Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, June 3, 1949.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:00 a.m., Friday, June 3, 1949. The following members were present: Governor Earle C. Clements, Chairman; E. E. Adams, Harper Gatton, T. H. Cutler, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Grover Creech, John C. Everett, Judge Harry F. Walters, R. P. Hobson, J. N. Smith and Guy A. Huguelet. Absent were: Judge R. C. Stoll, Vice Chairman; Judge Edward C. O'Rear, Boswell B. Hodgkin and Robert Tway. President Donovan and Secretary Peterson met with the Board.

Judge Stoll called to express his regret that he would be unable to attend the meeting, and Judge O'Rear telegraphed that he had planned to attend the meeting but had been unavoidably detained.

A. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the Board of Trustees of April 5, 1949, and the minutes of the Executive Committee of April 20 and May 11, 1949, were approved as published.

B. Report of the Comptroller.

The Comptroller made the usual report, submitting balance sheet and statement of fund and budget operations for the period July 1, 1948, to and including April 30, 1949. He read the following summarized statement and submitted in detail the balance sheet and operating statement, which were examined by members of the Board.

My dear President Donovan:

I submit herewith a balance sheet of University funds as of April 30, 1949, together with supporting statements of fund and budget operations for the current period then ended.

The unappropriated General Fund surplus consisted of the following:

The Restricted (Trust) Fund balances including investments of \$608,744.05 and undistributed receipts from the Veterans Administration of \$435,605.50 amounted to \$1,741,874.53, distributed as follows:

The Reserve for Encumbrances provides for obligations in the form of construction contracts in progress and for current bond maturities and interest. The Appropriation Balances consist chiefly of insurance claims and other funds appropriated but not encumbered by purchase orders or contracts on the date of the report. The Unappropriated Plant Fund balance amounting to \$16,000.00, represents payment on account for the Library and Service Building, and Stadium Addition Revenue Bond Issues. When the remainder of the proceeds of the bonds have been realized, Plant Fund Appropriations will be recorded in conformity with the purposes for which the bonds were issued.

The operating statement as of April 30, 1949 shows that 94.8% of estimated income has been received. Receivables due from the Veterans Administration indicate that the estimated budgeted income for the year will be fully realized.

The per cent of the income budget realized for the three University divisions is displayed in the following statement:

The members of the Board discussed the changes, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the increases and decreases as recommended were authorized, and the Comptroller was directed to make the proper budget adjustments.

D. Approval of Revised Budget for the Department of Animal Pathology.

President Donovan presented a revised budget for the Department of Animal Pathology of the Experiment Station for the year 1949-50. He stated that this was a revision of the budget submitted to the Board of Trustees April 5, 1949. The revised budget was made necessary through a reduction of the funds to be received from the United States Public Health Service. He stated that the salaries as shown in the original budget would remain the same, that the revised budget totalled \$105,050.00, and that it included funds from the Adams Act, Bankhead-Jones Act, Federal and State Research and Marketing Appropriations, and Revolving Trust and Restricted Funds.

After due consideration, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the revised budget of the Department of Animal Pathology for the fiscal year 1949-50 was approved.

E. Sunday Afternoon Musicale Budget Approved.

President Donovan stated that the restricted budget for the Sunday Afternoon Musicale Program for the ensuing fiscal year 1949-50 was not submitted at the April meeting of the Board of Trustees, and that he desired to submit the budget at this time. He stated that the budget calls for a total appropriation of \$3,000.00 to pay operating expenses and fees for artists for the Sunday afternoon programs. The budget was detailed and presented for consideration.

Board members being thoroughly advised of the contents of the budget, made motion, seconded and carried, that the budget as submitted be approved, and a copy filed with the Secretary.

F. Rental Rates for Veterans' Housing Projects.

President Donovan submitted a revised rental scale for the Shawneetown and Cooperstown houses. He stated that 124 trailer units in Cooperstown, under the new plan, would rent for \$25.00 per month. The rental scale for these at the present time ranges from \$22.50 per month to \$28.00 per month, depending upon the gross monthly income of each veteran. This makes a raise of \$2.50 per month in the rents recommended for some trailer units in Cooperstown, and a lowering of \$3.00 for some of the units.

