Roseburg Moonlight School

One of the most wonderful experiences I have ever had was teaching the Roseburg Moonlight school. This school was successful beyond my most extravagant belief, but it took a lot of hard work to make it so.

When I was employed by Mr. Trulock, the trustee, to teach the day school, we agreed that I should teach a moonlight school also. During the first week in July, which was the week before the day school began, I visited every patron in the district, urging them to send their children and telling them how important it was to keep them in school. After discussing the day school, I told each patron about the moonlight school which I was planning to begin in August, and insisted that each attend the sessions as far as possible.
