"Hate State" Update

This is a listing of groups boycotting Colorado which amended its state constitution on Nov.3, 1992, to ban any discussion of civil rights for homo/bisexuals (Amendment 2).

Cancellation of conventions alone since Nov.3 has cost Colorado over \$10 million in lost tourist revenues.

-City of Atlanta: voted to not use taxpayer money for city business trips to Colorado. Atlanta hosts the 1996 Olympics and the Olympic HQ is in Colorado Springs. Attempts underway to move Int'l. Olympic Committee. Philadelphia, San Francisco and other cities are expected to follow suit with heavy pressure for the Conference of U.S. Mayors to endorse the boycott.

-AmfAR (American Foundation for AIDS Research): canceled Aspen fundraiser -Nat. Council for Social Studies: canceled 1994 Denver convention (loss of potential \$4 million/ 4000 attendees)

-American Law Library Association: canceled 1998 Denver convention (loss of 5000 attendees)

-Coalition of Labor Union Women: canceled 1994 Denver conference (loss of 1500 attendees)

-XChange: publishing firm with \$5 million annual profits canceled move of its headquarters to Ft. Collins, CO

-Laurel Entertainment, Inc.: chose Utah over Colorado for the filming of Stephen King's "The Stand" because of A2. Loss of at least 36 million.

-National Education Association: canceled Colorado Springs meeting of 450 top educators

-Women's Sports Foundation: abandoned plans to relocate from NYC to Colorado Springs for new HQ for 300,000 member/

Contact Your Legislator Now!!

Right wing extremists are calling and writing state legislators to pass a constitutional amendment to undo the Wasson Supreme Court case which guarantees the right of privacy and equal protection to Kentuckians regardless of their sexual orientation.

Legislators need to hear from the majority of Kentuckians who don't want their privacy rights taken away. Call 1-800-372-7181 and leave a message for one or more legislators. Write to: Legislative Offices, Capital Annex, Frankfort, KY 40601.

When you call, you will be asked for your name, address and phone number as well as your message. Your message can be a simple, "I support the Supreme Court Wasson case on privacy" or "I'm opposed to a constitutional amendment that violates Kentuckians' right to privacy as decided in the Wasson case."

Do not leave a message for all representatives and senators. Those messages are placed on a large bulletin board and seldom read by legislators. Messages for specific legislators go to their desks.

Kentucky Fairness Alliance Forms

In October, a group of Kentucky's leading lesBigay activists and leaders gathered in Frankfort to discuss the building right-wing backlash against the Wasson Supreme Court decision. Out of this meeting has formed the Kentucky Fairness Alliance, a "statewide, non-partisan alliance of individuals and organizations dedicated to promoting equality for all people regardless of sexual orientation; advocating the adoption by local and state legislative bodies and governments, of legislation and executive orders which guarantee privacy rights and the equal protection of the laws to lesbian, gay and bisexual people; educating the public about the lesbian, gay and bisexual community; facilitating the passage of information between local and state-wide efforts; and supporting local efforts which are consistent with the goals of the Alliance" (mission statement). An interim steering committee of five volunteers and five people chosen to represent the Commonwealth's different regions was also determined at a subsequent November meeting. Faced with highly organized and well-funded right-wing anti-gay groups, the KFA promises to be a vital player in the protection of lesBigay rights in Kentucky. Initial meetings are forging links between P-FLAG, Louisville's Fairness Campaign, Fairness of Lexington, GLSO and many more groups. For more information, contact Keith at (606) 266-3934.

Homo Holidays: Domestic Travel

Overlooked Opinions, a market surveying service targeting America's 25 million gays and lesbians, has found that homosexuals are far more likely to travel each year than our heterosexual sisters and brothers. As summer again approaches, our readers may be interested in a listing of some traditional lesBigay tourist locales. There is also an International Gay Travel Association which includes several local travel agencies. The IGTA can be reached at 1-(800) 448-8550.

