## HONORARY DEGREES

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Professor Horlacher, as Chairman of the Senate Committee on the Student Constitution, presented the proposed constitution in mimeographed form. After recommending certain minor amendments, Professor Horlacher moved that the Constitution of the Student Government Association be approved, subject to such minor changes as may be made by the student-faculty committee prior to the student vote on ratification. The motion was seconded and passed by the University Senate. The adopted constitution follows:

"CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION  
of the  
UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

PART ONE: Name

The student governing body of the University of Kentucky shall be known as the STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY. Its membership shall be composed of all resident students of the University.

PART TWO: Purpose

The purpose of the Student Government Association shall be to enact and enforce such legislation as is hereinafter set out, with a view to a harmonious coordination of the various organizations on the campus, to effect a centralized student government, better faculty-student cooperation, and to promote the general welfare of the student body.

The Student Government Association shall be superior in authority to all student organizations on the campus.

PART THREE: Membership

Article One:

1. There shall be a president of the student body.
2. There shall be two vice-presidents of the student body, one man and one woman.
3. These three officers shall be chosen in this manner:
  - a. Each aspirant shall formally petition for candidacy, and such petition must be in the office of the Registrar at least ten days before the election. The petition must indicate which of the three offices the aspirant desires.
  - b. Each aspirant petitioning must successfully fulfill the following requirements before he may become a candidate.
    - (1) He must have a University standing of at least 1.8.
    - (2) He must be at least a second semester sophomore with a year's residence at the University.
    - (3) He must be ranked among the higher 50% of the aspirants to the office sought on a preliminary

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examination to be prepared annually by the faculty members of the Election Board.

- (4) The Election Board shall be composed of three faculty members elected by the Student Legislature; the retiring president of the student body; and two members, elected by and from the Student Legislature. No aspirant for the offices of president or vice-president of the student body shall be a member of the Election Board. If the retiring president of the student body is seeking reelection, a member shall be elected by and from the Student Legislature to serve in his position on the Election Board.
- (a) The preliminary examination shall be prepared, tested, and the grading system pre-determined by the faculty members of the Election Board. The examination and the grading system shall be kept in the office of the Registrar of the University and shall be accessible only to the faculty members of the Election Board until the examination is given.
- (b) The examination shall consist of three parts: Leadership aptitude, knowledge of the University, and knowledge of parliamentary procedure and other details of administrative government.
- (c) The examination shall be as nearly as possible factually objective and shall be graded on an entirely objective basis according to a predetermined grading system.
- c. The aspirants receiving the higher 50% in the ranking for each office shall be declared candidates for the office. A minimum of two aspirants shall be declared candidates for each office.
- d. Any aspirant has the right of appeal to the Student Legislature, at any time preceding the election, if he considers any act of the Election Board in conducting and grading the examination as unfair or prejudicial.
- e. The grading system, the examination papers, and score sheet shall be preserved in the Office of the Registrar until after the election and shall be open to inspection by any student or member of the administrative and instructional personnel of the University.
4. Having fulfilled the above requirements, the candidates will run in a general election, in which any resident student of

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the University may vote.

5. Any resident student of the University may vote for the president of the student body, but only men resident students shall vote for the man vice-president of the student body and only women resident students shall vote for the woman vice-president of the student body.
6. A majority of the votes cast is required for the election to these offices. If a majority is not received, a run-off will be held at the time of the Legislature election.

## Article Two:

1. There shall be a Student Legislature composed of representatives, ex-officio members, and non-voting ex-officio members.
2. The representatives shall number 22, and shall be elected by and from the colleges of the University, with the exception of the two representatives from the Freshman Class. Representatives from each college shall be determined by the proportion of the college enrollment to the total enrollment of the University, as nearly as possible, except that no college shall have less than one representative.
  - a. Colleges with more than one representative shall elect rising seniors equal in number to the underclassman group (which shall include rising juniors and rising sophomores) as nearly as possible.
  - b. The college representation shall be apportioned as nearly as possible according to enrollment by sexes.
3. To become a candidate for the Student Legislature a student must have a standing of at least 1.5 in the University and must submit to the Election Board a petition signed by 30 members of his college.
4. Representatives shall be elected by and from their respective colleges.
5. There shall be two representatives, one man and one woman, elected by and from the Freshman Class.
  - a. Candidates shall be determined by the aforementioned examining board from the freshmen ranking in the first decile in University placement tests.

