A Closer Walk

The Oscar nominated film, "A Closer Walk", will be shown at the KY Theater on Thursday, July 1, at 7:30 PM. There is no charge so bring your friends to see this incredible film and stay for the discussion. The film is sponsored by Kentucky's Student Global AIDS Campaign, Lexington's Laymen's Response to AIDS, NCCJ (Lexington), and the Interfaith Alliance

Shot on four continents, this documentary reveals through vignettes, interviews and personal narratives, the scope and consequence of AIDS. There is particular focus on women's status and vulnerability, the disproportion of infections outside the West, and the phenomenal demographic group- over 13 million-called "AIDS orphans." There is also information about the response from the world's religious organizations and AIDS epidemiology related to cultural institutions.

Excerpts from interviews with UN Secretary General Kofi Annan, the Dalai Lama, development economist Jeffrey Sachs, U2's Bono, UNAIDS director Peter Piot, Partners in Health's Paul Farmer, with testimonies from American, Indian, African, and Ukrainian physicians give context to the stories of HIV+-patients, caregivers and advocates fiercely supporting the sick, and family members, often parents who survive their childrens' death.continued on page 20

KY Families For Fairness

The Kentucky Fairness Alliance and the Fairness Campaign came together to create Kentucky Families for Fairness - the campaign to defeat the constitutional amendment on marriage in Kentucky.

I am pleased to introduce myself to you as the new Campaign Manager. I so much appreciate the opportunity to bring my experience of community and electoral organizing back to Kentucky to help launch and manage this massive and dynamic campaign to defeat this anti-gay amendment. For over a decade I have worked as a community and electoral organizer for nonprofit organizations, candidate campaigns, federal and municipal government and most recently on staff of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

In these capacities, I have recruited, trained and motivated hundreds of volunteers working to create change in their communities and build political power to move forward an agenda of equality. I served at the Task Force as a Senior Field Organizer. My job was to work side-by-side with state and local communities facing anti-LGBT ballot initiatives. The Task Force has generously let me take a 6 month leave of absence to accept this position. It is a huge investment of staff resources and indicates their high level of support and confidence for our campaign.

Additionally, I am a life-long and proud Kentuckian, a former staff member and steering committee member of Kentucky Fairness Alliance as well as a former CFAIR member at the Fairness Campaign.

As your campaign manager, I am committed to writing and implementing a campaign plan that includes an aggressive volunteer voter identification effort, intentional coalition and ally building. We will not focus on just the urban areas of the state, but will

continue to strengthen Fairness across Kentucky from Boyd to Hickman and every county in-between.

There are a number of things we are currently doing as we ramp up to a full-fledged campaign. I want to assure you that there is a lot going on, even though it may not be highly visible right now.

I am conducting aggressive local and national searches for qualified and capable Finance/Fundraising Director and a Statewide Field Director.

The nominating committee is working overtime to solicit candidates for the campaign steering committee. They are working diligently to make sure our committee is well represented in terms of geography, race, class, age, gender, gender identity and sexual orientation, as well as prior campaign experience. I'm confident this committee will be a dynamic and experienced team of folks.

Thanks to Andrea Hildebran and Barry Grossheim, we have officially registered as an issue campaign with the Secretary of State. thanks to Andrea and the KFA Staff & Board and the Fairness Campaign Staff & Board as they have worked tirelessly to launch this campaign since April 12th - raising money, recruiting volunteers and continuing to identify voters on the issue. Andrea has been working hard to raise money to fill the account. Thanks to Charles King in Northern KY, we have found office space that seems to fit our needs in that region. We are still working to identify office space in Louisville and Lexington. If you're interested in helping out with identifying offices, please let me know and I'll get you the space needs we're looking for.

We're starting now to train voters on how to vote in November and to help

make it clear what we are asking, the public name of the campaign is "NO on the Amendment". The legal name of the campaign will remain KFF, but it will only appear in the paid for by... All checks and donations should be made payable to "NO on the Amendment".

We have a tremendous amount of work to do and I need your help. The most important work we can be doing right now is raising money and talking with voters at their homes and on the phone. Please don't ever hesitate to contact me with any questions or concerns you have about the campaign. My door is always open and I'm committed to a campaign of honest and direct communication. Again, thanks so much for the work you've done this year or for the past five, 10 or 15 years to move Fairness forward in Kentucky. We didn't ask for this fight, but we're going to seize this opportunity and strengthen Fairness and equality for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender folks in all 120 counties in Kentucky.

Marriage, Civil Unions, Domestic Partnership ...What's the Difference?

As we talk to people about the need to defeat the Ky constitutional admendment, it is important that we understand the differences between the various terms used to indicate relationships between two people. It is particularly important to let the public know that this amendment would make illegal not only marriage, but civil unions and domestic partner benefits for employees of state universities.

