#### Memorandum for President McVey

My dear President McVey:

For your information and record, I am giving you the Governor's record of appointment of the members of the Board of Trustees of the University as constituted after the passage of the new law in 1918. I obtained this information to-day from Mr. Carr, Assistant Secretary of State.

The Governor's record shows that Mr. Lyle, Mr. Gordon, Mr. Stoll and Senator Fromen were appointed for a period of six years which would make their terms expire in 1924; Mr. Johnston, Mr. Ernst, and Mr. Wells were appointed for a period of four years, making theri terms expire in 1922; Mr. Grady, Mr. McKee, Mr. Turner and Mr. Elliston were appointed for a period of two years, making their tersm expire in 1920.

All these men with the exception of Mr. Grady and Mr. McKee were appointed on April 27, 1918. Mr. Grady was appointed on May 15, 1919. No record was obtained regarding the appointment of Mr. McKee, but his appointment was earlier in the year of 1919.

It will be noted that the distribution of the periods is strictly in accordance with the law, namely that one alumni member, one member of the State Board of Agriculture and two distinguished citizens of the Commonwealth shall be appointed each biennium in the even years.

The question might be raised as to the date of expiration of the term of office of the members of the State Board of Agriculture -- whether their term of office as members of the Board of Trustees is coterminous with the expiration of their term as members of the Board of Agriculture. In making the appointments it is evident that the Governor considered that such was not the case for he appointed both Captain Rash and Senator Froman for periods extending beyond the expiration of their term as members of the Board of Agriculture. The Attorney General might be called upon to settle the point, but it simplifies matters to assume that the Governor's appointment of Mr. Rash and Senator Froman should stand until the end of their regularly appointed periods as members of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Grehan, former Secretary of the Board of Trustees, informed me that no statement from the Governor was obtained at the time these appointments were made. It was, therefore, necessary to consult the records at Frankfort in order to obtain the information.

I desire to suggest that in future catalogs, the personnel of the Board be printed as classified on the preceding page, the dates of the expiration of term of office of Board of Agriculture members being also given.

AN ACT creating the position of member ex-officio of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

- 1. That the position of member ex-officio of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky is hereby created.
- 2. That the president emeritus of said University shall, so long as ne may live, or so long as he may desire, hold said position and upon his death or resignation the position shall be automatically abolished.
- 3. That said member shall perform all duties now required of other members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and shall in all respects have the same power and authority now vested in other members of said board.
- 4. All laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Approved March 20, 1920.

### Chapter 42 Acts of the General Assembly for 1920

An Act to create a Board of Trustees for the government, administration and control of the University of Kentucky; providing for its appointment, and repealing previous laws relating to same subject.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

1. (a) The government, administration and control of the University of entucky is hereby vested in a Board of Trustees, constituted and appointed as follows:

The Governor of Kentucky, who shall be chairman of the Board, the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Commissioner of Agriculture, Labor and Statistics, who shall be ex-officio members, and twelve men, discreet, intelligent and prudent, who shall be appointed by the Governor of Kentucky. Four of each shall be appointed each biennium for a term of six years and until their successors are appointed. One of the four so appointed shall be a member of the State Board of Agriculture, one shall be appointed from among three alumni nominated to the Governor by the alumnic of the University, and the other two shall be distinguished citizens of the Commonwealth, one of whom shall be appointed from each of the political parties having the right to appoint a member of the State Board of Election Commissioners. With the exception of the members of the Bpard of Trustees appointed upon the nomination of the alumni of the University, no two members of the Board of Trustees, who are appointed by the Governor, shall be residents of any one county in Kentucky. All appointments as members of the Board of Trustees by the Governor shall be made during the month of January in the even years. The Board of Trustees of the University shall prescribe the methods by which the alumni of the University shall make the nomination to the Governor of the three persons from whom the alumni members of the Board of Trustees shall be appointed. Each alumnus shall be permitted to vote, but no alumnus shall be permitted to vote for the nomination of alumni trustees in the year in which he has received his degree. No member of the Board of Trustees shall be held to be a public officer by reason of his membership on said board. Provided, however, as soon as this act shall become effective, the terms of the present members of the Board of Trustees of the University shall expire and the Governor shall appoint twelve members of the Board of Trustees, four of whom shall serve until January, 1920, four of whom shall serve until January, 1922, and four of whom shall serve until January, 1924, and until their successors are appointed. In making said appointments the Governor shall appoint for