## Article Three:

1. There shall be a secretary of the student body, to be elected by and from the Student Legislature.
2. There shall be a treasurer of the student body, to be elected by and from the Student Legislature.

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## PART FOUR: Powers.

All powers of student government shall reside in the Student Government Association. The president of the student body shall serve as chairman of the Legislature and shall administer the actions of that body. The two vice-presidents of the student body shall, upon election, become ex-officio voting members of the Student Legislature.

Specific duties, hereinafter set out, shall be handled by standing committees of the Student Legislature. These committees shall function according to the powers given them by the Constitution; they shall meet as often as is necessary to complete their business; they must have a quorum of three-fourths of the members to do business; they shall tender reports to the Student Legislature and their actions and decisions are subject to the approval of the Student Legislature.

## Article One

1. There shall be a Finance Committee, composed of the student treasurer, acting as chairman and having voting power; two members of the staff appointed by the President of the University; two students appointed by the president of the student body, subject to the approval of the Student Legislature; the Business Agent or his representative.
2. The Student Government Association, acting through the Finance Committee, shall have powers in the regulation of financial matters of the student body as follows:
  - a. All moneys collected and expended for the maintenance of student government.
    - (1) A budget shall be prepared at the beginning of each school year by the committee approved by the Legislature and submitted to the President of the University. It shall include:
      - (a) A general budget for the Student Government Association.
      - (b) The finances of the four classes of the University.
    - (2) The President of the University, upon approval of the budget, shall authorize the Business Agent to place this sum into the account of the Student Government Association in the Organization's Fund of the Business Office.
      - (a) Authorization for expenditures from this account shall be made upon the approval of the student treasurer and a staff member chosen by and from the Finance Committee.
      - (b) The Student Government Association Account in the Organizations Fund shall continue from



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year to year, the change in authorization for expenditures being made immediately following the election of the new student treasurer.

3. Expenditures and collections for all social functions shall be approved by the Finance Committee.
4. Regularly once in every five years the Finance Committee shall make a study of the allocation of the student activities fee for the Student Legislature which may make recommendations to the President and the Board of Trustees.
5. All student organizations having moneys in the Organizations Fund shall deliver audits and accounts of funds into the hands of the Finance Committee at the end of each school semester, and it shall be the duty of the Committee to see that the same is published. The Finance Committee shall publish an itemized account of the expenditure of student activities fees.

## Article Two

1. There shall be a Social Committee composed of the following members: The Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, three staff members appointed by the President of the University, the President of the Student Union Board, two seniors (a man and a woman), and two juniors (a man and a woman) to be appointed by the president of the student body, subject to the approval of the Student Legislature.
  - a. The chairman must be a member of the Legislature and shall have voting power.
2. The Student Government Association, acting through the Social Committee, shall have power in the regulation of social activities of the student body as follows:
  - a. The Social Committee shall prepare a social calendar at the beginning of each semester. All student social functions given at the University shall first be approved by the Social Committee and placed upon the social calendar.
3. Expenditures and collections for all social activities shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

## Article Three

1. There shall be a Student Publications Committee composed of the following members: the Head of the Department of Journalism, the Director of Student Publications, the Business Agent of the University, a staff member appointed by the President of the University, the Editors of the Kernel and Kentuckian, and the vice-presidents of the student body.

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- a. The men's vice-president shall act as chairman with voting power.
  - b. In case the editor of the Kernel is seeking reelection, his place on the Committee shall be filled by a senior in the Department of Journalism, appointed by the president of the student body, subject to the approval of the Student Legislature.
2. The Committee on Student Publications shall have powers in the administration of Student publications as follows:
    - a. Selection of the paid staff members of student publications.
      - (1) This selection is subject to ratification by the Student Legislature.
    - b. Awarding of all contracts relative to student publications.
    - c. Establishing rules and regulations governing the qualification of applicants for positions.

## Article Four

1. The presidents of the Interfraternity Council and the Pan-Hellenic Council shall serve as non-voting ex-officio members of the Student Legislature.
  - a. They shall tender to the Legislature reports of all rules and regulations passed at regular meetings of the Interfraternity Council and the Pan-Hellenic Council.

## Article Five

1. The president of the Union Board shall serve as a non-voting ex-officio member of the Student Legislature.
  - a. He shall tender to the Legislature reports of all legislation passed at regular meetings of the Student Union Board.

