



In celebration of Pride Month, the Bluegrass Chapter of

the KFA and the Rainbow League are jointly sponsoring the Sixth Annual Rainbow City Bowling Competition. The tournament will be held on Saturday, June 12, at Collins Southland Lanes, 205 Southland Drive, Lexington. The entry fee is \$15 per person. Registration will begin at 1pm with bowling at 2pm. Bowling should be completed by 4pm.

This is a benefit fundraiser for the Bluegrass Chapter and it is our hope that a number of organizations will sponsor a team of four bowlers. Last year we had a very positive response and we hope to do even better this year. With everything that is going on this year, we better!!

There are FIVE ways you or your team can win! Each bowler who brings in a minimum of \$50 in pledges will bowl for free. The name of the winning team and its sponsor will be added to the traveling trophy. The organization that brings in the most sponsorship money will receive a prize. A bowler can win a special prize by getting a strike when the colored pin is in the head pin position. In addition, we will be offering a fifty \ fifty raffle. So, if your bowling is not quite up to par, you still have a chance to win some money.

In a No-tap Monte Carlo event, knocking down nine pins (as opposed to ten) is scored as a strike. Periodically a colored pin will appear in the head pin position. If you bowl a true strike (not a no-tap) you will win a prize. An established average is NOT required and NO experience in bowling is necessary. If you are not a member of a team, we will assign you to a team. All you need to do is bring yourself and have a good time bowling. ners in love and political struggle for over fifty years. *No Secret Anymore* is a delightful way to meet these legendary lesbians, known as the founders of the modern lesbian civil rights movement. This documentary will be shown at the UK Young Library Theater on Sunday, June 13 at 1 pm.

In 1955, Martin and Lyon courageously launched the Daughters of Bilitis, the first public organization for lesbians in America. This documentary includes incisive interviews, rare archival images and warmhearted humor. The film has won numerous awards internationally. The film maker, JEB, is well known as a lesbian-photographer and archivist. She visited Lexington twenty years ago and presented a slide show of her photographs.

Gay Straight Alliance for Youth



Pride Center Library Dream Becomes Reality

On June 2nd the Pride Center Library will celebrate its third anniversary. When we opened in 2001 we were so pleased to be able to say that we had over 300 books, videos, and audio recordings, all of which were donated by individuals in the community and all of which were available to anyone with a library card.

We could not have imagined that in three short years the collection would have grown to nearly 2,000 items, including over 700 works of fiction, 125 videos and DVDs, and 75 sound recordings. We could not have imagined a collection that covered religion, travel, history, culture, politics, biography, relationships, sex, parenting, family, health, education, humor, literature, poetry, music, art, and so much more.

We are sincerely grateful to all those who made this library a reality. To all the volunteers that helped get the library off the ground and those that continue to keep it going. To the GLSO for supporting this project by giving it a home that made it available to everyone. To the hundreds of individuals who donated materials, supplies and even shelving. This is truly a community library because our community made it happen.

ERNESTO SCORSONE RECEIVES LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The Imperial Court of Kentucky has bestowed its highest award, the James F. Herndon Lifetime Achievement Award, on state senator Ernesto Scorsone. Kentucky's first and only openly gay legislator will receive the award at Coronation 23 on Sunday, June 6 at the Radisson Plaza Hotel Ballroom in Lexington.

Senator Scorsone has represented Central Kentucky's 13th Senate District since 1996. Previously he was a State Representative from 1985 to 1996. A Lexington native, Scorsone attended the University of Kentucky receiving a BA in 1973 and a law degree in 1976. His contributions to the LGBT community span over two decades.

From 1986 through 1992 Scorsone led the legal battle to overturn Kentucky's sodomy statute in Commonwealth v. Wasson and in 1994 led the successful fight against a constitutional amendment to re-instate the sodomy law. He also served as counsel in the Commonwealth v. Ireland case that guarantees domestic violence protection to same-sex couples.

In legislative action, in 1998 Scorsone successfully moved to amend Kentucky's penal code to include, for the first time, a hate crime provision based on sexual orientation. In 2002 he expanded the hate crimes provision that applies to sexual orientation. In 2003 he successfully petitioned and helped draft the Executive order protecting LGBT state employees from job discrimination. He worked against and voted against DOMA, the Defense of Marriage Act, in 1998 and the anti-gay constitutional amendment in 2004.



Scorsone organized Lexington's first AIDS walk for AIDS Volunteers Lexington(AVOL), in 1993 and has been a co-sponsor of the event every year since. He has raised funds for the Kentucky Fairness Alliance and, in 2001, helped organize the campaign in Lexington that successfully pushed for a citywide fairness ordinance.

Lexington's Gay & Lesbian Services Organization (GLSO), and the HIV/AIDS Legal Project are among the many other organizations Scorsone has assisted. Last year Scorsone was the recipient of the Wasson Award voted on by all of the member organizations of the GLSO.

Other organizations have recognized Scorsone including the Kentucky Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Psychiatric Association, the Pritchard Committee, the American Cancer Society, and many others. He has twice been named "One of Ten Best Legislators."

The James F. Herndon award is named for James (Sweet Evening Breeze) Herndon and is given only by unanimous consent of the Board of Directors of the Imperial Court of Kentucky. Past recipients include community activist Donnie (EV) Royse, artist Robert Morgan and Moveable Feast Lexington founder Michael Thompson.

Soulforce protests Baptists

Last year at the Southern Baptist Convention, Baptist leaders announced plans to "liberate" homosexuals by converting them to heterosexuals. Richard Land, president of the Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission said, "Homosexuals can find freedom from this sinful, destructive lifestyle. They can be redeemed. "

Over seventy Soulforce volunteers stood protest outside this convention in 110 degree heat to counter these untruths. They passed out literature comparing Southern Baptist anti-gay teachings with those of Kansas pastor Fred Phelps. They shared their deep concerns about Baptist plans to convert GLBT people. They stated that GLBT people are part of the "creative-given" and that God loves us exactly as we are.

The most powerful event came the night of June 17th. In the middle of GLBT pride month, all the Soulforce volunteers formed a line and used glow-sticks to create a redorange-yellow-green-blue-purple banner of light. When the convention let out, thousands of Southern Baptists were funneled

directly to where they were standing. The sight of GLBT people and our allies standing there in that moment moved our police liaison, a black woman named Pat, to tears.

This year Jamie McDaniel is cochair of the Southern Baptist Denomination Team and has planned protests for the SBC in Indianappolis June13 - 16. (see page 14). Watch the news to see if Soulforce and their work is covered.

Last year President Bush addressed the Baptist Conferance by videotape. He called the Southern Baptists "faithful servants" and said "You and I share many common values. We believe in fostering a culture of life and that marriage and family are sacred institutions." Bush is our first Born Again President. Talk to your friends about voting!


