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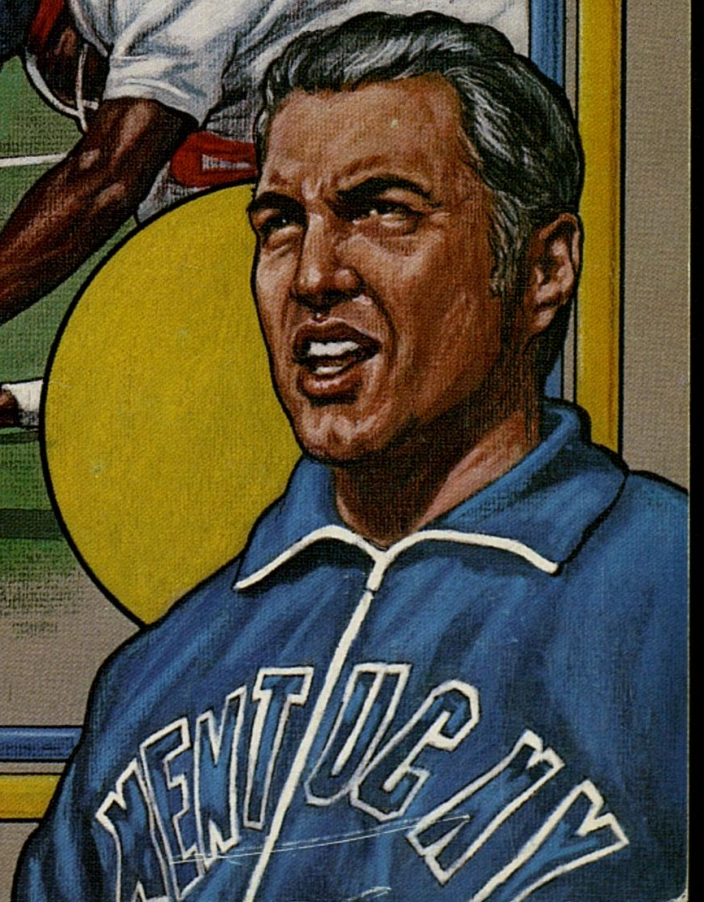

TO THE PRESS-RADIO-TV

Here is your copy of the 1975 Kentucky Wildcats' Football Facts Book which we sincerely hope will aid you in the process of covering U. of K. football during the forthcoming season. If you desire additional information or have any questions not answered herein, please feel free to contact the Sports Information Office, (606) 257-3838.

WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information Window in Memorial Coliseum, except on game days, when they will be moved to the ticket window at Commonwealth Stadium.

COMPS—No individual game allotment.

TELECOPIERS—Two Telecopier niches, each equipped with dorm-type telephones which take only collect or credit card calls, are provided in the press box for use of out-of-town writers. A fee of \$10 will be assessed for use of a telephone. A telephone telecopier and operator will be provided for a fee of \$20. Telephone jacks are available along press row for persons wishing to order their own telephone installation; however, it is less expensive to use the aforementioned telephones. Please notify Sports Information in advance of your needs.

PRESS BOX—Limited to working personnel. Kentucky Sports Information will service play-by-play quarterly, half-time and final statistics, scoring summary, lineups and coaches' comments. Lunch is available in Commonwealth Stadium Press Box upon presentation of luncheon ticket.

RADIO—Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the UK Network. One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through the UK Director of Broadcasting, Mr. Pete Manchikes (257-2655). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES—Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used. An agreement to this effect must be executed before permission will be granted. Application should be made to the UK Director of Broadcasting and forms may be signed for the entire season. On request, the University Film Lab will provide TV stations with a 100 to 200-foot newsclip of game highlights (processed 16 mm color film) at actual cost. Film can be shipped on Sunday following game.

IT WAS A GOOD YEAR

The University of Kentucky closed the 1974 football season with its first winning slate in nine years and put several new records on the books in the process.

With senior quarterback Mike Fanuzzi, and juniors Sonny Collins and Steve Campassi combining for a total of 2,504 yards, the Wildcats amassed 3,124 yards rushing.

That beat the old record of 2,518 set by the 1973 team and set a per game record of 284.0 yards compared to 228.2 in 1973.

Collins, who missed the final two games after receiving a broken leg in the second quarter of the Vanderbilt game, led the team with 970 yards in 177 carries and the Southeastern Conference with 107.8 yards per game, although Mississippi State's Walter Packer passed him up in total yardage.

Collins set a new career mark for rushing attempts (529 against Rodger Bird's 397 from 1963-65) and now has a total of 4,351 career rushing yards, which far surpasses the old record of 2,101 set by Shipwreck Kelly (1929-30-31).

Fanuzzi gained 909 yards in 179 carries while Campassi gained 625 yards in 128 carries. Sophomore Joe Dipre, seeing action in nine games, carried 53 times for 242 yards and junior Bill Bartos carried 48 times for 184 yards.

The team's total of 632 rushing plays beat the record of 592 set by the 1973 Wildcats and the 4.9 average per rush beat the 4.7 set by the 1950 squad.

The 1974 Wildcats also made 143 first downs rushing, beating the record of 136 set in 1952, and scored 31 touchdowns rushing, one more than the record of 30 set in 1973.

Attendance for six home games in Commonwealth Stadium totaled 328,785, an average of 54,797 per game. The previous highs were 250,068 at five games in 1973, an average of 50,136. A single game high of 56,535 was registered at the LSU game, beating 53,224 set at the Tennessee game in 1973.

Other high attendances last year were 56,449 at the Vanderbilt game and 56,191 at the Indiana game.

John Pierce kicked two 48-yard field goals to beat the record of 46 set in 1970 by Bob Jones and tied in 1973 by Ron Steele and then beat his own record with a 52-yarder against Florida.

Pierce also had three field goals against Vanderbilt to tie a school record set in 1970 by Jones, who coached Pierce at Harrison County High School.

The Wildcats matched their own 25-year-old record and national record—several other teams also share the record—when Greg Woods, Tony Gray and Mike Siganos each returned an interception for a touchdown against Tulane.

En route to their first winning season since the 1965 team finished 6-4, the Wildcats defeated LSU for the first time since 1961, Florida for the first time since 1956 and Indiana for the first time since 1919.

COMMONWEALTH STADIUM

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road. Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972 and construction began a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium.

Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July 1973 and this was replaced with bermuda in 1974. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles—Stoll Field and McLean Stadium—that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University. Soon after the first sections of the concrete stadium on Euclid Avenue were completed Sept. 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville Oct. 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium Nov. 1, 1924.

During three years as a Wildcat, Sonny has put such new records on the UK book as most career yards rushing and yards gained, along with various season records. Fully recovered from the leg injury, he expects to change a few more Wildcat records before he completes his eligibility this fall.

A three time All-American and team captain in both football and track at Madisonville High, Sonny came to UK as one of the most heralded freshman backs in Wildcat history. SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats hold a 7-3-2 edge in a series which began Oct. 30, 1926 with a 13-13 tie on old Stoll Field. Led by John (Shipwreck) Kelly, Kentucky won 20-6 the following year and did not play Tech again until five years later when the Gobblers won, 7-0 in Blacksburg. The series was resumed in the war years of 1941 and 1942, with U. K. winning, 37-14, at Louisville, and then settling for a 21-21 tie at Roanoke. After a 21-year intermission the series resumed with UK winning, 33-14, at Lexington. Coach Jerry Claiborne, a UK alumnus, brought his team back to Lexington three years later and beat the Wildcats of his old teammate and friend Charlie Bradshaw, 7-0. The Gobblers won, 24-21, the following year in Lexington to tie the series. Kentucky went ahead with a 7-6 victory at Blacksburg in 1969, won 33-27 in Lexington in 1971, 31-26 in Lexington in 1973 and 38-7 last year.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 15, 1974 (Blacksburg) UK 38, VPI 7—UK had just evened the count at 7-7 in Lane Stadium when Bruce Arians hit Ricky Scales for a 67-yard pass play to the Wildcat two. Four plays later, the ball was inches away from the UK goal line and a VPI

lead. That successful goal line stand turned the tide and, with Mike Fanuzzi operating the veer, the Wildcats racked up 441 yards in an impressive 38-7 victory in the opening game for both teams. The 'Cats had been stunned when the Gobblers capitalized on a Wildcat fumble and tallied the first TD with 6:40 left in the initial quarter. Minutes later, Sonny Collins ripped off a 33-yarder to set up the equalizer. UK then scored three TD's in the third quarter and that was the ball game.