1. Key West, FL: #1 domestic travel

1. Key West, FL: #1 domestic travel destination in 1990 according to the IGTA. This island town south of the Florida mainland has welcomed authors including Ernest Hemingway as well as hordes of gay tourists visiting its beaches, bars and bed

& breakfast inns.

2. San Francisco, CA: The "Promised Land" to many lesBigay folk, SF's Castro District was an early center of gay political activism and the city as a whole has hundreds of bars, great restaurants, bookstores set among SF's beauty. The nearby Russian River area hosts many lesBigay campgrounds and beautiful natural scenery.

3. Provincetown, MA: "P-town" sits at the tip of Cape Cod and is a summer mecca for lesBigay beachgoers and a large artist colony. Hets, homos and bis comfortably mix together in this town where finding a man skipping by in drag as Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz is not

altogether too uncommon.

4. Northhampton, MA: Located near Amherst's Univ. of Massachusetts in the rolling Berkshire Mtns., Northhampton's recent fame has come from its reputed ratio that 1/7 of all women in the charming college town are lesbians. Since a 20/20 news story on the town, more than a few womyn have detoured thru Northhampton and found it worth the drive. Besides, having been there, I'll recommend the bagels!


5. Several large cities' "gay districts"

attract many including:

New York's Greenwich Village with its thriving community and lesbian block parties; Los Angeles area with West Hollywood (famed as the only city with an openly gay MAJORITY!) and Laguna Beach; Washington, DC's Dupont Circle area; New Orleans' French Quarter where wantonness and depravity are merely a Louisiana tradition; Atlanta's Midtown; Chicago's New Town and Miami Beach.
6. Some smaller towns host artists' colonies and large gay communities such as Asbury Park, NJ; Rehoboth Beach, DE; New Hope, PA; Ogunquit, ME; Asheville, NC; and Saugatuck, MI.

7. One of the biggest gay events in the US annually is the Hotlanta River Expo taking place the first weekend in August when thousands of gay men and women descend on the Chattahoochee River with rafts and then retire to Atlanta's nightlife for the evening.

8. Several organizers of the popular women's music festivals that occur in various states have also branched into the travel industry with Olivia Records (800) 631-6277 and Robin Tyler Productions (818) 893-4075 involved in cruises. RSVP Cruises offer similar cruises for gay men thru the IGTA, etc. Also, Womentrek (206) 325-4772 offers all-woman safaris and cycling tours of exotic foreign countries such as Tanzania and Nepal. The Lexington Fairness Campaign, birthed in a year of revival and accomplishment for our community, closed the last month of a busy 1992 with two goodwill outreach activities and plans for the first of the new year.

Holiday Parade Banner: Following up on our presence in the 4th of July Parade, volunteers painted and hung a banner from the front of The Bar Complex the evening before the Dec. 5 Holiday Parade. This banner wished Lexington a Season's Greetings from "our family." Early in the morning, a small but devoted group braved the cold to post handbills with the same message on kiosks and telephone poles along the parade route.

Gay Apparel Project: Again, with the cooperation of The Bar and the Unitarian-Universalist Church, Fairness organized the 1st Annual Gay Apparel Project. NEWS SHORTS



CANBERRA, AUSTRALIA: Following on a similar change in Canada in October, the Australian government has dropped its ban on homosexuals in the military. This change makes the USA and Great Britain as two of the few 1st World countries to still prohibit homosexuals in the armed forces.

CINCINNATI: The Cincinnati City Council passed in a 7-2 vote an ordinance banning discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

CINCINNATI: Proctor and Gamble Co. has adopted an anti-discrimination policy for gays and lesbians. This company change adds to the number of companies in Lexington with such a policy.

ICELAND: The Parliament of Iceland unanimously passed a resolution calling for an end to anti-gay discrimination in October. A committee has been formed to make changes which may include legalization of gay marriages, which would make Iceland the second country in the world to do so. (Denmark is the first.)

