Time warp: Today marks the one year anniversary of the sweatshop protests; See what the protestors are doing today

The eighth hour culminated in a blur of bodies, cries and pleads. About a dozen students locked arms around a side door of the Administration Building. But police forged through their barricade, herding 11 tired and hungry students out the side door of the Administration Building and into a paddy wason.

That was April 4, 2000.

One year ago today, 12 students were arrested after an eight-hour sit-in in the Administration Building in protest of UK's involvement with sweatshop labor.

Outside, about 30 other students raised who had locked themselves together with PVC pipe, chains and bike locks.

New Hole thing seems like one big, long moment. Said Lindsey Clouse, one of the 12 students arrested and charged with second-degree trespassing.

The media heralded the United Students Against Sweatshops movement as a return of student activism on campuses. UK students had not been arrested for civil disobedience since the Vietnam War.

Last year, on a "national day of protest" and the anniversary of the as-

sassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., students staged protests on campuses across the country. The students were demanding their universities join the Workers Rights Consortium, a factory monitoring group created by USAS in October 1999 as a better alternative to the Fair Labor Association, another monitoring group. UK belongs to the FLA, which USAS claims cannot fairly monitor factories, partly because the FLA governing board includes corporate representatives.

The sit-in was the climax of a year of passing out fliers, hanging posters, holding forturns about sweatshops and trying to meet with administrators. Finally, USAS asw civil disobedience as their only course of action.

When the protest began, the USAS had one demand—to abandon the FLA

Hundreds wounded in Bangladesh DHAKA, Bangladesh — Violent clashes in Bangladesh have killed four people and injured 300 as a general strike intended to force Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's resignation shut down cities throughout Bangladesh for a third day Tuesday. Opposition acid guas and homemade bombs since the strike began Sunday, a working day in Bangladesh, closing businesses and schools and halting most traffic in the capital, Dhaka, and 90 other cities and towns. opening the way for mass corruption charges
against him, said Maria Luisa Villarama, assisatant clerk of court. The court originally ruled
March 2 in another unanimous vote to back the
legitimacy of President Gloria Macapagal Arroy
and reject Estrada's claim to the office. It also

Estrada appealed the decision but Tuesday's rul

Not quite one-third of the fleet — 68 cruise ships — were responsible for the bulk of the problem.

Most of the cases are mi-nor and accidental, says Michael Crye, president of the International Council of Cruise Lines, which repre-sents the \$15.5 billion cruise

Overall, the industry is performing well, he said, when compared to other maritime and land-based polluters.


"Last year it was like something was missing," said Beth Coleman, UK's lone senior. "Making it to region was what we had worked all year for. The hard work from last year paid off."

Russia fights for the rights of television station

Flag burning, a T-shirt with the Confederate flag, school uni-Flag burning, a T-shirt with the Confederate flag, school uni-forms: These are the most recent controversies that involve freedom of speech in our country. While many disagree on what exactly con-stitutes freedom of speech, no one can disagree that people have a ba-sic right to express grievances about their government. Obviously, citizens must know what their government is doing in

order to declare these grievances. And this is another right that Americans take for granted: the freedom of the press. Regardless of your views on American media, one of its most important and basic functions is to act as "watchdog" over the government; it makes our government accountable for its actions. Unfortunately, this essential right of government accountability is being threatened in Russia. Currently, there is only one independent television station in Russia, NTV. Gazprom, a state-controlled energy monopoly belong the Datin side is besides to select the critical reports. Vladimir Putin's part. Gazprom, a state-controlled energy monopoly chaired by a Putin aide, is hoping to get its hands on the station. Tuesday, it planned to announce itself as the majority owner and replace the board of directors. While Gazprom claims that it is only interested in preserving the financial interests of the station, citizens are crying "foul" over this conflict of interest.

On Saturday, 20,000 people convened in Pushkin Square in Moscow to protest the imminent takeover. Politicians, TV stars, rock stars and a world-champion gymnast staged a concert to pressure Putin to give up its financial and legal campaign against NTV.

The mere fact that this many people could come together to support this cause makes evident how important the cause is. During the past decade, these protests have become more and more rare due to governmental instability and economic problems.

If the Russian people can come together despite their many hard-

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
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
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