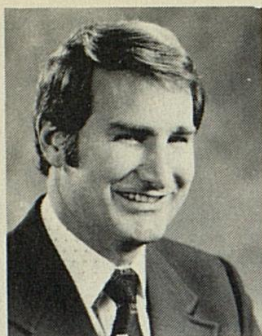
1975 OUTLOOK: With the heart of a wishbone attack that gained 266 yards per game returning, the Gobblers expect to be even more productive this fall. Senior halfback Phil Rogers, who ran for 663 yards, along with seven TDs last year, heads the running back corps that also includes George Heath at the other halfback. Junior letterman Michael Barnes takes over at QB. Tight end Dick Kevin is a fine receiver and blocker. The offensive line returns some fine players, but the defensive line lost four regulars. Senior Doug Thacker and sophomore Rich Razzano will again head a strong linebacking corps. Three regulars return in the secondary.

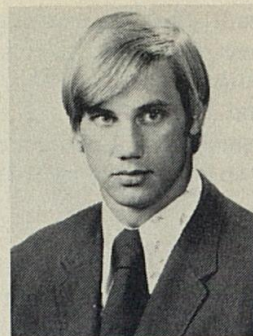

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcat-Terrapin battles began with a 6-6 deadlock in a 1931 match at College Park. The Terrapins were coming off an undefeated season and were defending national champion (losing to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl) when they came to Lexington to return the game in 1954. Although All-America quarterback Bernie Faloney was gone, they still had Dick Bielski, a battering ram fullback, and co-captain John Irvine, a brilliant linebacker. Maryland won, 20-0, to spoil Blanton Collier's debut as UK coach. Kentucky won two years later at College Park to even the series 1-1-1.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 3, 1956 (College Park), UK 14, UM 0—Little Ivan Curnutte scored from the nine-yard line and Dick Mitchell returned a punt 78 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter as the Wildcats beat the Terrapins on a cold, rainy day before 20,000 hardy souls at College Park. Kentucky outgained Maryland, 160-118 on the ground, but the Terrapins had the edge in passing, with six completions in 18 attempts for 71 yards while the Cats failed to connect on three tries. Jack Gallagher intercepted a Terrapin pass. Curnutte punted seven times for 257 yards while three Maryland punters punted the same number of times for 261 yards in a bruising battle.

1975 OUTLOOK: Maryland lost 16 starters and both kicking specialists from the 1974 team that recorded an 8-3 record and landed a berth in the Liberty Bowl. However, 31 lettermen are back, and lettermen are expected to start at every position with the exception of the kicking specialists and only two are sophomores. While the defense should once again be strong the secondary is untested and the defensive unit does not have a dominant figure such as Randy White. Jim Brechbiel, the defensive left halfback, is a "Big Play" athlete and the leader in the secondary that will have two new starters joining him. Brechbiel in two years of starting duty (he took over Midway his sophomore year) has intercepted nine passes, returned them for 106 yards and a touchdown, blocked two punts through the end zone for safeties, blocked three field goal attempts and an extra point attempt. A sprinter on the track team, he has excellent speed and quickness and has gained experience playing behind Louis Carter. He joined the varsity midway through his freshman year and has gained 938 yards on 202 carries (including 5 for 41 in 1973 Peach Bowl Game) for an average of 4.6 yards per carry. He has also caught 13 passes for 246 yards.

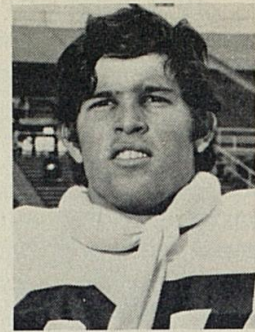

1975 OUTLOOK: Penn State has not had a losing record in football since 1938. The job of upholding that tradition against possibly the toughest schedule Penn State has ever played is the challenge that faces the 1975 team. Paterno has 25 lettermen returning from last year's 10-2 Cotton Bowl champions, but the Lions have some work ahead of them. The main losses are fullback Tom Donchez, who led the team in scoring and tied for the team lead in receiving in addition to being the top rusher; quarterback Tom Shuman, a rifle-armed passer who set a school record for touchdown passes; All-American defensive tackle Mike Hartenstine; defensive end Greg Murphy, one of the best pass rushers the Lions have ever had; and tight end Dan Natale, a three-year regular. The offensive line looks strong with veterans Tom Rafferty, Brad Benson, Mark Thomas and George Reihner; but Paterno must replace the top four receivers. Defensively, the Lions must rebuild the front line, which was decimated by the loss of Hartenstine and Murphy. Tackle John Quinn and end Dennis Zmudzin are capable returnees.

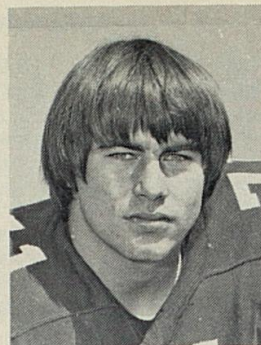

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats and Tigers first got together on the football field in Lexington in 1934—the year after the SEC was organized—and played another game the following year at Montgomery before interrupting their series for nearly two decades. Each held a victory out of the early meetings and the 1954 game, which resumed the rivalry, resulted in a 21-14 decision for UK. Games between the two since have been fraught with frustration. Kentucky walked away with a memorable 14-12 upset victory in 1961 on the Tigers' home ground, where no Auburn eleven had been beaten in 30 straight games. Prior to that victory, UK had been able to score only once in five years on the stingy Plainsmen. Before the series was interrupted in 1971, the Tigers had won five straight games by impressive margins, outscoring the Wildcats 151 to 32. The 31-13 Auburn victory in 1974 gave the Tigers a 15-5-1 edge over the Wildcats.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 12, 1974 (Auburn) UK 13, AU 31—The undefeated and nationally ranked Tigers unleashed what had been a dormant offense up to that time and registered a 31-13 victory in Jordan-Hare Stadium. Meanwhile, the Wildcats, facing the nation's No. 1 defense, gained 294 yards, some 90 yards below their season average. Sonny Collins gained 127 of those yards, which was almost the total offensive Auburn was allowing

before that game. The Tigers made 429 total yards, including scoring drives of 80, 73 and 86 yards. UK turned the ball over five times on three fumbles and two interceptions, but until the Tigers drove 86 yards to score in the fourth quarter and took a 28-13 lead, UK was definitely in the game.

1975 OUTLOOK: The Tigers have an excellent offensive attack built around sprint out quarterback Phil Gargis, the 1974 SEC soph-of-the-year. The three-deep running back corps includes Secdrick McIntyre, who gained 839 yards last season. The offensive line is big and experienced. If Auburn has any problems, they might be on defense. Tackle Rick Telhiard, who led the Tigers in tackles, returns along with end Liston Eddins. Three graduating linebackers from last year include Ken Bernich, an All-America. Senior Carl Hubbard is the only LB holdover. In the secondary, only one letterman returns. Although inexperienced, the replacements are talented. The Tigers are expected to battle Alabama for the SEC championship.

SERIES HISTORY: Kentucky fared fairly well in the first few years of the rivalry which began in 1949, but the Wildcats fell on hard times before finally defeating the Bayou Bengals, 20-13, last year. The 'Cats won 19-0 in the inaugural and 14-0 the following year. After skipping 1951, the series resumed, with LSU winning 34-7 at Lexington. Kentucky gained a tie the following year at Baton Rouge and won 7-6 in Lexington in 1954. The teams swapped victories in 1956 and 1957 and then disaster struck the Wildcats. They fell, 21-0, and 32-7 to the Tigers at Baton Rouge and 9-0 at home before winning, 3-0, at home in 1960. Then came a 13-game losing streak, beginning with a 21-14 LSU victory at Baton Rouge and running through 1973.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 19, 1975 (Lexington) UK 20, LSU 13—UK forced six LSU fumbles and recovered three of them to deny former Wildcat Charlie McClendon his 100th coaching victory. One was recovered by defensive back Ben Thomas to set up a 30-yard touchdown pass from Mike Fanuzzi to Dallas Owens, giving the home team a 13-3 lead just three seconds before halftime in Commonwealth Stadium. The UK defense limited LSU to 183 yards on the ground, forced eight punts and took over on downs to kill LSU's last hope with 1:42 remaining in the game. John Pierce had a 48-yard field goal, breaking the UK

record of 46 set by his Harrison County High School coach Bob Jones vs. Auburn in 1970. Pierce broke his own record later in the season with a 52-yarder against Florida.