WASHINGTON, DC: Queer Nation staged a kissin at Sen. Sam Nunn's DC office to protest his homophobic opposition to gays in the military.

NEW YORK: Respected NYC Schools Chancellor Joseph Fernandez has suspended the Queens District 24 school board for refusing to implement the "Children of the Rainbow" curriculum teaching respect for various family structures including the controversial gay/lesbian parents section. Other NYC districts opted to compromise by introducing the g/l families sections to older grades (5th or 6th) but the Queens area refused altogether. Vocal protests continue from the ousted school board and parents who fear that their children are being "recruited" and will be taught the particulars of anal and oral sex. Fernandez called the battle "emotional and draining" in the face of death threats but also commented that "a lot of my kids come from gay relationships and lesbian relationships...everyone doesn't come from a traditional family structure." (Lexington Herald-Leader story, 12/9/1992)

NETHERLANDS: Openly gay Antoine Bodar was ordained as a Roman Catholic priest by Dutch Bishop Henri Bomers on Sept. 26. The Vatican has yet to make a response.


CHARLOTTE, NC: The City Council did not pass an ordinance that would have protected s from discrimination in housing and jobs in a 4-7 vote.

AUSTRALIA: The government of the Northern Territories has added the word "sexuality" to its anti-discrimination law after lobbying by lesBigay groups in Darwin and Alice Springs.

ATLANTA: The Fulton Co., GA, Board of Commissioners voted unanimously on Aug. 19 to add sexual orientation to its Equal Employment Opportunity Policy.

OMAHA, NE: An exhibit of a portion of the NAMES Project AIDS Quilt included over 75 panels that have been submitted since the International Showing in Washington, DC, in October. The Quilt now contains over 26,000 panels or less than 12% of the total known AIDS deaths in the USA.

washington, DC: The US Supreme Court refused on Dec. 8 to overturn a lower court decision on Dusty Pruitt's case concerning her discharge from the military for openly acknowledging her homosexuality. In essence, the Supreme Court upheld that the military must prove its discrimination is rationally based and not due to societal disapproval.



I hope everybody had a great holiday! Our Christmastime with Alex at two was great...especially after my mother got over the fact that Santa brought Alex the Fischer Price "Play Kitchen" instead of the "Work Bench with Circular Saw." I didn't understand the problem until I jokingly said, "Don't worry Mom, Alex isn't GAY" and she said "Are you sure?" Just when I thought I had her trained...

Well, here is the rest of my December article about ideas for surviving gay parenthood. I've experienced both creating a family by becoming involved with someone who has children already and also by this process with Ann. These situations have some different aspects so some of these ideas are exclusively for one and some for both:

1. Find or create support groups. Get together with and without the kids. Exchange books, clothes, nursery equipment, toys, frustrations and joys.

2. Realize that each parent will develop a different style of parenting and don't try to make the other conform to yours. (Easily said...)

4. Stay active in the gay community. It's easy to lose this side of yourself and feel like some politically correct Betty Crocker.

5. Play women's music loud and often. If you can learn to appreciate Raffi, the kids can learn to like Cris Williamson. (Ed.-men might try the latest soundtrack to Les Miserables or Elton John.)

6. Find safe sitters and use them. (We swap "at home" laundry facilities for sitting with our friend Lonnie.)

7. Don't get overinvolved in the relationship between your partner and

the father of the children (hindsight is 20/20).

8. Let him take the kids on the weekend without complaint (i.e. sleep in and enjoy it!)

9. Do not criticize the "ex" in front of the children.

10. Don't over commit yourself (i.e. change careers, move interstate, start school and buy a home for renovation all at once!)

11. Draw up a parenting agreement (esp. if this is a Donor Insemination situation) that outlines who gets "custody" if you separate. Does someone pay child support?


12. Don't underestimate the expense of the undertaking. We are constantly amazed at the sheer expense of formula, diapers, sniffle medicine and shots.
