



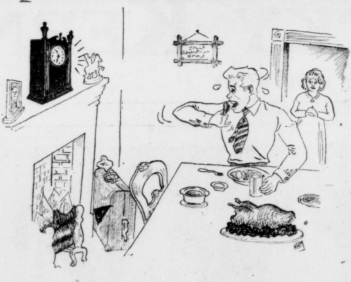

Ignoring such mundane matters as elections, the staff just relaxed and paid off bets.

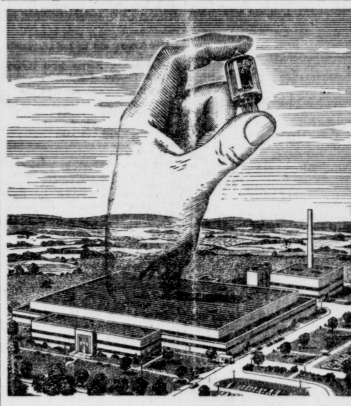

However, even though Coach Rupp did set the official opening on Nov. 1, Beard, Barnstable, Groza, and a few others of the varsity have been shooting a half an hour a day, before the frosh practice, for the last two weeks.

With the first game against Indiana Central, only three weeks away, Coach Rupp expects the boys to round into shape by the middle of next week.

Four All-Conference men and two All-Americans from last year's team were missing when Manager Hummer Yessin blew the whistle and started the 48-49 campaign. Departed were Captain Kenny Rollins, Joe Holland, Jim Jordan, Jack Parkinson, and Dutch Campbell.

This year's Wildkats are: **CHIT Barker**—the team's grand grand old man starts his last year for the Wildkats, practicing long shots for his forward position; handles the ball like an apple.

**Dale Barnstable**—6'2", likes basketball as much as Beard; banged in 17 points against DePaul last year from far out on the floor; likeable boy, has "lotsa hustle."

## Wildcats Stomp Cincinnati 28-7 In Rough Encounter

The Wildkats of Kentucky defeated the University of Cincinnati, 28-7, before a near-capacity crowd of 26,000 fans last Saturday afternoon in UC's Nippert Stadium.

It was the third consecutive year that the Kentuckians had whipped the Bearcats by a three-touchdown margin. In 1946, UK won 26-7 and last season the Big Blue took the skirmish, 30-0.

The contest was hard fought from beginning to finish. And for the second straight year, the game nearly ended in a free-for-all battle between the two teams.

The outbreak of fistfights started shortly after Bobby Brooks kicked his fourth straight point-after-touchdown for the Kentucky eleven. Brooks and UC's Thurman Owens mixed it up and were joined by several others from both teams. However, the whole melee lasted only 30 seconds as the coaches, officials, and some of the players quickly broke up the hostilities.

**Score Twice in Six Minutes**  
The Cats were terrific to open the game. After stopping three UK line plays, Bill Miller took a Bearcat punt and ran 34 yards into Cincy territory. Two plays later, Sherty Jamerson scampered around right end for 24 yards and the first TD. This came with only three minutes gone.

## Wildcats Stomp Cincinnati 28-7 In Rough Encounter

Lloyd McDermott recovered a UC fumble on the bear's 47 shortly thereafter. After a 28-yard run by Jamerson, George Blanda passed to Jim Howe in the end zone for another score. Brooks kicked the second of four perfect placements.

These two tallies came with only six minutes of the contest elapsed.

## Still in the first quarter, Sherty Jamerson, taking a handoff from Boller on a punt, raced 63-yards for another marker, but a 15-yard penalty nullified the play.

In the second play, a 36-yard aerial from Boller to Wah Jones netted the UKers another score.

The Bearcats' only touchdown came on a pass QB Tom O'Malley to Rod Joe Hawk in the fourth quarter. The play was good for 22 yards. Tom Jensen kicked the p.a.t.

**Howe scores Final**  
In the dying moments of play, Boller flipped a 24-yard aerial to Don Pucci's one pass interception this year was good for 78 yards and a touchdown, which gives him the lead in that department.

## Howe in the end zone and UK scored again. A few seconds later, the short flurry of fists started to fly, but this was quickly squelched.

Standouts for UK were Linemen Doc Perrell, Lloyd McDermott, Jerry Claiborne, Ray Porter and Dick Holway. In the backfield, Bill Boller, Jim Howe, Sherty Jamerson, George Blanda, and Dick Martin were the passcutters.—T. D.

There are 13 seniors, 19 Juniors, and 31 sophomores on this year's Cincinnati Bearcat squad.

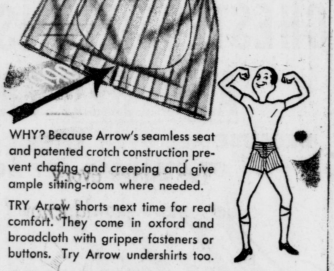

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## Player Of The Week: Jim Howe

Right Halfback Jim Howe has been chosen as the Kernel's Player-of-the-Week for having scored the winning and the final touchdowns last Saturday against Cincinnati.

Trailing closely behind Howe for top honors was Shurtly Jefferson, who scored twice, only to have one called back as a result of a penalty. Jefferson ran like a demon and picked up much yardage while he was in the game.

Other standouts for UK were Bill Bolter, who tossed two TD passes; George Blanda for his excellent kicking and good passing; and Doc Ferrell for having blocked a UC punt and stopping many Bearcat backs as they tried the Big Blue Line.

But Jim Howe, a junior halfback from Fort Thomas, was "Johnny-on-the-spot." He took a Blanda aerial in the end zone right off the finger tips of UC Quarterback Tom O'Malley early in the initial quarter for the Cats' second score and what proved to be the winning touchdown.

In the closing minutes of the hard-fought struggle, Howe slipped into paydirt and snagged a 24-yard pass from Bolter for UK's final score. Seconds later, the contest ended and Kentuckians went home happy.

Had 9.3 Average In 1942

Howe led the Wildcats team last season in average yards gained per try with a mark of 9.3 to easily top Jack Harris, who had a 6.4 record. In addition, he scored 12 points, intercepted one pass, and caught nine UK aerials good for 71 yards for the campaign.

High School Star

The 21-year-old halfback stands 6'1", weighs 170 pounds and served for 22 months in the U.S. Infantry. While at Highlands High School, in Fort Thomas, Jim won the award for being the best all-around athlete in the institution. He was a four-sport standout.

He captained the school's track and basketball team in his final season. In tennis, Howe was on the doubles team that captured the Northern Kentucky high school championship.

In football, Jim was named All-State in his junior and senior years. It was in his last season that Highlands won the State championship when they whipped Ashland High, 19-0, on UK's Stoll Field in the annual Shrine charity game of 1942.

Scored Five TD's In 1944

Then as a 17-year-old, Howe came to UK after almost deciding to enroll at the University of Tennessee. In the initial game of the 1944 season, against Ole Miss, Howe scored the first touchdown of the contest, which Kentucky eventually took 27-7. Late in the game, Howe received a broken collarbone.

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