each of said terms one member of the State Board of Agriculture, one alumnus of the institution and two distinguished citizens, one of whom shall be members of each of the political parties in the State having the right to name a member of the State Board of Election Commissioners. In case of vacancies by resignation, removal or death, the Governor shall fill such vacancies in the same manner as provided for the appointment of members of the Board.

(b) The Board of Trustees of the University shall meet at least four times a year, as follows:

On the Tuesday preceding the regular annual commencement of the University, on the third Tuesday in September, on the second Tuesday in December and on the first Tuesday in April of each year.

Special meetings of the Board, however, may be called by the chairman or by any three members of the Board, upon giving ten days' notice of the meeting in writing to each member of the Board, but at such special meetings the business to be transacted shall be specified in the notice of the meeting.

- (c) The Board of Trustees shall annually elect an Executive Committee of five, which Executive Committee shall have such powers as may be delegated to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall submit to the Board of Trustees at each meeting, for its consideration and approval, a complete record of its proceedings, provided, however the authority of the Board of Trustees to revise the acts of the Executive Committee shall not extend to the rejection of any valid or any authenticated expenditure of money by said Executive Committee.
- (d) The Board of Trustees shall have power to elect a vice-chairman and such other officers as it may deem wise, and shall have power to make such by-laws, rules and regulations not inconsistent herewith, as it may deem proper.
- (e) The chairman of the board shall appoint at the meeting in June of each year an Extension Committee consisting of four members of the Board of Trustees in addition to hamself to advise with the Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Director of Extension on matters pertaining to the Extension Service in the State.
- 2. Whereas, it is deemed for the best interests of the University and of the State that the Board of Trustees be re-organized at once so that the State may be better served, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this act shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, as required by law.

3. Section 2 of Chapter 20 of the Acts of 1916, beginning at page 150 of said published acts and continuing to Section 3 on page 154 of said Acts, and Section 15 of the Kentucky Statutes, Carroll's Edition 1903, which is all of Section 4636c Kentucky Statutes, Edition 1915, beginning with said section at the top of page 2361, and including all Sub-sections and sub-sub-sections to Subsection 16 on page 2362, are hereby repealed. Sub-section 20 of Section 4636c, beginning on page 2363 and ending on page 2364, Subsection 22 of Section 4636c on page 2364, and Sub-section 24 of Section 4636c, beginning at the bottom of page 2364 and ending at the top of page 2365, are also repealed.

Minutes of the regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky for Tuesday, June 1, 1920.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular quarterly session in the office of the President at the University at 12:00 o'clock, noon, Tuesday, June 1, 1920. (The April meeting of the Board having adjourned to meet on this date.) The following members were present: Superintendent George Colvin. T. L. Hornsby, Richard P. Ernst, Robert G. Gordon, J. R. Rash, P. P. Johnston, Jr., J. I. Lyle, Richard C. Stoll, James W. Turner, Rainey T. Wells, Frank McKee, and W. H. Grady. Frank L. McVey, President of the University and Wellington Patrick, Secretary of the Board were also present. In the absence of the Governor, Mr. Stoll presided.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board for April were approved as published. The minutes of the Executive Committee since the last meeting of the Board were approved as published.

(3) Report of the President. The President then presented to the Board a brief report of the work of the year, as follows:

The Board of Trustees

University of Kentucky

#### Gentlemen:

"In presenting this, my annual report to you, I shall confine my remarks to the main features. I shall present a brief or longer report, depending on the time at our disposal.

