Tape changes students' tune

After the release of the president's testimony on live TV, some students, professors say it's time for nation's leader to step down

With the release of President Bill Clinton's grand jury testimony on television Monday, it seems the tide of UK opinion might be turning against him.

"I never thought Clinton should be impeached until today," said Mark Kirschenbaum, a marketing senior, after watching the tapes.

tions, and, personally, I am offended because I voted for him. This has definitely lowered my opinion of Clinton."

Clinton should resign because that would bring a complex and time-consuming matter to a close, said John B. Stempel, director of the Patterson School of Diplomacy.

"The sooner it gets over, the better," Stempel said. "The best idea, from a foreign policy standpoint, would be for him to resign."

Stempel said Clinton's staff is spending too much time on the

Lewinsky case, which is bad for both domestic and foreign issues.

"Anything that reduces the president's power make it difficult to do things overseas," said Stempel, who served as a diplomat to five countries over a 25-year career and was stationed in Zambia when the Watergate scandal erupted.

Stempel also said terrorist organizations could take advantage of Clinton's preoccupation.

"It might embolden some people to do tricky things, especially if they feel that they can do some-

thing and fuff it up like they did with the embassies in Africa," Stempel said.

On the domestic front, Greg Hager, an assistant professor of political science, said Clinton will continue to speak to Congress through the public.

"He's going to try and get the public to buy his point of view," said Hager, adding that Clinton's credibility has been reduced in everyone's eyes.

Hager, who teaches a legislative process course, said the next move for Congress will be to decide whether or not to proceed with impeachment hearings.

UK zeroes in on fire safety

Murray student's death has fire officials talking prevention

The typical college student spends their worrying about many things: upcoming exams, research papers, parties, safe sex, etc.

The last thing students should have to worry about is whether they'll die from smoke inhalation in their dorms.

After the recent residence hall fire at Murray State University in which one student died, fire safety on UK campus has become a hot topic.

Fire officials said if the dorm had been equipped with an appropriate sprinkler system and the fire had started in the hall, 19-year-old Michael H. Minger might still be alive, according to a Sept. 20 Associated Press article.

Russel Sanders, a former Louisville fire chief, putting sprinklers in dormitories where there are a lot of young people is particularly important.

Garry Beach, UK fire marshal, said sprinklers help reduce and secure a fire so people can evacuate.

In only two minutes, a fire can engulf an entire room with temperatures of 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit.

A state law passed in 1972 mandated that any building over four stories must have a sprinkler system installed, Beach said.

All UK dorms except Keeneland and Holmes Hall have sprinkler systems in them, and Beach has plans to accommodate the other two in the future.

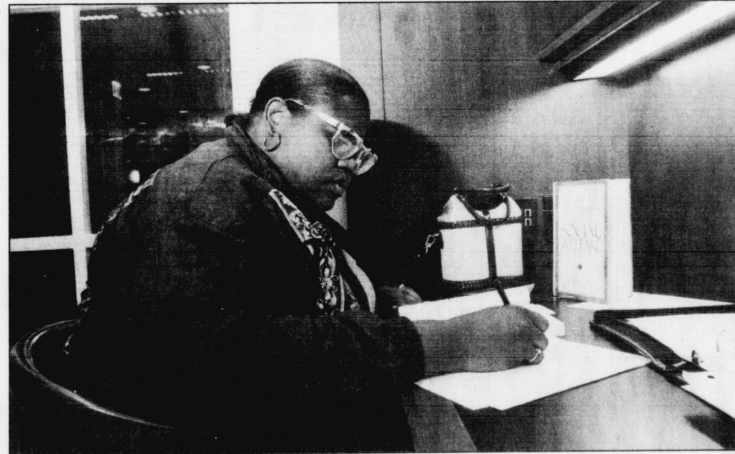
Every room has a smoke alarm installed that signals the front desk when it is set off, Beach said.

UK fire department's main objective in fire safety is prevention, he said, not postvention.

"The most important safety feature we have is the individual," Beach said. "The student must accept responsibility in order to prevent fires from happening in the first place."

