So to combat buses with broken wheelchair lifts, which were the subject of numerous complaints by students who poured into the Student Government Association office all this week, one disabled student will act as a spy to report to problems that arise for disabled passengers on Cats buses.

Although the person has not been hired yet, he or she will most likely be a regular passenger, said Jake Karnes, director of the Disability Resource Center.

Nicholasville Road bus will notice a small change in the time schedule. This is the most frequently used UK route, and although the delays at the beginning of the year might seem long, the routes should clear up as the semester progresses, said LexTran Operations Manager Ron McElhose.

# **UK can't find** rhythm with new offense

In volleyball, as in natural science, certain laws hold

In volleyball, as in natural science, certain laws note true.

Nature holds that length multiplied by width equals height. On the court, however, offense without passing equals futility.

The UK volleyball team held it's annual Blue-White scrimmage Monday, unveiling its new "low" offense designed to speed the attacking tempo. Though the new system lived up to its billing as a faster attack, the team's passing unintentionally sped up as well — forcing the team's setters to scramble all night.

"We were too aggressive on passing and defense and it didn't give (the setters) an opportunity to get in the flow of the offense," head coach Fran Flory said. Ideally, Flory added, passes to the setters should be about as high at the net antennae. "Instead, the top of the net is what we got tonight. We have to improve on that," she said.

That over-zealousness resulted in passes to the setters which were lower than intended — giving the setup layers less time to pick their sets and a less efficient overall attack.

"We're good passers, but we're so excited about this low offense that we were passing so low at the (scripmange)," outside hitter Katie Eiserman explained. We need to get a temp going that we can all work with and have the same consistent pass for our

A consistent and patient tempo makes life better for the setters who perhaps value time more than anyone on the court. Additional time allows the setters to analyze the defensive set and make more thoughful decisions about where to direct the attack.

Sophomore setter Terri Crabb, who skippered a similar style of offense before coming to Lexington last season, believes the team's passing will improve before Friday night's season opener against Morehead State. She added that better passing will allow her to direct a more dynamic attack.

"It gives me a chance to send people different ways," Crabb said. "Lower passes make it harder to get underneath them, but it's good to see at least we're coming out and running it low and quick instead of the way we used to run.

### **Cats name new** assistant coach

Michelle Anderson, a five-time All-American while at Georgia, has been named the new assistant women's tennis coach at UK. Head coach Mark Guilbeau coached Anderson for three years while an assistant at Georgia. Anderson helped lead Georgia to the NCAA team championship in 1994, the same year she won the ROLEX National Indoor Doubles title with partner Angela Lettiere.

"We are very fortunate to have Michelle on our staff," Guilbeau said. "From a tennis perspective, she brings a tremendous amount of experience and knowledge to our program. Most importantly, she is a great person — very unselfish and extremely enjoyable to be with."

Anderson was named the 1997 Southeastern Conference Player of the Year, SEC Tournament MVP and won the 1997 SEC Sportsmanship Award, making her the first player to ever win all three honors in the same season. She also was named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

A four-time All-SEC selection, Anderson was the only four-time

doubles All-American in school history and was the 1997 NCAA Doubles Runner-up. She was named as ITA Doubles Player of the Month in March of 1996 and finished 1994 as a member of the top-ranked collegiate doubles team in the nation.

In addition, Anderson helped lead Georgia to the USTA/ITA National Indoor Team Titles in 1994 and 1995. She also was the top-ranked junior player in the world in April of 1990.

"As a player, Michelle excelled in ever area — talent, determination, mental toughness," Guilbeau said. "These characteristics will make her a vey effective teacher and coach."

stopped beforehand all had broken lifts, said social work junior Joe Schuler, SGA executive director of scademic affairs.

The UK Parking and Transportation Services department has had to send the lifts off for repair more than once, at a cost of about \$500 \, \text{cach}.

"We have spent a fortune," said Don Thornton, director of the department. "They do not make a Lexus wheelchair lift. It's a problem trying to keep those things operational."

The lifts on the 15-passenger buses have caused the most trouble, because they're placed underneath the bus and extend out, he said. The combination of the weight of the chair, the person and the lift pose a triple threat to a helpful device.

Truth: Only full-time employees made the nearly \$20 an hour rate. That would be only 30 percent of the 185,000 workers. The other 70 percent start out at \$8 to \$9 an hour. That was the same starting wage part-timers UPS workers made in 1982, when most of you were 5 years old and watching "Sesame Street." Taking into account 15 years of inflation, that \$8 to \$8 expressed in 1982 dollars would be about minimum wage today.

Truth: Five of every six UPS jobs created in the last five years are part-time. UPS was once the Mecca for good-paying part-time college jobs. While some of you may have washed trucks or sorted packages over the summer, permanent workers simply cannot raise a family on \$8 an hour. At 25 hours a week, part-time worker earns a mere \$10,000.

Truth: The members voted by a \$9 percent margin to strike if there was no contract by July 15. 
