Soulforce has been negotiating with Calvery Baptist Church for several months. They are asking to present a film, Journey To a Hate Free Millennium, to the congregation. This film presents several faces of hate, including the creative strategies of GLBT people and friends who blocked Fred Phelps from being visible at Matthew Shepard's funeral, the aftermath of the James Byrd murder (dragged to death in Texas), and the Columbine school murders.

If the Church does not agree to some form of dialog, Soulforce will mail a packet of information challenging church teachings on homosexuality to all church members announcing their plans to vigil outside the church.

This is an example of the work Soulforce does. They continue to asks for discussions with church organizations that they believe teach negative messages about GLBT people. They do not protest publically until they try other avenues.



WICCAN PATHWAY PART 7 Mabon

Mabon is named after the God of Youth. It is the Autumn Equinox, the second harvest festival and occurs around Sept. 21. Once again day and night are equal, poised as the God is ready to leave his body and journey in the unseen to prepare to be reborn of the Goddess.

Mabon is also called Alban Elfed (Caledonii) Winter Finding (Teutonic) which spans from the Equinox until Winter Night, Oct 15, the Norse New Year. Mabon marks the First day of Autumn when the hours of sunlight and darkness are equal, in perfect balance. Mabon is the Wiccan day of giving thanks for all we have.


Each fall, nature declines, drawing back it bounty and readying for the winter, its time of rest. The Goddess knows that in the weakening sun the God wanes. The fire burns within her womb and she feels the pressure of the God and his need to be reborn.

Mabon is associated with the harvesting of corn and other plants before the first frost arrives. The last of the herbs and other vegitables you wish to store for winter uses should be harvested now.

Celebrate this time of balance by taking stock of your self. Are you living a balanced life? Can you give as well as receive? Are your hours of rest and work in balance?

A simple way to celebrate Mabon is to walk in wild places and forests gathering seed pods and dried plants (a traditional practices). Dried herbs and other vegetation can be use to decorate your home, season your food, or for herbal magick.

Pride Library Book Review Trans-Sister Radio by Chris Bohjalian

As the title suggests, this is a novel about a M2F transsexual and the impact she has on a small community in Vermont. Dana Stevens, a Professor of History, is just beginning the process of transitioning when s/he meets Allison Banks, a divorced elementary school teacher. Allison finds herself falling in love with Dana, and Dana with her. Dana waits perhaps a bit too long to tell Allison what's up with hir. (Hir-a pronoun used by some people in the middle of our bi-gender system)

Allison's x-husband, Will, doesn't approve of the match, and that's before anyone knows that Dana is transitioning. The fact that Will still calls his former wife "my Allison" is big clue to his inability to completely separate from her, not to mention that it bugs the hell out of his present wife, Patricia.

. Will works in public radio and Carly, his and Allison's daughter, is beginning to be interested in a similar career. During a summer internship she helps produce a National Public Radio story on transsexuality which happens late in the time frame of the novel but pieces of the radio interviews are sprinkled throughout, thus the *Radio* part of the book title.

Each chapter of the book is told from the point of view of one of the four main characters, providing a rich layering of emotions and diverse points of view. The author certainly succeeds in challenging assumptions about love and gender.

Bohjalian obviously researched transsexuality and is very successful at presenting the emotional, medical, social and political issues involved. Through Dana we learn some of the many nuances of being transsexual including the confusion of growing up different without words to identify the feelings emerging inside, the pleasure in finally being able to wear clothes that feel appropriate, and the difficulties in communicating with family members.

Allison has to decide if, as a heterosexual woman, she can be happy with a woman as a lover/partner. She and Dana have to deal with a range of reactions in the small town including harassment, hate mail and the possibility that Allison may lose a job she loves.

There are numerous discussions among the characters about gender identity, how it is formed, what it means and the social pressures on all of us to conform to certain gender expectations. Carly says at one point "I do think we all want to cross over a lot more than we realize. We all want to be...other."

She is not talking about being transsexual, but about being free to be ourselves in ways that our culture may deem inappropriate for our gender. Gay, lesbian, and bisexual individuals "cross over" those lines consciously and unconsciously, and it is often this "gender bending" that is a trigger for homophobic reactions directed at us by others and, to often, directed by us at each other.

The short pieces written as if transcripts from the NPR interviews provide additional opinions and information. For example, a physician comments that "Clothing is infinitely more important to a transsexual than to a transvestite. A transvestite is merely using clothing to play a role. A transsexual is using it to define himself or herself as a human being."



Gay Spirituality:
A New Look at Roots and Wings

Now that the closet door is open - at least, for some of us - what face of God appears? If each and every one of us is created in the image of God then somehow us gay folks reflect an aspect of God that heterosexuals might not. Once we are willing to better "name" ourselves and understand ourselves and accept ourselves then, and only then, will that aspect or "face" of God appear.

This quest for discovery is the quest of spiritual awakening. By better understanding self each individual becomes more in tune with others and more in tune with the divine. This truth has been agreed upon by psychologists, sociologists, and religious gurus alike. It is the same for each person, gay and straight, male or female, faith filled or searching.

For the GLBT person the quest may be even more important. Living in a world and culture that demands "proof" of one's worthiness and constant defense of one's rights, the gay man and lesbian must strive for better understanding of self in order to

stand more firm against such difficulties. The quest for a definition of gay/lesbian spirituality begins with those "roots" that are common to the experience of being attracted to those of the same sex.

The up-coming series of articles will delve more deeply into the experiential "roots" of being gay and how those roots positively and negatively effect the individual. Lesbian Health Research

Do you remember last year when there were objections raised by a Ky. State Legislator because a UK Woman's Health Symposium included a workshop on lesbian health issues? I don't think we convinced that individual but internationally research continues into lesbian health issues.

Dr Rina Agrawal, a fertility expert at the London, England Women's Clinic has reported that Polycystic Ovarian Syndrome (PCOS) caused by an imbalance of sex hormones is more than twice as common in lesbians as in heterosexual women.

In a study of 618 women treated at the clinic, Agrawal discovered that 38 percent of the lesbian women had PCOS, compared to 14 percent of the heterosexual women. PCOS is characterized by irregular periods, acne, obesity, a hormone imbalance, fertility problems and an increase in body and facial hair.

The cause of PCOS is unknown but an excess of androgens, or male hormones, has been linked with PCOS. Other research studies have linked hyperandrogenism to sexual orientation. Agrawal pointed out that her research neither suggests nor indicates PCOS causes lesbianism, only that PCOS is more prevalent in lesbian women.

"It would be incorrect to make assumptions based on one single study," she said. "but doctors should be aware that lesbians have a higher rate of PCOS because it has health implications beyond fertility. Obesity, non-insulin dependent (type 2) diabetes and cardiovascular disease are much more common in women with PCOS."

Lesbians will any of PCOS symptoms should mention this study to their doctor so they will be aware of possible health issues.

Howard Stovall, owner of Sings Now, is supportive of the GLBT Community and has made many signs for GLSO. He was an active member of the Hate Free Lexington Committee protesting Fred Philps visit to Lexington last fall.