Balancing act

Non-traditional students juggle work, children and school as their numbers grow in universities across the country

Her fingers bang out a 10-page paper on behavioral disorders of elementary age school children while MTV blasts in the background and three teens wrestle over the ringing phone.

This is a typical evening for Mary Patton, an elementary education junior and divorced mother of three.

Patton is enrolled in 19 credit hours

and works an average of 25 hours a week at Dixon-Ballard Adjusters as a secretary.

In addition to regular work and school hours, she must observe students at elementary schools for two hours a week and work at Metro Group Homes, a facility for displaced children, another two hours each week. Patton is also the community leader of a 4-H group in her neighborhood.

Patton does all this for one reason. "I love children, and I have a dream to be an elementary school teacher," she said. "I know it is corny, but that's my dream."

She is able to pursue her dream with the aid of a strong support group, by sticking to a tight schedule and by giving up television.

"Saturdays are the kids and George's (her boyfriend) day - no homework," Patton said.

In the fall of 1997, about 17 percent of student seeking master's degrees were adult students, said Phil Greasley, dean of the University Extension Office.

About 34 percent of UK's total enrollment is adult students, he said. Adult students are considered to be anyone over the age of 25.

Clinton vows against terrorism

UNITED NATIONS — Keeping his public focus on international events, President Clinton renewed a global call to arms against terrorism Monday and attacked the idea that it is mainly an American problem of American making.

"This is a threat to all humankind," Clinton said in a 21-minute speech to the opening of the 53rd session of the United Nations General Assembly. The hundreds of delegates gave Clinton a rare standing ovation as he was introduced in the cavernous hall at U.N. headquarters.

White House aides were quick to tell reporters that Clinton was moved by the warm greeting, which offered a measure of support for a beleaguered president whose videotaped grand jury testimony in the Monica Lewinsky matter was playing on TV even as he spoke.

"It reflects the love and respect that the international community feels for you," Clinton's national security adviser, Sandy Berger, quoted Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif as telling the president afterward.

Rocket kills 10 in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan — In a second day of deadly attacks, rockets crashed into northern Kabul on Monday, killing at least 10 people.

The assault came as rescue workers dug through the rubble from a rocket barrage the day before that killed more than 50 people and wounded nearly 200.

Red Cross ambulances roared into the Khair Khana neighborhood shortly after Monday's attack, not far from where the earlier rocket struck. Neighbors used their hands to dig through the debris and reach the wounded.

"I thought I was going to die. There was a loud explosion and everything on the shelves fell off," said shopkeeper Aziz Ullah. "Why are they doing this?"

No one took responsibility for the attacks, but the ruling Taliban religious militia blamed its opponents, positioned north of the capital.

Opposition leaders denied firing the rockets and accused the Taliban of hitting the northern neighborhoods from their positions east and southeast of the city.

Murder indictments in embassy blast

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania — A Tanzanian and an Egyptian escorted into a courtroom under heavy guard were charged Monday with murder in connection with the U.S. Embassy bombing in Tanzania. If convicted, they would be hanged.

Egyptian Mustafa Mahmoud Said Ahmed and Tanzanian Rashid Saleh Hemed each were charged with 11 counts of murder. The Aug. 7 bombing killed 11 people, all Africans. Resident Magistrate Amiri Maneto said no bail was al-

lowed. A trial date will be set Oct. 5.

Police and soldiers stood guard while the two men arrived at the courthouse, in the center of Dar es Salaam.

Three FBI agents also were present at the hearing.

Although no details were released in court, local media said traces of chemicals that could have been used to make the bomb had been found in Saleh's home and car. Police, the reports said, also were seeking two unidentified men who had visited Saleh often before the bombing.

For Star Wars, 'less is more'

LOS ANGELES — Twentieth Century Fox execs have decided to adopt a "less is more" strategy for the 1999 release of the *Star Wars* prequels, the New York Post reported today (Monday), citing highly placed sources.

The newspaper said that the studio has decided to open only on about 2,100 screens, which would limit the initial film's chances of setting a box-office record during its first weekend. But 20th's distribution chief, Tom Sherak, told the Post: "It's not about the opening weekend. ... The summer goes May to August. We want to enjoy it every step of the way."

