### Exhibits

ALBERT EINSTEIN is honored with an exhibit in the Engineering Library. Original articles that he wrote for Annalen der Physik, 1905 are the rare items in the display. One is a critical article on the electrodynamics of moving articles. Others are on his special theory of relativity. Some of the materials are from the private collections of faculty members. One of the portraits of Einstein was drawn especially for this occasion by Robert Lihani.

KENTUCKY RIVER SURVEYS AND KENTUCKY FLOODS-THEN AND NOW; a new exhibit in the Gallery of King North traces the river from the first survey authorized by the federal government in 1829. The river has been studied from the view point of navigation of economic impact upon its valley, of recreational opportunities, of floods. Rivers of East and West Kentucky as well as the Kentucky and its tributaries have created destruction with their flooding. The exhibit explores the most widely known floods of 1937, 1957, and 1977. Federal and state government have given suggestions for the causes of flooding, ways to avoid some of its dangers, and programs for disaster relief.

### THE UNIVERSITY AND INFLATION

Inflation is hurting the pocketbook of the University of Kentucky, causing loss of competitive strength in obtaining personnel and difficulty in financing programs, Dr. Singletary said in testimony before a legislative subcommittee in Frankfort last week.

He traced the social, political, and economic climates of the post-Sputnik 50's, the turbulent 60's and early 70's that have cost the "darling" status of higher education.

The Kentucky Governor's Pre-White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services meets at the Lexington Hyatt Regency March 16-18.
