The Faculty met at the usual hour.

Mr. Davis, the father of A. G. Davis, who was dismissed Nov. 8th, was present and made in substance the following statements in regard to his son, viz: That his son had been confined to his bed with fever since his dismissal but was improving now. That his son felt very severely the dishonor which he had brought on himself and now promised in the presence of Maj. Luster, never to drink again and to entirely reform if he ^{should} ~~could~~ be admitted to Collegiate privileges. Under the circumstances in the case, on motion of Dr. Peter, it was resolved to give A. G. Davis another opportunity to retrieve his character. The Pres. and Maj. Luster were appointed as a committee to take note of his conduct till the beginning of next term with a view to his re-admission. The Pres. was requested to reprimand privately Ramsey for not attending classes. The committee appointed to investigate Joe Lovel's case reported that they were unable to prove certainly that he had stolen some of his cartridges from the University; but felt well satisfied that such was the case.

It was then resolved that the general conduct of J. Lovel be reduced 20% for distributing cartridges for improper purposes among his fellow students; and also that he be publicly reprimanded.

On view of the fact that many young men get the permission of their parents to visit home during Christmas week the Pres. was authorized to grant furloughs to all such, when he thinks best.

Molyneux presented for himself and others a paper, a copy of which is given below, signed by himself and other members of the Foot Club. After hearing the paper, just mentioned, read it was resolved that no student be allowed to join said club without signing the paper. The following is a copy of the paper above mentioned.

Cline, ^{a student} of the College of Arts, has been teaching a class in Vocal Music in this college without the consent of the Faculty thereof, and Prof. Bailey having been, by the direction of the Board of Curators, appointed to the position of Prof. of Music by the Executive Committee it was resolved that the following resolution be sent Mr. Cline, viz: "Resolved that the Faculty inform Mr. Cline that no classes are authorized to be taught in this College except by consent of the Faculty, previously obtained, and that in accordance with this resolution his class in Music be discontinued from date."