He stated that there were 196 two-bedroom units in Cooperstown and Shawneetown recommended for a flat monthly rate of \$35.00 per month. The rental scale for these units has ranged from \$28.50 to \$41.00 per month, depending upon the gross monthly income of each renter. The recommended rental scale calls for a raise of \$6.50 per month for some of the units, and a lowering of \$6.00 per month in the rent scale of others.

The President stated that there were 184 one-bedroom units in Cooperstown and Shawneetown which were recommended for a monthly rate of \$31.00. The rental scale for these units ranges from \$26.50 per month to \$34.00 per month, depending upon the gross monthly income of each veteran. The new rent scale calls for a raise of \$4.50 per month in the rents of some of the units, and a lowering of \$3.00 per month in the rent scale for others.

Members of the Faculty living in Shawneetown and Cooperstown are now paying the maximum of \$41.00 per month for two-bedroom units and \$34.00 per month for one-bedroom units. The President recommended a rate of \$35.00 for faculty members living in Shawneetown and Cooperstown for the one-bedroom units and \$42.00 for the two-bedroom units. This would have the effect of raising the rents for all faculty members \$1.00 per unit. The faculty houses have been on the same rental scale as the houses occupied by student veterans--a sliding scale depending upon income.

Members of the Board discussed the recommendation, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the Veterans Housing Committee and of the President was concurred in.

G. Fee for Master's Degree Approved.

President Donovan read the following letter from the Comptroller:

June 2, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President
University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

The fee for candidates for master's degrees is now \$17.00. The cost of the master's hood is \$14.00, the cap and gown rental and diploma cost \$5.00, and the binding of the thesis cost \$2.23. The total cost to the University is \$21.23 when thesis is submitted. It is, therefore, apparent that the fee should be increased. Not all candidates for master's degrees submit theses to be bound, and we will not have the binding charge of \$2.23, in these cases.

I have conferred with Dean Pardue and Dean Seay, and we desire to recommend an increase in the fee for candidates for master's degrees from \$17.00 to \$20.00, effective after September 1, 1949.

President Donovan read a letter from Dean Terrell, recommending that the College of Engineering, Department of Architectural Engineering, cooperate with the Beaux Arts Institute of Design.

It is desirable that our work in Architectural Engineering be given in connection with the Beaux Arts Institute of Design. This was the case before the war. We dropped Beaux Arts because of the small number of students in that field.

J. State Insurance Division Scholarship.

President Donovan stated that the State Insurance Division had agreed to sponsor six \$500.00 scholarships in Fire Protection and Safety Engineering through the College of Engineering at the University. He stated that the plan had been approved by the Division of Insurance, the Attorney General and the Governor, and that a formal announcement of the program had been made.

President Donovan stated that these scholarships would materially assist deserving students in the College of Engineering, with special emphasis on fire protection and safety engineering, and recommended their acceptance.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the six \$500.00 scholarships in fire protection and safety engineering offered by the State Insurance Division were authorized accepted.

K. Department of Music--Grants-in-Aid Approved.

President Donovan stated that the Director of the Department of Music and the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences had requested permission to give 35 grants-in-aid to students in the Department of Music for the academic year 1949-50. He stated that these students would work on an average of seven hours a week for the Department, assembling band instruments, collecting and distributing music, playing for the voice teachers, and playing in the various musical organizations for which they receive no credit.

President Donovan recommended that the request be granted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, 35 grants-in-aid to students in the Department of Music for the academic year 1949-50 were approved, with the understanding that the students so approved would be relieved of paying the incidental registration fee but not exempted from paying Activities fees.

L. Gifts:

From General Education Board--\$1,500.00.

President Donovan read the following letter:

GENERAL EDUCATION BOARD

May 9, 1949

My dear President Donovan:

I am pleased to inform you that the General Education Board has made available to the University of Kentucky the sum of \$1,500, or as much thereof as may be necessary, toward the workshop in moral and spiritual values to be held during the summer of 1949.

The grant was authorized pursuant to your letter of request of February 3rd and Superintendent Hodgkins's letter of March 17th, and is for use substantially in accord with the purposes mentioned. The officers regret they were unable to comply in full with your request and hope the small additional sum needed may be obtained from some other source. All of the appropriation authorized for summer school purposes had already been allocated except for the grant mentioned herein.