The studio also plans a limited marketing campaign, the Post observed, quoting one insider as saying, "*Star Wars* is already part of our culture. ... It's not going to take a lot to interest people."

Passenger restrained for bugging Hootie and the Blowfish

LOS ANGELES — Call it a crooked rear view.

An allegedly drunk passenger on an American Airlines flight from New York to Los Angeles had to be restrained, placed in a rear seat, and tied up with seat belts after refusing to stop pestering the members of Hootie and the Blowfish Thursday. The crew made an unscheduled landing in Denver to put the man, identified as Amit Singh, off the plane and into the hands of local police.

Detective David Metzler of the Denver police department said: "Because he was intoxicated (the band) might have felt pretty uncomfortable, not knowing who he was or what he was going to do."

Titanic director angered at DiCaprio for snubbing Oscar ceremonies

LOS ANGELES — James Cameron, who directed Leonardo DiCaprio in *Titanic*, told the New York Daily News the other day how angry he was when he learned that the young star would refuse to attend the Academy Awards presentations. Cameron said DiCaprio phoned him and remarked, "It just ain't me, bro."

"Apparently," seethed Cameron, "getting \$4 million to do a juke ad that airs only in Japan is him; going to the Oscars is not."

These two certainly know the history of professional wrestling.

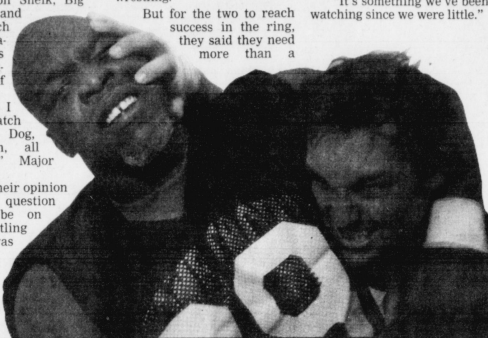
But for the two to reach success in the ring, they said they need more than a

Normals praying for success

Christian band tries to break the mold of secular rock with its album, *Better Than This*

Add a touch of Pink Floyd, a pinch of Toad the Wet Sprocket and a dash of U2, and you've got a mean case of the Normals.

Mark Lockett, Andy Osenga and Clayton Daily, who constitute this almost stereotypical Christian alternative/pop group, come from the city of Normal, Ill. — hence the group's name.

The Normals give a mediocre performance in their debut album, *Better Than This*.

With alterna-pop sound songs as well as lyrics without much gusto, the album barely grabs the listener's attention.

With songs that have seemingly mismatched lyrics and music, a few songs somehow break through the monotony, such as "Everything" and a nameless secret song harbored in the middle of track No. 21.

How can there be 21 tracks on a CD with just 12 listed tracks and one unnamed secret song? That's more than my product

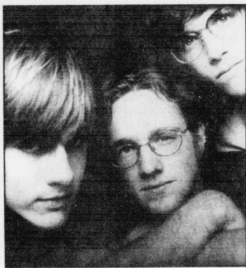

of a high-school-education mind can possibly fathom.

However strange a makeup this album might be, outside of the recording studio, the Normals have some abnormally good merits that nearly make up for the farce of a CD it produced.

The group's goal for their music is not to make a big pile of money, but to influence their listeners to learn to love God and live by his ways.

Osenga recently accepted the position of youth director at his local church, and seems to take this role seriously.

"I go to the high school and hang out with the kids and try to meet more kids," Osenga said.

"It makes you seem real to them, and they see that you care."

The reaction from the fans and knowing they relate to the lyrics is a big plus for the band.

"If your songs are honestly about who you are, they (the listeners) get to know what you're thinking," Osenga said.

"You can meet a kid afterwards and they know everything about you, and they're surprisingly open with you. You listen and then you pray with them ... and their eyes light up. That's what makes it all worthwhile."

Whatever makes this group tick, buying this CD is definitely not worthwhile for anyone who is doing just fine falling asleep.

With tracks that sound the same and lyrics that only make sense half of the time.

The Normals released a debut album that is nowhere close to being exceptional.

