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Classroom Cheating—
The Waif On UK's Doorstep

Not necessarily accurate, the YWCA survey published in today's Keener does indicate a tendency in cheating which is not too encourage ing. We may console ourselves by saving we're no worse off than many other state colleges, but that really is only a defense mechanism which alters in no way the facts.

By examining the figures, it will be noted that those students in the higher scholarship brackets cheat less than those of the mediocreas. Another interesting conclusion to breached from the data is that instructors are to a great extent responsible for this laxity in eithical conduct. But most enlightening of all are the reasons given for cheating. Afraid of flunking, momentary lapse of memory, and less trouble are listed first, second, and third, respectively, as primary causes.

The findings present a problem made to order or members of the recentlyorganized student standards committee but we do not envy them their job. Possibly little can be done, but the committee can not ignore this "call" of social service.