- "(a) Attendance. The total attendance for the year Of these, there were 1,068 candidates for has been 1,624. degrees. There were 32b women students - the largest enrollment of women that we have ever had at the University. It is also the largest total enrollment that we have ever had at the University with the exception of last year when we had with us the Students' Army Training Corps. Out of a total number of about twenty-five hundred high school graduates in the State, we get from those who go to college about 35%. We ought to have between eight and ten thousand students graduating from the high schools of the State instead of twenty-five hundred. We have in the State about 277 high schools and private academies that prepare students for We have had this year 107 out of the 120 counties college. represented. We also have students from 23 different states and one from a foreign country. One hundred forty-four students in the senior class are candidates for bachelor degrees. In spite of the comparatively small number of high school graduates in the State, however, the University has about all it can care for.
- "(b) The University Staff. The University staff as at present is composed as follows:

- "(c) Housing of Students. The situation with respect to housing and feeding students gets worse all of the time rather than better. Boarding houses are beginning to withdraw from the field. Prices are soaring higher and higher, and board is likely to go up for students as high as \$12, a week for next year.
- "(d) Teaching Problems. The situation with regard to teachers is growing increasingly difficult. Men are leaving us all the time, and we are finding it more and more difficult to fill their places. Instructors that we formerly paid \$1,200 to \$1,500 leave us and those who come in their places want \$1,800. We are relying on seniors and graduate students and our teaching staff is having to carry a heavier load.
- "(e) Student Conduct. Student conduct at the University has been very satisfactory. Hazing is gradually disappearing. Gambling gives us a little trouble, and I suppose that it will continue to do so to a certain extent.
- "(f) Scholarship. Scholarship in the student body has been very satisfactory. A large number have maintained a standing of 2.7. Over 5.9% of our seniors have attained a standing of over 2.7.
- "(g) Research and Publication. Research and publication is improving but is by no means what it ought to be. The Experiment Station staff has been doing considerable publication work.
- "(h) Miscellaneous Activities. There are a good many miscellaneous activities on the campus that may be mentioned. Excellent work is being done in mining, but more equipment and more help are needed. Outside lecturers have been given in greater number. Extension courses are showing a gratifying growth. The growth of certain departments has been marked, noticeably in Economics and Sociology, Art, Music, Botany, Zoology, Romance Languages, Mathematics, Anatomy and Physiology, and Geology. Publicity work as carried on through the Department of Journalism bids fair to be of service to the University. Art exhibits and concerts have occupied a larger place in University life. The campus playhouse has scored a decided initial success. Matriculation lectures required of all freshmen were voted a success generally by the students themselves. Departmental

clubs and honor societies have increased, showing a healthy attempt to make affairs of the 'main tent' compète with the 'side shows'. The combined courses are attracting students. Certain new courses like the Phychology of Advertising, the laboratory work in Physiology, and the new courses in Bacteriology are deserving of notice. The program in physical education is developing. Instramural sports, first aid courses, out door sports for women, high school tournaments, all record progress. The Reserve Officers' Training Course is being developed under the efficient guidance of Captain Tucker. The Red Cross work has proven very successful. The Model School has had a successful year and an able teaching corps.

"We need badly a museum. Kentucky is losing every day a lot of valuable things in the way of paintings and fine historical material that are going to museums out of the State simply because we have no place to put them. We need badly a building for agricultural engineering. The Law School has made good progress during the year. It is the best year that we have ever had. It has a library of 10,000 volumes and an enrollment of about 100."

(5) Report of Committee on Engineering Equipment. The report of the Committee on the Purchase of Engineering Equipment was made by Mr. Lyle, as follows:

## Report of Committee on Engineering Equipment to the Honorable Board of Trustees University of Kentucky

This Committee wishes to make the following report:

War Department Equipment. It was found that very little, if any, equipment could be secured from the War Department. Mr. Grady made a trip to Dayton, Ohio, and investigated the situation there. Professor Anderson and Mr. Lyle investigated the conditions in New York and Washington. The equipment which the War Department had for sale consisted very largely of special tools and some of it had seen hard usage. The majority of the tools, however, that were suitable for the University had been taken by Wisconsin, Purdue and other universities who had appropriations available and who were able to act immediately upon this material being placed on the market, before we even had appropriation made by the Legislature.