1975 OUTLOOK: The big problem in Bayouland is finding a quarterback. Bobby Moreau saw some action in the Utah game last fall when he guided LSU to its last touch-down of the season. The other candidates are sophomores Pat Lyons, Chris Rittiner and John Karaphillis. Split end Richard Romain is the lone returning starting receiver, but the Tigers have good experience at other posts. TB Terry Robiskie and Lora Hinton are the lone experienced returning runners. Eight of the 16 returning lettermen are in the interior line. Defensively, the Bengals should be strong in their front four, but a rebuilding job looms in linebacking, with senior Terry Hill the returning regular. The secondary lost three regulars. There are a lot of "ifs," but one thing is for sure—LSU has no plans to repeat the losing season of last year.

SERIES HISTORY: A 1973 victory in Athens broke a seven-year drought for the Wildcats but they lost to the Bulldogs, 24-20, last year and are now trailing 6-20-2 in a series dating back to 1939. The two schools met almost annually from that time until the series was broken off after the 1949 game and not resumed until 1956 at Athens. During the 22 years that Wally Butts coached the Bulldogs (1938-60), Georgia won nine of 14 games. The Wildcats took the initial game in 1939 and tied the following year, but did not pick up another win until 1947. Despite such Georgia superiority, the games have been interesting as reflected by the fact that Butts' four SEC champions managed an average win margin of only 11 points over the Wildcats.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 26, 1975 (Lexington) UK 20, UG 24—Taking advantage of a UK fumble and two short punts, the Bulldogs scored touchdowns on drives of 26, 41 and 32 yards. Kentucky outgained the visitors 320-258, but the UK passing game was woefully weak. Mike Fanuzzi had one completion in five tries, hitting to Elmore Stephens for a 47-yard touchdown with 5:29 left to narrow the margin to 24-20, the final score. One of UK's touchdowns was set up by a 62-yard return of the second half kickoff by Steve Campassi. Georgia's first TD was set up by a Fanuzzi fumble on the UK 26 early in the

second quarter, the second on a 21-yard punt and the third on a 13-yard punt, both by John Tatterson, who was ranked 22nd in the nation at the time.

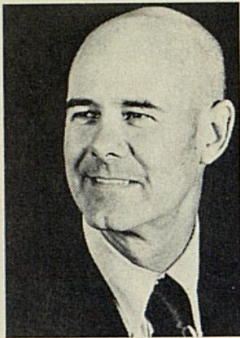

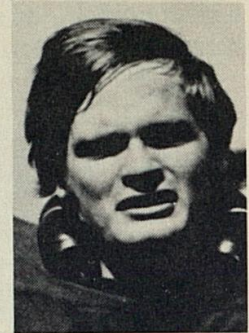

SERIES HISTORY: Kentucky's win over Tulane last year evened at 5-5 dating back to a 10-3 Wildcat victory at Lexington in 1910. The teams skipped 22 years before Tulane returned to Lexington and defeated the Wildcats 6-3. They played the next three years in a row, with Tulane the victor in each. Sixteen years later, Kentucky went to New Orleans and blanked the Greenies 37-0. The Wildcats won in Lexington in 1952. When the series was resumed 20 years later, Tulane won in New Orleans but the Wildcats won the last two in a row.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 2, 1975 (New Orleans) UK 30, TU 7—Tying a national record of three intercepted passes returned for touchdowns, which the 1949 Wildcats set against Mississippi, the 'Cats downed the Greenies, 30-7, in Tulane Stadium. UK scored first on a 66-yard run by Sonny Collins and then hit for 10 points in 19 seconds as John Pierce kicked a 44-yard field goal and Greg Woods returned an errant Tulane pass 45 yards for a TD. Tony Gray and freshman Mike Siganos also returned intercepted passes for touchdowns. Several other teams have tied the record set by the Wildcats in 1949.

1975 OUTLOOK: Experience and youth will have to blend to give Tulane enthusiasm as five starters on both offense and defense have been lost. The returning six lettermen that started on offense and defense have been pushed through spring by youthful replacements that have exceptional talent. Weaknesses are found in the interior offensive line and the defensive secondary. The picture is far from bleak as the interior line is intact except for Charlie Hall. All four defensive ends return that either started or earned letters. Four lettermen return at linebacker and lettermen can man all secondary posts. Lettermen will fill vacancies in the offensive line at center, one tackle position, and both guards. None of the running backs were lost except Steve Foley at quarterback. Lettermen will fill the receiving corps positions. All told 40 lettermen return, 19 were lost, including five on defense and five on offense.

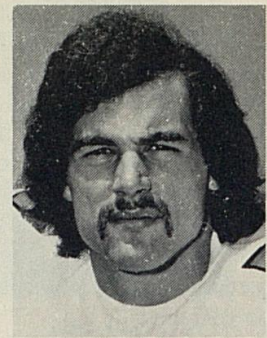

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats and Commodores first met on the gridiron in 1896 at Nashville and the series is one of the South's oldest from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. The record stands solidly in Vandy's favor, 26-17-4, with the Commodores registering 12 shutouts in the first 20 years and U. K. failing to get into the win column until 1939. The Wildcats' 27-0 homecoming rout of Vandy in 1960 ended a three-year trend to close games, but the rivalry got back in the groove in 1961 as U. K. struggled for a 16-3 decision. Kentucky's biggest margin since that time was 34-0 in 1965, Vandy's 42-6 in 1969. Last year's win was UK's fourth in a row after Vandy won the previous two. U. K. had a seven-game string—six victories and a tie—before that.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 9, 1975 (Lexington) UK 38, VU 12—The Wildcats lost Sonny Collins but gained a victory over the Peach Bowl-bound Commodores as ABC-TV cameras recorded the action for a regional audience. Collins received a broken fibula when he scored UK's third touchdown for a 19-0 lead with 5:26 left in the first half. Kentucky completely dominated the game and it was just icing on the cake when freshman Ken Northington burst through the line and went 80 yards for a Wildcat TD late in the game. Northington had two carries in that game and two against Tulane for his only four trips of the season. ABC-TV gave its offensive and defensive awards, respectively, to UK's Fanuzzi and Mike Emanuel.

1975 OUTLOOK: New head coach Fred Pancoast must replace the Commodores' top rusher and three offensive interior line starters who left via the graduation route. Also missing is QB David Lee, but returning is senior Fred Fisher, who started last year before going out with an injury. Flanker Jesse Mathers and TE Barry Burton return as the top two receivers. Lonnie Sadler, who rushed for 610 yards last fall, is expected to take the place of Jamie O'Rourke. Defense should be a Vandy strength. Middle guard Tom Galbierz return with ends Joe Reynolds and Tate Rich, tackle Mickey Jacobs and Dennis Harrison, named outstanding defensive player in the Peach Bowl. The linebacking corps returns intact, as does the starting secondary. The Commodores are expected to be as strong or stronger than in 1974.

SERIES HISTORY: A UK win in Lexington last year put the Wildcats one game ahead of the Gators. Florida tied it at 12-12 in 1973 after Kentucky had stayed ahead since whipping the Gators 52-0 in Lexington in 1917. Through 1955 the Wildcats held a 12-4 advantage, with Florida managing only a pair of victories prior to 1952. An unusual moment occurred in 1955, when Delmar Hughes, Wildcat quarterback sidelined earlier in the game with a broken nose, came off the bench and kicked a 20-yard field goal to give U. K. a 10-7 decision. A year later, Lou Michaels kicked a rain-soaked football 34 yards with two seconds remaining in the first half to put the Wildcats ahead to stay. After a 10-year lapse, the series was resumed in 1967, with Florida winning 14-7, beginning a streak that now stands at eight straight.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 16, 1975 (Lexington) UK 41, UF 24—An 18-yard run by Jimmy Dubose, a 42-yard TD aerial from Don Gaffney to Lee McGriff and a 22-yard field goal by David Posey were answered only by a Mike Fanuzzi score in the first quarter as Florida took a 17-6 lead. With ABC-TV cameras televising the game regionally for an unprecedented back-to-back appearance, the 'Cats clawed back to ensure UK's first winning season since 1965, outscoring the Sugar Bowl-bound Gators, 35-7 over the last 31 minutes. Joe Dipre, subbing for injured Sonny Collins, scored from the one and Fanuzzi's two-point

pass to Elmore Stephens made it 17-14 at halftime. Steve Campassi scored from the one, but Gator freshman Tony Green burst through the middle for a 72-yard score. John Pierce kicked a UK record 52-yard field goal in the third quarter. The Wildcats got 17 unanswered points in the fourth quarter. Fanuzzi was named offensive star and UK's Tom Ranieri defensive star of the game.

