TERRY HALL

After two outstanding seasons at Kentucky and possessing a career winning percentage of .657 in eight years as a collegiate coach, Terry Hall is now regarded as one of the top coaches in the women's collegiate ranks.

Hall guided the 1981-82 edition of the Lady Kats to their finest season ever, a 24-8 campaign that ended in the Midwest Regional championship, where Kentucky fell to No. 1-ranked and eventual National Champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor.

By the end of the season, the Lady Kats were playing so well that Hall proclaimed, "If we had been in any other region, we would have been in the Final Four."

That Kentucky performed so well is largely credited to Hall, who at the start of the season was faced with the task of rebuilding a team that lost two starters off the front line while adding only one player—a guard—to the roster. But somehow Kentucky improved. The Midwest Regional final was one step farther than the Lady Kats had advanced the previous year, in Hall's rookie season at Kentucky. That year UK finished with a 25-6 record after losing at Maryland in the AIAW's round of 16 finalists. Following that season, Hall was honored as the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference Coach of the Year.

Hall now has a 49-14 record at UK for a winning percentage of .777. Her career record is 142-74 over 8 years. The highlight of her career at Kentucky came toward the end of last season, when the Lady Kats defeated favored Tennessee 80-74 to capture the Southeastern Conference championship on their home floor.

Before coming to Kentucky, Hall coached for five seasons at Louisville, where her teams compiled a 79-54 record. In her final season at U of L, she guided the Lady Cardinals to their first Metro Conference title as they defeated a tough Memphis State team in the tournament finale. Hall also coached tennis and softball while at U of L.

Hall's initial coaching job was a one-year assignment at Eastern Kentucky University, where the Lady Colonels produced a 14-6 record and a KWIC title for the rookie coach. Her experience up to that point had been in the high school ranks, where she coached Louisville Butler to a 69-33 record and two Jefferson County titles in five seasons.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall attended Indiana State University, where she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball before graduating in 1966. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Also an outstanding softball player, Hall enjoys competing in a fast-pitch league in Louisville. She has been named to several softball all-star teams and is an exceptional pitcher.

Hall earned a degree in Health and P.E. from ISU in 1966, and received a Master's Degree in P.E. from Eastern Kentucky University in 1974.

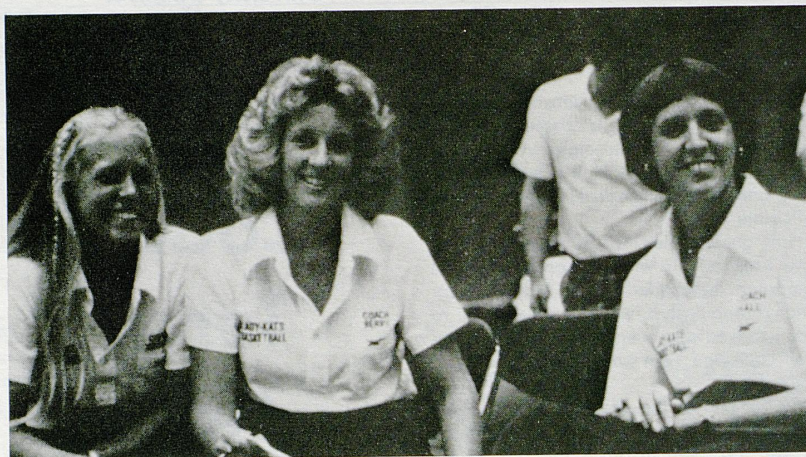

An excellent student, Lynn earned Academic All-American honors at William and Mary while earning a 3.97 grade point average over four years. She was also a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society. A native of St. Petersburg, FL, Lynn has spent several summers working basketball camps, including the B/C All-Stars Basketball Camp, the Manatee Junior College Basketball Camp, and the Lady Kat Basketball Camp. As a player at William and Mary, Lynn is ranked No. 1 on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,504 career points. She averaged 18.3 points over four seasons with a 56.2 field goal percentage.