## Article Six

1. There shall be a Student Welfare Committee composed of the following members: a chairman elected by and from the Student Legislature, five students elected by the Student Legislature, and six faculty members chosen by the University Senate.
2. The Student Welfare Committee will be an investigating and policy-forming committee on general student welfare, teaching and curriculum problems, and healthy faculty-student relations. It shall report at least once a month to the Student Legislature.

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## Article Seven

1. There shall be a Committee of Student Standards composed of the following members: A chairman elected by the Student Legislature; the two vice-presidents of the student body; the Dean of Women; the Dean of Men; a woman member of the Faculty; and a man member of the Faculty, to be chosen by the University Senate; one woman student chosen by the House Council of the Woman's Residence Halls; one woman student chosen by and from the organized houses; one woman student chosen by and from the women residing in Lexington; one woman student chosen by and from the Pan-Hellenic Council; one man student chosen by and from the Men's Residence Halls; one man student chosen by and from the Interfraternity Council; one man student chosen by and from the men's rooming houses; and one man student chosen by and from the men residing in Lexington.
2. The Committee of Student Standards shall be a policy-forming group, which shall concern itself with standards and regulation of student conduct. It shall report and adjudicate violation of the established standards of conduct and it shall develop a constructive program to combat cheating and other general departures from decent and honorable personal and social behavior in the University.
3. The Committee of Student Standards shall function in a disciplinary manner through sub-committees representing all organized groups of men and women students, whose representatives in the Committee shall serve as chairmen of their respective sub-committees.
  - a. These chairmen will report regularly to the Committee of Student Standards, and there will always be the right of appeal to the Committee of Student Standards, or to one of its committees to be hereinafter mentioned.
4. Violations of the established student standards of conduct of a general character beyond the jurisdiction of any of the sub-committees responsible to the Committee of Student Standards shall be brought before the Judiciary Committee, composed of the following: the chairman of the Committee of Student Standards; the two vice-presidents of the student body; the Dean of Women; the Dean of Men; and one staff member serving on the Committee of Student Standards.
5. For infractions of student regulations of concern only to women, or to men, or of a nature best resolved by only women, or men, the women members, or the men members, of the Committee of Student Standards shall serve in place of the entire Committee.
6. The Committee of Student Standards shall be responsible to the Student Legislature, and through it, to the President of the University. The right of appeal will be either to the Student Legislature and through it to the President of the University, or directly to the President of the University.

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## Article Eight

1. The two student members of the Athletic Advisory Board shall be chosen by the Student Legislature.

## Article Nine

1. There shall be a Liaison Board composed of the following members: the president of the student body; the two vice-presidents of the student body; three members chosen by the University Senate. One of the three faculty members shall be chairman of the Board, with voting powers.
2. It shall be the function of this board to maintain good will and to foster cooperation among the different colleges, organizations, student groups and faculty of the University.

## Article Ten

1. An amendment to this constitution may be effected by:
  - a. A petition signed by twenty per cent of the resident students of the University, and subsequently passed by a two-thirds vote of the Student Legislature.
    - (1) In the event that the Legislature fails to pass the proposed amendment, the proposal shall be referred to the student body in a general election which shall require a majority vote, with at least 25% of the students participating.
  - b. By a two-thirds vote of the Student Legislature and referred to the student body in a general election which shall require that at least three-fourths of those voting favor the amendment. Twenty per cent of the resident student enrollment is necessary to make the voting valid.

## Article Eleven

This Constitution shall go into effect upon ratification at a general election to be held Monday, September 25, 1939. At least 30% of the resident students enrolled in the classes of 1940, 1941, and 1942 must vote. Ratification shall require a majority vote.

The Constitution shall be in effect for a trial period of one year.

## BY-LAWS OF THE CONSTITUTION

1. Both the student and faculty members of the Election Board shall conduct and grade the examination of aspirants for president and vice-presidents of the student body. The Election Board shall rank the examination papers for each of the three offices on the basis of the total of the three parts of the examination. Each of the three parts shall be of equal importance.

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2. The election of the president of the student body and the vice-presidents of the student body shall be held on the same day, which will be between the fifteenth of April and the first of May of each school year, the specific date to be set by the retiring Student Legislature.

3. Candidates shall be announced at least five days before the date of the election.

4. All candidates for the Student Legislature will run in a general election to be held one week after the election of the president and vice-presidents of the student body.

5. For the first year, the President of the University shall appoint the Election Board.

6. For the first year, members of the Men's Student Council and the Executive Council of the Association of Women Students shall conduct the elections.

