UK considers College of Design

Come together: Interior Design and Architecture may find a home in proposed new college

Students in one UK major learn to design buildings, while students in another learn to design the interiors of those buildings.

Now, however, the architecture and interior design majors may come together under one College of Design, something which many say is good for the real-world relationship of the two professions.

The University Senate will soon vote on the proposal to join these two majors.

"A number of schools have had these disciplines together for as many as 25 years," said Ann Dickson, the director of the School of Interior Design.

Dickson said that the association between architecture and the interior design is becoming more pronounced. The two areas work together in the real world, and more interaction, Dixon said, will be good for the students.

"A College of Design would be much better suited to our field in the way that the resources are structured

and because of the environment in which our students will work and learn."

The proposal will most likely be passed, according to University Senate member Jeff Dembo.

"I think it is a great idea. These are majors that will work together in their careers. It always helps to have input from other fields. We have even had a few juries that had Interior Design people on them," said Craig Jacobs, an architecture senior.

The proposal would also rename the other units of Human Environmental Sciences, which consists of family studies, nutrition and merchandising apparel and

textiles, as the Center for Family and Consumer Services. Those majors would be assigned to the College of Agriculture.

There are no plans to change the number of hours or types of classes that a student in these disciplines would need to graduate. As of right now, there is no plan to move the location of offices or classrooms.

Dembo also anticipates that there would be no teaching positions lost to this proposal. He added that the only reason a teaching job would be lost is if the teachers did not foresee a place for themselves in this new program and wanted to leave.

No proposal has been formally made to the Senate, so these changes have not been finalized.

The proposal may be introduced to the Senate in October.

"This is not the first time a proposal like this has been made," Dembo said. "In late spring, Provost Mike Nietzel sent a memo regarding the interim reorganization of Human Environmental Sciences."

"But even interim reorganizations need to be run by the University Senate, so the proposal was deferred until that could be done."

Dembo said that the proposal seems natural because

of the connection between internal design and external design.

Dembo said that he could not see the Senate getting in the way of that connection.

Dembo stressed that the Senate is made up of faculty as well as students.

"Everyone so far has seen this as a step in the right direction."

Meanwhile, students in these departments are pleased with the idea. "I think it will give us a more well-rounded education. I don't see that it will cause any problems," said Inga Ryles, an architecture freshman.



Opening soon

The old reflects the new as inhabitants of the old engineering building are now making themselves at home in the new Ralph G. Andersen Building in Central campus.

The building, which was supposed to be completed in January, had many construction delays and was not done until August.

The Andersen building boasts faculty and staff offices, classrooms, administrative areas and a common, courtyard area for students. Also the space allotted for research has doubled from what was in the old building.

Construction of the Andersen building cost about \$24.6 million with \$19.6 million coming from the state and \$5 million from private contributions.

A ribbon cutting ceremony will be held at 10 a.m. Friday, Gov. Paul Patton, President Lee Todd and major contributors are expected to be in attendance.

UK alumni association recruits new students

Facelift: Freshmen targeted for membership; incentives include free pizza and T-shirts

More students are joining UK's group of alumni before they even graduate thanks to a new, revamped Student Alumni Association.

The number of student members has more than tripled since last year because organizers of the student group started targeting freshmen and tempting them with more pizza parties and career seminars than in the past, the organizers say.

"We're just really going to be revamping everything," said Angela Carlos, the special programs coordinator for the UK Alumni Association.

About 85 people have signed up to be members.

The Student Alumni Association is more formal this year, charging a \$15 annual fee for membership and doling out goodies and gift certificates to its members.

New members get a bag of coupons, a T-shirt that reads, "Tell the world you're a wildcat," and stickers with the same slogan.

Some days, anyone caught wearing the shirt on campus is stopped and given a gift of some sort, Carlos said.

The group has also planned seminars.

"We want to do some fun stuff, but at the same time we want to do some seminars that will be beneficial career-wise," she said.

In the past, the association didn't charge a fee and meetings weren't as organized as they will be this year, said Stan Key, the director of Alumni Affairs.

"We think it will be more successful this time because this (the fee) is what has proven to work well at other Alumni Associations in the country," he said.

He said he hopes for 300 members in the group by winter.

The idea of the Student Alumni Association is to recruit alumni before they graduate, Key said. Approximately 25 percent of those in the student group will stay in the association after graduation, he said.

But the students who are in the group will feel more a part of UK and carry that on when they graduate, he said.

"We'll have more of a loyalty and spirit and carry a tradition," he said.

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Cats gaining respect

Men's soccer: Already ranked No. 17, UK awaits another ranked opponent in Furman Invitational

The UK men's soccer team knew it was a diamond in the rough. The players knew the team would be mentioned with the nation's elite as soon as it got a chance to prove it could challenge.

And now the diamond has been unearthed. The Cats have impressed enough people to be mentioned amongst the best.

Ranked in the Top-25 in all four major polls and as high as No. 17, the Cats look to continue climbing the polls this weekend when they travel to Greenville, S.C., for the Furman Invitational.

Physically, the Cats are battered and bruised, but mentally the Cats are confident.

An impressive showing last weekend at the University of Virginia Invitational only fueled the notion that the Cats have turned heads. In a mix between youth and talent, the Cats almost scored a near-upset to host No. 3 Virginia only to lose 3-2 in the 89th minute.