1975 OUTLOOK: The entire Gator starting backfield returns, including experienced signal callers Don Gaffney and Jimmy Fisher, along with record-breaking receiver Lee McGriff. Sophomore Tony Green spearheads the running brigade while senior Jimmy DuBose returns at fullback. The offensive interior must be rebuilt, but tackle Mike Williams and guard Gerald Loper are good for starters. Five starters are missing from the fine defensive unit of last year. The Gators will especially miss LBs Glenn Cameron and Ralph Ortega. The secondary is anchored by veteran safeties Wayne Fields and Sivin Cowans. Great things are expected of the Gators.

SERIES HISTORY: Tennessee holds a 42-19-9 edge in the series that is among the oldest football rivalries in the nation, dating back from a 56-0 Wildcat victory Oct. 21, 1893 in Knoxville. Except for three war years (1917-18 and 1943), the two schools have met annually on the gridiron with the result that the Vols hold a distinct edge of 38 wins to Kentucky's 19 and nine ties. The seniors on the 1955 UK squad became the first class in 43 years to graduate with the accomplishment of never playing in a game in which the Vols emerged victorious and they bowed out in a blaze of glory, triumphing 23-0 over the bowl-hungry Vols in the most one-sided Kentucky win since 1935. Tennessee took the 1961 meeting for its first victory in five years, but UK's courageous "Thin Thirty" fought back to win a 12-10 squeaker in 1962. The Vols caught Kentucky in a letdown in 1963 to annex a 19-0 decision, but Kentucky capped a strange 1964 campaign in glorious fashion by capturing a hard-fought 12-7 victory over the equally inconsistent Tennesseans. Without passing star Rick Norton, injured the week before in the Houston game, Kentucky could not cope with the Vols in '65 and dropped a 19-3 decision. Tennessee has won the nine other games since that date, holding on for a two-point victory in 1973 and beating UK, 24-7, for a Liberty Bowl bid last year.

Since 1925, the two schools have stimulated their grid rivalry with a rotating trophy—a battered old beer barrel. Many shenanigans on the part of the rival student bodies have

added to the color of the series. Following the 1953 UK win, disgruntled Tennessee students raided the Kentucky campus and "kegnapped" the barrel—holding it until persuaded to return it by threats of reprisal against their coon dog mascot, Smoky. In 1955, UK students visited the Tennessee campus hiding place of Smoky and "dognapped" him. UT students promptly retaliated by painting up the Kentucky campus in a surprise raid and carting away "Colonel," UK's stuffed wildcat mascot. A trade was engineered at the '55 game. For a couple of years, things were comparatively quiet. Then the stunts erupted again in 1958 as Vol students caught a guard "napping" and slipped away with UK's stuffed Wildcat. Despite promises to return it at halftime of a nationally-televised basketball game, the mascot wasn't given back until nearly four months later. A post-game sidelight to Kentucky's victory in 1959 saw a strange calm shattered by rioting UK students protesting a faculty refusal to reward the win with a traditional pre-Thanksgiving holiday. Up to 5,000 demonstrators and onlookers carried on for about four and one-half hours, marching on the UK president's home and setting a bonfire at a main intersection in downtown Lexington. The famed beer barrel, which had remained in hiding during "Tennessee week" in 1960, came up missing almost four months later under unusual circumstances. Vanderbilt students "kegnapped" the trophy in a surprise attempt to gain support of Vol fans for the Commodores' basketball team which was meeting the Wildcats in Knoxville in a playoff for an NCAA Tournament berth. The stunt backfired, however, as UK won. Embarrassed Vandy students did not return the trophy until several months later. Thirteen years ago, another chapter was added to the keg's history as two UK freshman players forgot to bring the barrel to the game and the Vols left town without claiming it. Kentucky sent the keg on to Knoxville later. Since then, the old beer barrel has been silent.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 23, 1975 (Knoxville) UK 7, UT 24—The game was virtually over at halftime, with UK trailing, 13-0, and minus the services of Mike Fanuzzi, who was knocked senseless with a concussion in the second quarter and never returned to action. UK recovered two fumbles and intercepted a pass after UT moved ahead, 24-0. Cliff Hite, subbing for Fanuzzi, got the 'Cats on the board with a 24-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. UK's only thrust in the first half came on a brilliant 44-yard run by Fanuzzi to put UK, trailing 3-0, on the UT 26. John Pierce's field goal attempt was wide. UT then thundered 80 yards in 16 plays and went on top 10-0 after Stanley Morgan's two-yard run. Ricky Townsend kicked his second field goal for a 13-0 lead. Fanuzzi was back to pass on UK's 39 when he was struck down on a blind side rush by Ron McCartney with two minutes remaining in the half.

1975 OUTLOOK: The decision of Randy Wallace, second team QB last season, to rejoin the Vols after turning down a baseball contract with the Chicago Cubs, lightened the task of replacing Condredge Holloway, is Tennessee's top priority entering the 1975 season. Coach Bill Battle, entering his sixth season as head man after guiding the Vols to a fifteenth place ranking in the UPI poll last year, must make do for the first time since 1971 without the magic touch of Holloway, Tennessee's all-time career offense leader. With the notable exception of Holloway and a pair of all-star kickers, Tennessee's graduation losses were relatively light. Some brilliant talent returns, headed offensively by all-Southeastern Conference tailback Stanley Morgan, running back Mike Gayles and split end Larry Seivers. Tennessee's defense bounced back last year from the debacle of 1973, when it was creamed for 219 points, and once more became a stingy, grudging machine. End Ron McCartney should be a candidate for all-star honors following a productive junior season capped by his selection as outstanding defensive Vol in the Liberty Bowl.

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Sixteen other men, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as do two student representatives.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Athletic Director Cliff Hagan.

MEMORIAL

Kentucky's athletic complex off Cooper Drive was named "The Bernie A. Shively Sports Center" in April, 1969, in memory of the distinguished Wildcat director of athletics who died of a heart attack at his home December 10, 1967.

Shively joined the Kentucky staff in 1927 as football line coach, following a brilliant athletic career at Illinois. An All-American as a blocking guard for Red Grange, he also was Big Ten heavyweight wrestling champion and a track standout. He was named to the Helms Hall of Fame in 1972.

In 1933, he was appointed head of the UK Physical Education Department, and five years later became director of athletics. He continued coaching until 1946, handling football, track and baseball at various times. Among other honors, he was inducted into the Kentucky Hall of Fame.



DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky

Established in 1865 under provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862 as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky University, the University of Kentucky today has approximately 32,000 students in the 15 academic colleges and Graduate School on the central campus in Lexington and in its 13 community colleges.

In 1878, the school separated from Kentucky University and became an independent institution supported by the state, and since 1916 has been known as the University of Kentucky, embodying the functions of teaching, public service and research.

Situated in the famed Blue Grass region of Central Kentucky, the University maintains several research institutes whose work increasingly affects state and nation: the Tobacco and Health Research Institute, the Office of Business Development and Government Services, the Institute for Mining and Minerals Research, and the Water Resources Institute.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

President since 1969 has been Dr. Otis A. Singletary, who came from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. He earlier had been director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

He is the eighth president of the University. Unique recognition of his service to the institution came recently from the UK Alumni Association, which presented him its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.



CLIFF HAGAN, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

"I've been preparing for this all my life," Cliff Hagan said just before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky last July 1. "I feel I've got a clear picture of what it's all about. A year from now, I will have a clearer picture."

A few months earlier, Harry C. Lancaster had announced his intention to step down as athletics director in order that Hagan might have time to get acquainted with the duties involved before assuming the position of command.

Lancaster will remain as a special assistant to Hagan until February, 1976, when Lancaster will reach the mandatory retirement age.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the 1949 state high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 29 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

While playing in St. Louis, he was a member of the Welfare Society of Florissant, Mo., and a director of the Florissant Historical Society and the Florissant Park Board. From 1957 to 1968 he was director of Camp Robin Basketball Clinic in New Hampshire. He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

During his 11th year in St. Louis, Hagan did radio and television commentary for the Hawks' basketball team and for Anheuser Busch.

