"Anything that reduces the president's power make it difficult to do things overseas," said Stempel, who served as a diplomat to five countries over a 25-year career and was stationed in Zambia when the Watergate scandal erupted.

On the domestic front, Greg Hager, an assistant professor of po-litical science, said Clinton will con-tinue to speak to Congress through the public.

"He's going to try and get the public to buy his point of view," said Hager, adding that Clinton's credi-bility has been reduced in every-one's eyes.

Hager, who teaches a legislative process course, said the next move for Congress will be to decide whether or not to proceed with impeachment hearings.

Balancing act

Non-traditional students juggle work, children and school as their numbers grow in universities across the country

Her fingers bang out a 10-page paper on behavioral disorders of elementary age school children while MTV blasts in the background and three teens wrestle over the ringing phone.

This is a typical evening for Mary Patton, an elementary education junior and divorced mother of three.

Patton is enrolled in 19 credit hours

and works an average of 25 hours a week at Dixion-Ballard Adjusters as a secretary. In addition to regular work and school hours, she must observe students at elementary schools for two hours a week and work at Metro Group Homes, a facility for displaced children, another two hours each week. Patton is also the community leader of a 4H group in her neighborhood. Patton does all this for one reason.

"I love children, and I have a dream to be an elementary school teacher," she said.
"I know it is corny, but that's my dream."

She is able to pursue her dream with the aid of a strong support group, by sticking to a tight schedule and by giving up television.

"Saturdays are the kids and George's (her boyfriend) day — no homework," Patton said.

In the fall of 1997, about 17 percent of student seeking master's degrees were adult students, said Phil Greasley, dean of the University Extension Office.

UK zeroes in on fire safety

Murray student's death has fire officials talking prevention

The typical college student spends their worrying about many things: upcoming exams, research papers, parties, safe sex, etc.

The last thing students should have to worry about is whether they'll die from smoke inhalation in their dorms.

After the recent residence hall fire at Murray State University in which one student died, fire safety on UK campus has become a hot tonic.

Fire officials said if the dorm had been equipped with an appropriate sprinkler system and the fire had started in the hall. 19-year-old Michael H. Minger might still be alive, according to a Sept. 20 Associated Press article.

Russel Sanders, a former Louisville fire chief, putting sprinklers in dormitories where there are a lot of young people is particularly important.

In only two minutes, a fire can engulf an entire room with temperatures of 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit.

Report fires by activating a fire alarm pull station and dialing 911.

Don't create false alarms. Never smok beneath a smoke detector.

Always evacuate. Never assume an alarm is a false.

A state law passed in 1972 mandated that any building over four stories must have a sprinkler system installed, Beach

said.

All UK dorms except Keeneland and Holmes Hall have sprinkler systems in them, and Beach has plans to accommodate the other two in the future.

Every room has a smoke alarm installed that signals the front desk when it is set off, Beach said.

UK fire department's main objective in fire safety is prevention, he said, not postvention.

"The most important safety feature we have is the individual," Beach said. "The student must accept responsibility in order to prevent fires from happening in the first place."

Clinton vows against terrorism

UNITED NATIONS — Keeping his public focus on international events. President Clinton renewed a global call to arms against terrorism
Monday and attacked the idea that it is mainly
an American problem of American making.

"This is a threat to all humankind." Clinton
said in a 21-minute speech to the opening of the
33rd session of the United Nations General Assembly. The hundreds of delegates gave Clinton a
rare standing ovation as he was introduced in
the cavernous hall at U.N. headquarters.

White House aides were quick tell reporters that Clinton was moved by the warm
greeting, which offered a measure of support a
belegatered president whose videotaped grand
jury testimony in the Monica Lewinsky matter
was playing on TV even as he spoke.

"It reflects the love and respect that the international community feels for you." Clinton's
national security adviser. Sandy Berger, quoted
Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif as telling
the president afterward.

Rocket kills 10 in Afghanistan

Rocket kills 10 in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan — In a second day of deadly attacks, rockets crashed into northern Kabul on Monday, killing at least 10 people.

The assault came as rescue workers dug through the rubble from a rocket barrage the day before that killed more than 50 people and wounded nearly 200.

Red Cross ambulances roared into the Khair Khana neighborhood shortly after Monday's attack, not far from where the earlier rocket struck. Neighbors used their hands to dig through the debris and reach the wounded.

"I thought I was going to die. There was old old explosion and everything on the shelves fell off," said shopkeeper Aziz Ullah. "Why are they doing this?"

No one took responsibility for the attacks, but the ruling Taliban religious militia blamed its opponents, postdiers denied firing the rockets and secused the Taliban of hitting the northern neighborhoods from their positions east and southeast of the city.



Mumme, Spurrier talk about improved units their high-powered offenses face Saturday

Hal Mumme and Steve Spurrier disect defenses for breakfast, but both face units this weekend that might be tougher to swallow. Mumme leads UK (3-0) into the Swamp Saturday to tackle Spurrier's Florida Gators (2-1), but both are bringing improved defenses to the rematch of last year's 38-point shootout. "Kentucky is a completely

"Kentucky is a completely different Kentucky team than in years past." Spurrier said.
"They have a lot more team speed, especially on defense."

The biggest change is UK's more aggressive style of defense, he said. In years past. Spurrier said, the Wildcats would concede the run.

Now. UK places more men near the line of scrimmage, and they get more physical with receivers, he said.

"They're into stopping people now." Spurrier said. "It's a little bit like we play, but not exactly. It seems to be a lot tougher defense than the one we faced last year."

Of course, Bob Stoops' Florida defense is no slouch. Aside from the NFL's Denver Broncos and Green Bay Packers, Mumme said, there might be no better.

The Gators return a line backer corps that includes four candidates for the Dick Butkus Award, given to the nation's best linebacker. And they return two senior All-America candidates at defensive line, Ed Chester and Tim Beauchamp.

"They are tremendous athlets," Mumme said. "We got excited around here when we recruited Dennis Johnson, but they have six or seven just like him, except they are juniors or seniors."

Gender gap persists at Harvard U.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — At the first Black Students' Association party Friday night, first-year women were introduced to a social phenomenon they will soon be familiar with — a room full of black Harvard women among only a few handful of black Harvard women among only a few handful of black Harvard men.

In the class of 2002, 79 black men were admitted, compared to 128 women, meaning males should comprise a little less than 40 percent of the class — an admitted class that was overall 52 percent male. (Figures on matriculated students are not yet available).

These ratios are roughly in line with those of recent years. In fact, the number of black males is up significantly from the class of 1986, in which fewer than 25 percent of black males is up significantly from the class of 1986, in which fewer than 25 percent spence that 1980.

These numbers reflect a nationwide gender gap in higher education, where black women make up the majority — 63 percent — of black student enrollment at colleges and universities, according to The Journal of Blacks in Higher Education.





Child Care Assistance Program

The Child Care Council of Kentucky, Inc. is the Service Agent for the Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) for 22 counties. CCAP is funded by federal and state funds. Case managers in each county assist etigible families in finding and paying for child care.

To be eligible, child care must be needed for parents to work, attend college, participate in a K-TAP training program, protect a child, or to attend high school (for a teen parent). Low income working parents and college students may qualify if their income is below 133% of the federal poverty guideline (see chart below). (Except for families with an income below \$400, all families will pay for part of their child care expenses.)

Note: Eligible children must be either under the age of 13, under age 18 if physically or mentally incapable of caring for his/herself, or under age 18 and under court supervision.