The following night, they beat No. 10 Maryland 2-1 in impressive fashion to prove that their performance against Virginia was no fluke.

The Cats will face similar competition this weekend. They play No. 19 Creighton on Friday and take on 2001 NCAA Tournament participant Butler on Saturday.

Scheduling challenging tournaments on back-to-back weekends is what Coach Ian

Collins had in mind before the season. He said he regularly schedules the Cats against top competition to ready the team for postseason play.

"Our schedule is extremely difficult, and we purposely did that to see where we stand," Collins said.

"We are going into this weekend with the same intensity, desire and work ethic we had last week and since the season began."

The Cats will have to take their confident demeanor a step farther as they are bogged down with minor but aggravating injuries.

Senior goalkeeper Greg Raber is bothered by a possible broken finger, while junior midfielder Nathan Fleetwood and freshmen Dani Kamras and Lasse Lagerblom are nursing sore ankles.

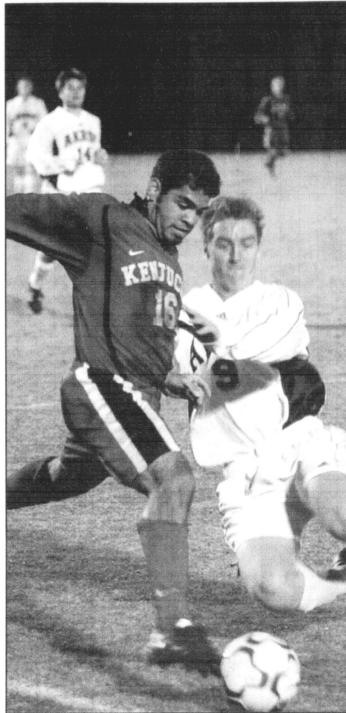
Sophomore midfielder Olli Lehtimaki, however, will be lost 4-6 weeks with a fractured ankle.

Depth has not been a concern for the Cats. The play of Fleetwood and Kamras up front and Raber controlling the posts has been a steady force.

Regardless of the Cats outcome this weekend, Collins is only interested in the team peaking at the right time.

"We want to peak at the end of the season, but right now we're committed to playing our absolute best."

If playing to their capability, the Cats will likely take that continual climb up the ladder.

Brook Pearse tiptoes the sideline during a game last fall against Akron. Pearse and the Cats play Creighton and Butler this weekend.

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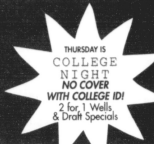
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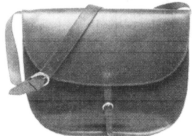

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Courts condemn Nigerian mother

Amina Lawal is a Nigerian woman who had a baby. Unfortunately for her she had a baby more than nine months after divorcing her husband. This would mean she had sex out of wedlock. A Muslim court in Nigeria says that this is wrong and that Lawal should be stoned to death.

The ruling by this court is just ridiculous. What's worse, the government of Nigeria will probably allow the sentence to be carried out. You may say that I'm being culturally insensitive and that I'm trying to inject Western standards into a different culture, but the gravity of this case outweighs any of that.

They want this woman to have large rocks thrown at her until she is dead. And there's not even an illusion of equal treatment in the Nigerian court. The man that Lawal identified as the father was acquitted due to lack of evidence.

Wouldn't it be the height of irony for a man to be executed by an antediluvian method because of DNA testing? How noble of him to stand idly by while this woman is sentenced to death for something he participated in.

The Nigerian government needs to step in. There is a secular, constitutional government that functions in this country. If it wants to have any international clout in the future, Nigeria's government needs to stop this. You can't expect to be taken seriously if you won't even attempt to derail an execution ordered by a religious kangaroo court.

Nigeria's Justice Minister Kanu Agabi says the government is opposed to the death sentence. I suppose that's a start. They need to enact legislation to prevent these kinds of sentences from being carried out. If these Islamic courts want to hand out the sentences, fine, but under no circumstances should they be binding. Keep them symbolic. They can even try to excommunicate her if they want. I don't know if Islam has a measure for that kind of thing, but it's an idea.

I know different places have different ideas about morality, but is out-of-wedlock sex really something you should be killed for? Of course it's not. The death penalty should be reserved for people who have killed someone else.

Did Amina Lawal kill anyone? No, she brought another life into the world. Would anybody even know what had transpired had she not given birth? Probably not. There was no harm done.

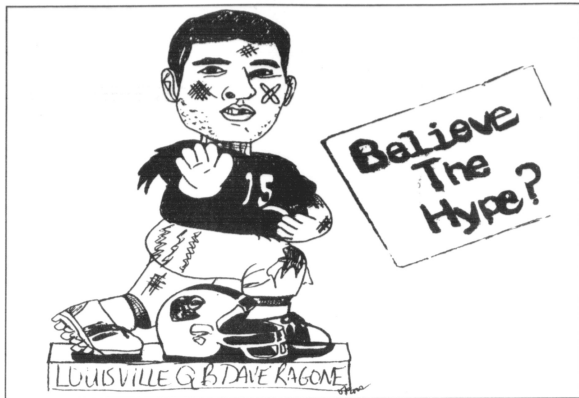