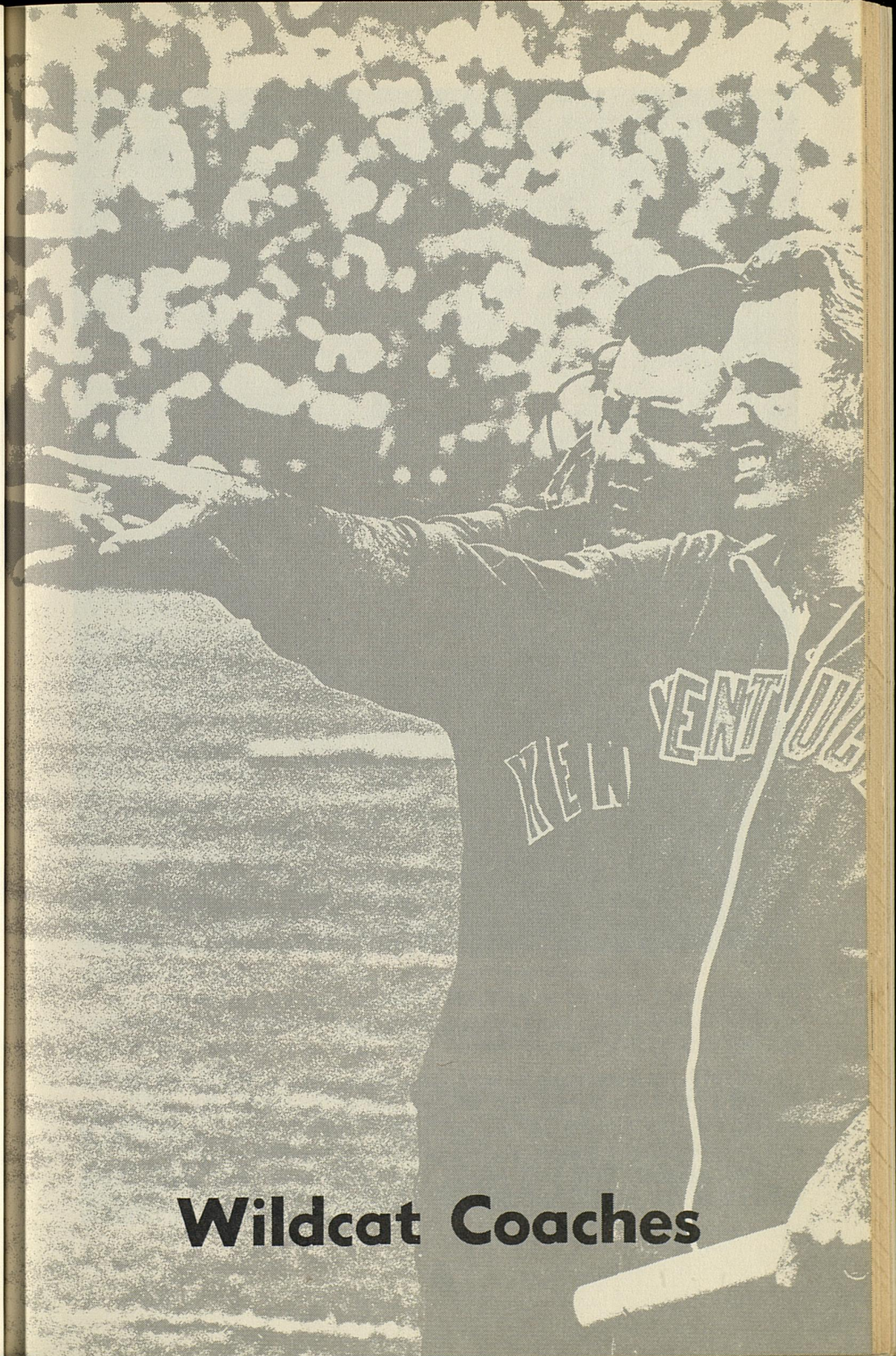
He then joined the Dallas Chaparrals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

A well-known speaker for civic clubs, churches and schools, Hagan was speaker for the World Convention of Toastmasters in 1966.

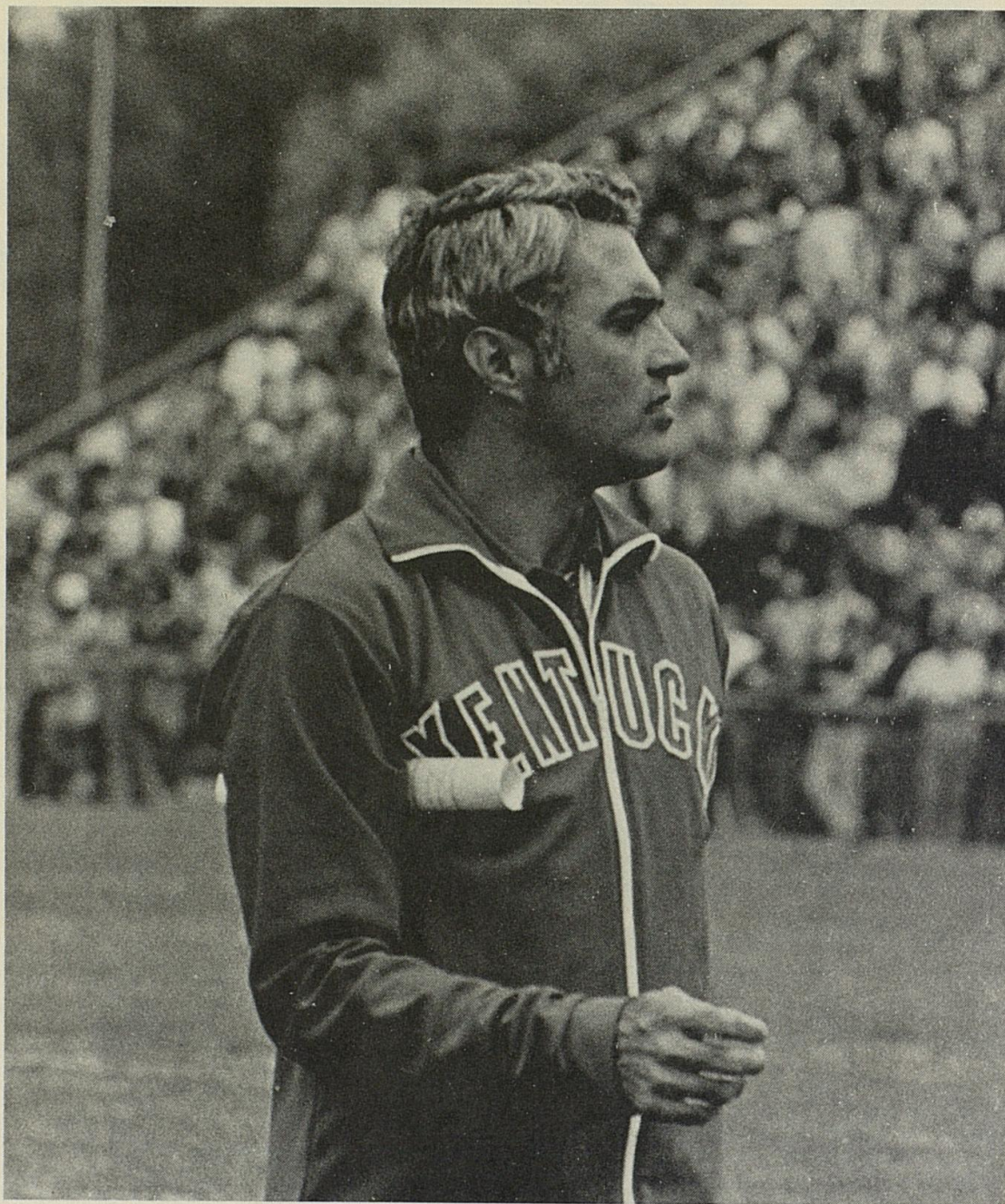
He is president of the Fayette County Board of the American Cancer Society, State Board Chairman for the UK Division of the Cancer Society, a lay delegate to the National Board of Directors and a member of the Kiwanis Club.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, 18, Laurie, 17, Amy, 13, and Kip, 11.



Wildcat Coaches



FRAN CURCI

Head Football Coach

In 1974, his second year as head coach of the Wildcats, Fran Curci gave the University of Kentucky its first winning season (6-5) since the 1965 team finished 6-4. The Wildcats also tied for fourth in the SEC, their highest finish in nine years. Curci subsequently was awarded a new five-year contract.

"We obviously have been pleased with the progress made during Coach Curci's first two years at the University of Kentucky," Dr. Otis A. Singletary,

UK president, said, "and we look forward to his continuing contributions in the days ahead."