7. Election of Freshman representatives to the Legislature shall occur at a mass meeting for all Freshmen called by the president of the student body, at which meeting the organization and function of student government shall be explained and the Freshman candidates introduced.

8. The election for Freshman representatives shall be conducted not later than November 1.

9. The Student Legislature shall meet at least two times a month.

10. All meetings of the Student Legislature shall be open to anyone in the University.

11. The president of the student body, the two vice-presidents, and the representatives to the Student Legislature shall be inducted into office by the retiring officers and members of the Legislature within one week following the election.

12. A member of the Student Legislature shall be automatically expelled from that body when he has three unexcused, consecutive absences from meetings.

13. In the event that a vacancy occurs in the Student Legislature, the president of the student body shall request the nomination of five persons by the dean of the college in which the vacancy occurs, these persons to have a standing of at least 1.5. The Student Legislature shall choose, from these five candidates, the student to fill the vacancy.

14. All meetings shall be conducted according to the procedure set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.

15. In the event that a vacancy occurs among the president or vice-presidents of the student body, a successor shall be elected by the student body, after the candidate has fulfilled the requirements for the office.

16. The retiring Legislature shall examine enrollment figures for classes, sexes, and colleges in April of each year, and shall make such

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changes as are necessary to insure representation according to the stipulations of Part Three, Article Two. Until changed, the representation shall be as follows:

Professor Kuiper presented the following report from the Curriculum Committee:

"The College of Arts and Sciences has recommended to the Senate the following courses and changes in courses:

A. To make corrections in the list of live courses, as follows: (The courses named were omitted by mistake from the approved list or incorrectly listed)

- Psychology 122, Personality Maladjustments (3) (omitted from list)
- Psychology 123, Practice in Testing (3) (omitted from list)
- Ancient Languages 151a-d, Independent Work (3 ea) (omitted from list)
- English 102, History of the English Language (3) (Instead of 2, as listed)
- History 1a-b, The Ancient World (3,3) instead of (2,2) as listed
- History 105, Colonial America (3) instead of (2) as listed.

B. To approve the following new courses:

- English 1aD-1bD - English Composition (3,3)
- Music 115 (Choral Methods and Conducting (2)
- Music 20, Survey of Musical Literature (2) with the following restriction added: "Credit in this course shall not count on a major in music nor toward the degree of B. S. in Music."

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The Committee recommends that these courses and changes in courses be approved.

In regard to the Advertising courses which were referred back to the Curriculum Committee for further consideration, we wish to say that we are faithfully following these instructions and also awaiting further suggestions from the departments and colleges concerned. At present we are not ready to present any recommendations in this matter.

The College of Education recommends the following change in Education 121, History of Education in the United States (3):

That the number of this course be raised to 201 (same title, description and credit)

The Committee recommends the approval of this change."

The College of Agriculture recommends to the Senate the following:

A new course: Farm Engineering 104, Rural Electrification (2)  
A new course: Horticulture 201a-b, Research in Horticulture (3.3).

To raise the number of Home Economics 104, Problems in Textiles (4), to 204 (same title, description, and credit)."

The above report was approved by the Senate.

Descriptions of the new courses approved are as follows:

College of Arts and Sciences

English 1aD-1bD - English Composition. Three hours recitation and two hours laboratory a week. 3 credits each. This course is designed especially for students in the lowest two deciles, replacing English D, a non credit course. (It is experimental, for which reason English D is not to be abandoned.)

Music 115 - Choral Methods and Conducting. 2 credits. This course is intended for music supervisors majoring in the choral field and for them is to be substituted for the course, Orchestration and Conducting, required of instrumentalists. This will be a study of materials, techniques, and problems of presenting choral literature to the secondary age and above. (This course will not duplicate the high school music methods course, Music 26.)

College of Agriculture

Farm Engineering 104. Rural Electrification. 2 credits. This course is designed to give students information on how to obtain electric service and on the problems involved in the selection, operation and care of electrical equipment in the home and on the farm. The course includes the following topics: History of the Development of Rural Electrification; Sources of Electricity for Farm Uses; Farm Electric Lighting Plants; Problems Involved in Obtaining Electric Service from Utilities and Other Agencies; Rates, and Estimating Cost; Wiring Materials, Codes, Permits

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and Inspection; Selection, Operation and Care of Electrical Equipment for the Home and Dairy, Etc.

Horticulture 201a-b. Research in Horticulture. 3 credits each.
