Atchison Kansas  
 June 30<sup>th</sup> 1861

My Dear Father  
 I have not received a letter from you since I last wrote, but suppose you have written and the letter not come to hand, owing to the disturbed condition of affairs in Missouri. You have doubtless heard of the burning of bridges on the North ~~of~~ Missouri and on the Pacific Rail Roads. The Hannibal and St Joseph Rail Road is still running and we received <sup>this morning</sup> for the first time since Friday last papers from St Louis - no mail matter has come since that time and I do not know when we will get any. Things are in a terrible condition in Missouri and a fight is every day expected and may have taken place before now. It is reported and I think it is true that Genl McCullough of the Confederate army at the head of fifteen thousand men is near the Missouri River. <sup>He</sup> comes if the report be true from Fort Smith about in <sup>the</sup> Western part of Arkansas. There are a thousand and one reports in circulation and one does not know what to give credence to. I have no later news than you will see in the newspapers and will consequently not give any of the rage rumors which we hear. The military occupy St Joseph and are arresting some of the best citizens in Buchanan County.