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

President, University of Kentucky



Dr. Otis A. Singletary, the eighth president of the University of Kentucky, assumed that office in August 1969. He had previously served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,400 students on the Lexington campus and about 21,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Great strides toward academic excellence have been made during Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. Two professional schools—dentistry and pharmacy—have been ranked among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history and mathematics have gained national attention. The UK Library now ranks among the best in the Southeast, and a large portion of the world-wide research related to tobacco and health is now done at UK.

Under Dr. Singletary's guidance, strong efforts have been made to meet the needs of minority groups including the establishment of an office of vice president for minority affairs.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary has been actively involved in a number of professional organizations and has served as president of the Southern Association of Land-grant Colleges and State Universities,

vice president of the American Council on Education and vice chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board.

Among his many awards and honors, he most recently received the Department of Army's Outstanding Service Medal.

He entered higher education in 1954 as a member of the history faculty at the University of Texas and twice was awarded the University Student Association's Teaching Excellence Award.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa Senate.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U.S. Navy Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

Athletics At Kentucky

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in 20 different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Seventeen other members, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as do two student representatives.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Director of Athletics Cliff Hagan.

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN

Athletics Director

The hiring of new football coach Jerry Claiborne and presentation of a record budget of \$6,397,685 to the UK Athletics Association Board of Directors are two more recent developments in the career of Cliff Hagan, now in his eighth year as Wildcat athletics director and 11th year with the Athletics Department.

Accompanying Hagan's budget report was a statement by UK president Dr. Otis A. Singletary stressing the need for a first-rate swimming facility and a fieldhouse, which were long-range goals for the department.

In other related news, Hagan said the University is free to televise all its December basketball games on a live basis and that the possibility exists to televise UK's road conference football games provided the telecasts don't do "appreciable damage" to other games within a 125-mile limit.

Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been a hallmark of Hagan's seven-year reign as Wildcat athletics director, with fine attendance at football and basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

Recent physical improvements include a new baseball grandstand behind home plate, a new office area for the academic advisory staff, new locker rooms in the football dressing rooms and construction of a new equipment shed for track.

On the institutional side of the ledger, the University was host to both the men's and women's Southeastern Conference basketball tournaments earlier this year and will host the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985, along with renewal of the UK Relays in 1980.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

A few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics under Hagan include:

- Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful players' lounge at Shively Sports Center.
- New food service equipment in the press box at Commonwealth Stadium.
- New basketball offices in Memorial Coliseum for both the men and women.
- Re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a complete revamping of the track facilities at Shively Sports Center.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena.

Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics

director in July, 1975; during the ensuing school year, Wildcat teams compiled one of the best records in the school's history, with the basketball Wildcats winning the National Invitational Tournament, the wrestling and rifle teams winning SEC titles and the baseball team winning the SEC Eastern Division.

The wrestling team repeated as conference champion the following year, the basketball team finished with a 26-4 record and the football team won seven of 11 regular season games and defeated North Carolina in the Peach Bowl. It was the best UK football record in 23 years and the Wildcats first post-season appearance since the 1952 Cotton Bowl. The next year, the football team finished 10-1 (6-0 in the Southeastern Conference) and the basketball team won the NCAA championship.

With both the football and basketball teams playing to sellout crowds and drawing a big on-the-road following, Hagan has not been content, but has made Wildcat games even more enjoyable by personally designing and selecting the Wildcat Mascot, which has captured the fancy of UK fans everywhere, and by granting permission for publication of "The Cats' Pause," a unique weekly tabloid devoted strictly to UK sports.

Physical improvements during Hagan's regime as athletics director include a 110-yard Astro-Turf football practice field, modern equipment in both the Shively Sports Center and Memorial Coliseum weight rooms, open-type lockers, a new pressbox and new dugouts at the baseball field, and a revamped tennis complex with additional seating and modernized offices. He has also added a strength coach to work with all sports and funds for the popular Parcourse Fitness Trail.

Offices in Memorial Coliseum have been modernized and Hagan is looking forward to the day when he can put on the drawing board an Olympic swimming pool, and plans for the expansion of Commonwealth Stadium.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and



scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

He received his M. S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington.