It was noted that the workshop will be held June 2-18, 1949. Our Comptroller will therefore send you a check for the full amount of the grant in a few days. Shortly after the close of the workshop we should like to receive a statement of income and expenditures and a summary report of activities. The termination date of the grant is December 31, 1949, and any part remaining unused on that date will revert to the Board.

From Mrs. H. M. Nicholls, a Bronze Bust of Lincoln.

President Donovan reported receipt of a bronze bust of Abraham Lincoln, presented to the University by Mrs. H. M. Nicholls, Chicago, Illinois, and stated that this work of art would be placed in the Fine Arts Building in the fall of 1949, when that building would be ready for occupancy. He recommended acceptance of the gift.

The Board expressed their appreciation of this gift, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the bronze bust of Lincoln was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to write to Mrs. H. M. Nicholls, Chicago, Illinois, expressing the gratitude of the University and the Board of Trustees.

From Kentucky Press Association - \$325.00.

President Donovan presented the following letter from Dr. Niel Plummer, head of the Department of Journalism:

M. Surplus Hospital Equipment Transferred to State Board of Health.

President Donovan read the following letter from the Comptroller:

June 2, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President
University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

On April 30, 1949, Delbert Eagle, Judge of Garrard County, wrote you a request to secure some surplus hospital equipment for a small community hospital at Lancaster.

I have located in storage twenty-three hospital beds, old type; one examining table, folding, metal; one oxygen tent, old type. These surplus items were received with other shipments from Evansville Marine Hospital and the Louisville Medical Depot.

I have requested J. S. Chambers, Director of our Health Service, to furnish me with a statement as to whether or not these items are surplus to our hospital equipment requirements. His statement is hereto attached to the effect that the equipment could not be used by the University Infirmary.

The fiscal court of Garrard County is eligible to receive surplus property. I can see no objection to transferring these items to an eligible unit if such meets your approval.

After some discussion, and upon recommendation of Governor Clements, motion was made, seconded and carried, to transfer surplus hospital equipment to the State Board of Health for such disposition as that body might see fit to make.

N. Agreement between the University of Kentucky and the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health.

President Donovan stated that on May 19, 1949, the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health authorized the entering into of a cooperative agreement between the Board of Health and the College of Pharmacy of the University of Kentucky, and that on March 22, 1949, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky approved a similar agreement. He read the proposed agreement to be executed by the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health and the University of Kentucky.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into at Louisville, Kentucky, this _____, by and between the LOUISVILLE AND JEFFERSON COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH, First Party, and THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, a Kentucky Corporation, Second Party.

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, it is the intention of the aforesaid parties to promote the general welfare and efficient management and operation of the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health including the Louisville General Hospital, and in particular the pharmacy service necessary to and a regular part of this operation, and to furnish to the College of Pharmacy of the University of Kentucky the opportunity and facilities for the training of its students in compounding and manufacturing drugs.

NOW, THEREFORE, in so far as the parties to this agreement are permitted by law to do so, and with the understanding and agreement that the parties hereto do not, nor does either of them, by this agreement or otherwise, relinquish any of the control of or responsibility for the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health or the University of Kentucky, with which parties are charged by law, and that each of the parties remains a source of authority in all matters connected respectively with and concerning the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health and the University of Kentucky, the parties hereto do now agree to establish and maintain at the Louisville General Hospital facilities for manufacturing drugs under the following terms and conditions:

1. The terms of the following agreement shall apply to the department within the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health which is known as the "Pharmacy Department of the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health of Louisville, Kentucky."

2. The primary objects of this manufacturing pharmacy laboratory are for the training of students in the production of pharmaceuticals and furnishing the Party of the First Part with aid in manufacturing of medicines.

3. Two members of the staff of the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health shall be appointed as acting members of the faculty of the University of Kentucky during the period of this agreement; namely the Chief Pharmacist of the Louisville General Hospital and the Hospital Administrator who is in charge of the Pharmacy Department of the Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health.