Aeroplane Motors. We believe that we have procured motors, one Liberty and one Gnome, which have been used in aeroplane service but which are splendid for educational purposes. Certified check has been sent the War Department, and while we are absolutely sure we have procured the Liberty we have not yet been advised that we are to receive the latter. These motors have cost us \$450, while if they had been purchased new they would have cost about \$10,000. We think we may be able to get a Hispanola at \$300. This is more expensive than the other two but it is very doubtful if one can be found that the War Department will be willing to let us have.

This Committee has approved and sent to the Purchasing Agent requisitions for tools consisting of lathes, dynamometer, millers, drills, and electrical equipment, amounting to \$7,156.65.

Procedure of Purchasing. In this connection Dean Anderson has procured bids and specifications for tools in accordance with the list which has been approved by the Committee, and these prices and specifications are submitted

to the other members of the Committee and, if approved, requisitions are then made to the Business Agent for their purchase.

Availability of Funds. The Furchasing Agent has written a letter to Doctor McVey, copy of which is attached hereto, in which he brought up the question of whether or not any of this money is available for expenditures previous to July 1, and that only \$30,000 of it would be available before July 1, 1921. This is not in accordance with the understanding of the Committee at the last meeting of the Board. The Committee wishes to ask your advice on this point and we strongly urge if it is possible to so arrange it that the full \$60,000 be made available to complete the scheme as outlined below.

Changes in Plant. Although it was probably not contemplated in the original motion appointing this Committee that its scope should be extended beyond that of purchasing the equipment and the proper expenditure of the \$60,000 appropriation, still this Committee has seen fit to make a thorough survey of the entire Engineering Department and wishes to ask your authority to carry out the following recommendations:

- 1. To convert the new building built by the War Department, which is approximately 40 by 240 feet, into a modern machine and wood shop, moving all the present machine shop and wood shop equipment from Mechanical Hall to this building.
- 2. Convert the present wood shop into an engineering library, assembly and lecture hall, particularly to be used for study hall for the freshmen and sophomore classes. To use the \$4,000 included in the budget for tool room for fitting up this library and assembly room.
- 3. To move the work shop and equipment now used by Mr. Whipple to the building in the rear of his residence, allowing him to use such part of the basement of the Science Building as is necessary for store room and for any work that could be performed there without objectionable noise. Investigation on the part of the Board representatives of this Committee revealed the fact that there is ample room in the basement of the Science Building for any work of this character. There is some question as to whether the one machine tool which he has could be used without causing objectionable noise and for that reason we recommend that

this machine be used in the building referred to above.

- 4. Remove the old switchboard in steam laboratory and replace with modern board in new electric laboratory.
- 5. Install automobile laboratory in room at north end of present building and now used for electrical laboratory, removing the two partitions from the electrical laboratory store room and fit this up as automobile accessories instruction room.
- 6. Raise the skylight and provide proper natural ventilation for present wash room.
- 7. Build brick charging floor and coke bin for foundry, providing same with hand-operated elevator.
- 8. Build new concrete walk from wash room to new machine shop.
- 9. Use old photometry building as store room for new shop supplies.
- 10. Remove wooden structure at rear of testing of Materials Laboratory now used for storing pipe and fittings.
- 11. A rrange room connecting present wood shop with boiler room for wood shop storage room.

Plans are herewith submitted showing rearrangement of new machine and wood working shops with the exception that the tool room and the instrument shop will be combined. Plans for other changes have not as yet been made.

New Tools. The Committee has carefully selected the new tools required and has had a preliminary survey made of the old tools, and it seems wise to repair many of these old tools, putting in new bearings and converting them, as far as possible, into electrically driven, up-to-date machines. We find that many of these tools can be so converted at a cost very much less than new tools.

Owing to the scarcity of labor and the high price of same it would seem that a good many of the students could be used throughout the summer under the direction of instructors in making these repairs and changes and the work done at very much less expense than if let out by contract or done with regularly employed labor.

