Victory Gives Them Strong Claim for State Honors.

The State co-eds defeated the Ken Wesleyan lassies by a score of 16 to 9 in the final fray of the season Saturday night. Both teams played an excellent game and it was one of the fastest girls' games seen at the Auditorium this season.

At the end of the first half Doctor Tigert's bunch had a two-point lead on the Wesleyan girls and this they insed to seven in the second half by hard playing.

STATE WITHDRAWS FROM K. I. A. A.

Kentucky State University was notiied that it would be reinstated in the K. I. A. A. after a suspension since June, 1912, at a meeting of the Association held at the Phoenix Hotel, Tuesday, and immediately signified its intention of withdrawing.

While this action of the K. I. A. A. will not in any way affect the athletic situation at the University, their reinstatement and withdrawal as member in good standing will remove a most unfortunate blot from their past record.

Kentucky State was suspended in 1912 from the K. I. A. A. for alleged violations of the eligibility rules of the athletics throughout the State. association in playing Burriss and Park on the baseball team. These men were accused of professionalism but the charges were not substantiated before the S. I. A.
