

Change of Title and Course Description:

Metallurgical Engineering 166 - Minerals Beneficiation. (5 sem. hrs.)
Study of the theory of mineral dressing and of the machines used in preparing crude minerals for market is supplemented by reference reading to acquaint the student with the application of theory to the problems of preparing specific minerals. Consideration is given to the principles of design of mineral preparation plants. Lecture and recitation, five hours. Prerequisites: Chemistry 21a, Physics 3b, and Met. Eng. 26 or Met. Eng. 27.

Change of Title, Credit and Course Description:


Metallurgical Engineering 167 - Minerals Beneficiation Laboratory.
(1 sem. hr.)
The theories of mineral dressing are applied in the laboratory: accompanying Met. Eng. 166. The approach to practical problems in mineral dressing is emphasized. Laboratory, two hours. Prerequisite or concurrent: Met. Eng. 166.

New Courses:

Electrical Engineering 103 - Electrical Laboratory for Mining Engineers.
(1 sem. hr.)
A laboratory study of circuits and equipment used in the servicing and operation of industrial equipment. With special emphasis on mining applications. Laboratory: three hours. Concurrent: Elec. Eng. 102.

Mining Engineering 132 - Mine Rescue Training and First Aid. (No credit)
This course is required of all mining engineers, and covers the fundamental principles of mine rescue training and first aid, to be given on the University campus by the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals, the U. S. Bureau of Mines or both in collaboration. Prerequisite: Junior or Senior Classification.

The Chairman of the Committee on Rules presented the following report, which was approved by the University Faculty.

The Rules Committee met Tuesday, July 25, at 3:00 p.m., in the office of Vice-President Chamberlain. Dr. Sprowles presided. Other members present were George K. Brady, Leo M. Chamberlain, John Kuiper, Samuel Mory, and M. M. White.

The Chairman stated that he had called the meeting to consider the cases of students who are members of various reserve units of the armed services and who are being called to active duty before the close of the summer session. He presented the following rules which had been passed by the University Faculty January 9, and June 19, 1942.

January 9, 1942

"1. A student at the University of Kentucky who, after completing the eighth week and before completing the twelfth week of the semester, withdraws and within ten days is accepted into the armed forces of the United States shall be entitled to receive, without examination, credit and residence for one-half of each course in which he is passing at the time of his withdrawal. The grade reported shall be that attained in the course up to the time of withdrawal.

"2. Where such withdrawal occurs upon completion of the twelfth week of the semester, or later, such a student shall be entitled to receive full credit and residence under like conditions.

"3. If with the credit and residence thus granted the student has fulfilled all requirements for a degree, he shall be recommended for that degree by the Faculty of the University. If a comprehensive examination is required for graduation, this requirement shall be waived.

"4. For students in the College of Law, the regulations set up by the Association of American Law Schools at its December, 1941, meeting are adopted. **

June 19, 1942

"The Faculty placed the following interpretation on a rule adopted last winter, relative to the credit a student might receive on leaving for military service. Under the quarter system, the student may receive full credit if he remains in school through six weeks of the quarter. For one term of the summer quarter, the minimum attendance requirements shall be four and three weeks respectively."

**At the request of Dean Evans, this action was rescinded May 4, 1943, and Law students were placed under the general University regulations governing credit to students leaving for military service.

The general rule has never been rescinded, but it makes no provision for the eight weeks' summer session. After discussion, the Committee adopted the following resolution, subject to approval by the University Faculty.

"That the rule adopted by the University Faculty January 9, 1942, relative to credit for students called into the armed services, be reaffirmed and that it be in effect for the first semester of 1950-51 and for succeeding semesters; that for the eight weeks' summer session the student may receive full credit if he remains

in school through the sixth week of the summer session, and half credit if he remains through the fourth week. The Registrar is to inform the Deans of the colleges of the exact credit dates for each term. The college Deans are to certify to the Registrar's Office the date of the student's withdrawal, the date of induction into the service, and the amount of credit due."