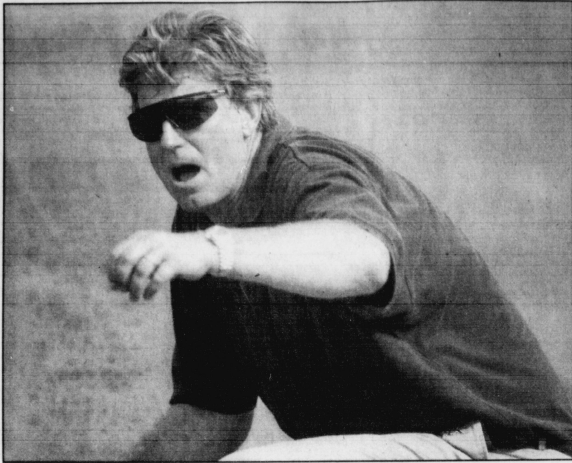

Offensive gurus get defensive for UK-UF

Mumme, Spurrier talk about improved units their high-powered offenses face Saturday

Hal Mumme and Steve Spurrier dissect defenses for breakfast, but both face units this weekend that might be tougher to swallow.

"Kentucky is a completely different Kentucky team than in years past," Spurrier said. "They have a lot more team speed, especially on defense."

The biggest change is UK's more aggressive style of defense, he said. In years past, Spurrier said, the Wildcats would concede the year.

Now, UK places more men near the line of scrimmage, and they get more physical with receivers, he said.

"They're into stopping people now," Spurrier said. "It's a little bit like we play, but not exactly. It seems to be a lot tougher defense than the one we faced last year."

Of course, Bob Stoops' Florida defense is no slouch. Aside from the NFL's Denver Broncos and Green Bay Packers, Mumme said, there might be no better.

The Gators return a line-backer corps that includes four candidates for the Dick Butkus Award, given to the nation's best linebacker. And they return two senior All-America candidates at defensive line, Ed Chester and Tim Beauchamp.

"They are tremendous athletes," Mumme said. "We got excited around here when we recruited Dennis Johnson, but they have six or seven just like him, except they are juniors or seniors."

A brutal battle is brewing

in the trenches, where an all-senior UK offensive front meets a deep and experienced Florida defensive front that includes three seniors and a junior.

"Our offensive line is going to have to play a tremendous game, and our backs are going to have to do a good job of picking up blitzes," Mumme said. "It presents a huge challenge because they are so talented."

But the biggest challenge for UK will be maintaining patience on offense, he said, because UK cannot rack up as much yardage on dinks and dunks as it did against three lesser opponents.

"You've got to make a lot of plays, and you've got to make a lot of plays back-to-back, so you have to be patient in your execution," he said. "You're not going to catch the little ball underneath like we did against Louisville and run up the side-lines 57 yards for a score."

"That's not going to happen. You'll catch the ball underneath and run seven yards, then you've got to catch another one, another one and another one."

No driver, no problem

UK women's golfer overcomes club mishap for big weekend, record round in Tallahassee

The next time Jenny Dugan takes her boyfriend golfing, she'll have to remember to keep the driver out of his hands.

When she and her boyfriend, Chris Gayton, a safety for the UK football team, hit the links together a couple of weekends ago, Dugan lost an old friend — her Big Bertha driver.

"I took Chris golfing on Sunday and he had only played twice," said Dugan, the junior captain of the women's golf team.

"He grabbed my driver and said he was going to crush one. On his first swing, he hit the ball and my clubhouse went flying off the shaft out into the fairway. I didn't say anything for about a minute, then we both started losing it."

The incident created quite a dilemma for Dugan.

"We had to leave for Tallahassee on Wednesday for the Lady Seminole Tournament, and here it was Sunday, and my driver was broken," Dugan said. "So Coach Evans called up Callaway on Monday and we had a driver shipped overnight. I got it on Tuesday, but I didn't have time to try it out until the practice round on Thursday."

It didn't take Dugan long to fall in love with her new driver, a Biggest Big Bertha.

Dugan did better than simply finishing in the top three. She fired a three-day total of 206, good enough for first place at the Lady Seminole Invitational.

Her 8-under-par weekend set a tournament record, while her Friday score — a 6-under-par 66 — set a course record and a school record. No other UK women's golfer ever scored that low. Her two-day total of 138 was also a tournament record.

