFL representatives were chosen to give an address at the College Music Journal convention in New York, one of the major radio conventions of the year.

Rizvi's actions are totally unwarranted, and, in light of the station's accomplishments, a slap in the face to its management. Not only should Rizvi withdraw his resolution, he should apologize to the management of WRFL.

Humanities courses helps make a well-balanced student

humanities, he said, are necessary "to teach a little humility, to understand the responsible use of power and knowledge."

Berry said too much science with too little humanities creates the "American over-educated yahoo," who doesn't learn the language or culture of other countries, and uses his or her knowledge arrogantly. Throughout the world, then, society makes "technological" advances that too often result in catastrophes, he said, citing Chernobyl, Love Canal, and the destruction of rain forests and the ozone layer.

"What the humanities teach you is that responsibility is an issue," Berry said. "People who are going to be thought of as educated ought to be required to learn at least one foreign language."

"They ought to be familiar with their own history and culture, and know something about the history and culture of other countries, and something of the history of thought, and they should know the classics of their own language."

"The proper role of education is to help people to be human beings in the best sense," he said. "So I think people in the sciences should be required to take more humanities and vice versa."

The University Studies program, the new set of course requirements that was implemented with this year's freshman class, has that goal in mind, said Lou Swift, director of the University Studies. Swift, who helped design the program, said it

was implemented in response to a campuswide feeling that all students need an education encompassing many different areas, from the sciences to the social sciences to the humanities.

He said the requirements stress students' understanding of their cultural heritage, cross-cultural dimensions, basic science concepts, their writing and speaking skills, and, in general, their appreciation of the importance of a well-rounded education.

"On the surface (science and humanities) look unrelated, but we know that's not true," Swift said. "We did strike a balance."

Swift said UK, as both a land grant institution and a state university, has to serve the dual role of offering education in technological areas and research as well as in liberal studies.

"I'm aware of the tension, but I'm aware of how important it is for the two things to be together," he said.

Swift said there has been a resurgence of interest in the humanities among educators not in that field.

"They're concerned about the kinds of integration their students are receiving," he said. "They want to be able to think, to imagine, to create."

As part of the University Studies, students in the engineering school are required to take at least one semester of humanities courses, said Ray Bowen, dean of the engineering school.

While he said he's pleased that the United States is recognizing its deficiency in the science and tech-

nological areas, he is equally pleased with the emphasis on the humanities, too.

"There's all sorts of evidence that the math and science training is important," he said. "But everyone seems convinced the study of the humanities is important also. The country is wise to emphasize (math and science) more, but at this University it's not being done at the expense of the humanities."

In fact, classes and programs at UK are geared toward both students and faculty to keep alive the interest in the humanities. Students in the UK honors program, for example, take four semesters of colloquia dealing with the progression of Western civilization and ideas.

Ray Betts, a history professor and director of the honors program, said the humanities act as a means "for understanding and enjoying life more."

"The importance of education is to enhance self-realization and civic spirit," he said. "The primary purpose is the betterment of the individual."

Betts said the sciences and humanities shouldn't be thought of in competition with each other, as a horse race, but more as working together, as with a stagecoach.

"All of these expressions of concern are less directed to special disciplines than to a general need for an improved educational system," he said. "The virtue of a well-rounded education is to enable the student to... make combinations meaningful," for example by turning to literature as a way to understand ethics in medicine.

With the rapidity of change in a highly technological society, there too often is "an incredible sense of obsolescence," Betts said. However, "Ideas are never obsolete."

Also associated with the honors program is the Gaines Center for the Humanities, which began five years ago to stimulate studies and activities. Among its programs are the Gaines Fellowships, awarded each year to 10 students who then take special multidisciplinary seminars; scholarships for UK employees to take humanities

courses; and lectures by scholars in the humanities.

In addition, the Faculty Forum, sponsored by the College of Arts and Sciences, presents lectures by various faculty members throughout the year about their particular areas of interest or research.

The M. I. King Library sponsors the Gallery Series on Friday afternoons, which gives people across campus an opportunity to give or listen to presentations ranging from special research projects to musical performances.

But students seldom attend these types of activities, MacAdam said. He said the University can do only so much, and it's finally up to individual students to broaden their interests on their own initiative, for example by going to concerts or lectures and doing outside reading.

Part of the problem, several faculty members said, is that many students feel pressured to specialize in a particular subject and immediately focus their attention on a set career. They then don't explore as much as they should.

"I think there's a little more emphasis on job training than there used to be," Berry said. "The career track is the death of education. It's an outrage. These people get stuck in this rut, having their work, looking forward to retirement and death."

"The humanities at least raise the questions. People change their minds. So another definition of a

well-rounded education is it gives them the power to change and the power to choose."

Joseph Engelberg, a physiology professor, is trying to alleviate that situation somewhat by forming courses and seminars concerning the integration of knowledge. He emphasizes an understanding of the world as a whole instead of as unrelated fragments.

"We've had a decline in producing American scientists and mathematicians, and that's a serious matter," he said. "But the humanities are not integrative either. All of those fields have become areas of specialization."

"I just want to see whether an integrative component can be developed. Until we try it, we can't really know."

Swift acknowledged the conflict many students may have, that "you've got to make a living, but at the same time you have to grow as an individual."

Glady Pramik, an adviser for undeclared majors, said she encourages students interested in the humanities to pursue them.

"I think the misperception is that you can't do anything with these

majors," she said, when actually they're quite useful. "I think (the University) is doing a good job emphasizing both (the sciences and the humanities). I would never say one against the other."

"It's like we've used him and now we're going to throw him away," he said. "He's a pretty decent fellow. There's no one in the game better than Sutton."