During the seven years before Curci came to Lexington, the Wildcats finished 3-6-1 in 1966, 2-8 in 1967, 3-7 in 1968, 2-8 in 1969, 2-9 in 1970, 3-8 in 1971 and 3-8 in 1973.

Despite losing All-Conference runner Sonny Collins for the last 2½ games of the 1974 season, Curci's forces still were in line for a Liberty Bowl bid when they fell to Tennessee at Knoxville after upsetting bowl-bound Vanderbilt and Florida before ABC-TV cameras on consecutive weekends in Commonwealth Stadium.

Reputed as one of the nation's finest recruiters, Curci has worked long and hard to attract fine talent to Lexington and his first two Wildcat squads have featured a host of freshmen and sophomores playing prominent roles. Freshman Art Still was Southeast "Lineman of the Week" in the LSU game last season and was named first team defensive end on the Football News' Freshman All-American team. Warren Bryant, named All-SEC with Sonny Collins, was selected to that magazine's Sophomore All-American.

Curci produced the first two UK All-Americans since 1965 as center Rick Nuzum was honored by Newspaper Enterprise Association and Elmore Stephens was named first team on the Time Magazine squad chosen by professional scouts. Stephens was drafted in the second round by Kansas City, Nuzum in the fifth round by Los Angeles and linebacker Tom Ehlers by Philadelphia.

Curci also had one of his Wildcats honored nationally for the second year in a row as Tom Ranieri was selected "Lineman of the Week" by the Associated Press for his play at noseguard against Florida. He was named an Academic All-America first team member.

In 1973, Sonny Collins was the AP's national "Back of the Week" and a member of the UPI's "Backfield of the Week" for his fine performance against Mississippi State.

Curci's first UK squad had a record of five wins and six losses against tough competition, including six teams involved in bowl games. Kentucky tied Florida and Georgia for fifth place in the conference. Better yet, nobody romped over the Wildcats. They led mighty Alabama, 14-0, at halftime before falling, 28-14, and led LSU, 21-7, at intermission before losing, 28-21, in Baton Rouge. In each case, Curci felt a lack of depth was the cause of the Wildcat loss.

Upset victims included Georgia, Mississippi State and nationally ranked Tulane, which came to Lexington with an undefeated record.

At the end of the season, many honors were accorded Curci, including United Press International "SEC Coach of the Year," Inside Kentucky Sports "Kentucky Coach of the Year," and Courier-Journal "Man of the Year" in Kentuckiana sports.

One of his big problems upon arriving in Lexington was to convince the players and fans that Kentucky could win; after an opening victory over Virginia Tech, he told the squad that a person would have thought they had lost, they had to learn to win. By the end of the season, the Wildcats became known as a team that never gave up, and twice came from far behind to lose by only two points to bowl-bound teams.

Curci came to U.K. from his alma mater, the University of Miami, Fla., where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after making All-America and playing as a 5-foot-9, 152 lb. quarterback for the old Dallas Texans of the AFL.

In four years, his Hurricane freshman teams won 12 and lost two games. He then served as a varsity assistant two years (1966-1967), with the Hurricanes participating in bowl games both those years.

Curci was tapped by the University of Tampa in 1968 to see what he could do about a faltering football program; in three campaigns, he wrote one of the most amazing success stories in college football.

In his first year, he put together a 7-3 season, including victories over Mississippi State and Tulane. That earned for him the Florida Sports Writers Association "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970. His 1969 season was a brilliant 8-2 affair. His 10-1 record in 1970 also included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking as well as bringing Curci College Division "Coach of the Year" runner-up honors.

He took over as Miami grid boss Dec. 19, 1970, and left the program there in good shape for his successor.

Curci has been selected four times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game four years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charlie McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America football game at Lubbock, Texas, and was co-South coach with Bill Battle of Tennessee in Miami's Shrine North-South game in 1972.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Curci played his high school ball in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At the University of Miami, he was known as the "Mite-y Magician." Playing at 152 pounds, he parlayed intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving honorable mention All-America and winning acclaim as one of the foremost sophomore football stars in the country in 1957.

His record-shattering feats at Miami included breaking of seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained on passing. He also was co-holder of the record for most TD passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades.

As a senior, he captained Miami and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset (18-23) over Big Ten champion Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year with the Dallas Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

He is married to the former Miss Patricia Ann Taylor of Louisville. They have four children, Angela 14, Frankie 12, Mary Teresa 11 and Jimmie 9.

GALS' COACH FIRST UK MENTOR

Prof. A. M. Miller, who became Kentucky's first football coach in 1892, was chosen because he had learned about the game from sideline observations while a student at Princeton. His only previous coaching experience was at a girls' school in Pennsylvania. He coached four games and yielded to Jackie Thompson for the remaining three games.

BILLY MITCHELL, DEFENSIVE ENDS

Billy returned to his alma mater in 1974 from Wake Forest, where he was a member of K-Letterman Tommy Harper's staff. A native of Georgetown, he earned four letters as quarterback at Garth High, plus three letters each in basketball, track, and tennis. He was All-State two years in basketball and regional high jump and tennis champion. As a U.K. halfback, he earned three letters and also lettered as a high jumper for the Wildcat cinder squad. He was head coach at Manual High in Louisville in 1965 and then served as an assistant at Murray State, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest.

JOHN COOPER, DEFENSIVE SECONDARY

John came to Uk in 1973 from the University of Kansas, where he was defensive coordinator, defensive secondary coach and recruiting coordinator. A standout safety as a college player, he was a member of Iowa State's famed "Dirty Thirty" Club of 1959 and captained the Cyclones in 1961. He remained at Ames a year as a member of Clay Stapleton's staff, then joined Tommy Prothro at Oregon State for the 1963-64 seasons. He went with Prothro to UCLA to coach the defensive backs. He left UCLA with Pepper Rodgers when the latter was hired for the KU head job following the 1966 season. A native of Clinton, Tenn., he was a quarterback and safety on the undefeated Powell High School team of 1952 and the 1953 team (7-3) and was named outstanding

player in the Tennessee All-Star game. He also earned three letters each in basketball and baseball. At Iowa State, he was most valuable player in 1961. He was on the coaching staff of three bowl teams: Oregon State vs. Michigan in 1965, UCLA vs. Michigan State in 1966, and Kansas vs. Oregon State in 1963.

DAN COUGHLIN, DEFENSIVE LINE

A teammate of Fran Curci and a two-year starter as offensive guard and linebacker at the University of Miami, Dan cut his coaching teeth at Coral Gables High School, where he spent nine years with the perennially powerful teams there. During his tenure, the Cavaliers won 102 games, lost nine and tied one, registering nine shutouts in 13 games in 1967 and winning two national championships. A native of Cleveland, he played his prep football at Benedictine High. After graduating from Miami, he coached one year at LaSalle High there.

CHARLIE BAILEY, LINEBACKERS

Charlie came to UK this year from Rice University, where he served three years as defensive coordinator and was assistant head coach. A native of Poca, W. Va., he was a high school quarterback there, earning three letters each in football, baseball and basketball. As a end on both offense and defense, he lettered four years at the University of Tampa, being named outstanding lineman and team captain, among other honors. After graduating from Tampa, he coached one year each at Poca High and Brandon, Fla., High before serving as an assistant at Tampa from 1964-70. He was defensive coach for Curci one year at Miami before moving to Rice.

JON MIRILOVICH, OFFENSE

A former star end at the University of Miami, Jon was a teammate of Fran Curci at Miami's Archbishop Curley High, earning All-City and All-American honors. Playing as two-way end at U. M., he lettered three years and was accorded honorable mention All-American, teaming again with Curci. He played with the Dallas Texans before a leg injury cut short his career. He served successfully as assistant coach at Columbus High (1961-62) and Southwest High (1962-63), head coach at Columbus (1965-66) and as assistant coach at Coral Gables High (1968-69) before joining Curci at Tampa in 1970. The Spartans swept to a 10-1 record that year and rolled up an astounding 342 points, including 31 against U. M. and 48 against Florida A&M. Jon went to Miami with Curci in 1971 and came to U.K. with him in 1973.