"To go out with a driver she had never used before and play that well — it's just amazing," Coach Bettie Lou Evans said. "I don't think I've ever been this excited about a player in the 18 years I've been here."

The 6-under-par 66 Dugan fired on Friday was also a personal best.

"I had never shot in the 60s before," Dugan said. "The best part of the round is when I was going into the 18th hole, a short par five. I was 5-under par and had left myself with about a 30-foot put for birdie. All I wanted to do was lag it up by the hole and take my par. I don't know what happened, but somehow that last put just fell in."

"All of my teammates were

watching and they all went nuts. It was simply an enigma. It was unreal."

The record-setting weekend also helped lead the Wildcat team to a fourth-place finish, just two strokes away from runner-up North Carolina.

Dugan couldn't have picked a better setting for her best round.

"I grew up playing golf in Florida and everybody down there called me a traitor when I came to UK to play golf. Instead of playing for the University of Florida," Dugan said. "But I wanted to play for Bettie Lou, and going back and having my family watch me play my best was just unbelievable."

She not only shot a 66 on Friday, but also shot a 72 on Saturday and a 70 on Sunday.

"The most impressive thing was her consistency," Evans said. "Usually when someone shoots that low the first day, it's hard to back it up with two rounds under par, like Jenny did."

"A lot of it's determination. This weekend, UK's women's team will travel to Chapel Hill, N.C., to play in the Lady Tar Heel Invitational.

Dugan plans to extend her hot streak.

"I plan on playing really good down there," she said. "I certainly have the momentum."

Women's soccer trips in Mizzou

The UK women's soccer team rolled into Mark McGwire territory (Missouri) for two games in the Nike Tiger Invitational over the weekend, but "Big Mac's" weekend proved more successful.

Tulsa blanked the Cats 1-0 on Sunday for their second loss of the season, following a 1-1 tie against Missouri on Friday.

Despite surrendering a goal to the Golden Hurricanes, the defense shone in the Cats' second game. Tulsa managed 17 shots, but seven saves by UK goalkeeper Carrie Kuhnell kept the Cats in the contest. Neither team lit up the scoreboard until the 56th minute when Tulsa's Paige Mayer

scored the game's only goal.

"I think the defense played outstanding," Kuhnell said. "We continued to do what we've done all year."

The Cats' downfall was one that has plagued them recently: failure to put the ball in the net.

UK recorded 16 shots on goal and six corner kicks, but nine saves for Tulsa and one less player for the Cats in the second half helped Tulsa earn the shutout. UK forward Jennifer McMaster was disqualified in the second half after receiving a red card for hitting a defender, a teammate said.

"We had a lot of opportunities in the first half, but we couldn't capitalize on them," UK forward Carrie Staber said. "I think we thought we would

get more opportunities in the second half."

Sunday's game was a reflection of last week's game against Alabama, in which the Cats managed 22 shots on goal but came up empty.

The offense had far fewer opportunities in their first game against Missouri, recording only seven shots against the Tigers. Staber made one of those count, though, when she scored her third goal of the season. That tied the score at 1-1, which proved to be the final score after two overtimes.

UK (2-2-2) awaits two Southeastern Conference foes South Carolina on Friday and Florida on Sunday.

"If we can sweep this weekend," she said, "it would be huge."

Avoiding debt debacles

Students who use credit cards to pay for their tuition, books and living facilities often face bad credit later in life.

Lexington attorneys and the Central Kentucky Better Business Bureau say the more students charge, the more likely they will acquire debt. The more debt, the more likely students are to miss payments or not be able to make minimum payments each month, which leads to bad credit.

"(Making late payments or no payments) shows that someone is not making a conscious effort to keep their credit stable," said Bobby Lazer, marketing assistant for the UK Federal Credit Union.

Bad credit can have long-term detrimental effects.

"If you have bad credit on your report, you can be denied certain services, ability to rent an apartment, purchase a car," said Jennifer

Watson, the community outreach specialist for the Central Kentucky Better Business Bureau.

"It affects your record... even your ability to obtain a job."

