President McVey appointed a committee to make a study of the Smith-Towner Bill, write a brief outline of the bill and its probable effect on the educational interests of the State, and submit it to the Senate for their consideration. The following persons were appointed members of the Committee: Messrs. Baker (Chairman), Rhoads and Wood.

The President stated that the capacity of the Chapel was 600 and that it would not accommodate the freshman and sophomore classes. He asked the Senate to advise what modification should be made in the Chapel exercises, so that all students who are required to attend may be accommodated. On motion it was voted to appoint a committee to make a study and report at the next meeting. The committee is as follows: Messrs. Melcher (Chairman), Roberts, Johnson, Lafferty, Boyd, Colonel Freeman and Miss Simrall.

MINUTES OF THE SENATE NOVEMBER 8, 1920

The Senate met in the Campus Theater Monday, November 8, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of the meeting of October 11 and Council minutes of October 8, 15, 22 and 29 were read and approved.

The report of the Committee on Smith-Towner Bill and the Kenyon Bill was read and after some discussion, it was voted that a Department of Education, with a secretary in the President's Cabinet, would be for the best interests of education. President McVey requested the committee in charge to prepare a referendum, to be sent to all the members of the Senate, to request that they vote 'yes' or 'no' on all questions raised and return to the chairman, so that the vote may be tabulated and given in.

The Senate voted to approve the request of the Extension Committee, to offer high school work by correspondence. The course of study submitted was approved and the Committee authorized to make such changes in the course as may be necessary to meet the conditions. Following is a list of the courses authorized:
