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Seventy-four Students Not From Kentucky

Report has been given out by the registrar of the University of Kentucky that of the approximately 1,300 students enrolled in the institution this year, only seventy-four have been registered from outside Kentucky. Twenty-four states, including Kentucky, and two foreign countries, Russia and Australia, are represented in the student body.

According to the registrar's books the number of students enrolled from other states is as follows: Indiana, twelve; Ohio, twelve; Tennessee, five; Oklahoma, four; Virginia, four; Florida, four; North Carolina, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Texas and Georgia, three each; Alabama, California, Illinois and West Virginia, two each; Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Mississippi and Washington, one each; and the two foreign countries, Russia and Australia, one each. One hundred and seven Kentucky counties have sent representatives, no students being recorded from Adair, Allen, Clinton, Greenup, Jackson, Leslie, Lyon, Martin, Metcalfe, Monroe, Owsley, Powell and Rowan counties.

Alumni Are Organizing Throughout the State

As a result of a movement on the part of the Alumni Association of the University of Kentucky for organizing alumni clubs in every county in Kentucky, to which former students as well as graduates of the University may be admitted as members, about seventy-five graduates and more than two hundred former students now residing in Louisville and Jefferson county, met at the Louisville Public Library on Friday, December 3, and reorganized the Louisville Alumni Club.

The club sent in a request to the Athletic Council of the University that both men and women's basketball teams should play games in Louisville this spring and that there should be a football game there next fall. The football game has already been arranged, though no definite date has been set for the contest.

A similar meeting was held by the Lexington Alumni Club, December 11, at the Phoenix Hotel, at which time the club was reorganized, officers elected and plans made for cooperating with the general Alumni Association. The Association has an eligible membership list of about 16,000, according to the new membership basis, as compared with only 2000 eligibles by the old basis.

Faculty Club Discusses Dangers of Over Organization

The Faculty Club of the University of Kentucky, which was organized last March, in order that faculty members might meet to discuss important questions affecting the University and enjoy a social hour together, held its first meeting in November and elected Prof. A. A. Miller president and Enoch Grehan secretary.

A second meeting was held Monday, Nov. 13, in the Little Theatre, White Hall, to discuss over-organization in the University. Dr. P. P. Boyd, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, read a paper on the subject and Dr. Granville Terrell led the discussion, which was generally indulged.

Seven of Ten Ag. Entries Win in Poultry Show

Seven of the ten entries made by the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, at the Ohio Falls Fanciers' Association Poultry Show, which was held in Louisville during the week of December 7, came out winners according to the opinions of the judges. In the list of prizes were included three firsts, two thirds, one fourth and one fifth place ribbons.

The three first places were won by three of the four White Leghorns sent by the University, the other receiving fourth place. Other winnings of the University entries were: Ancona cock, third; Wyandotte cock, third; Wyandotte pullet, fifth. The educational exhibit sent to the show by the Poultry Department of the University attracted considerable attention among the exhibits of poultry foods and other displays.

A total of more than 1,000 birds, coming from all parts of Kentucky, and surrounding states, were competing for honors at the show.

Commercial Fraternity Installed for University

Delta Sigma Pi, the leading professional fraternity in commerce, has installed a chapter at the University of Kentucky and ten men have been initiated into the organization.

Pi Chi, the Kentucky local, petitioned Delta Sigma Pi last spring. Mr. H. G. Wright, national president of the fraternity, visited the University in order to investigate conditions here and a short time ago word was received by the local that their petition had been granted.

Freshmen Punished by Senior Court

A meeting of the freshmen boys was called in chapel Tuesday, Nov. 30, to discuss means of finding and punishing offenders who painted class numerals on several buildings and the fountain outside the Administration building. Messrs. Bell and Rodgers of the senior class asked the class to cooperate with them in stopping the custom of painting numerals on campus buildings and to assist in apprehending the guilty members of the class. Responsibility was placed on the class officers to produce the offenders.

The Nov. 30 edition of the Kernel contained an editorial urging the senior court to take action if the freshmen failed to do so, and to go to any length to learn the culprit. The freshmen were also urged to divulge the name of the guilty boy. The editor of the Kernel Nov. 10 reported the fact that the freshmen had been duly punished by being compelled to remove the unsightly numerals, which were promptly rubbed off the various buildings upon which they had been painted, thus vindicating the dignity and maintaining the authority of the court.

The program is under the direction of Prof. Lampert, head of the Department of Music at the University, and Herndon Evans, manager of last year's Stroller production, is stage manager. The costumes and scenery are being designed and planned by Carol Saxe, head of the Art Department.

The annual Pan-Hellenic dance, the night of December 17, in the ball room of the Phoenix Hotel, was the last of the pre-holiday entertainments for the students.

Students' Loan Committee Reorganizes

The Student Loan Fund Committee of the University of Kentucky has recently been reorganized and is making plans for carrying forward its work the current session. Owing to the fact that more than half the fund has already been lent out, the committee feels that it will be necessary to increase the amount of the fund this year and it is now at work on plans whereby this end may be accomplished. The purpose of the fund is to help students who are in need of financial aid, to continue their education at the University of Kentucky.

Leland Author of Important Tax Work

Simeon E. Leland, assistant professor of Economics, University of Kentucky, has written a book on "Taxation in Kentucky," which has just been published under the auspices of the University as one of a series of monographs dealing with studies in economics and sociology put out by the institution for the benefit of students and others interested in such subjects.

The work is neither a history nor a criticism of the tax system of the state, but is primarily a study or discussion of the more important phases of taxation and tax reform in Kentucky as they have evolved out of the various systems of boards, commissions and agents which have functioned in the past. There are also special topical discussions dealing with the more important problems as applied to the State of Kentucky, of taxation and public finance, the general property tax, the inheritance tax, a proposed income tax and the project of centralized administration, besides a study of the relationship between state and Federal taxation as one of the important factors affecting tax reform.

Professor Leland has made a close investigation and survey of the tax system of Kentucky as compared with other commonwealths, and it is only after such observation and study that he has put his work before the public. Persons interested in this study of the tax problems of Kentucky may obtain copies of the book by applying to Wellington Patrick, head of Extension Department, University of Kentucky.

University in Need of Legislative Relief

Governor Morrow will be asked to include consideration of measures for the relief of the University of Kentucky in his call if he decides to order a special session of the legislature for good road purposes, as suggested last week by Lieutenant Governor Thurston Ballard.

President McVey's reports supply sufficient evidence that money is urgently and immediately needed to bring the physical plant of the University to conformity with the growth of the student body. Many students were turned away last September because the University could not accommodate them.

52 Girls Initiated Into Y. W. C. A. Work

Fifty-two girls were initiated into the Y. W. C. A. of the University of Kentucky, Sunday, November 21, at Patterson Hall. The girls, dressed in white and each carrying a lighted candle, marched slowly in to soft strains of music, and signed their names to the Y. W. C. A. book, making the service the more impressive.

More than seventy-five girls signified their intention of becoming members of the Y. W. C. A. but not all of that number were able to be present for the initiation services.
