Berryville, July 27th 1900.

My dear Scollay,

I paid the term taxes the same day that you sent me the check, and took receipts for them, but I was at the time engaged in moving my office, and laid the receipts on the table, intending to send them to you. The negro who was moving my office furniture, went in before I intended, and mixed up all the papers I had on both tables, and on my iron safe, and elsewhere in the room, in one common mass, so that I have not been able to put my hands on the receipts. This is the reason I have not written you sooner, as I was waiting to get the receipts, and send them to you. I am spending every spare minute in arranging the papers (there is almost a wagon load of them), and as soon as I come to them I will endorse them to you.

The State tax I will pay when I make a call

on the County Treasurer for a settlement of an installment
of my salary.

Sam. Taylor tells me he has sent you the
policy of insurance.

I attended at Whiting's office on the 19th,
in the Mc Lermick case. He has not made up his
report, but he will report Edward's interest as heir
of his mother to be one sixth, subject to your life estate
in it, and one fifth of one sixth as an heir of Miss
Flora Mc Lermick, who I believe I wrote you, died
intestate as to the land. The whole tract is subject
to M^{rs} Mc Lermick's dower.

We are all well. Janie is at Berkeley Springs, on
a visit to M^{rs} J. Hammond Siler (Miss Jessie Catte-
man) and Nora has gone to Gloucester.
