Economics Department Graduates Are Honored

The young woman in question is Mrs. Pauline Park Wilson, who is now nursery school assistant at Columbia University. The quotation came from an accurately prophetic annual, published at the university in 1924. And continuing the record of achievement (attention, freshmen! Remember the parable of success given at the Y tapers the other evening?), one finds this: "Strollers (3); President Woman's League (4); Woman's Administrative Council; Home Economics club; Y. W. C.