The Miami University Redskins opened their 1982-83 season just as impressively as they finished their previous year. Returning three starters from a team that reached the AIAW National quarter-finals, Miami won its first game this season by a 94-60 score over Morehead State last Monday. Five players hit double figures and 10 players managed to score in the impressive victory. The Redskins were to meet Cincinnati on Wednesday before coming to Lexington for today's game.

Miami has put together back-to-back seasons of more than 20 victories, and last year rolled up a 24-9 record en route to a Mid-American Conference Championship. Just before the current season began, the MAC was notified that this year's conference champion will receive an automatic bid into the NCAA post-season tournament. That news boosted enthusiasm into a program that is already establishing itself as a very well-respected national competitor.

Chief among the returnees for Miami this season are guards Kris Livingston and Linda Mallender. Livingston hit 52 percent from the field last year and averaged 11.2 points while being named All-MAC. Mallender is a big, 6-foot point guard who averaged 7.3 points last season. In the victory over Morehead last week, she poured in 30 points on 13-of-16 shooting, and added eight assists and six steals. Livingston pitched in 16 points, five assists and eight steals. Other double-figure scorers were 6-1 center Cindy Gibson and 5-10 forward Amy Cooley, with 11 points each, and sophomore forward Tonya Stubbs, with 10.

Kentucky and Miami last met officially in 1974, but the two teams also met informally in an unpublicized preseason scrimmage a year ago. Kentucky edged the Redskins, but learned to respect the Ohio team.

"We learned then that they have great outside shooting, and after watching them beat Morehead, we know that's still the case," said Kentucky Coach Terry Hall. "We also know they are an aggressive, well-disciplined team. They have good passers and they run the fast break well."

Miami is coached by Pam Wettig, the 1982 MAC Coach of the Year who has a 10-year career record of 152-88.

LADY KAT FEATURE

Diane Stephens: If Attitude Scored Points, She'd Be a Star

It has been well documented that a change from high school stardom to relative anonymity in college can sometimes be difficult for a teenager. Not so for Diane Stephens, who graduated from Louisville's Southern High School with a desire to continue learning and a willingness to do whatever was asked to help her team—even if it meant sacrificing personal aspirations.

Diane was named All-State and All-State Tournament as she led Southern to a 27-4 record her senior year. After considering several colleges, she chose Kentucky even though she knew the Lady Kats already had a wealth of talent at the guard spot. "She knew she wouldn't likely play much for at least two years," Coach Terry Hall recalls. "But she still wanted to come."

Last season, as a freshman, Diane saw just over 100 minutes of playing time. This year her playing time will increase substantially, but still no starting assignment is in sight. Diane greets the hard facts not with bitterness or false hopes, but with what Coach Hall calls "a great attitude."

"Hey, I love it here," Diane says. "I feel like I know Coach Hall as well as anybody and I really respect her as a coach. And how could anyone ever feel down about playing behind two players like Lea Wise and Patty Jo Hedges? I see them out there playing great basketball and it makes me feel good to be sitting on the bench of their team. Also, I realize that playing with them every day helps me improve my own game."

In Kentucky's opening win over Cincinnati, Diane was the first player off the bench. "I couldn't believe it," she said. "I was nervous. But the next time, I'll just be ready."

With three front line players gone from last season's team, Diane will see more time at small forward. At 5-9, she will put a new meaning into the adjective "small." She'll be backing up Lisa Collins, who, at 5-10, is one of the smallest forwards in the SEC.

An excellent shooter, Diane hit 50 percent of her shots as a freshman and canned 75 percent of her free throws. Other phases of her game continue to improve as her career progresses.

"She is one of the hardest working players we have," Hall says. "She has handled her role very well so far, and in doing that, she's helping herself and the team."

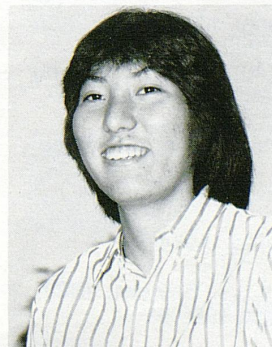

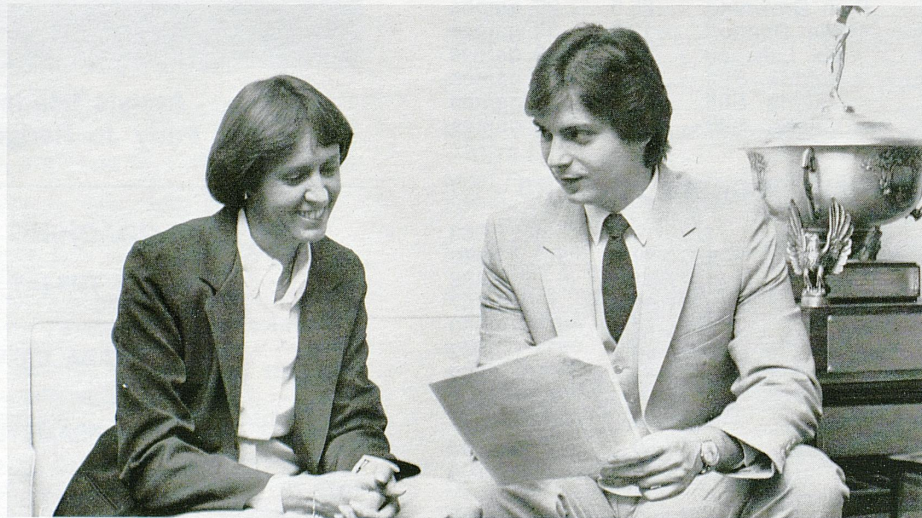

THE COACH TERRY HALL SHOW

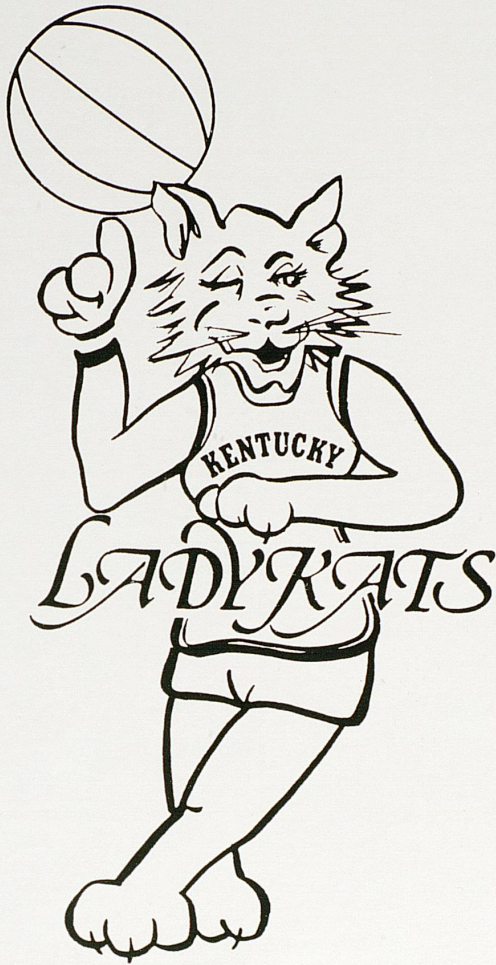
"The Coach Terry Hall Show will be something fresh and innovative—not your standard coach's show," promises Channel 36 Sports Director Kenny Rice. Believed to be one of two weekly women's coach's shows in the nation, the Terry Hall Show will be seen on Sunday afternoons at 5:30 p.m., with the time slot subject to change after the first of the year.

Channel 36 Station Manager Bill Service saw the growing interest in Lady Kats basketball and decided the time was right to initiate the show. "We think the team has a good shot at making the Final Four," said Rice. "And we want to be right there with them."

Rice, a 1980 graduate of UK who hails from Eastern, Ky., joined the Channel 36 staff in October of 1980, and was named Sports Director in March of 1982.
