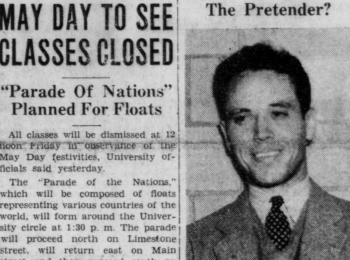

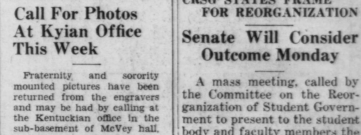

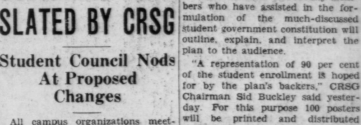
Elected Queen of the May in Thursday's student poll, Kappa Delta Romaine Perkins will reign over May Day festivities on Still Field, Friday.



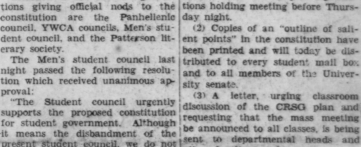
Backers of Bill Dunlap, engineering senior, claim that he is rightful May Queen by virtue of having earned most first place votes in Thursday's election.



Student Council President Bill Dunlap, center, with other members of the council, met yesterday afternoon in the Union building to discuss the proposed CRSG constitution.



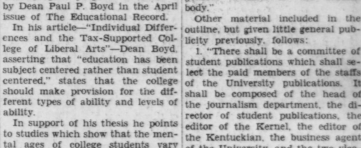
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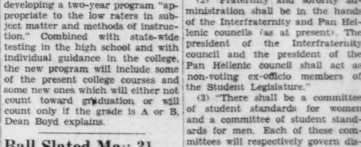
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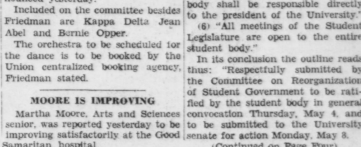

Petition To Be Circulated The petition to be circulated at the mass meeting for student endorsement reads thus: "We, the undersigned students of the University... do heartily desire to adopt the student constitution drawn up by the Committee on the Reorganization of Student Government and presented to the University senate, May 8, 1959; and further, we desire this constitution to go into effect September, 1959, with the revisions adopted before that date."

Explaining the advantages of the new plan of student government, CRSG Chairman Buckley said: "It will co-ordinate all student governing organizations under one central student government. The Men's Student Council and the Association of Women Students will be eliminated. The Student Government association will be directly responsible to the president of the University and can meet rebuttal only by him."

At Least Make Noise With his socky whipping him like a reformatory case, Mountain Ridge, at the turn, began to make his bid and gained on the pack until he soon was able to make out their tracks. On and on he rushed like the midnight freight as the crowd shook the ground with their cheers.

Students who object to any points in the constitution are urged by the CRSG not to refrain from ratifying it, because changes can, and will, be made before the constitution, if ratified, goes into effect.

BLUES SCORE 85, BEREA 33, TIGERS 13 Paced by Bob Rankin, who personally accounted for 12 points, Kentucky's track team made 11 first places count for 85 points to roll easily over Berea and Georgetown in a triangular meet yesterday on the Stoll Field cinders.

Second position in the three-way meet was taken by Berea with 33 points to 13 for Georgetown. Besides breaking first tape in both the 100 and 200 yard dashes, Rankin added a second in the 220 yard dash hurdles as he led the scoring parade.

In the freshman meet, sandwiched in with the varsity show, the Kentucky Klitens, scoring at all, gathered 93 1/2 points to 28% for Berea and 8 for Georgetown. Mullis, Scholtz, Lee and Henning, each with two firsts, led the point collection as the Klitens took honors in 12 events in the 13 cinded.

Off to a good start as Paul Durbin took the mile run to remain unbeaten for the season, Kentucky scored wins in all the varsity running events but dropped three field events, the high jump, discus and javelin.

Neither Dayton nor Kentucky are members of the Third Regiment, but were invited by that regiment to participate in the competition of the best drilled team on the field.

Union Night Cancelled No College Night will be held on May 13 as previously scheduled, student impresario, John H. Morgan said yesterday. Cancellation was necessitated by previous book-ings in the Union, he said.

Unit Gets 1,152 Out Of 1,300 Contest Points Company C, Pershing Rifles, University crack drill unit, placed third in the Third Regimental drill meet held last Friday and Saturday at Bloomington, Indiana, officials of the military department said today.

The University team gathered 1152 points out of a possible 1300. The winners of the contest, a team from Dayton University, received 1169 points, while the University of Illinois was second with 1186 points. Western State Teachers College, Bowling Green, placed fourth with 1075 points.

DIAMOND TEAM TAKES BEARCATS BY 8-4 DECISION

Second Successive Win Is Marked Up Saturday Off to a flying start with five runs in the first inning, Kentucky's baseball team rolled to its second successive win with an 8-4 decision over the University of Cincinnati Bearcats Saturday afternoon on Stoll Field.

It took the Wildcats exactly one third of the first round to discover that Pritchard Jack McClaren had very little on the ball except his left hand. Two markers were picked up in the fifth and the total was completed with one tally in the eighth.

For four and two-thirds innings Hank Ellington, Kentucky's opening pitcher, hurled fine ball and kept the Cincinnati scoring sheet blank or had a pick pocket's expression. Then suddenly, a rally of four hits, a passed ball, an error and a walk produced four runs and brought George Tognocchi to the mound.

After shedding a hit and a run, Tognocchi steadied and held the Bearcats to one lone single during the remaining four frames. Kentucky collected a total of 12 hits off Lowry, McClaren and Penak, while Cincinnati batted out 8 safeties. Randal Phillips, Roland Barette, Joe Shepherd and Eddie Fritz each hit safely two times to head the assault.

In the first inning Kentucky tied off when Tice walked and stole second. Carnes popped to shortstop but Wiloughby lashed a long single into center field, sending Tice home and moving him over to second on the play at the plate. Phillips dribbled a roller to short and beat it out and both runners scored as Navarre dropped a triple along the right field line. Charley Martin followed with another three base single to right and scored when Shepherd doubled to right center field.

At that point McClaren decided to call it a day and yielded the mound to Joe Lowry, a swarthy, loud-protesting right hander. With catcher Ed Alexander, Lowry formed a two-man team that was as busy in protesting decisions as a double teamed humming bird. Shepherd, after going to third on Fritz's single, was out as he tried to score on a passed ball and Ellington rolled out, shortstop to first base. With Ellington going in top form, Kentucky's total began to look large. Then a church bell until the fourth. In that round, after two were out, a temporary fit of wildness that walked three successive men, sent Tognocchi to the bull pen

to warm up. But the threat was halted as Lowry grounded out. Then came the trouble in the fifth. Jucker, first up, struck out but Winters doubled to center. Jones rolled out. Curves to Phillips hit. Robertson and Meyers singled and Alexander and Powell tripled to provide five runs before Tognocchi, after walking one man, forced Lowry to ground out. Navarre to Phillips. Smart playing gave Kentucky two runs in their portion of the fifth. One was out when Phillips slammed a single to center and on the hit and run play dashed to third as Navarre kept out a slow roller to third base. While Lowry admitted his windup Phillips stole home and Navarre moved to second to score on "Lone Drive" Shepherd's single over second base. The final run came in the eighth as Fritz punched a double down the left field line and walked home when Tognocchi singled to left.

Sweeping four of the six singles and two of the three doubles matches, Kentucky's tennis team swept its third win of the campaign by trouncing the University of Indiana 5-3 Saturday afternoon on the Dornier courts. Led by Lee Huber, who took just 35 minutes to win his No. 1 match by 6-0, 6-2, the Cats were never trailing. A sharp wind that swept across the courts caused play to be slowed.

The win brought the year's record to three triumphs and two losses. Another match, last Wednesday against Notre Dame, was postponed because of rain with the score knotted at 4-4 in matches and the deciding doubles bout tied at one set and one game each.

But one match, the No. 2 contest won by Kentucky's captain Dave Ragland, was forced to go into the third set. 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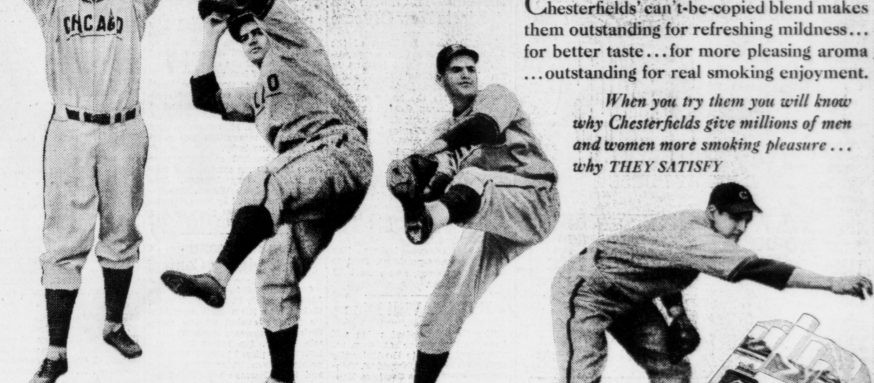
