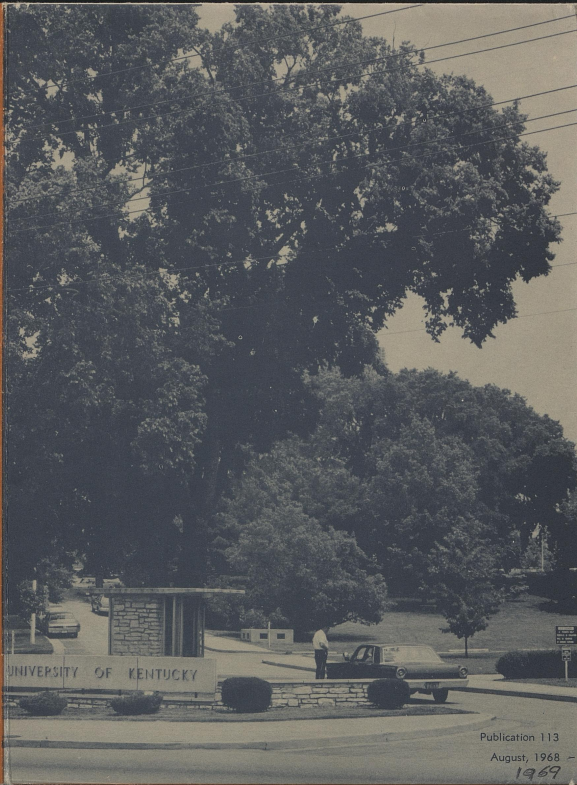

A BRIEF HISTORY

Kentucky's concept of a state university dates back to the year 1865 when Kentucky University became one of the nation's first land grant institutions to be established under the Morrill Act.

Passed by both houses and Congress in June, 1862, the Morrill Act provided federal aid, in the form of land grants to the various states, to be used for the establishment of colleges which would, "without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts . . ."

In 1878, when the people of Kentucky decided to establish a "State institution, free from all ecclesiastical entanglements or control," the Agricultural and Mechanical College was separated from Kentucky University and reestablished on land given by Lexington and Fayette County.

In order to provide a separate campus for the new College, the City of Lexington donated its 50-acre fairground and park, an area which had been used as a bivouac area for Union troops during the Civil War. Lexington and Fayette County together contributed \$60,000 for the construction of buildings, and James K. Patterson, first president of the University, even used his own personal savings to supplement the building fund.

Thirty years later, the State Legislature changed the name of the institution to State University, Lexington, Kentucky, and allocated additional funds for its support. In 1916, the name was changed to the one by which it is known today—The University of Kentucky.

PHYSICAL PLANT

The University of Kentucky is a small city in itself. It has its own post office, bookstore, radio station, newspaper, printing plant, cafeterias, theatre, library, police force and hospital. There are over 100 major buildings on the Lexington campus alone. The University community, including students, faculty and staff members and their families, numbers about 22,000.

PARKING

Visitors may park in those areas marked "Visitor" and in any areas with parking meters. Those parking in "Visitor" areas must display a properly validated guest pass in the left-front windshield of the locked vehicle. The guest pass may be obtained from the attendant at the main entrance to the University on South Limestone Street. Fees for use of parking meters are indicated on the meters themselves.

Parking areas designated as "A" areas are for the use of vehicles bearing "A" permits. Those areas designated as "B" areas may be used by vehicles displaying either "A" or "B" permits. "C" areas are for the use of "C" permit holders only, and may not be used by "A" and "B" permit holders.

Unless otherwise indicated, the maximum speed limit on University property is 15 miles per hour.

Any vehicular accidents on University property must be reported immediately to the Safety and Security Division of the University of Kentucky.



LIBRARIES

An important facet of the University is its library system composed of more than 1,330,000 volumes housed in the Margaret I. King Library and in the smaller, highly selective libraries of various colleges and departments.

These special libraries include the collections of the Agricultural Library and the Medical Center, as well as those of Architecture, Art and Music, the Biological Sciences, Chemistry and Physics, Education, Engineering, Geology, Law, Mathematics and Pharmacy.

Designated a regional depository for its documents by the United States government, the University of Kentucky library system offers an extensive collection of source materials, printed and manuscript, including complete runs of most major scientific serials. Among its special collections are a broad range of materials on Kentucky and Ohio Valley history, the works of numerous contemporary authors (including their original manuscripts), documents and literature on tobacco—a major factor in Kentucky's economy, and papers of such public figures as Henry Clay, Allen W. Barkley, A. O. Stanley and Jovett Shouse, records which provide a fascinating study of the details of political life in 19th and 20th Century America.

RESEARCH

The University of Kentucky Research Foundation received 391 awards during the fiscal year, 1967, its twenty-second year of service. These awards totalled more than 11 million dollars.

While research work during the Foundation's early years was primarily in the physical sciences, it now extends into education, the humanities and the social sciences as well. The Foundation presently adminis-

ters funds for 763 different research projects, distributed between 78 departments or divisions of the University.

Its current projects range from an appropriation for assisting the development program of a local school to an annual award of almost \$1,500,000 for the Tobacco and Health Research Program which now involves 31 UK Faculty Researchers from eight departments.