NICK NICOLAU, OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

A graduate of New Bedford (Mass.) High, where he was a member of football and track teams, Nick launched his collegiate career as a freshman on

the Southern Connecticut defensive unit which established a national small college defensive record in 1951. He was then shifted to offensive halfback during his sophomore campaign and was the club's leading ground gainer. He interrupted his college career for a two-year hitch in the Marine Corps but returned to Southern Connecticut in time for the 1956 season and was a key member of the Owls' 9-0 club, the finest in the school's history. He was the last player to earn four varsity football letters. His coaching background includes stints in high school, Southern Connecticut, Springfield College, University of Bridgeport, University of Massachusetts and University of Connecticut. While head coach at the University of Bridgeport for five years, he was twice chosen "Coach of the Year" in 1966 and 1969. He was selected as honorary head coach of the "Centennial" University of Bridgeport team. His '69 team won the Eastern Football Conference championship in 1969 and played in the First Annual Knute Rockne Bowl. He holds a Bachelor's degree from Southern Connecticut, a Master's degree from the University of Indiana and a doctoral degree from Springfield College.

RON BLACKLEDGE, OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

A member of the Bowling Green University Hall of Fame (Oct. 28, 1972), Ron came to U. K. in 1973 from the University of Cincinnati, where he served as an assistant (offensive line) in 1972. A native of Robertsville, Ohio, he was raised in Canton, where he was All-City and All-Stark County both in football and basketball, honorable mention, All-Ohio football, second team basketball, a three-letterman in baseball and winner of the Timken Athletic Achievement award in 1956. He was a regular on the 1959 undefeated Bowling Green football team, winning All-Mid-American Conference honors. He was also first team All-MAC in baseball, winner of 1960 NCAA slugging honors and a seven-year all-star in Canton amateur baseball circles. He was guidance counselor and assistant football coach, Canton South, 1960-63, head coach Timken High three years, a graduate assistant at Ohio University in 1966 and coach one year at Canton Glenwood. He was assistant coach at Ashland College three years before joining Wildcat letterman Ray Callahan at Cincinnati.

DAVID WELLS, RECEIVERS

A native of Madisonville, Ky., Dave came to the University four years ago as a graduate assistant after serving an internship as an assistant at his high school alma mater. He earned three football letters and was an All-State running back at Madisonville, setting a school record for the most points in a season. He also earned three basketball and four track letters, participating in the state track meet two years. An Academic All-SEC and honorable mention Academic All-American, he lettered three years as a wingback at Ole Miss, playing on one SEC championship team and participating in the Sugar, Bluebonnet and Liberty bowls. He was with the Washington Redskins during the 1966 exhibition season

and was a graduate assistant that fall and the following season at Ole Miss. He spent two years with the Army in Germany before returning to Madisonville.

FLETCHER CARR, ASSISTANT

After earning four letters as a starting center at Tampa University, Fletcher joined his former coach Curci at U.K. in 1973. A native of Erie, Pa., he made All-City in football at East High, playing tackle on both offense and defense, earned four letters in track and was city wrestling champ. At Tampa, he made All-South Independent and was an honorable mention All-American. He was All-American and NCAA College Division wrestling champ in 1971 and 1972, Florida state champ four years and participated in the 1968 and 1972 Olympic Trials. After finishing first in the College Division wrestling championships in 1973, he was fourth in the University Division. He is the 1973 Southeastern karate champion, holding a black belt in the sport. He is also U.K.'s wrestling coach.

DAN LEAL, CHIEF RECRUITER

A native of Oakmont, Pa., as is Fran Curci, Dan played linebacker and halfback in high school there, and graduated from Gannon College in Erie, Pa. He spent eight years with Spang & Co. in Butler, Pa., before coming to U. K. as Curci's chief recruiter. He had served as unofficial recruiter for Curci in the Pittsburgh area since Curci started coaching and recruiting in the college ranks. He is also UK's golf coach.

ROY DON WILSON, TRAINER

After serving two years as head trainer at The Citadel, "R. D." came to U.K. six years ago, and is recognized as one of the top men in his profession. A native of Texas, he is a graduate of Amon Carter Riverside High in Fort Worth. He received his B. S. degree from Texas A&M with a major in physical education and a minor in business. He also received a corrective therapist certificate from the VA hospital in Houston. After serving as a student trainer at Amon Carter and A&M, he was head trainer two years at Ector High in Odessa before serving two years as assistant trainer at Florida State University.

DR. FRANK M. DOWNING, ACADEMICS

Dr. Frank M. Downing, assistant to director of athletics for academic affairs, came to U.K. in 1974 from Memphis State University, where he completed his doctorate in education with an emphasis in reading. Prior academic degrees include an MA in reading from the University of Miami (Fla.) and an AB in English from Lafayette College in Easton, Pa. He has been involved more than

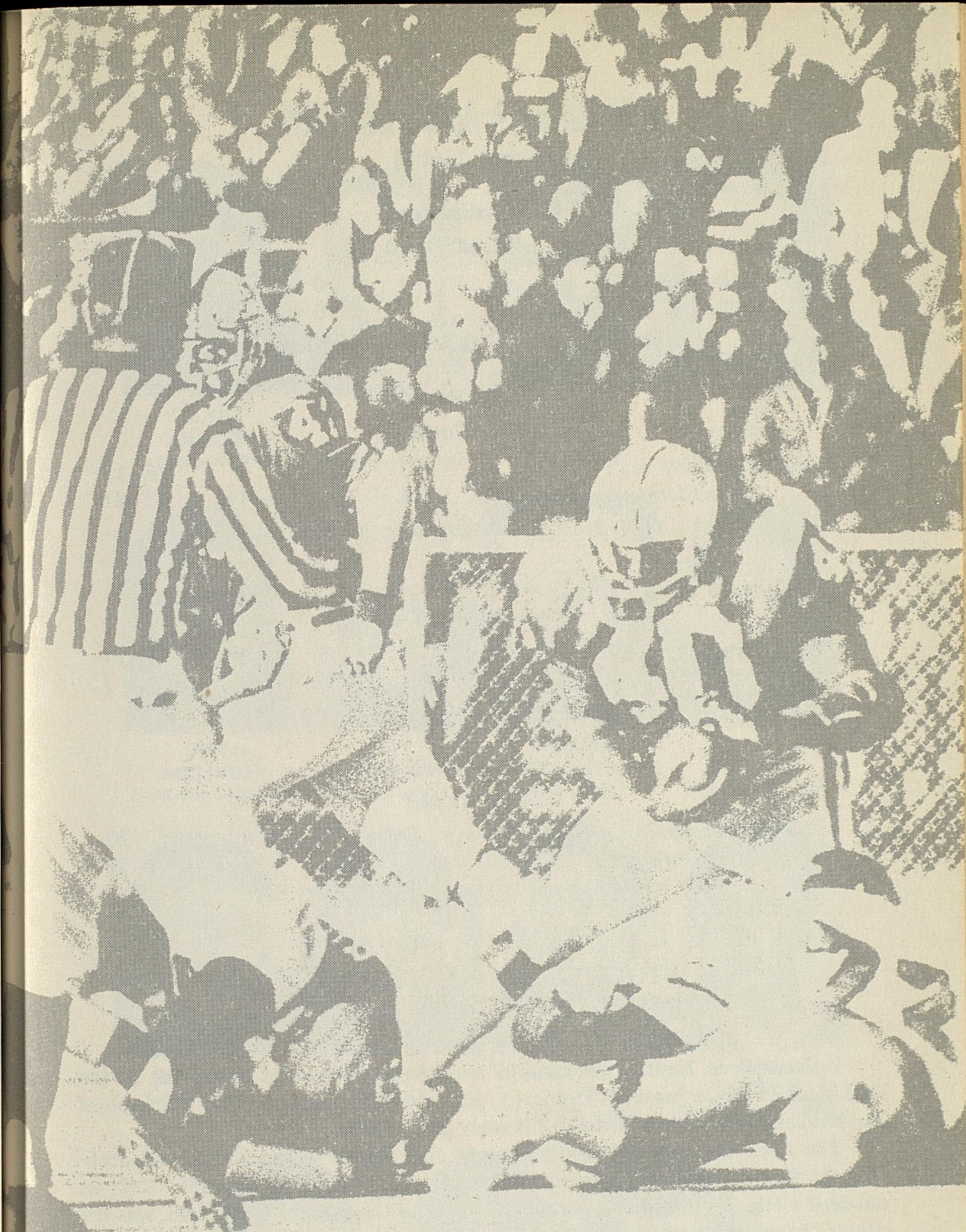
20 years with high school and college student athletes in Pennsylvania, Florida and Tennessee. In 1965, he was honored as football "Coach of the Year" in Dade County, Fla. A native of Brooklyn, N. Y., he is married to the former Marilyn Thompson.