A civil marriage is a legally binding contract between two people who commit themselves to one another for a lifetime. There are a few minimal requirements, including age and an absence of close blood relationship between the two parties. Two elements are required to enter into a marriage: a license and a ceremony. The couple applies for a marriage license from the state. Certain officials such as judges or clergy members are authorized by the government to perform the ceremony.

If the marriage ends in divorce, it is dissolved in family court, where child custody issues and distribution of property is also handled. Civil marriages are available to opposite-sex couples in all 50 states, and historically, every state recognizes

marriages contracted in every other state.
Only Massachusetts allows same-sex couples to marry.

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A religious marriage is a covenant between two people in the care of a community of faith. They . too, commit themselves to one another for a lifetime. Some religious organizations have requirements before a ceremony is performed. For example, pre-marital counseling may be required and may be offered by the minister, rabbi, or other religious leader. All faith tradition see marriage as a serious commitment; only the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches view marriage as a sacrament. A few religious traditions do not permit or recognize divorce.

Some religious organizations will perform Holy Union Ceremonies, most usually for gay and lesbian couples. This union is recognized and supported by the church community even though there is no legal status for the couple. In Lexington The Unitarian Universalist Church, St. Michal the Martyr Parish (a member of the Orthodox Catholic Church) and The Society of Friends, Quakers will witness the joining of two people

is similar to a civil marriage, but not identical. The same two elements are required: a license and a ceremony. A civil union entails only those rights and responsibilities governed by Vermont law. It does not grant any of the 1,138 rights and responsibilities governed by Federal law. Should the civil union end in divorce, it is dissolved in family court. There is no residency requirement for entering a civil union, but if the couple wishes to divorce, they must first establish residency in Vermont.

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A domestic partnership is much more limited than either a civil marriage or a civil union. The concept originated among private businesses that wanted to provide greater job equity to employees with unmarried partners. Thus, the benefits are contingent on one partner being employed by a firm that offers such benefits, and are limited to issues that an employer can address. For example, an employer may

provide health insurance to the partner, but has no jurisdiction over taxation and inheritance. Generally, the couple must complete an affidavit and may be required to provide documentation as to the length of co-habitation and their financial interdependence. There is no ceremony, and their marital status is still "single." To dissolve the domestic partnership, one of the partners must submit a form stating that the relationship has ended. There is no divorce and no process for distribution of property.

The vast majority of same-sex couples do not fall into any of these categories. They make lasting commitments to one another that are not recognized by government, religion, or business. Some have lived together for decades, owned homes together, raised children together, and are spouses in every respect except legally. Yet, they are still viewed as strangers in the eyes of the law.

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GLSO WINS FIRST PLACE AT 6TH ANNUAL BOWLING TOURNAMENT

In celebration of Pride Month, the Bluegrass Chapter of the Kentucky Fairness Allinace sponsored the 6th Annual Fundraising Bowling Tournament which was held at Southland Lanes on June 12, 2004. Twenty-two bowlers, representing four organizations, participated and raised nearly \$1,000 dollars through bowler sponsorships. The event was a No-tap Monte Carlo tournament consisting of three games. In a no-tap event, knocking down nine pins (as opposed to ten pins) is scored as a strike. Periodically a colored pin would appear in the head pin position and if the participant bowled a true strike, a

cash prize of either three dollars or one dollar (depending on the color of the pin) was given away. Nearly \$50.00 in prize money was distributed with most of the proceeds being immediately contributed to the fundraising event.

The GLSO team, consisting of Michael Childress, Tom Collins, Mike Taylor, a/k/a Benedict Arnold, and John Ward soundly trounced the team representing the Fairness Bluegrass Chapter by 200 pins and took home the traveling trophy for the second year in a row. The traveling trophy was presented to the representatives of GLSO at the volunteer dinner On June 25, 2004. It will be displayed with pride at the Pride Center until next year. Members of the Bluegrass Chapter have vowed to capture the trophy next year.

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GCBT Spirituality

Some months ago I began a series on various aspects of what might be called a Gay and Lesbian Spirituality. We touched upon six different points of reference that may be common in the GLBT experience. I called these points of reference icons for they, like computer icons and religious icons, tend to open up new windows of understanding when discussed. The first six icons of Gay/Lesbian Spirituality were: Lack of Models of Adult Love, Exile. Mourning, Internalized Self Hatred, Shame and Isolation. This first set of spirituality icons can be collectively thought of as icons of Desolation with the next six being the icons of Consolation. St. Ignatius of Loyola explained in his many theological writings that our relationship with the Divine One goes through many peaks and valleys. When we are feeling good and life is fine we are in moments of consolation. When we are hurting and life seems to be dealing us prunes we are in moments of desolation. Many persons

would like to say that in those moments of desolation God is far away and, conversely, in the moments of consolation God is near but Ignatius challenged that concept. He believes that God is equally present in both the up times and the down times and that both offer great opportunities for connection with this Divine Being. Consolation and Desolation times are natural and healthy and should not be avoided. The key to a healthy life (healthy spirituality) is being able to recognize which phase you are presently in and being able to ride the wave in a healthy manner.

Beginning next month I will start our journey through the six Consolation Icons of GLBT Spirituality. If the first six seemed somewhat dark or depressing expect the next six to be more up-beat and joyful. We have a great deal to celebrate as GLBT persons. We have a richness to offer the world that is only now beginning to be realized. Let s celebrate together and let the world know!

A CLoser Walk is **not** simply a depressing look at the world pandemic. It does expose the stark reality of global AIDS but it also asks the viewers to empower ourselves and each other to make a difference in how our country responds to this crisis. We can help make this time the end of the beginning.

Today, 44 million people are living with HIV, 95% in developing and poor countries, and 99% without treatment. In some countries, infection rates exceed 30%. Over 8,000 people die from AIDS each day. Children orphaned by AIDS frequently must quit school, suffer hunger, and are forced from their homes. Beyond sub-Saharan Africa, India, China, and Eastern Europe are poised to see comparable devastation. Compared by Jeffrey Sachs to the Holocaust, the film asks: Do we really believe we can stand by and watch as tens of millions of people die needlessly and still not pay the price?

In 2004 we have seen the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, TB, and Malaria nearly disabled for want of funds, proven prevention strategies undermined, deliberate attempts to block affordable access to treatment- while over two-and-a-half million people died from AIDS. Can we use the words compassion, humanity, dignity of our fellow man and woman? They all become hollow, says UN Secretary General Kofi Annan in an excerpt from the film.

At previous screenings in the state, audiences expressed surprise, disbelief, and conflict trying to reconcile perception with apparent reality. Based on viewer's reactions in smaller venues, The Kentucky Theater agreed to show the film and play host to a discussion afterward about advocacy, policy, and the global AIDS campaign. US Senators Bunning and McConnell and State Senator Mongiardo are invited to attend to discuss US leadership

around global AIDS, though their acceptance is not yet confirmed. (State Senator Scorsone, within 15 minutes of receiving the invitation, simply wrote back: "Count me in." Where do such hearty fighters come from?)

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Event sponsors are AIDS advocacy groups based in Lexington, Louisville, and Northern Kentucky, all chapter members of the international campaign to prioritize the global AIDS fight among US leaders. From Lexington s Aspendale neighborhood to sub-Saharan Africa, we work to confrom the policies and ignorance that block our progress.

Specifically our goals are to secure adequate funding, and to protect poor and debt-burdened countries right (ensured by international trade agreements) to purchase generic AIDS drugs to treat their citizens. At this time there are proposed agreements seeking to block such purchases.

This year we are charged to make AIDS and the care of 44 Million HIV+ people a central campaign issue. Which candidates have enough courage and moral clarity to prioritize the lives of people living with HIV/AIDS? The goal of this event is to build a base of people willing to commit energy, time, and self to advocacy work. Our leaders' reluctance and unwillingness to confront this global emergency implicates us as a whole. We are the people who electe them, we have a responsibility to educate ourselves and our fellow citizens, and a responsibility to vote.

HATE CRIMES REPORT

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Division of Police annually releases their Hate Crimes Report for crimes in Lexington that are reported and defined as hate crimes. Hate crimes are defined as criminal offenses against the person or property of individuals where the victim is targeted because she/he is a member of her/his particular race, ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation. The data for Lexington both reflect and differ from national numbers in several ways:

Nationally African-Americans are the most targeted group for hate crimes. In Lexington for the years 2000-2003, African-Americans were also the most frequent hate crimes victims with 7 incidents plus two involving multi-racial targets. Almost tied, however, are Gay Men against who 7 hate crimes were reported from 2000-2003.

Nationally Jews are the second most frequent targets of hate crimes, but in Lexington there were no reported cases of anti-Semitic hate crimes.

Overall, Gay Men/Lesbians are the 3rd most frequently targeted victims of hate crimes in the US but the most frequent victims of violent hate crimes (assaults and murder as compared to intimidation or vandalism). In Lexington there were no reported anti-lesbian hate crimes in 2000-2003 but 7 hate crimes against gay men. Half of all violent hate crimes in the city in the last 3 years have been against gay men. This makes Gay Men the most frequent targets of violent hate crimes in Lexington.

The violent hate crimes against people rather than property (vandalism, etc.) consist of 1 aggravated assault and 5 simple assaults.

In Kentucky in the last 4 years, there have been two hate crimes where the victim was murdered. In both cases the motivation was anti-gay feelings on the part of the killers:

July 5, 1999: Private Barry Winchell was brutally beaten with a baseball bat at Ft. Campbell, KY, and died the next day of severe trauma to the head. His killers, former friends of Winchell's and fellow soldiers, were upset that he was dating a female-to-male transgendered woman.

June 17, 2003: Guinn "Richie" Phillips was strangled and suffocated to death in Rineyville, KY. His body was then put in a suitcase and dumped in the local Rough River. Relatives of Phillips' killer testified that the killer said he lured Phillips to a motel room because he was gay and killed him.