The Faculty approved the recommendation of the Rules Committee.

In connection with the report of the Rules Committee, a question was raised concerning those students who are members of reserve units and who were ordered to camp two weeks before the close of the summer session. The Faculty approved a motion to apply in this particular instance the rule allowing credit to students called into the armed services. It was the consensus that this should in no way set a precedent; that rather, it was an exception made because of the emergency and would apply only to the 1950 summer session.

Miss Haseldon presented for the Committee on Student Organizations a request from Tau Kappa, a local social fraternity, to petition to Tau Kappa Epsilon, a national fraternity. The Faculty approved the request.

Dean White presented the following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences, which were approved by the University Faculty.

New Courses:

English 156a, The Modern American Novel (3)

Studies the American novel from 1900 to the present. Novels by Theodore Dreiser, Willa Cather, Sinclair Lewis, Ernest Hemingway, Thomas Wolfe, and William Faulkner emphasized, but some choice of reading also allowed. Novels chosen for their enduring value rather than historical importance; particular attention paid to shifting techniques of fiction and to contrasting interpretations of the American scene.

English 156b, The Modern British Novel (3)

A study of the content and technique of the best twentieth-century British novels, with some consideration of these in relation to significant social, philosophical, and literary trends.

English 500, 1-2-3, Thesis (0)

Geography 500, 1-2-3, Thesis (0)

Sociology 109a, The Family (3) (Effective Feb. 1951)

A study of the institutions of marriage and family as they have existed

in the past and are changing at present; an analysis of the various factors and forces at work in our time which are affecting the individual marital relationship.

Sociology 109b, The Family (3) (Effective Feb., 1951)

A study of the various social situations in which children grow from birth to early adolescence with particular emphasis on primary group relations in the home, neighborhood, play group, and school. Parent-child relationships under the impact of urbanization with the changing roles of each as they are being redefined. Prerequisite: Sociology 109a or permission of instructor.

Courses to be dropped:

Physical Education 21, Recreational Sports

The faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences recommends the adoption of the following Foreign Language Requirements Rule, as amended:

The foreign language requirement may be satisfied either by passing a basic achievement examination or by passing with an average of C the first and second semesters of the second year course in one of the following languages: French, German, Greek, Italian, Latin, Russian, Spanish.

Assistant Dean Horlacher presented for the College of Agriculture and Home Economics the following recommendations:

Home Economics 103a and b, Public School Nutrition, 3 credits each, to be changed to

Home Economics 103a and b, Community Nutrition, 3 credits each.

A study of the nutrition education movement with emphasis on causes and effects of malnutrition, the relationship between social and economic factors and nutrition and the importance of good nutrition to social and economic welfare. Opportunity is given to observe and participate in community nutrition projects including public school nutrition programs.

These recommendations were approved by the Faculty.

Dean Dickey presented the following recommendations from the College of Education.

Raise Education 16, Educational Psychology, 3 semester hours to Education 148, Educational Psychology, 3 semester hours. Course description will remain the same.

Authorize Education 286a,b, Seminar in Vocational Education, 2 semester hours each. The description of this course to be as follows:

A critical study of selected problems in vocational education. The course is open only to students with experience in the field.

The Faculty approved the recommendations from the College of Education.

In the absence of Dean Sloan, Dr. Slesser presented the following recommendations of the College of Pharmacy for new courses and changes in courses.

Dr. Slesser also presented a recommendation from the College of Pharmacy for the following rule governing probations in the college. After some discussion and one slight amendment, the rule was approved by the University Faculty as follows:

"If a student in the College of Pharmacy is placed on probation, he must attain a quality point standing in his next succeeding semester of not less than 1.0 in that semester's work. If he is still on probation at the end of this period, he may be continued on probation for a second semester. At the end of this time he must have attained an over-all quality point standing of not less than 1.0 or be dropped from the college rolls."