Revision of Budget. Your Committee strongly recommends that the budget that has been approved by the Executive Committee be revised so as to admit of these changes and for this work we estimate as follows:

Shop Instructor. The Committee finds that we have good practical instructors in the foundry and forge shop and the budget that has been approved by the Executive Committee has provided for a first-class pattern maker. It also seems that the instructors in charge of the machine shop while efficient from the standpoint of discipline and general work cannot be used as tool makers nor are they capable of doing the finest and most delicate instrument work and it seems to the Committeen that such a man should be provided and, if possible, the \$2,000 recommended by Dean Anderson for such a man should be appropriated.

On motion, duly seconded, the report of the Committee was approved, with the following provisions: (a) That the item of \$500 for pavement be omitted; (b) that the item of salary for a tool maker be left to the Executive Committee; (c) that \$5,000 be added to the budget as at present organized; (d) that the amount of expenditure for equipment be limited to \$30,000 as a maximum for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1920, unless instructions to the contrary shall be received from the Executive Committee.

(6) Election of Officers. On motion by Mr. Colvin, duly, seconded, the following members of the Executive Committee were declared reelected as members of the Committee: Richard C. Stoll, P. P. Johnston, Jr., Robert G. Gordon, Richard P. Ernst, and Rainey T. Wells. After due nomination (Mr. Lyle presiding) Mr. Stoll was declared elected as vice-chairman of the Board. After due nomination, W. A. McDowell, President of Phoenix and Third National Bank, was elected as Treasurer. Mr. Patrick requested permission

to withdraw from the meeting during the election of a Secretary. On being recalled, he was informed that he had been duly nominated and reelected Secretary.

- (7) Budget for the Fiscal Year, 1920-1921. The budget for the fiscal year 1920-1921 was taken up and discussed. On motion duly seconded, it was approved as presented, subject to such minor changes as may be necessary, and subject also to the changes indicated in the action recorded above on the report of the Committee on Engineering Equipment.
- (8) Committee on Inspection. Mr. Stoll suggested to the Board that each member of the Board ought to familiarize himself with the situation regarding the University plant and the work of the University. On motion by Mr. Grady, duly seconded, and unanimously adopted, the chair was authorized to appoint a committee on inspection whose duty it should be to go over the plant and report to the next meeting of the Board. The chair appointed Mr. Grady, Mr. Colvin and Mr. McKee.
- (9) Changes in College of Arts and Sciences. President McVey presented to the Board a communication from Dean P. P. Boyd making certain recommendations for changes in the college of Arts and Sciences. On recommendation by President McVey a motion was offered, seconded, and unanimously adopted, making the following changes:
- (a) That the name of the Department of Art and Design be changed to the Department of Art.
- (b) That Assistant Professor Minna McLeod Beck be promoted to an associate professorship with the title of acting head of the Department of Art.
- (c) That Dr. M. Scherago, instructor in Bacteriology be promoted to an assistant professorship in Bacteriology for one year, with the title of acting head of the Department of Bacteriology.
- (d) That Assistant Professor J. S. Cleland's title be changed from assistant professor of Sociology to associate professor of Economics, the appointment to be for a period of three years.
- (e) That Dr. Harry Best be reappointed as professor of Sociology for a period of three years.
- (f) That Assistant Professor W. E. Butt be promoted to associate professor of History and Political Science, for a period of three years.

He indicated that J. W. Carr, Phd. D., had been selected for the work. Mr. Colvin stated to the Board that in his opinion the Board of Trustees of the University should pass on the appointment. On motion, duly seconded, the appointment was approved.
- (12) Resignation of G. T. Wyatt. Mr. John Crenshaw of Cadiz, Kentucky, was permitted to appear before the Board to make a statement relative to Mr. G. T. Wyatt. Mr. Thomas Cooper, Dean of the College of Agriculture, and Mr. Thompson Bryant, Assistant Director of Extension, also appeared before the Board relative to Mr. Wyatt. Thereupon, Mr. Crenshaw for Mr. Wyatt presented Nr. Wyatt's resignation as District Agent in the Extension Division of the University. The resignation is as follows:
