Staff Publications

Russell Powell of the Engineering Library Published the second edition of his Handbooks and Tables in Science and Technology last spring. As the following review attests, the book is a respected reference work. Congratulations, Russ.

Handbooks and Tables in Science and Technology. 2d ed. Edited by Russell H. Powell. Phoenix, Oryx, 1983. vi, 297p.

This guide lists 3,403 handbooks and tables in science, technology, and medicine. It emphasizes the pure and applied sciences such as physics, chemistry, engineering, agriculture, and biology. Generally excluded are popular how-to handbooks as well as "dictionaries, encyclopedias, field guides, maps, directories, biographical sources, indexing and abstracting tools and current awareness sources" and compendia of standards. This edition includes approximately 1,300 more entries than the first edition, published in 1979 (cf. RSBR, July 1, 1980).

There are four sections: the main entry section, a Subject Index, Author/Editor Index, and Publishers Index. The Main entry section is arranged alphabetically by title and includes complete bibliographic data as well as LC card numbers, ISBNs, prices, and (for government documents) Superintendent of Documents numbers or NTIS/technical report numbers as applicable. Most entries have a brief annotation. Some entries make references to other handbooks dealing with similar information. Entries are numbered, these numbers being used in the Author/Editor and Subject Indexes. The latter is a keyword index comprised of significant words from titles and annotations, augmented as necessary. See and see also references are used throughout. The Author/Editor Index includes the publishers where no authors are given. The Publishers Index is in fact an alphabetical directory.

Handbooks and Tables in Science and Technology continues to be a very useful reference guide and acquisitions tool for academic, special, and large public libraries. (Booklist, Jan. 1, 1984)

UK Art Museum News

New York-based artist Peter Berg's massive abstract sculptures are especially designed for the spaces in which they are built. For the University Art Museum's central court the artist will construct a dynamic architectural work, brightly colored and complex in composition. Berg's recent sculptures are not only philosophical statements, filled with historical references to Constructivist art, but witty visual puzzles as well. They challenge the viewer to discover the hidden geometric patterns and carefully considered structure that underlie the apparently random compositions. A group of the artist's expressionistic "Garfish" drawings will also be on view March 4-April 22.

Data Research Associates at Lexington Public

The Lexington Public Library has signed with Data Research Associates of St. Louis for an integrated automated library system. DRA will provide circulation control, acquisitions, and database construction and maintenance functions, as well as serials control and a public access catalog.

DRA and LPL will jointly develop a cable TV interface which will allow access to bibliographic information via the library's dedicated channel. Hardware will be DEC's VAX 11-750, with DEC Rainbow micros used as intelligent terminals as well as for record conversion and system backup. (Library Hotline (Jan. 16), p.6)

Summer Institutes in the Archival Sciences

The Newberry Library and the Folger Shakespeare Library are sponsoring summer institutes in the archival sciences. These institutes have been designed to provide intensive training in the techniques fundamental to work with primary source materials, with an emphasis on the reading, transcribing, and editing of manuscripts from the period 1300-1560.

The Newberry Institute will concentrate on the study of Spanish and Hispanic-American source materials; the Folger will concentrate on French materials.

THE UK LIBRARY SYSTEM

The following is the first in a series of descriptive articles concerning various aspects of the UK Library System.

The Agriculture Library houses a very old library collection which dates back to the very beginning of the Agricultural Experiment Station. The Library has made several physical moves and one administrative move in its history; today it is an Associate Library in the University of Kentucky Libraries system and occupies 12,000 square feet on the ground floor of the Agricultural Science Center North.

The collection has seen rapid growth during the last 20 years. The core collection consisted of Experiment Station and U.S. Department of Agriculture Publications. These collections are still maintained today, but the library now houses 90,000 volumes in Agriculture and all the allied fields. Areas of primary collecting are Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Engineering, Agronomy, Animal Sciences, Entomology, Forestry, Horticulture, Landscape Architecture (some aspects), Nutrition (not dietetics), Food Sciences, Plant Pathology, Rural Sociology, and Veterinary Sciences. The Agriculture Library houses the U.S. Department of Agriculture collection, which includes a large amount of material in Home Economics as well as applied agriculture. A collection of publications from all U.S. Agricultural Experiment Stations has been maintained and is currently being completed in microfilm.

During the past 2 years the Agriculture Library has expanded its services by adding computerized literature searching and is currently in the process of developing services to the off-campus faculty located in both western and eastern Kentucky. The library's mission is to support the land grant function of the University and actively support the Agricultural teaching and research of the University of Kentucky. Because of the applied nature of the collection, it is used by many on and off-campus people and welcomes all visitors. (Toni Powell)

INFORMATION FROM THE PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

When disaster strikes a library, fire or water are almost always involved. Knowing what action to take will save time, personnel, costs, and contents.

In case of fire, firemen will take charge and ideally will have been informed of the library's priorities, concerns, and needs. Whenever possible, ranges should be covered with salvage tarps to help lessen water damage. Libraries should have rolls of plastic sheet which can be thrown over ranges where heat is not a problem to protect books from unexpected water damage, often quite far from the actual fire or water problem. When premises are finally safe, fire experts will allow inspection. In a large fire this may not happen for twenty-four to forty-eight hours after the fire is extinguished. (Jessie Adams)