CLARENCE UNDERWOOD, ASSISTANT

"Buckshot" returned to the University in 1965 as an assistant coach. A native of West Virginia, he played football at Woodrow Wilson High in Beckley and at Marshall University, where he also lettered in boxing. He coached four years at Beckley High, served as a Naval lieutenant in WW II and coached two more seasons at Beckley before joining "Bear" Bryant's staff at U.K. He left U.K. in 1956 to become athletic director and head coach at Thomas Jefferson High in Port Arthur, Texas, compiling a 77-26-6 record and winning six district championships. He was Texas high school "Coach of the Year" in 1957 and coached the South All-Stars in the 1960 Texas schoolboy classic.

STOLL FIELD 'COW PASTURE' BIRTHPLACE OF DIXIE FOOTBALL

University of Kentucky's campus boasts the distinction of serving as the birthplace of Dixie football. Ironically, however, the forerunners of the present day Wildcats were not involved in the early grid contest.

The first intercollegiate football game ever played in the South, and probably the first to take place west of the Alleghenies, came about April 9, 1880, on old Stoll Field. That gridiron, located adjacent to the present Stoll Field, was the site of the early tilt which saw Kentucky University (now known as Transylvania College) take the measure of Centre College, 13¾ to 0. The match, which was said to resemble a combination of soccer and rugby, followed by only six years the introduction of the game of football to the United States.

University of Kentucky (then called A & M College of Kentucky) did not play its first game until a year later on the same field, which once served as the private pasture for University President James Patterson's bovine herd.

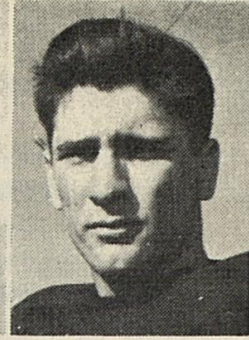

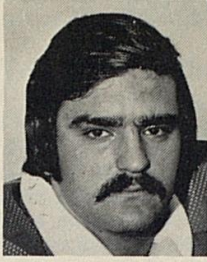


SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR—Russell Rice was named sports information director at UK in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High. After serving with the U.S. Marines in World War II, he attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951. He has served as manager of the NCAA Mid-East Basketball Tournament (1968), president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Information Directors Association and chairman of the Basketball Hall of Fame Committee of the College Sports Information Directors Association and was recipient of the 1971 Churchmen's "Sportswriter of the Year" award. As a newspaperman, his duties ranged from agricultural hearings in Washington to spending three months as the traveling companion to a Kentucky gubernatorial candidate. He attended a national sports editors seminar at Columbia University and reported the activities of such Wildcat teams as football coach Charlie Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" and "The Runts" of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. He is a former Kentucky area correspondent for Time-Life-Fortune magazines and was Kentucky editor of Tobacco Magazine and Religious News Service. For the past eight years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. His book on Kentucky football is fresh off the press while a book on UK basketball is scheduled for publication later this fall. He edits the K-Mens Newsletter and has been honored by that organization for outstanding service. He also was honored recently by WAVE-TV for "Outstanding Contribution to Televised Sports." He is married to the former Miss Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children—Mrs. Rodney Morris of Louisville, Russell James, 23, Judy, 21, and Kim, 9, all of Lexington.

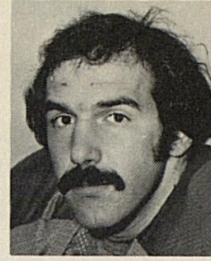

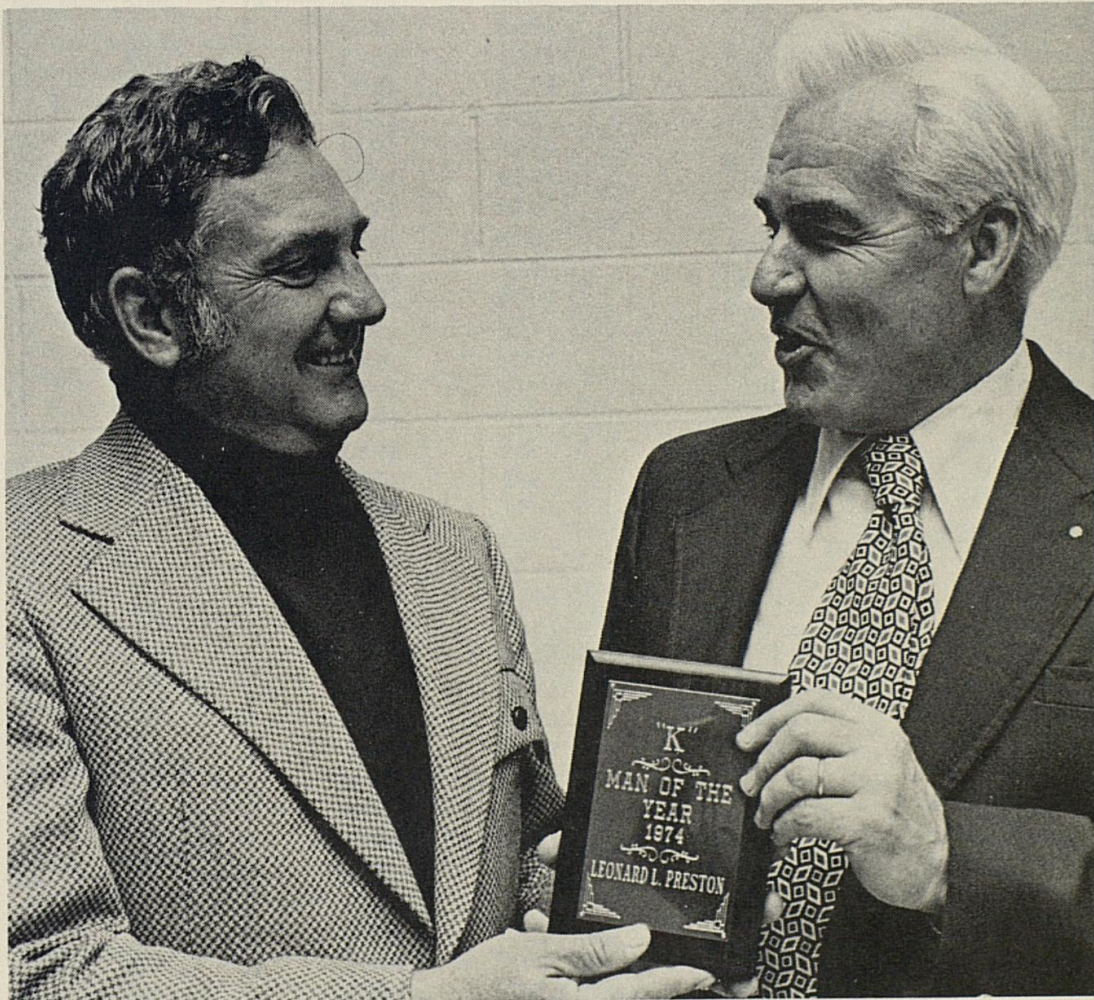

Footnote A — Although numerical scoring had not yet been introduced in Rugby football, either here or in Great Britain, when Kentucky and Transylvania (then known as Kentucky University) played their series in 1881, persons in charge of the games obviously had arrived at some sort of agreement assigning values to the various scoring plays. Records never existed and men who played in the games are now deceased. All we can do is accept the scores printed in the newspapers and surmise that a touchdown perhaps counted $\frac{1}{4}$ point and that a goal or an end-kick (a punt into the modern end zone) counted 1. That seems logical, since in the ratio scoring of that day, a touchdown was worth one-quarter of a goal. The end-kick, a British heritage, undoubtedly was introduced because all realized that green Players would score few goals, if any.

Footnote B — The football rules took no official position on the score of a forfeited game until 1908 when it was pegged at 1-0 to make it different from any other score possible in the game. By common consent, forfeited games prior to that were entered into the records as victories by 6-0 for the offended team—everywhere, that is, except in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, predecessor of the Southern Conference and the Southeastern Conference. In the S.I.A.A. the 6-0 practice was followed unless the offended team had a greater number of points. In that case, the offended team won by the greater score to nothing. Thus, Kentucky's forfeiture to Central University in 1900 is 6-0, since Kentucky led by 11-0 at the time. Kentucky led Cumberland by 12-11 in 1905 when the Tennesseans forfeited. The Blue and White, under S.I.A.A. rules, gets credit for a 12-0 victory.