Students seem to have a tendency to accrue bad credit through credit cards.

"Credit cards are very easy to use," Lazer said. "Students are very accessible to credit cards."

Students get in trouble with retail cards because they receive 10 percent off their purchases, and these purchases add up, Lazer said. "Stay away from credit cards," said Ginger Knight, a bankruptcy attorney in Lexington. She cautioned students, most of whom do not have a large income, from using credit cards because they don't have the money to pay for items they charge.

Charging an abundant amount on a credit card can create more problems than students might realize.

"I didn't have a credit card in college. Most of my friends didn't

either... mostly because we didn't qualify," said John Simms, an attorney for Hayden and Butler. "I think students should stay away from credit cards."

And bad credit shows up credit reports for seven years, Watson said.

The best thing to do when a student realizes he or she is in debt is to call a credit bureau and obtain a copy of their credit report, she said. If someone has been denied credit in the last 60 days, the report can be obtained free of charge. Normally, the report costs about \$8.

"Read your report carefully and make sure someone from the bureau explains the report to you," Watson said. "If anything is incorrect on your credit report, tell them."

Beware of companies who promise to erase bad credit from a credit report, Watson said. That's not possible.

The best thing to do to prevent bad credit is to manage money efficiently. If students do not have credit cards, it's difficult to get into debt.

It did not take a tragic occurrence like Murray State for Beach to jump-start an appropriate fire safety program. Rather, it was last year's mock "disaster" that surprised dorm residents with fake smoke.

On Thursday, Beach will have a fire prevention demonstration from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the Commons Plaza. At 5:30 p.m. in the Commons Building, a town meeting will be held at which further fire

safety concerns will be addressed.

Students might sleep easier knowing all dorms are equipped with fire-retardant furniture and carpet, Beach said.

He stresses the words "fire-retardant," because those materials are not 100 percent fire resistant.

To make a building truly fireproof, Beach said, it would have to be made of concrete and placed under water.

In addition to these preventive measures, resident advisers give out a guide to fire safety regulations and policies to dorm residents.

NUBIAN Council glad about party approval

Group's concerns allayed after fights broke out at a gathering earlier this fall

The Nubian Council was "relieved last night when they found out they could sponsor parties at the Student Center in the future."

Students were concerned for the past week about whether or not the Student Center would allow organizations to host non-alcoholic parties in the ballroom anymore.

On Sept. 12, the Nubian Council threw a party that got a little out of hand when fights occurred, said Tom Joyner, president of the Nubian Council.

An estimated 720 people were at the party, almost filling the ballroom's capacity of 1,000 people. The party was supposed to be from 10 p.m. to 1 a.m., but the DJ was ordered to call the party off at 12:45 a.m. because the third fight was getting out of hand.

Three UK police officers also attended, along with eight student workers and four security officers.

Last Thursday, UK administrators met to critique the party to find better ways to plan them.

"The parties will go on, that was never a question," said Burke, who was at the party. "We're just trying to accommodate the students' safety. Our (UK) students handled themselves in a well-mannered way compared to the other Kentucky college students who were there."

Nubian Council Vice President Caroline Bivens was surprised at the decision.

"I thought they would cancel any parties at the Student Center altogether," Bivens said. "It didn't occur in an orderly fashion."

UK Police Lt. Henry Huff said no criminal complaints or reports had been filed. He mentioned procedural problems with the dance policy.

"It's the officer's discretion at the scene about whether to make a criminal arrest," Huff said.

Joyner and administrators said the reason so many people showed up

was because people from all over the state were invited.

The Nubian Council charged \$5 at the door. UK students with a valid ID could sign in a guest who had a driver's license. Students from other schools could not bring guests.

Dean of Students David Stockham was glad security was on sight.

"It would have been a bad situation had the police not been there," Stockham said. "Police were hauling people out of there. Police also stood between groups of people after the party."

Stockham also said the best they can do while planning the parties is estimate the number of people showing and then assign security officers accordingly.

Joyner says he sees no need for security officers at parties at all.

"They're not professional at all," Joyner said. "They turned away 20 of our guests from K-State (University) at first. They didn't know who was allowed in the party. The UK Police do their job."

Joyner said she wants to see two cops per 100 people at the parties.

"We are going to try to plan (the next party) so nobody gets hurt at the party," Stockham said.

Gender gap persists at Harvard U.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — At the first Black Students' Association party Friday night, first-year women were introduced to a social phenomenon they will soon be familiar with — a room full of black Harvard women among only a few handful of black Harvard men.

In the class of 2002, 79 black men were admitted, compared to 128 women, meaning males should comprise a little less than 40 percent of the class — an admitted class that was overall 52 percent male. (Figures on matriculated students are not yet available.)

These ratios are roughly in line with those of recent years. In fact, the number of black males is up significantly from the class of 1996, in which fewer than 25 percent of black students were male, the lowest figure since the 1960s.

These numbers reflect a nationwide gender gap in higher education, where black women make up the majority — 63 percent — of black student enrollment at colleges and universities, according to The Journal of Blacks in Higher Education.

Over the past 20 years, the number of blacks in higher education has increased by 40 percent — and women have accounted for 75 percent of those gains, according to The Journal.

Memory of Maris is skewed by recent hype

As the dynamic duo of Mark McGwire and Sammy Sosa slug it out for the home run record, a simple man has been lost amid the fanfare. A reluctant hero to begin with, now his amazing season of '61 in '61 is being dismissed as a flash in the pan and his place in the Hall of Fame disputed. This man, of course, is Roger Maris.

Many will argue that he was given his due when his family was at the game where his record was broken and solemnly remembered. This is true, and the credit that McGwire and Sosa have given him is a tribute to their humbleness in today's ego-ravaged sports scene. But the public has only viewed Roger Maris as a simple statistic and not a man.

As McGwire and Sosa chased the record, they received standing ovations in visiting ballparks and support from all over the country. The well-being of the nation and pulling together of communities was attributed to their home run total. This is a much different scenario than the one Maris encountered. In 1961 Roger Maris was vilified for attempting to break the immortal Babe Ruth's record of 60 home runs. He was the ire of many fans throughout the nation and was not only occasionally booed but even received threats. All he wanted was to be left alone.

Roger Maris grew up in lonely Fargo, N.D. An unlikely talent in an unlikely place, he eventually paved his own way to

a career with the New York Yankees, a team famous for its baseball exploits in a town famous for its exploitation of baseball players.

No one has ever said playing for the Yankees was easy. The Bronx cheered as the killer M's, Maris and Mickey Mantle, wreaked havoc on pitchers in the summer of '61, but as Maris closed in on the record, things changed. While he was enjoying a phenomenal season and chasing a god, Maris did it in the wrong place. Babe Ruth was a legend, and in no place was he more beloved than New York. Nothing was as eerie as Maris chasing the record in Yankee Stadium, known to many as "the house that Ruth built."

Even though he had completed one of the most prolific and amazing seasons of all time, many argued that because it had taken him more games than Ruth, the record he had set was tarnished.

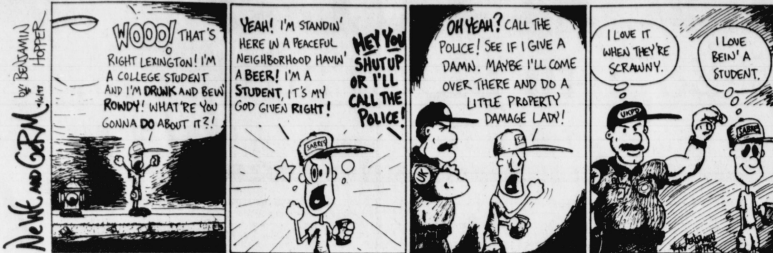

Child Care Assistance Program

The Child Care Council of Kentucky, Inc. is the Service Agent for the Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) for 22 counties. CCAP is funded by federal and state funds. Case managers in each county assist eligible families in finding and paying for child care.

To be eligible, child care must be needed for parents to work, attend college, participate in a K-TAP training program, protect a child, or to attend high school (for a teen parent). Low income working parents and college students may qualify if their income is below 133% of the federal poverty guideline (see chart below). (Except for families with an income below \$400, all families will pay for part of their child care expenses.)
