LOUISVILLE — Three inches of snow in April!

It happened Monday in Pine Mountain, a tiny community northeast of Harlan, said Norm Reitmeyer, a forecaster for the National Weather Service.

"Several other towns also got a taste of winter weather," said Reitmeyer, adding that Glasgow got two and half inches of snow while Bowling Green and London had one inch each.

"We're not showing any signs of breaking out of this weather pattern this week," he said. "We didn't have the winter we were supposed to have. It looks like we're getting it now."

#### **Future of Volcker uncertain**

WASHINGTON — President Reagan is leaning against naming Paul A. Volcker to a second term as chairman of the Federal Reserve Board but has not made a final decision on either Volcker's future or a successor for the powerful post, administration sources said yesterday.

One source, speaking on condition that his name not be used, said White House officials are considering five or six candidates to succeed Volcker, whose four-year term as head of the notion's central bank expires in August.

Volcker, 55, appointed by former President Carter, is not of the most influential figures on the economic scene because of the tremendous impact the Federal Reserve exerts on inflaint, interest rates and economic growth through its control of the notion's supply of money and credit.

The administration source, emphasizing that Reagan has not made up his mind firmly, said Volcker still has an outside chance at a second term, if he wants it, but that the probability of that happening "is diminishing every day.

"Volcker's support in this administration has never been

strong," said the source. "The overwhelming view is that the president has a right to name his own guy. Carter did. That's the way it works. There are lots of qualified people in the country for the job."

#### Gandhi director alters travel plans

CONDON — British director Sir Richard Attenborough bowed to widespread protests yesterday and announced he would not go to South Africa for the opening of his Oscar-winning film "Gandhi" unless all performances were open to all races.

Attenborough, in a turnaround from his original plan to attend the whites-only premiere in Johannesburg this week, said he would to South Africa only if the entire "Gandhi" run were open to all races and no cinema had to apply for a government permit to show it to a racially-mixed audience.

The conditions appeared to rule out Attenborough going to South Africa to promote his film about Mohandas K. Gandhi, the Indian pacifist who lived in South Africa in the early part of the century before helping to lead India to independence from Britan in 1947.

South African cinemas are segregated under the national policy of apartheid — racial separation — unless the white-minority government gives special permission for a multiracial audience.

## **Renovations offer students** ways to better organizations

Since the opening of the Student Center Addition last year, the University has been left with a large bottom-floor room — formerly occupied by the bookstore — that is collecting only dust.

Unfortunately, plans to turn the room into offices for registered student organizations were placed on the back burner late in 1982,

were placed on the back burner late in 1982, and the University could not find the money needed for renovation.

Last Wednesday, however, Frank Harris, Student Center director, was given the honor of announcing the huge room will be converted into the long-needed organizations' office complex, thanks to the discovery of an almost-indispensible \$100,000 for the project. According to Harris, the offices were important to three influential University officials — President Otis Singletary, Donald Clapp, vice president for administration and Jack Blanton, vice chancellor for administration — who channeled the money toward the effort.

"We've taken dollars over the years and put it back into renovation projects," Blan-ton said. "We all put our budget requests in months ago and the president decided that

this project was of high priority."

Blanton and Singletary hit the issue right on the head — the continued success and growth of registered student organizations is growth of registered student organizations is very important to UK. Strong student organizations to keep it moving.

The majority of UK's student organiza-The majority of UK's student organiza-tions have no place to call home, to keep files or to receive mail, restricting to some degree the ability of some groups. "The groups without an office or a mailbox are working at a great disadvantage," Danny Faber, Socially Concerned Students presi-dent, said.

With an office, possibly staffed with a work-study office worker, some of the University's student organizations will have a base of operations, a sense of stability and will be able to think more about their projects instead of wondering where to meet week after week.

Not only will the office space provide a sense of security and stability for some organizations, it might add a bit of life to the Student Center, possibly creating a new core of

dent Center, possibly creating a new core of student activity and generating new life into its sometimes empty halls.

Faber said, "It's going to be great for a number of student organizations," and added it will result in greater student involvement.

The coaches said they have been recruiting high-caliber players to boost the team and its following. "People still see volleyhall at a very recreational level." McReavey said. "Hopefully, we can get them to see there's much more to it."

The coaches said the key to mak-ing the finals may rest with senior Marsha Bond and Carolynn Kirby, a transfer from Utah State who sat out this year.

Kirby said playing the finals in the Coliseum would hold a special meaning for her. "It makes it so much more special to go the distance," she said.
"I'm very happy," Bond said. "We're going to have an outstanding season."

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

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
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