4. The Party of the Second Part shall furnish a qualified instructor to oversee all activities of its students while working in the Manufacturing Laboratory of the Louisville General Hospital.

5. The Party of the First Part shall furnish a room behind the Pharmacy Section of the Louisville General Hospital. This room is approximately 12 x 10 with a 12 foot ceiling. All utilities are to be furnished by the Party of the First Part, including heat, light, power, telephone, gas, hot and cold water, steam, waste, sewage disposal, and janitor service.

6. The Party of the Second Part shall furnish the machinery and equipment for a manufacturing pharmacy laboratory, such equipment to remain the property of the Party of the Second Part, who is to maintain and service said equipment.

7. The Party of the Second Part will begin in a small way adding to the machinery from time to time as it is necessary.

8. The Party of the First Part shall furnish drugs, chemicals and materials of U.S.P. and N.F. quality to be used in the manufacturing of pharmaceuticals for its use.

9. The Party of the Second Part will furnish the materials used to make pharmaceuticals for instruction only, and not used by the Party of the First Part.

10. The supervision and control of the students is to remain under the Party of the Second Part and the Party of the First Part is to maintain the necessary records and advise the Party of the Second Part concerning the conduct and instruction of the students.

11. The Party of the Second Part shall furnish adequate assays and check slips to the Party of the First Part on all materials manufactured for them, thus insuring the safety of dispensing these medicines to patients.

12. This laboratory will be in operation during the academic year only.

13. The Party of the First Part may use this laboratory when it is not in use by the Party of the Second Part. The laboratory is to be cleaned by the last party using it each time.

14. This agreement may be terminated by either party on two months written notice.

After due consideration and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved, subject to approval of the Attorney General, and the Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees were authorized to execute contract on behalf of the University.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees of April 5, 1949, President Donovan submitted a report of a Committee of the Graduate Faculty on honorary degrees. The Board authorized honorary degrees conferred upon the list of nominees submitted with the understanding that the names of the recipients would be recorded in the Minutes of the June meeting. Those approved for honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws were:

President, Crosley Broadcasting Corporation.

Mr. Shouse is a native Kentuckian, having been born in Henry County. He attended the public schools at Bellevue, Kentucky, and graduated from Miami University. Before entering the radio field, Mr. Shouse was a teacher in the schools at Southgate, Kentucky. Successful and varied experiences as a staff member of Stations WBBM, KMOX, and WLW have made Mr. Shouse an outstanding leader in radio. Under his direction the Crosley Broadcasting Corporation has been responsible for a wartime and post-wartime world-wide news gathering staff and many discussion programs of benefit to the Ohio Valley.

Proof of the esteem in which he is held is evident in the numerous awards given the radio station during the past few years. P. Resolution on Death of Miss Ethel Caswall.

President Donovan stated that he regretted to inform the Committee of the death of Miss Ethel Caswall, who for thirty-seven years had been connected with the Administration Department of the Experiment Station.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following Resolution was ordered spread upon the minutes and a copy was ordered sent to the bereaved family.

RESOLUTION

In the death of Miss Ethel Caswall on May 22, 1949, the University of Kentucky recognizes a distinct loss. The Board of Trustees desires to express its appreciation of her long and faithful service at the Agricultural Experiment Station and to enter upon its minutes this testimony to her memory. On March 1, 1912, Miss Caswall entered upon her duties at the University, as secretary of the Department of Chemistry of the Experiment Station, a position which she occupied until the retirement of Dr. A. M. Peter as Head of the Department of Chemistry in 1927 and his appointment as Chairman of the Publications Committee of the Station. Thereupon Miss Caswall became secretary of the Publications Office, continuing in those duties until she was suddenly stricken on the evening of February 10, 1949.

To her work Miss Caswall brought an unusual degree of loyalty, devotion, equanimity of temperament, and skill. Her particular contribution in service of the University was such as to be often overlooked in hasty appraisals of institutions of learning, but which is never overlooked nor minimized by those who have administrative responsibility: carefulness and exactitude in the keeping of records of many kinds and the rare quality of being always beforehand in the preparation of reports and the recording of details. Her many friends, both in the University and in the community, where she had resided since childhood, mourn her passing and extend deepest sympathy to her family.
